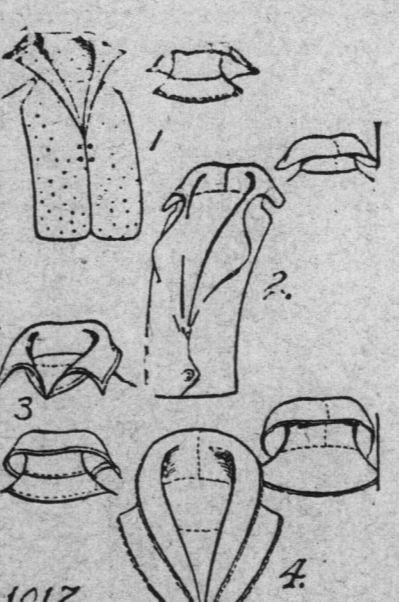

Love is a great and wonderful force and any love worthy the name partakes of the spiritual. Yet even the highest and most wonderful love must also partake of the material and be influenced and affected by material things, —and by very little things too.

I thought of this the other day when a friend of mine was ridiculing an assertion, made in a newspaper interview by a well known customer, that ill-fitting corsets had a great deal to do with divorce.

Now of course the connection between corsets and divorce is sensational and rather ridiculous on the face of it, but dig deeper, and perhaps it won't seem so absurd. Ill fitting corsets cause ill health. Ill health causes ill humor. Ill humor certainly lends towards divorce.

So such a small and very material thing as an ill fitting garment may have a tremendous effect upon such a great and spiritual thing as love. Especially is love subject to insignificant and material influences at the beginning of its existence. Just as

the little rivulet may be turned into a new channel by the falling of a rock or by a few moments' work while it takes years of labor or some cataclysm of nature to turn the course of the same stream when it has grown into a mighty river, so the love which might have become a great and powerful force may be easily turned aside at its inception.

The Wolf.

The wolf is a long-legged, lanky animal composed principally of jaws and appetite which infests the temperate zones in all countries and has never succeeded in making itself useful while living.

There are many kinds of wolves of assorted sizes but they have one general characteristic. They are always hungry. The wolf is a strict vegetarian, living entirely upon meat and not being particular about whether the meat is still alive or not. For this reason, there is nothing more unpleasant or alarming than the loud edger howl of a pack of wolves which haven't dined for several days and are on their way to a meal.

The wolf looks much like a dog and associates with him readily, in country fashion. A large wolf is almost 6 feet long but when he opens his mouth red jaws and asks for dinner, one can see into his interior about 5 yards. He is a hard fighter and is very fatal to domestic animals, but usually declines to deliver hostilities until there are a half dozen of him on hand. In Russia, where wolves are almost as numerous and cruel as officials, peasants are frequently devoured by them during the winter and in some parts of the United States, notably northern Michigan and Minnesota, the man who ventures into the woods after a long blizzard without a magazine rifle and the means of delivering an S. O. S. call is not wise.

The wolf has survived the advance of civilization in this country far better than any other wild animal and is still found in such-up-to-date and crowded states as Illinois, Indiana and New York. But he is very unpopular and has to live entirely by his wits. All hands are against him and the man who discovers a wolf and massacres him gets a handsome bounty from the county. In this respect the native wolf is not as well off as the human variety who gets into our councils and legislatures, mangles justice for the sake of a bribe and is then eagerly defended by lawyers, newspapers and his party associates. The United States is no longer in any danger from the four-legged wolf, but the two-legged variety still exists in large numbers and uses a loophole in the law as a den with the greatest success.

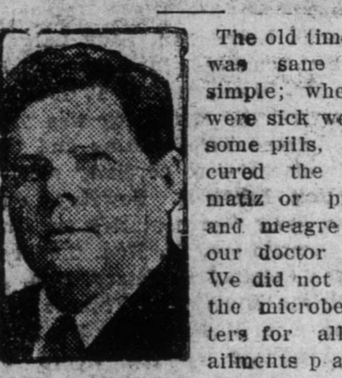
The new sunshades have plain hook handles of polished horn, jade or lapis lazuli.

Foresight and Hindsight.

The good offices of Sir Edward Grey did fair either to avert war between Austria and Serbia or to localize it. Austria lays upon the Serbian Government the responsibility for the assassination of the late Archduke and his wife and asks for assurance of good behaviour for the future. Serbia is intensely jealous of Austrian aggression which is directed mainly at Serbian expense. The danger of such a conflict spreading arises from racial jealousies between Slav and Teuton. There is a risk of Russia backing Serbia, and Germany taking a hand against Russia on account of her interference, with the remote risk of France siding with Russia and the still more remote risk of Britain being dragged into the war through France. Germany has already issued a warning of hands-off which can be meant only for Russia. France it is stated will hold aloof, unless Russia is attacked by another power. Sir Edward Grey, the British Foreign Secretary, is endeavoring to keep the peace between the outsiders and to arrange a conference with the object of finding a solution for the difficulty between Austria and Serbia.

Sir Edward Grey succeeded in localizing the Balkan struggle during the recent war with Turkey, and there is every prospect of him obtaining an assurance from the outside powers that they will take no part, even if war should ensue between Austria and Serbia.

It is a thousand pities a similar foresight and prior care could not have been taken in Ireland. The stupidity of the Government in permitting non-Government Volunteers to be enrolled, organized, armed and put on a war-footing is now amply demonstrated. They have allowed the Ulster Volunteers to grow so formidable that they fear to utilize troops against their lawless deeds, and when troops are used to stop lawless acts of a less formidable force, they are naturally and fairly taunted with not administering the law impartially.

The fact of the matter is plain that regular troops are useless in Ireland for enforcing the law either in Ulster

or out of it. If the Government intend to stop gun running, they must do it by the navy and at sea. There they are still supreme and they have plenty of ships for the purpose. In Ireland they must recognize that almost a state of potential war exists, which may break out at any time. The restraining influence of Redmond is to be seen in the fact that the Dublin tragedy has not been followed by reprisals of even a worse nature. The Government can only act as mediators between armed men, and the quicker this is realized the better for everybody. Delays are dangerous. Such incidents as those of Sunday impart intense bitterness and resentment and make a settlement the more difficult to bring about.

Broad Cove Regatta.

Those interested in the Broad Cove Regatta, have changed the date at which it was to be held on the last whole holiday in August to the half-holiday on August 12th. Fishing boats will be used instead of race boats, as was the old-time custom, and this will give a better chance to the fishermen of the nearby settlements, who might otherwise find difficulty in obtaining raceboats. Entries must be made by August 5th.

The Earl Grey Arrives in Port.

WITH ROYAL COMMISSION ON BOARD.

The Royal Commissioners who are representatives of His Majesty's Dominions, came here to-day at 1 p.m. on the Canadian cruiser Earl Grey, the object of their visit being to take local evidence regarding the Trade and Natural resources of Newfoundland. The Commissioners were expected to reach here on Saturday last but were detained on account of the Allan Liner Alsatian being fog-bound for two days and a half in mid-Atlantic by which ship they were carried from Liverpool to Rimouski. At the latter port they joined the Earl Grey in charge of Capt. Marquisson, leaving there on Saturday. Yesterday dense fog was met and continued until shortly before port was reached. The ship brought the following passengers, including the Commissioners and some of their wives: Donald Campbell, Esq., LL.B., Hon. J. R. Sinclair, Mr. Harding, Mr. Bridgeman, Lady Landrigan, Miss Tatlo, Mrs. Tatlo, Mrs. Lorimer, Mrs. Garnett, Mr. William Lorimer, Sir Alfred Bridgeman, Sir H. Rider Haggard, Sir Joseph Largerman, Lady Largerman, Dr. Comstead, Sir George E. Foster, Mr. Payne and Mr. T. Garnett.

On arrival the Earl Grey was profusely dressed with bunting and the Commissioners were cordially received by Hon. Edgar R. Bowring, our Newfoundland representative on the Royal Commission. Rt. Hon. the Premier, the Colonial Secretary, Hon. J. Bennett, the Minister of Finance and Customs, Hon. M. P. Cashin, Mr. J. S. Munn, President of the Board of Trade, Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Hon. John Harvey, E. A. Bowring, Esq., the Chairman of the City Commission, W. G. Gosling, Esq., and other prominent citizens. On landing, the distinguished visitors were driven in motor cars, provided by Messrs. Bowring (2), Munn and Reid, to Waterford Hall, where they will have lunch. To-night they will be dined at Government House. To-morrow they will tour our principal country roads by motor cars. This afternoon the Commissioners will have their opening session in the House of Assembly, and each subsequent day until their work is completed a session will be held. The three stenographers appointed by the Government to take evidence on the matters, are Mr. B. E. S. Dunfield, Mr. L. E. Emerson and Mr. G. Byrne.

The cruiser Earl Grey is now at the Allan pier and after receiving coal and getting supplied by Mr. T. Cook, will return to Rimouski. The Earl Grey is a well constructed and up-to-date ship. She was here about four years ago for coal, when on her maiden voyage.

The Road Race.

The road race in connection with the Mount Cashel Garden Party to-morrow afternoon promises to be an interesting event. Six competitors have entered, and as all are well known in athletic circles much enthusiasm will be centered on this feature of the afternoon's programme. The competitors are: Messrs. S. Pearcey, J. Kavanagh, W. Wall, H. Hill, J. Bell and T. Ring. The race will start from the Convent gate at Turbay at 2.30 p.m. and is expected to finish on the Mount Cashel grounds about 2 p.m. The finish to consist of three laps of the field, the whole making a total of six miles.

LONDON, To-day.

David Campbell of the Elder Dempster Line, gave out in an interview that Campbell had been discussing with the London management of the line the advisability of inaugurating a service between Newfoundland, Brazil and the Argentine with the object of extending the salt fish trade from Newfoundland especially timely, now that the Norwegian Government has a subsidized service in that trade between Norway and South American countries. It is proposed, that the Elder Dempster Line seek a Government subsidy for the purpose of extending the Newfoundland trade.

LONDON, To-day.

The St. Petersburg correspondent to the "Times" says the Russian Emperor left on Monday night for Finland, and adds that matters have become calmer. The correspondent says I may quote a sentence used by the Emperor at the close of a Grand Council on Saturday. "We have stood this sort of thing for seven and a half years, that is enough." Thereupon, His Majesty authorized the issue of orders for a partial mobilization, confined to the fourteenth army corps on the Austrian frontier. At the same time an intimation was given to Germany that orders for mobilization of the Russian army would follow immediately upon mobilization by Germany. These words and acts are believed to be largely responsible for the sudden change in the international situation. The general impression in diplomatic circles is that Austria has gained, so much by Serbia's acceptance of the terms of ultimatum, that it is difficult to believe she would risk war with Russia and a European conflagration by driving Serbia to the wall.

BERLIN, To-day.

Berlin morning papers note the significance of the fact that Sir Edward Grey's proposal contemplates only mediation between Austria and Russia and not Serbia and Austria. Well informed circles assume that Germany is disposed to regard the British Foreign Secretary's proposal sympathetically, but so to act only within the limits wholly agreeable to Austria. Any scheme of mediation distasteful to Vienna will forthwith be rejected as an attempt to exert undue pressure on Austria.

Tennyson And The Girl.

"Edward Whymper as I Knew Him" is the title of an interesting paper in the Strand by Coulson Kernahan. Whymper tells this story of Tennyson:—

Cold Storage Fish.

The preservation of food for prolonged periods has become an imperative necessity in modern life; the food supply of enormous populations is possible only through the ingenious preservation of surplus food for future use. The old methods of desiccation and salting changed the flavor and digestibility of foods to such a degree that the palate of the average modern man and woman protested. Preservation by means of ice was unsatisfactory for prolonged storage.

The discovery of the ammonia process for the production of low temperature has changed the entire aspect of cold storage. Exact information upon the chemical changes in meats, eggs, butter, etc., under prolonged refrigeration has been furnished by the Bureau of Chemistry. Fish has been an exception, however, and we hail with satisfaction the information published recently by the Physiological Laboratory of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University, on the effect of refrigeration upon hammers. These data are

applicable to all cold storage fish, and they demonstrate conclusively that after storage of two years there is no change in nutritive value or other desirable qualities if the fresh fish are frozen, then dipped in water and again frozen to maintain the moisture within the flesh.

The prejudice against cold storage fish is unfounded.—New York Sun.

Dublin Tragedy.

AMENDING BILL POSTPONED INDEFINITELY

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 27.

The first effect of the Dublin tragedy has been to smash Asquith's plan for taking up the Amending Bill tomorrow. The Premier announced today the matter had been indefinitely postponed. Irish members are so exasperated over the killing of four persons and the wounding of thirty others in the clash yesterday between Regular troops and the Nationalist Volunteers, they are in no frame of mind to grant concessions to Ulster. The Laborite and many Liberals support them. The Government announced in the Commons today that Deputy Police Commissioner Harrell who ordered out the troops has been suspended, that the superior Commissioner, Sir John Ross who expressed a desire to share the responsibility had resigned office, and that a special inquiry will be held probably by a judicial commission. Meanwhile a demand for the removal of the Scottish Borderers from Dublin was not granted largely because the attempt to march them out would be the signal for an attack by mobs. They will remain prisoners in barracks until the anger of the people is cooled. Nationalist members of Parliament who held a meeting in the afternoon, showed more animosity against the Castle than the Government. They consider the Viceroys of Aberdeen's official family prejudiced against Nationalists and a heated discussion started in the Commons. John Redmond, Nationalist leader, demanded an impartial enquiry into the conduct of troops and their punishment if the shooting was not justified. He demanded also that the regiment should be removed from Ireland and the Proclamation against the importation of arms into Ireland should be withdrawn because it constituted a serious danger that law would not be administered impartially. He called for the suspension of Sir John Ross, Police Commissioner in Dublin, and said: "We had an experience of him in the Larkhill riot. He is unfit to hold his office. He is a well-known political partisan."

LONDON, To-day.

Redmond compared "this monstrous business with parades of armed volunteers in Belfast. To such a state of impotence has the British Government been reduced in Ireland, he said, that a subordinate official is able to call in soldiers without consulting the Executive of the country. He expressed the hope that the Irish people would not blame the troops too much and concluded amid cheers. Birrell, Secretary of Ireland, blamed the Deputy Commissioner, Harrell, for his astonishing lack of discretion. Harrell has assumed the whole responsibility, but the Chief Secretary put the question up to Commissioner Ross as to whether he associated himself with what he had done, and declared that if he did, he would be suspended also. Andrew Bonar Law, declared the Government's policy responsible for the tragedy. The Government should have enforced the law in Ulster from the outset, or if it doubted its authority to do so it should have gone to the people for authority. The Prime Minister defended the Government's impartiality in the attempt to prevent importation of arms. Since the proclamation had been issued, he said, the number of arms imported into Ireland had been infinitely small. Harrell's action in summoning the military after arms had been landed was an entirely new departure. He concluded: "The difficulties in Ireland are due to attempts in this House to govern a people they cannot understand by a Parliament imperfectly equipped for the task; he warned the Opposition who were hoping to come in power that the Government of Ireland would prove an impossible task until the Home Rule Bill became law." Balfour said others are criticizing the Government for making a scapegoat of police officials.

DUBLIN, To-day.

The Assistant Commissioner was suspended from duty pending the enquiry, and sixteen policemen, suspended for refusing to obey orders, were placed under arrest and ordered to remain in barracks, but refused to obey.

Canadian Position as Viewed Abroad.

London, July 22.—Underwriters are not taking a gloomy view of poor public reception for the Province of Ontario loan. The small amount of immediate application is undoubtedly due to the tendency of the public to wait until lists are closed in the hope of purchasing at a discount.
In spite of the late happenings in connection with Canadian financial houses in London, there is no doubt, says one authority, that the Canadian position is better than it has been for some time. A good harvest is all that Canada wants and there will be an end to this protracted depression in Canadian matters.

Shut Church Doors on Vanity and Enmity.

St. Louis, Mo., July 19.—By driving the imp's of vanity and envy around the stump, the East Alton Baptist Church expects an infinitely large attendance next Sunday.

When the Board of Trustees of the church sought to find the reason of a big falling off in attendance, they started with the belief that because of hot weather tepid Christians preferred to remain in negligence on Sunday mornings. But many who remained away reported that they did so because others went to church so fancily dressed, whereas they, the absentees, had not the raiment with which to "splurge."
Therefore, the Pastor, Rev. D. C. Blunt, and the trustees, decided that all good and true members of the congregation will next Sunday attend in more than Puritanical simplicity. The women must wear only calico, the men overalls.

Deadly Weapon Invented.

London, July 23.—A terrible weapon of warfare has been invented. In the Naval Annual for 1914, just published there is a description that might be almost described as devilish. It is of the Leon torpedo mine, which has now been acquired and is being manufactured by a British firm. The engine is so constructed that it can be set to hover between any depth below the surface that may be desired. When placed in the water it has a slight negative buoyancy, and sinks until automatically a propeller is brought into action which drives it upward again. It can be used in the open sea by any type of ship or, in the case of tidal harbors, it can be released by a vessel outside so as to make its way with the tide into the anchorage, and perhaps destroy shipping there. A touch on the deadly steel whiskers which project from its upper surface and the enemy would be sent to the bottom, as were the Hatsuse and the Petropavlosk in the Russo-Japanese war.

RYATKUHNNEN, Germany, To-day.

Shots were fired by Cossack Patrol across the German frontier on the alleged ground that an attempt was being made to cross the border at a wrong place. The Germans say that the group fired upon by the Russians were army officers. Much feeling has been caused by the incident.

Rescued Japs.

Vancouver, B.C., July 24.—As the *Komagata Maru* was passing through Plumpers Pass two Japanese were seen to dive over the side and the "man overboard" signal was given to the convoying cruiser. Within a few seconds one of the warship's cutters was lowered and manned. With a strong breast stroke the two Japanese swam were endeavoring to combat the swift running tide, but they were fast becoming exhausted. In the nick of time, the *Rainbow's* cutter overtook them and soon the men were hauled into the boat and placed under the care of the ship's doctor. The Japanese had evidently carefully planned to escape from the ship, as when they were picked up they were clothes strapped to their backs.
The *Rainbow* is expected back from there to-night.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, This a.m.

Information as to "the shocking occurrence in Dublin on Sunday," as John Redmond, Irish Nationalist puts it, was demanded immediately after the opening of the session in the Commons. Redmond was so dissatisfied with the meagre information given him that he moved an adjournment of the House in order to debate the matter. Chief Secretary Birrell threw the blame for the conflict between the troops and the public, on an assistant police commissioner, who, he said, had requisitioned the military on his own responsibility. The official had consequently been suspended, while an enquiry was being held. The Nationalist members shouted: "He ought to be hanged." Birrell said the Major in command of the King's Own Scottish Borderers had denied he had given orders to fire on the people. The soldiers, Birrell continued, became exasperated after several of them had received severe injuries. The officers stopped the firing immediately, but three people had already been killed and thirty-two injured. He added there would be a full enquiry immediately. The Lord Mayor of Dublin telegraphed Redmond as follows: "It is my opinion that the people responsible for the orders to fire should be indicted by the Crown, and that their defence should be made before a jury."

DUBLIN, This a.m.

Serious rioting began here last night, and the city is in a state of intense excitement. The authorities fear it will be necessary to call upon the militia, which will mean much bloodshed.

BERLIN, July 27.

Berlin papers are disposed to find grounds for hope that the Austro-Serbian conflict may be localized. News that Austria is delaying the crossing of the Danube has awakened hope that interchanges of views may result in checking an outbreak of hostilities, until Serbia finds means of satisfying Austria's demands.

Much attention is given to alleged expressions by French diplomats that France means to hold aloof and leave Serbia to her fate, unless Russia is attacked by another Power. The fact that France is making strong overtures at St. Petersburg, to dissuade Russia from interfering, is regarded as promising.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 27.

In spite of the generally unfavorable symptoms in the situation between Austria and Serbia, a better feeling is noticeable here to-day, as the result of yesterday's diplomatic conversations.

BERLIN, July 27.

Reports circulated throughout Serbia that King Peter is assured of Russia's support in war with Austria, have aroused a greater determination to resist to the last the demand contained in Austria's ultimatum. The entire Serbian army is being mobilized. Crown Prince Alexander will take command in the field. All preparations are being made for the defence of Nish, which is now serving as the capital of the Kingdom. The Parliament, Court, National Bank, in fact the entire Government has been transferred to Nish. Across the Danube the Austrian troops are mobilizing for attack. Austrians have been moving up and down the Danube carrying materials for bridges, and other equipment necessary for the invasion while large forces of the army are massed at Semlin. Belgrade is all but deserted. The panic-stricken inhabitants poured out of the city, following the withdrawal of the garrison fearing that the Austrians would bombard the town at any moment.

The gravity of the European situation is reflected in an official despatch from St. Petersburg, saying the Minister of War has expressed himself that war between Russia and Austria is almost inevitable.

Lack of confirmation of the reports of a hostile encounter on the Danube between Serbian and Austrian troops; and Sir Edward Grey's efforts to obtain consent of the leading European nations to mediation, led to the belief to-day of the possibility of avoiding an armed conflict between European nations. Germany and Italy are said to have agreed with the principle of the British Foreign Secretary's proposal of a conference between the Ambassadors of the leading powers, in London. Attention of the Chancellors of Europe has been turned to the attitude of Emperor William after his conference with his advisers on his return to Germany, and also the activities of Russian preparations.

ST. PETERSBURG, This a.m.

Workmen in the capital, who had been on strike for a week, have decided to resume work. In order to emphasize their approval of the Government's support of Serbia, they made patriotic demonstrations in the streets and sang the Russian National Anthem.

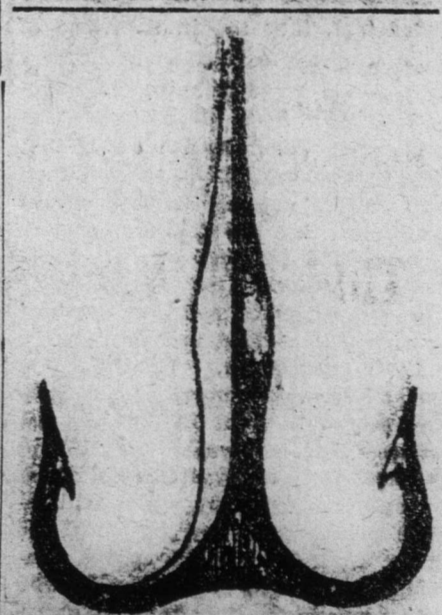

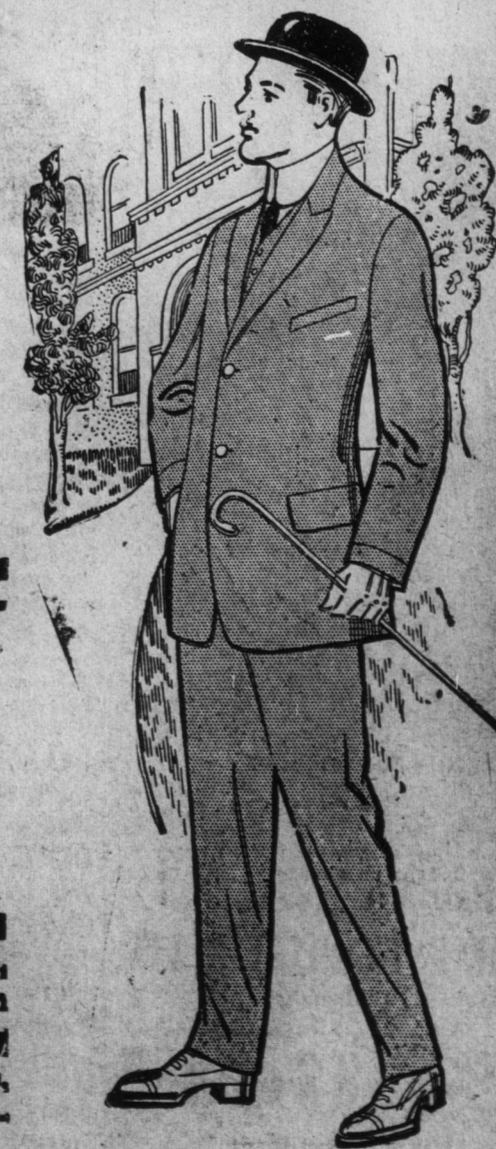

Persons visiting the lakeside to witness the boats practising should not be crowding the boat houses too much and hampering the work of those in charge, as was the case last evening.

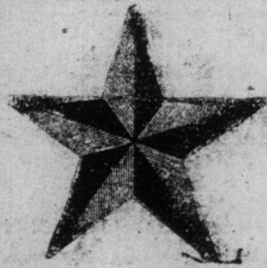
Joe Boone and Phil Brown had their trade crews out last night. It looks as if it will be "touch and go" for the gold medals.

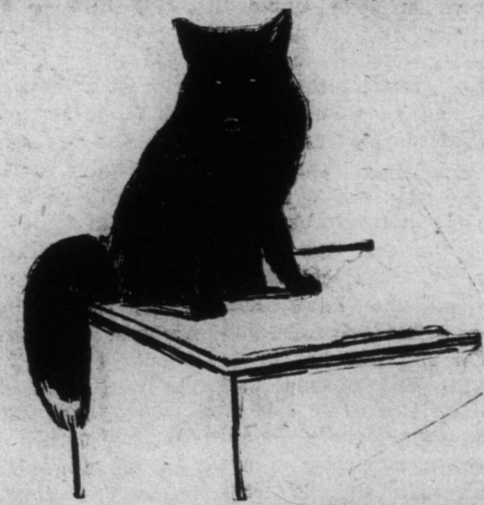
