



Any person who is the sole hear may homestead a quarter secti available Dominion land in Man Saskatchewan' or Alberta. The cant must appear in person at th minion Lands Agency or Sub-a for the district. Entry by proxy be made at any agency, on conditions by father, mother, laughter, brother or sister of int

Duties-Six months' residence within nine miles of his homest a farm of at least 80 acres solely c and occupied by him or by his mother, son, daughter, brother

In certain districts a bomestead good standing may pre-empt a qu section alongside his hemestead.

Duties-Must reside upon the h stead or pre-empfion six month each of six years from date of he stead entry (including the time reques homestead patent) and cultivate acres extra.
