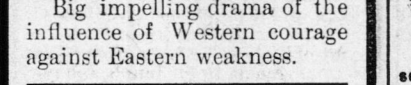

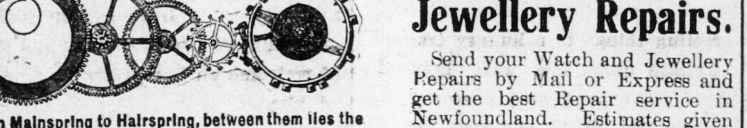

## The Summer Complexion.

In one way the summer is a boon to the beauty seeker. There is nothing so beneficial to the skin as profuse perspiration, as it cleanses the pores of impurities in a way that no Turkish bath can accomplish.

To help this process, drink plenty of cool, fresh water. Don't drink ice water; it creates rather than quenches thirst, retards the digestion of food, and may cause serious intestinal troubles.

On the other hand, the end of the summer will find many women in despair over their complexion troubles. For one thing, it is sometimes difficult to get hot water for washing purposes in the summer. You cannot keep the skin clean by washing exclusively in cold water; indeed, if the face is really grimy, the cold water will "set" the dirt. Insist on the daily warm bath for your complexion during the hot weather if you have to heat the water over an oil stove.

A good deal of trouble caused by tan and sunburn is due to carelessness. Don't go out in the hot sun without a hat. A bad case of sunburn is a serious matter, from which the complexion may be long recovering.

If your skin becomes seriously tanned or burned, don't neglect it until you go home from your vacation or until the weather is cooler. It may then be too late to repair the damage.

Never wash the face in cold water immediately after exposure—use water as hot as you can bear it. Fresh butter-milk is an excellent remedy for the sunburned skin. Wash the face in it as if with water, and allow it to dry in.

It is better not to use soap on the skin if it is irritated and inflamed. Apply cloths wrung out of hot water to the face until the impurities are removed. Then dry the face carefully and rub in (while the skin is still warm) a liberal supply of cold cream. Pat it in if the face is very sensitive.

Remove the surplus cold cream with a soft cloth, and apply cloths dipped in cold water to the face. Do this several times. The water for the last application should contain a few drops of benzoin, or an astringent should be dabbed into the skin before the powder is applied.

A half hour's attention to the complexion every night during the hot weather will prevent roughening and coarsening of the skin that is often the result of the vacation season.—Mme. Jeanne La Place in Woman's World for August.

## The Souvenir Hunter.

What is a thief? That sounds like a simple question, doesn't it? And yet I know a great many people who apparently do not know how to define that term.

Just recently a young girl who belongs to an excellent family, and who has always seemed to me like a girl of principle, showed me with pride a collection of souvenir spoons bearing the monograms of various hotels.

"Jack is collecting them for me," she said. "You know he attends so many of those athletic banquets, and he always manages to bring me a spoon as a souvenir."

Jack is her fiance. We are often told that one of the first duties of women is to inspire their men folk to live up to higher moral standards. Again the travelers who visit places of historic interest are notoriously among those who do not know how to define the term "thief." How the homes of famous people, which have been thrown open to the public have suffered from these kleptomaniacs, only the caretakers really know. Nothing is too small, nothing too large and nothing too sacred for the souvenir hunter to bear away. I believe it was Beethoven's piano which was entirely robbed of its ivories by this variety of thief.

Now perhaps you think it is only the intellectually lower class of people who commit such outrages. Don't you believe it. Surely we might expect to find the real upper classes of society in the colleges if anywhere. Tell me, Mrs. Souvenir Hunter, when you make way with a spoon or a butter plate or some other bit of bric-a-brac, from whom do you think you are stealing? You don't like that word? It's the right one, but I'll pamper you this time—from whom do you think you are collecting this souvenir? The hotel you say, or the company. Sometimes, perhaps, but not always. Let me tell you how the matter is arranged on the ship in which I travelled, and how it probably is arranged in many cases.

At the end of the trip the china and silver is counted, the loss worked and divided among the table waiters, and that loss, an officer assured me, often comes to \$10 or \$15 a trip.

Think of it, \$10 or \$15 stolen every few days from those poor fellows who people who must be at least decently well off.

The thief who steals her jewels from a wealthy woman is a greater criminal in the eyes of the law than the kind of thief, but to my mind he is half so despicable.

## Cable News

**Special to Evening Telegram.**—LONDON, Aug. 5.—Nine boy scouts were drowned the capsizing of a cutter, off St. Island to-day. A large number of Scouts were present to their meeting camp on the island when the accident occurred.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**—LONDON, Aug. 5.—Bishop Casey, of St. John, N. B., has been appointed Archbishop of Halifax, in succession to Archbishop McNeil, who has been promoted to see of Ontario. Rev. Fr. LeBlanc Digby, has been appointed Bishop of St. John.

**Special Evening Telegram.**—LONDON, Aug. 5.—An aeroplane with a pilot and passengers crossed the English Channel from Danais, Sunday morning a storm. The aeroplane landed at Ashford, Kent, but owing to the wind, collided with a tree. The pilot was smashed, but the occupants escaped injury.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**—LONDON, Aug. 5.—The Legislative Council has fallen in line with the other colonies, and ratified the trade agreement with Canada. It also agrees that in fulfillment of the terms of the agreement, the colony will extend to live products and manufactures of the United Kingdom and Newfoundland.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**—LONDON, Aug. 5.—An Imperial decree was issued today dissolving the Turkish Parliament. The Chamber passed a vote of confidence in the Cabinet, and the President of the Chamber, at Palazzo, to report the action of the Chamber, but the Sultan declined to receive him. It is reported that the ex-Minister of Finance, one of the leading members of the Cabinet, is arrested.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**—BERLIN, Aug. 5.—The Lokal Anzeiger publishes Kiel despatch to-day saying that the Englishmen have been arrested, Eberhard, in Schleswig Holstein, a charge of espionage. They appeared off the coast in a yacht, and they were caught ashore, and it is alleged they were caught taking photographs. A police confiscated the plates which they found on the yacht, which, developed, proved to be pictures of every harbor and fortification of the Coast. The names of the Englishmen have not been made public.

## Household Notes.

If you live in the country and throw soapuds and dishwater out, don't forget that rose bushes and other pet plants will thrive on it.

If you are so unfortunate as to have different sizes of sheets in your linen closet, mark all the sheets of a size with one distinguishing mark. To take fruit stains out of linen, stretch the stained spot over a bowl and pour boiling water through it. Peach stains are an exception to this rule.

Salmon or salmon trout sandwiches are delicious. Make the fish and add a little cream to it. A dash of French mustard is an improvement.

If lamp chimneys are only a little clouded and you wish to save time, simple steam them inside over the tea kettle and wipe with a clean cheesecloth.

The net gimpes so much worn nowadays will last much longer if they are washed without ironing. Shape them carefully while damp instead.

Add a little salt to the bluing water in which white clothes are rinsed if you want to be sure to keep the bluing from setting in spots or stripes.

Olives, stoned and chopped and mixed with fresh butter or heavy cream, and cream cheese make one of the most delicious of sandwich fillings.

To keep the kitchen range fire when you are not using it, take the stove-lids off a little while before putting on fresh coal. Then put the lids on only half way.

A good way to serve salad is in tomato shells. Take the skin off the tomato, cut a slice off at the stem and scoop out core and seeds. Put in refrigerator until wanted.

If you find insects when washing lettuce, put it through salted water, then rinse again in clear. But be sure not to leave in the salt water more than a minute or it will wilt.

In cellar or pantry where it is difficult to keep the air dry, place bowls of unslaked lime on the shelves near the food. The lime, of course, should be renewed from time to time.

A delicious Turkish dish can be made from left-over roast beef, tomato sauce and rice. Chop the beef and heat together with the rice and tomato in a saucepan; season with pepper and dash of curry.

Early in the season, when apples are scarce, the windfalls make excellent apple sauce. Cut out all the wormy portions and cores, but do not pare them; then cook and rub through a hair sieve.

If your family is small and table scraps are numerous, the easiest way to dispose of them is to put them under the back lids of the stove to dry out. When dry, they should be raked forward on the bed of coals and burned.

To make the best lemonade, make a syrup of a pint of water and two cups of sugar, to which is added the yellow rind of two lemons and one orange. Bring to a boil and add the juice of four lemons and one orange. Cool and ice. Add three pints of ice-water before serving.

Sandwiches are greatly preferred to cakes at the fashionable afternoon teas in England. One delicious sort is made with thin toast, with filling of grated parmesan cheese made into paste with anchovy sauce and cream and seasoned with cayenne, salt and black pepper. These have to be served instantly, or the toast gets sodden.

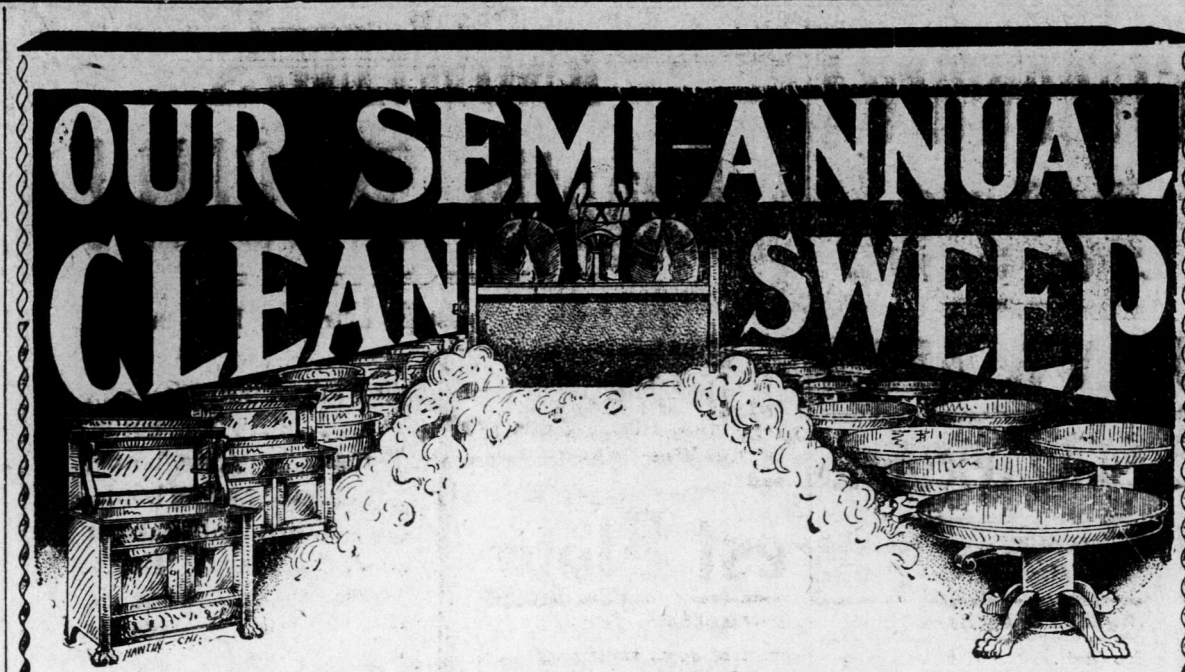
The most delicious fruit pies are made in the English way. Line the sides of a pudding dish with paste, put a cup upside down in the middle, to hold the juice, and fill the dish with the fruit sugared to taste. Cover the whole paste, making a pastry "rose" for the centre. Before the pie comes to the table, this rose should be cut out circularly, the cup removed and the rose replaced.

### The Sooner the Better!

We welcome the advent of the Chronicle last night, although belated, to the ranks of those expressing an expectation that Sir Ralph Champey's Williams will be transferred to other climes. The suggestion is coated with sugar in order to suit the palate of the Governor, but the bitter aloes are inside the sweet dressing. Here is the Chronicle confession:—

"The declaration is made every day that the Governor's usefulness is gone, and we may, therefore, naturally expect that in due course Sir Ralph Williams will receive a still more important appointment from the Imperial Government than Newfoundland is regarded to be."

Yes, there it is plain and plump, and we do not cavil at a word of it. All that we want is that the Governor shall go, and go quickly. Where he goes does not trouble us. It is to a land flowing with milk and honey, where the skies are always blue, where he may drink the nectar of the gods, and not like Jove on Olympian heights, that will content us. If he is translated to a veritable Lotus land, we shall be satisfied. If he is promoted to profits and pleasures, surpassing the imagination of the Chronicle, we shall still rejoice at his going. All that we want is that he shall go and go quickly, and we are more than delighted with the assurance that now his uselessness is shown up he will go in due course that we were not only delighted but really surprised at the refreshing frankness of the Chronicle. We did not expect it, and we would hazard the guess that the Governor expected it even less, and rubbed his eyes as hard as the Reids did when they read the famous Chicago letter. That is the surprising side of it. You never know what to expect from the writer, when a Government is tottering and times are critical, and the delightful aspect of it is that these unexpected surprises are signs of the times, that all in Newfoundland can read.

The Governor may have been annoyed at the suggestion, although it was thickly coated with sugar, we were pleased, and we were especially pleased to think that the Governor would go, according to the Chronicle in due course.

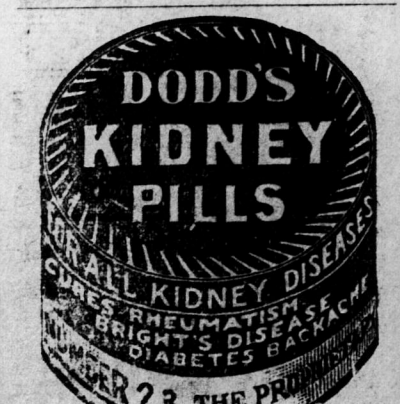
The assurance that delighted us most of all was contained in the words "in due course." The Chronicle does not leave us in doubt that the title will be short. The writer illustrates his meaning. He tells his readers the Telegram cartooned Governor MacCallum, and attacked Governor MacGregor.

These Governors remained but a short time in Newfoundland after the incidents to which the Chronicle directs attention. "In due course," in these precedents, was measured by months. The Chronicle's words therefore, must be comforting to the Governor. He has to bear the arrows and slings of outrageous fortune but a few months, and then heighho for the profits and pleasures of the high preferment which the Imperial Government will hasten to confer on the Governor who took into his fullest confidence a Minister of Justice who declared he didn't know it was wrong to tell a licensee he could steal Government timber.

But soft, it surely cannot be that the Secretary for the Colonies may give as short a shrift to the suggested preferment as he did to the Governor's effort to saddle him with the Morison-Cooker Memorials. After all the Secretary of State did not seem to hanker after commending Morison's ethical standard.

It would be a sad spectacle if the Secretary of State should forget to reward His Excellency for taking Morison to his heart. We hope sincerely the Chronicle is right and that the Secretary of State will not forget to reward him out of Newfoundland. The sooner, the better.

## Ice and Refrigeration.

The Municipal Fish Co., of Cleveland, or rather what is left of it, has decided selling fresh fish just out of the water in large quantities cannot be done from day to day, as it were, so the concern has decided to build a cold storage plant, capacity 60,000 pounds, near the company's dock near West Third Street. Temporary storage will be rented until it is completed. The Company's three tugs are now out to catch fish for storage.

The cold storage committee appointed by the Chicago Association of Commerce, after a year of investigation, have come to the following conclusions embodied in a recent report: Your committee finds at the outset there is an unreasonable prejudice on the part of the public towards food products which have been in cold storage. The responsibility for such prejudice is traceable directly to the retailer who sells food products unfit for consumption, many of which have never been in cold storage. The consumer finding the product tainted and unfit for use readily denominates the article as a cold storage product. To cite a specific example—fish caught in the winter time are frequently allowed to drown in the nets because of the inability of the fisherman, by reason of ice and weather conditions, to empty his nets more than once or twice in a week. These fish are sold in the market and deteriorate rapidly. The consumer blames cold storage, whereas, as a fact, a cold storage fish delivered in a frozen condition and properly thawed out is perfectly wholesome and greatly superior to the so-called "fresh" fish. Your committee, upon careful investigation, believes it to be a fact that articles when taken out of cold storage deteriorate more rapidly than fresh articles which have never been in cold storage; and for this reason the retailer should be obliged to exercise more care in the handling of these articles. We believe a great deal of the criticism of cold storage products is due to the fact that the retailer displays them on his counters and in his shop after they have been permitted to thaw out, and takes little precaution to see the article is not subjected to temperature which will cause deterioration.

## Boy Burned to Death.

TWO MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES WHILE BOATING.

Sherbrooke, Quebec, Aug. 1.—A young lad named Blais was burned to death last night. He and three other boys had collected potato bags in a tin can and put coal oil on them, when one of the boys dropped a match in the can, with the result that Blais' clothing caught fire.

Sherbrooke, Quebec, Aug. 1.—A double drowning fatality occurred at Little Lake Magog, a summer resort, about 8 miles from Sherbrooke, last night. Three men, Louis Brousseau, J. Massey and F. Horton, went out in a boat. In changing seats they upset the craft, and the three men went into the water. Brousseau endeavored to save one man, but the latter struggled so that he had to give up the attempt. Brousseau hung on to the boat, and was rescued.

**Leonidas.**

Leonidas was a Spartan hero who earned a large bronze monument by holding the pass of Thermopylae with three hundred men and a shoe-string.

Leonidas was a king of Sparta at the time this occurred. Sparta was a small, irritable country, about the size of a Florida town site, but it was never stepped upon with any success. The male population lived on cayenne pepper and rare beefsteak and practiced shooting at a mark eight hours a day. Every once in a while some foreign potentate would make up his mind to the Sparta to his chariot wheels and subdue her proud spirit, but he invariably returned home and kicked himself into a state of sweet somnolence.

Along about 480 B. C. Xerxes, king of Persia, became offended at something Sparta had said and decided to annex her in a hostile tone of voice. He accordingly rounded up a neat little army of 2,000,000 men and headed for the Grecian archipelago, which was about in the same place it is now.

Xerxes did not get far before he ran into the pass of Thermopylae, which was a short cut between the mountains wide enough to allow two thin men to pass each other without being telescoped. Here Xerxes found Leonidas drawn up in battle array, defying the whole Persian army in some of the rudest Greek adjectives ever used.

Xerxes took the affair as a joke until Leonidas had spit a few thousand Persian husbands on his trusty sword, when he concluded that this was increasing the pension roll too fast and hired the only crooked Spartan ever discovered to lead his army through a pass in the mountains until he could get in Leonidas' rear.

When Leonidas discovered that he was surrounded he mounted a stump and announced that it was his present intention to die with his boots on, or words to that effect. He thereupon gave his three hundred men a nice course dinner and after adjusting his boots charged the entire Persian army, which filled him so full of arrows that he had to be pin-feathered before being removed to the family residence.

**To Reduce Cost of Living.**

There is still a chance that the high cost of living will be reduced. Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, of the Labrador Mission, tells of the latent resources of Labrador about how the reduction can be brought about by merely changing the dinner course from beefsteak to reindeer.

At present too little attention is paid to the conservation of animal life in the northern country, and reindeers are left to be exploited and diminished. The reindeer development is in its infancy, but despite this fact, the herds number 30,000, and with regular breeding it is likely that 20,000 fawns will be added this season.

"Here is an opportunity for large investment of private capital, which would be a profitable money making proposition," says Dr. Grenfell. "The meat of reindeer could be made to add much to the world's supply at a small cost, the animal's milk could be exported and the skins could be made an important factor in the fur market. The skin could also be tanned, creating another industry, and used for the making of gloves. Three or four millions of deer could be maintained within the bounds of Labrador.

**Regatta Notes.**

Despite the downpour of rain a goodly number of citizens visited the Regatta last evening to witness the boat racing.

Conditions were poor for good rowing and the best time was 10.14 made by the S. U. F. in the Guard.

The French warship will take part in the Naval Race and her crew had a spin in the Shamrock yesterday afternoon.

The C. C. C. were out in the Red Cross and finished the course in 10.42.

Some of the experienced oarsmen, who are present to know, say that the Nettle R. is one of the best boats on the Lake and that it is not unlikely to see the Outer Cove record time lowered to-morrow.

A noticeable feature on the Lake last night was an incompetent coxswain who nearly carried the rudder out of the Nettle R. by colliding with the late John and Mary Forward. The committee should see this rectified, as last year they passed a rule not to have incompetents.

Tonight the crews will have their final practice.

All that is wanting to make our 1912 Henley Day the biggest success on record is a fine day.

She leaves to mourn two brothers—Harry, in New York, and George, sailmaker, of this city, and two nieces—Misses Irene and Rose Forward, of St. John's. To the relatives and friends of the deceased much sympathy is expressed in their bereavement.

**Ireland's Police.**

Some Facts About the Royal Irish Constabulary.

The Royal Irish Constabulary, in consequence of the Home Rule Bill, is now a much-discussed police force. Many people have only a vague idea of its existence and know nothing of its inner workings. It is a semi-military force. The rank and file are armed with the Lee-Metford rifle, sword bayonet, thirty rounds of ammunition and Webley revolver.

It consists of one inspector-general, one deputy, and three assistants. These reside in Dublin, and have their offices in the Castle. From here the whole police force of the thirty-two counties is controlled. In addition to the above there are thirty-six county inspectors, whose position corresponds to that of chief constable in England and Scotland.

There are 196 district inspectors serving under the county inspector, in the various counties, and about 10,000 head constables, acting-sergeants, and constables. The district inspectors are the lowest commissioned officers, and are comprised of two classes. One class join the force by competitive examination as cadets, the same as the army. The other half are promoted from the ranks, some by competitive examination, some for good police duty, and, last, a goodly number by private influence. The latter is the least popular officer with the men.

The forces cost the nation over six million dollars annually. The officers' salaries—county and district inspectors—and allowances are extremely liberal in comparison with the rank and file. A young officer passing his examination, is sent to a county district, and commences at \$600 per annum. This may look small, but there take his allowances, which tot up to more than his pay. He gets \$250 for the upkeep of a horse—that sometimes does not exist, \$225 for a room, \$15 for lodging allowance, \$50 for his office, \$15 for stationery, etc. Not a bad job for a young fellow who has only to sign his name to a few documents daily, written and tabulated by a head constable, perhaps of over thirty years' service.

Now for the other side. The efficient constable, who acts as clerk to the district inspector, commences at \$17 per annum. He remains at about \$1 a week until he attains fifteen years' service. If he is fortunate he attains the rank of sergeant with more pay and when on the eve of retiring on pension, say at twenty-eight or thirty years' service, he may be promoted head constable on "the minimum wage," less than a district inspector is allowed for his horse and groom!

Mr. Robert Loraine, the actor-aviator who has been "had up" again for exceeding the speed limit in his motor car, tells a good story of the day when he was a member of a touring company in the provinces.

After the final fall of the curtain on the first performances in each new town they visited, the manager used to assemble the entire company on the stage and criticize their performances. The company used to form in an irregular line, with the leading lady at one end and the least important super at the other, and the manager found each of them in turn.

"One night he passed Mr. Loraine without saying anything. "As you did not say anything about my performance," Mr. Loraine commented, "I take it I was all right."

"I did not say anything about your performance," said the manager jolly, "because what I have to say to you I must say in private!"

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### Roosevelt Convention Opened.

Special Evening Telegram. CHICAGO, To-day. The first session of the first convention of the new National Progressive Party was opened yesterday by the usual ceremony of a national political gathering. The actual proceedings were suggestive of a love feast, no resenting voice being raised during the session. The question of negro representatives from the South had caused some friction on the day of the national committee, but there was no echo of this light on the floor of the convention. Former Senator Beveridge, Indiana, presided. Amid acclaim he was escorted to his place on the stage decorated with a gold badge and handed the convention gavel. Senator Beveridge then delivered his key note speech and expressed some advance ideas of Government, adopted by the new party, paving the way for the more progressive proposals to be made to the convention by Colonel Roosevelt to-day. For Vice-President, Governor Johnson, of California, Permanent Chairman, Le Kidme Lindsey, Denver. This slate was agreed to by the National Progressive leader and met with the approval of Roosevelt. The Colonel endorsed strongly he recommended for Judge Lindsey, he recommended for permanent chairman, Lindsey is a former Democrat of southern parentage. It was felt his election would be an appeal to the South.

### The Biggest Yet.
