

Notes on the Patriotic Tour. HARBOR BRETON.

CHAPTER XIV.
L. C. M.
Harbour Breton is so long known to the business public, and has occupied such a prominent place in the commerce of Fortune Bay, that there does not remain much that is new to be said about it. We have, however, a few notes which may be worth reading, and perhaps worth the readers' while. The place itself abounds with history, all of which forms a link in the trade of Newfoundland, and in the enterprise of the Old Country. Here it was that the firm of Newman & Co., of London, England, during the nineteenth century, conducted one of the most extensive fishing enterprises that Newfoundland has ever known; and every relic of their former occupancy indicates the greatness and extensiveness of their trade; but great as it was, it had an ending, and now the buildings upon which the name of Newman and Co. were so long conspicuous are occupied by others.

The premises must have been well built in the first place, and even now after such a long career the most of them are in very good condition. The stores and wharves are specially adapted to our trade, and the former dwellings of Newman & Co.'s staff, still present a comfortable appearance; and certain it is that things were conducted on a large scale, and impressions were made that must long be felt within the district of Fortune Bay. Of the many buildings of the company which we saw, we think that the stone and brick building used as a shop and office is by far the most substantial of the lot. It is a splendid building, even now, and must have been more so in the early days of Harbor Breton. Upon the premises proper we were shown one very old stone; but could not make out any inscription. The stone is of pure white marble, and is about four or five inches thick, and has long since fallen to the ground. Mr. Elliott who showed it to us did not know its history, but it no doubt marks the spot where was laid to rest the remains of a prominent pioneer of Harbour Breton and Newfoundland.

Harbour Breton was settled principally by the young men who came from England in connection with Newman's firm; but very few of that class now remain. We met one man who came from London nearly fifty years ago and who has lived and worked there ever since. He is much like the "Last Rose of Summer," "all his companions are faded and gone." The conditions under which he came to Newfoundland are radically changed, and while Harbor Breton directly has lost that prestige which the firm of Newman and Co. brought it, there is still a splendid spirit of independence amongst the people of Fortune Bay, and they seem to have outgrown the limitations under which their fathers lived. The past conditions seemed quite satisfactory in their day, but a newer order has arisen, and a wider vision is upon the people.

Foreign Fish Market.

The following letter, dated Feb. 3rd, from Lind and Costa, of Oporto, is now posted at the Board of Trade Rooms:—

"During the first half of January the demand was very poor owing to the rise in prices occasioned by the further fall in exchange which is now fluctuating round about 35d. At this basis, the prices of codfish and other imported foods are almost prohibitive to the ordinary consumer and the consumption is therefore considerably restricted, dealers taking from day to day only the small quantities they require for orders on hand. There does not seem to be any prospect of increased demand so long as the exchange continues low. For example, to give the shippers a return of 25 per cent. at the exchange of 35 pence, it is necessary now to sell at the price of 17600 reis per 60 kilos as compared with 14000 at this time last year. It is evident therefore that Spain and Italy with their exchanges at a normal rate are easily able to show better returns than this country, apart from the fact that the wage earning classes of these countries are considerably better off and can afford to pay more for their food than the Portuguese. Schr. Lef is in Lexicoes Harbor awaiting orders."

The American citizen who hasn't money enough to go to England and take a look at the ancient universities of Oxford and Cambridge should not despair. He can see something twice as great, though not nearly so peculiar, by inserting himself into the subway at Boston and getting shot under the Charles River into Cambridge.

He will there discover himself in a wilderness of buildings, parks and historic remains known as Harvard University. It is the oldest college in the country and will celebrate its 300th birthday in 1936. This is a mere teething age as compared with European schools, some of whose buildings have not been dusted off for that length of time. But Harvard is old enough to have accumulated 25,000 alumni, including three presidents of the United States, an endowment of \$25,000,000, and enough venerable American history to keep a genuine American citizen busy and happy for several days while rambling about Cambridge.

Harvard University began its career in a few plain brick dormitories. In 1833 John Harvard left it \$3,750 and 300 books. This has made him so famous that his old home in Stratford-on-Avon is now a shrine of American tourists. It pays to advertise in a judicious and scholarly manner.

Asquith's Answer To German Piracy.

After long and careful consideration and consultation with her allies Premier Asquith told in the House of Commons yesterday what Britain and her allies would do to make reprisals on the enemies for the campaign of submarine piracy instituted by the Kaiser. He said that they would use all the force at their disposal to cut off all sea commerce with Germany, Austria and Turkey, and their best to put a stop to all cargoes being sent out or received by them. In other words they would try to enforce a

strict blockade, although they will not avail of the full rights of a blockade and confiscate all the ships and cargoes seized, nor will they extend the list of contraband goods. Presumably, this means that they will compensate neutrals for cargoes seized, which are not of the class of goods already listed as contraband. The most important difference, however, between the policy of Germany and Britain is in the treatment of the crews of ships which may come within the scope of this action. They will do their best to avoid all danger to the life and limbs of the crews of such mercantile vessels, whether they be those of the enemy or those of neutrals. This decision of Britain and her allies is not unexpected. It is just what was to be expected to do. But it is too much to expect that neutrals will willingly acquiesce in it. Findings of the Sealing Commissioners

Gist of Majority Report of the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Emerson, and Minority Report of Mr. Justice Johnson.

In these circumstances Captain Kean had sufficient reason to conclude that they had reached their ship. About 7 p.m. the Florizel sent a wireless to the Stephano reporting progress and asking whether the Newfoundland's men were on board the Stephano. Captain Kean replied that he had made them before noon within 3 miles of their ship, and that he had no doubt they were on board her. The derick signal was no more than notice to the Newfoundland if he could. It imposed no duty or responsibility upon Captain Abram Kean. There would be an end to all kindly help if the giver were to be saddled with onus.



Britain's Reply

To Submarine Piracy Policy of the Kaiser.

Britain and Her Allies Will Stop all Sea Commerce to and From Her Enemies--War Costing \$7,500,000 Daily--Will Soon Cost \$10,000,000

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
If the combined fleets of Britain and France can prevent it, no commodities of any kind except those now on the seas, shall henceforth until the conclusion of the war, reach or leave the shores of Germany. This is England's answer to Germany's submarine blockade, and it is to be effective forthwith. Premier Asquith, reading from a prepared statement, made this announcement in the Commons this afternoon at a session which will be history. Studiously avoiding the terms "Blockade" and "Contraband" for these words occur nowhere in the prepared statement, the Premier exclaimed: "After this day the Allies consider themselves justified in attempting and would attempt to detain and take into port ships carrying goods, presumed to be of the enemy by destination, ownership or origin. The Premier emphasized, however, that vessels and cargoes so seized were

Not Necessarily Liable to Confiscation and begged the patience of neutral countries in the face of a step through which they were likely to suffer. He added that in making such a step, the Allies had done so in self-defence. We are quite prepared, he went on, to submit to the arbitrament of neutral opinion and still more to the verdict of impartial history, that in the circumstances in which we have been placed, we have been moderate. We have been restrained. We have abstained from things that we were provoked and tempted to do, and we have adopted a policy which commends itself to reason, common sense and justice. He gave these figures asking for a supplementary vote of credit, making the total \$1,810,000,000 to carry on the war till March 31st, 1915, which the House unanimously granted. The entire struggle with Napoleon cost England only \$1,831,000,000, and the South African War only \$211,000,000. These were Asquith's figures. Before the Premier had finished, newspapers were on the streets proclaiming our answer to Germany, in big letters, and it was apparent everywhere that the entire nation had been

Chafing for Reprisals against the sinking of merchant craft by submarines. Premier Asquith said the plan of the allied Governments for the regulation of shipping to and from ports of hostile nations contemplates the prevention of commodities of every kind reaching or leaving ports, without, however, involving risks to neutral vessels or their crews. The Allies will hold themselves at liberty to capture any goods presumed to have come from hostile countries or to be destined for them. They have no intention, however, of confiscating ships or cargoes, which are detained, unless they are liable to confiscation under normal conditions of war. The Premier revealed these measures of reprisals to the Parliament and nation on introducing the third and fourth votes for the credit to meet the expenses of war. These are, respectively, \$185,000,000 to balance the expenditures of the current fiscal year, making the total cost of eight months' war \$1,810,000,000. Another vote of \$1,250,000,000 as the first instalment for the year opening April 1st. The Premier pointed out that by April the war would have lasted 240 days, with an average expenditure of \$7,500,000 daily. After making full allowance for all items not in their nature recoverable as loans, the daily expenditure would not work out less than \$6,000,000. The total amount raised under the votes for credit during the current financial year, \$1,810,000,000 represented broadly the difference in expenditure on the peace and war footing. Of the total \$190,000,000 represented advances for war expenditure of the Dominions and Crown Colonies. In addition to which there has been advanced \$50,000,000 to Belgium, and \$4,000,000 to Serbia. Further advances to these allies are in contemplation. The Premier continued: "It is probably within the mark to say that by April 1st we shall be spending roughly

\$10,000,000 Daily Above the Normal. The vote of credit for \$1,250,000,000 is the largest single vote ever put before the House. It will cover the period to the second week in July. Referring to the German naval campaign against British shipping, Premier Asquith said, Germany had violated systematically all the conventions intended for the mitigation of warfare. She had taken further steps, the Premier said, by organizing an under sea campaign of piracy and pillage. Germany, he declared, was not blockading and could never blockade the English shores. Referring to the attack on the Dardanelles, the Premier said there had been no impairment of the strength of the Allies in France or in England, as a result of the withdrawal of men for service in the campaign against Turkey. We shall continue to give the fullest and most effective support there, he added, referring to the western front. Neither has there been for the purpose of the Dardanelles operations, any weakening of the grand fleet enterprise, carefully conceived with distinct political, strategical and economic objects.

JOHN WESLEY died 1791, aged 88. The great founder of the religious community of the "people called Methodists." He was the son of an Anglican clergyman and took orders himself in 1735, but later he abandoned all ecclesiastical traditions and established on a wonderfully well-devised basis the connexion called by his name. He accomplished a great work of religious revivification, taking the world as his parish; and, profound as was his conviction of his high calling as an Evangelist, John Wesley "bided better than he knew" in rearing the denominational edifice which is the monument of his faith and strenuousity.
HORACE WALPOLE died 1797, aged 80. The younger son of Sir Robert Walpole. In 1768 he retired from public life and devoted himself to the writing of books and the accumulation of works of art. Live well, and then, how soon so'er then die.

SIR JOHN FRENCH VISITS LONDON AGAIN.

London, Feb. 3.—Again unknown to the British public, Sir John French, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces in France and Belgium, has paid another flying visit to London, conferred with the King and the War Council, and returned to the front without a word of his trip appearing in the newspapers.
Contrary to precedent the King called on Sir John at his residence, 94 Lancaster Gate W., instead of Sir John going to Buckingham Palace. Sir John crossed the Channel and reached London on Tuesday morning, January 12. Dressed in a dark suit and a Derby, no one recognized him either on the train from the coast or when he stepped from a motor car in front of his house.
His first caller was Premier Asquith, who remained about an hour. The Premier was followed by Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, and he by Lloyd George. It was evening and dark when the King arrived by motor. No one knew of his coming, and there was no crowd to greet him. It is doubtful even whether Sir John's butler for the moment recognized the distinguished visitor.
For more than an hour the King remained with Sir John in a conference in which they alone participated. What they discussed it will remain for some future chronicler of the war to disclose.
London's dim street lamps were lighted when the King left an hour before dawn, as was unobtrusive as his coming.
Next day Sir John, dressed in the same brown suit and wearing the same Derby, took train from Charing Cross station for Dover.

There he boarded a cruiser for Calais. To guard against mines or sudden attack a destroyer preceded the cruiser and at each side of her steamed a battleship.

BOMBARDMENT OF INNER PORTS RESUMED.

PARIS, To-day.
The bombardment of the inner ports of the Dardanelles was resumed at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, says our Athens despatch. A Russian Admiral, delegated to attend a council of Admirals, has joined the allied fleet in the Straits. A despatch from Saloniki states that the mines and submarines destined for the defence of Dedeagatch have arrived at that port. According to a Havas despatch, fire from the guns of the allied fleet has destroyed the fort Killid, Dahr and the fort Sultanie (Chand Kalesi), which guard the entrance to the narrowest part of the Straits. Information from Mytilene and Tenedos is to the effect that over 100,000 Turks have been posted along the coast of Gallipoli Peninsula, near the sea of Mar-more, about 130 miles from Constantinople.



When an animal in a menagerie is especially cross the keeper sometimes hangs a sign of warning on his cage. Now, why wouldn't that be a good idea for human animals to adapt and adopt? Don't laugh. I really know two young people who have found an adaptation of that idea of warning very helpful in avoiding family upsets.

How the Warning Is Given.
This is what they do. When either one of them finds that he has gotten out of the wrong side of the bed, he warns the other "I feel pudgy to-day." "Pudgy" is a word coined for the occasion. It means nervous and touchy, irritable, at odds with one's self and the world.

That announcement is received by the other as a warning and acted upon, as such. Washing the Face.
Milady would laugh to scorn the person who accused her of not knowing how to wash her own face, but there are many, many women who have never really known how to do this seemingly simple thing in the correct way. It isn't enough to wash the face. Each feature, the eyes, lips, mouth, nose, ears, forehead and chin need attention. Many a discriminating woman would receive a shock if she would see the cloth with which the masseuse has given the preliminary wipe of her features.

Here then are some hints for the regular morning toilette of the face: Commencing with the chin, raise it high to remove any dirt that may have collected in the loose skin, or the lines or wrinkles that may be appearing, and scrub, especially up behind the ears.

Fads and Fashions.

The coiffure is still high. The long tunic has run its course. Silk petticoats have rose quilling. New waists are elaborately shirred. Wide, wider, widest, describes the new skirts. Striped effects promise to be very fashionable. The most favored fabrics are in plain colors. The short-tongued colonial shoe will be good. The sand and putty shades continue their popularity. Low shoes are not worn with the excessively short skirt. The latest wrist bags are small and made of fatile silk. There are circular skirts with close-fitting underskirts. Dresses will be trimmed with velvet ribbons this summer. Evening gowns have white fringe trimming on waists and skirts. Subdued colors, plain and severe lines are fashion's latest kinds. There is a tendency in fashion to lean toward the large flat hats. There are dresses with waist and skirt entirely made of box pleats. Hats are being trimmed in black, yellow and red—the Belgian colors. Lingerie dresses have ruffles of plain net on embroidered net flouncings. The old-fashioned bodice is here, tight-fitting and with point front and back. Little close lace petticoats show below the gored skirts of evening gowns. 

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 1.

The Governor, Newfoundland:
The French Government reports small successes near Dixmude and Lombardzyde, and important progress in Champagne. German works were carried north of Perthes and Beausejour. Two hundred prisoners were captured northwest of Perthes, and over 1,000 German soldiers surrendered during the last ten days. A subsequent report confirms progress in Champagne, the gains representing 2,000 metres in trenches. In one trench the enemy left over 200 dead. In the Argonne about three hundred yards of trench was captured. At another point the Germans sprayed the advance French trench with burning liquid.

The Russian Government reports their offensive developing in north-eastern Poland. Przemysk has been taken, and the German retreat is extending. About 5,500 have been taken prisoners.

The Austrians were severely defeated in Eastern Galicia, losing 4,000 prisoners and nine machine guns.

HARCOURT.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 1.

Near Dixmude, Belgian artillery destroyed two German defence works. The Belgian infantry took a farm on the right bank of the Yser and Belgian aviators threw bombs on the German naval station of Ostend. The Germans are still bombarding Rheims and threw about thirty shells, of which thirty were directed against the Cathedral. In Champagne we have realized important gains, on Saturday night, by the capture of two German works north of Perthes les Hurles and north of Beausejour farm. Furthermore, we have progressed between these two points and made 200 prisoners. The number of German soldiers who have surrendered during the past ten days, exceed 1,000. A sharp artillery contest occurred on the Meuse heights and in the Vosges. We have progressed in the vicinity of Arhman's and Willerkopf.

FRENCH MAKING SUPREME EFFORT.

PARIS, March 1.

Terrific efforts are being made by the French to break the German lines in Champagne district in order to force a retirement of the Kaiser's forces between the Aisne and Oise Rivers. In the past five days at least thirty attacks have been made by the French against the German lines between Semain and Serror, north of Perthes, Beausejour and Les Hurles. The German armies lying in the angle formed by the junction of the Aisne and the Oise Rivers, will continue to be a menace to Paris until they are forced to retire. These armies are only forty miles from Paris and if Von Kluck could pierce the French lines with a sudden movement near Soissons, he could not only drive in the direction of Paris, but could split the entire French force in two. In West Flanders the Belgians are continuing their activity against the extreme German right using both infantry and artillery in their attacks. Heavy artillery fire is reported from the district northeast of Amiens and south of the Lys, as well as from the valley of the Meuse. In the Vosges mountains, the struggle for strategic points is becoming fiercer. The Germans have been reinforced with Landsturm forces brought from southern Belgium, where they had been used as patrols and guards for the lines of communications.

HALIFAX SCARED BY SHELL.

HALIFAX, March 1.

A twelve-pound shell, presumably fired from one of the harbour forts during target practice, entered two houses in the residential section here this afternoon. No one was in the houses at the time. The people living in the vicinity were panic stricken for a while, thinking that an enemy's ship had fired the shell.

ARRIVED SAFELY.

LONDON, March 1.

The steamer St. Louis arrived safely at Liverpool to-day, without any incident in passing through the naval zone.

OPERATIONS DELAYED.

LONDON, March 1.

The attack by the allied fleet on the Dardanelles has been interrupted. The Official Bureau issued a statement to-night saying that operations are being delayed, owing to bad weather.



Entertainment at Seamen's Institute



Brownrigg, C. E. Hunt, R. H. Simms, J. J. McKay, J. G. Higgins, A. White, C. Fox.

Capt. Bulley informed the meeting that the C. C. C. Band would give their services for the night, and that he would arrange for a special program of music.

The Sports' programme will likely consist of the following events:—One Mile Race, boys under 16. Inter-Collegiate Hockey. League Hockey, Feildians vs. City. Ladies' Hockey Match. All Comers Race, one mile. General Skating.

The admission fee will be 50 cents for reserved seats, and 20 cents general admission and tickets may be had at Parsons' Photo Studio.

The proceeds will be divided between the Dorcas Society, St. Vincent de Paul Society and Salvation Army, and in view of the object for which the affair is being held, there should be a large attendance.

Boon for Labourers.

The arrival of shipping at the present time with large cargoes of freight is a great boon for labourers along shore. The Stephano is discharging the largest cargo she brought for the season, the Durango the last to reach port has 800 tons, while the Graciana is due hourly from London with 1,500 tons of cargo, all affording employment to hundreds of men. In addition a large contingent of workmen are engaged cleaning up and getting ready the sealing steams.

Ice-Bound Steamers Reach Port.

ADVENTURE.

After a four days passage from Louisburg, half of which time was spent butting through heavy slob ice, the S. S. Adventure, Capt. Couch, entered port at three o'clock yesterday afternoon, bringing her sealing supply of coal. The ship reached the vicinity of Cape Race on Sunday morning but owing to the ice, which was tightly packed, made very slow headway. Yesterday morning there was an off shore wind, causing the ice to loosen and the Adventure came through.

DURANGO.

The Furness Liner Durango, Capt. Chambers, reached port from Liverpool last night, bringing 800 tons of cargo, 95 packages of mail matter and 25 passengers.—R. C. Quick, F. C. Holder, H. A. Amos A. Warren.

The voyage occupied eleven days. An unusually quick run was made up to Saturday last when ice was first sighted. The following day Cape Race was sighted and the floe became heavier and difficult for the Durango to negotiate. For several hours practically no progress was made but, like the Adventure, when the floe loosened the came along.

Charity Committee.

A meeting of the Charity Committee was held yesterday afternoon to further consider the distribution of charity and the giving of labour to the unemployed in the city. The following were present:—

W. G. Gosling, Chairman; Rev. Fr. McDermott, Rev. Mr. Hemmeon, Rev. Canon White, Hon. J. Harvey, Mrs. W. C. Job, Inspector O'Brien, Commissioner Ayre and Mr. C. W. Ryan.

Mr. W. G. Gosling informed the meeting that the Civic Commission had decided to give employment in the way of stone breaking which work will be carried on at the old railway yard in the East End, and near the Gas House in the West End. The men will be paid at the rate of 90 cents per ton, and it is estimated that at this figure a man can earn \$1.35 per day. Employment may be had from the city inspectors or by applying to the foreman at either of the places where the work is being carried on. Mr. Gosling asked the clergymen present to instruct their parishioners to this effect.

The erection of new sanitary stables will likely begin within a fortnight when it is hoped a large amount of employment will be given. It was decided that the charitable societies will be able to cope with the situation in the meantime.
