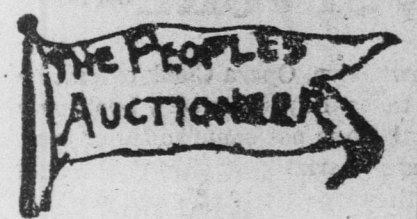

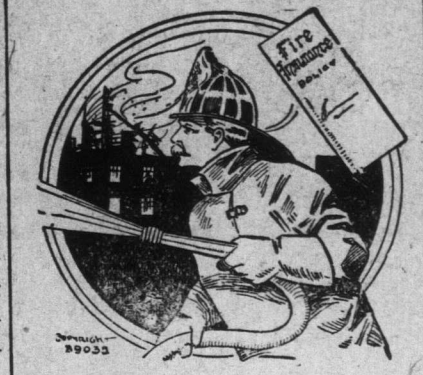

The Story of the Exploits.

How Harry J. Crowe Handled a Property on Which More than Ten Million Dollars Cash in the Erection of Pulp, Paper Plants and Railways, Besides Several Million More in Labor for Operating has Subsequently been Expended.

(Concluded.)
"I may say that before granting this concession the Government consulted with the owners who, not knowing the effect it would have on their water power, acquiesced in it."

"The necessity of limiting the water power to about half the requirements, consequent on the discovery of the engineer, caused Mr. Albert E. Reed and Alexander Henderson to hand in an adverse report to the Syndicate. The Syndicate then gave up any further idea of completing the undertaking, and it looked as if, after reaching the verge of success, my efforts of a year and a half were to be in vain. To say nothing of several thousands of dollars I had paid out of my own pocket in my endeavours to negotiate a sale of the Timber Estates and Exploits properties. I had also included the New Lands Company, Norris Arm property, in the deal, but was afterwards obliged to withdraw it at the request of my associates who preferred to hold the property. This they afterwards had cause to regret."

"During all these negotiations I had the operation of the Timber Estates and New Lands properties on my hands which taxed my physical and other resources to their limit, having exported over one hundred million feet of lumber to South America."

"About this time my option on the Exploits property expired, and the President of the Company proceeded at once to London to sell direct to Englishmen. I, too, sailed for London for the purpose of meeting him and securing the property long enough to overcome the water power difficulty and completing the transaction with my Syndicate. This President was doing his utmost to interest the Harmsworths in his property. Before securing an option on this lower portion of the Exploits I had urged the Harmsworths to buy it, but they had informed me that they positively would not add any more limits to their holdings."

"It was with great difficulty that I secured an extension of time on my expired option. At last, after using great pressure I secured an option that would expire in ten days after I should land in New York, and I was to leave on the first and fastest boat out of Liverpool."

"As soon as I reached New York, I went at once to Montreal where I took up the matter with my Timber Estates associates, again offering them the entire profits from the sale of the Exploits property, providing they would co-operate with me in securing the same. I knew this would be the means of selling our Gander River property, unless we acted ourselves of the advantage of the option which would expire in ten days, there was great danger of it being secured by others which would prevent the establishing of any future industry at Bishop's Falls, besides losing the opportunity of selling the Timber Estates limits. But I failed to induce my Timber Estates Company associates to consider the matter. After my ten days option expired I found the Exploits owners were continuing to use every means in their power to sell their property in London."

"I was thus compelled to devise some other way of saving what I considered a most critical situation, and I proceeded to Amherst, Nova Scotia, for the purpose of interviewing the Harmsworths. After some difficulty I succeeded in securing a seven-months' option on the mortgage. I then temporarily became a mortgagee and went to Boston in order to make another effort, to induce the owners to extend my original option to a time within which I should be able to clear up the water power difficulty with the Newfoundland Government and the Harmsworths. This I believed would enable me to close the matter with the Syndicate."

"Before calling a meeting of the Exploits Company to submit the matter to them I called on the President of the Timber Estates and showed him the option I had secured on the mortgage. I hoped that in this way I might persuade him to come to my assistance, thus giving the Timber Estates the opportunity of receiving all the profits. But the Timber Estates did not wish to participate in the Exploits in any way and declined the offer."

"During my meeting with the owners of the Exploits that night in my room in the Young's Hotel, Boston, an unforeseen incident occurred, due to a message I received over the telephone, that changed the attitude of the different members present, and had the effect of making them at once offer me the option I desired."

"The night was spent in drafting an option which was signed in pencil with the understanding that it would be more formally dealt with on the morrow."

"Unfortunately I woke in the morning with an attack of tonsillitis which kept me confined to my bed for a week. In the meantime nothing was done with the agreement."

"As soon as I was able I called at the office of the Company and asked for the agreement and was informed that they had changed their minds."

and were not going to deal with the property in that way. I did not wish to waste time in disputing the matter and asked them to state how they did wish to deal with the property. They said they would make a substantial reduction for cash and would allow me a week in which to raise the money. As I held the mortgage, and they agreed to take a large part of their equity in notes, all the cash I was required to raise was twenty-five thousand dollars. I succeeded in getting this amount from my friends in Nova Scotia, and thus secured the property which afterwards proved to be of such enormous value in the development of the paper industry of Newfoundland."

"I then formed the Newfoundland Pine and Pulp Company for the purpose of taking over the property. "I returned to Boston two days before my week expired prepared to complete the transaction, but the sellers told me they could not accept the money until their President had arrived in London. I knew this meant another attempt to sell to the Englishmen, but it resulted in their failing to induce them to buy and I was at least able to secure a conveyance of the property."

"My next task was to arrange the water power difficulty which had caused the Syndicate to abandon the proposition. I then immediately took the matter up with the Government, resulting (after several months negotiation with Lord Northcliffe's Company), in a release from the latter which enabled the Government at Bishop's Falls to be fully developed."

"As this was the only obstacle in the way of the British-Newfoundland Syndicate I started to work, expecting to have no difficulty in consummating my transaction with them. I found the opposition (within my own ranks) to my completing negotiations with the British-Newfoundland Syndicate growing more formidable as I was nearing the final issue which would have resulted in the establishment of Bishop's Falls and Glenwood. On account of this opposition the Syndicate wrote me saying they would decline to entertain the proposition if I insisted on including the Glenwood property, for they had received a certain letter from a solicitor that caused them to come to this decision. They further stated that if I would offer them my own Exploits property they would give me a final answer in twenty-four hours. I declined to take the matter up with them except in the way previously stated, and they refused to include the Timber Estates property, and wrote them to this effect. They replied their answer was final. I then withdrew from the matter from the British-Newfoundland Syndicate. After they had entirely abandoned the undertaking I submitted the Exploits property to Mr. Albert E. Reed and succeeded in securing a time in negotiating the property to his Company."

"It will thus be seen that the immense timber limits draining into the Exploits Valley in its magnificent watershed of over 5,000 square miles, were now in the hands of two strong English companies to whom I delivered about one hundred thousand cords of pulpwood to the mills at the low cost of about \$3.00 per cord. Those Companies have spent over ten millions in labour enabling them to produce over three hundred tons pulp and paper daily."

The Embargo on Fish to Greece

The following is a copy of a letter, received by Mr. E. A. Payne, Secretary of the Board of Trade, now posted at the Board of Trade Rooms:— November 10th, 1915.

Sir— I have the honour to acquaint you that His Excellency the Governor-in-Council has been pleased to issue a Proclamation, following the terms of that issued by the Imperial Government, whereby exportation of fish of all kinds, whether cured, salted, or fresh, shall be prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France, Russia, (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal. The Imperial Government considers as regards the exportation to Greece, that in view of the existing conditions in the Balkans, for the present no exports should be allowed which could be utilized for warlike purposes, or serve to build up the national stocks of supplies. Will you be good enough to disseminate this information among the trade in St. John's who are interested in the shipments of fish.

Meaning of Half-Mast.
Perhaps you have noticed that whenever a prominent person dies, especially if he is connected with the government, the flags on public buildings are hoisted only part of the way up. This is called "half-mast." Did you ever stop to think what connection there could be between a flag that was not properly hoisted and the death of a great man? Ever since flags were used in war it has been the custom to have the flag of the superior or conquering nation above that of the inferior or vanquished. When an army found itself hopelessly beaten it hauled its flag down far enough for the flag of the victors to be placed above it on the same pole. This was a token, not only of sub-

mission, but of respect. In those days, when a famous soldier died, flags were lowered out of respect to his memory. The custom long ago passed from purely military usage to public life of all kinds, the flag flying at half-mast being a sign that the dead man was worthy of universal respect. The space left above it is for the flag of the great conqueror of all—the angel of death. — Scottish-American.

Awaiting the Verdict.

Waiting for the count after a General Election is always tedious, but usually it is clear within three or four days after polling which party has won. The count of 1908 is in this respect similar to the count on Prohibition. Eight days have elapsed and the result is still in doubt. At that time it hung on the count of St. Barbe's. Now the result hangs on the counts in three districts: Twillingate, Fortune and St. Barbe's. The collection of boxes in Green Bay is being made by motor boat, 23 boxes being held up at New Bay by bad weather. As so much depends on the weather there is no knowing how short or how long the wait at Twillingate for the boxes may be. As for Fortune Bay, the count cannot take place until the St. John's box arrives at Harbor Breton. That box was despatched from St. John's to await the Gloucester at Placentia. Owing to the delay in the arrival of the Gloucester at that port, the box is still there, and will not leave before to-night at the earliest. This may possibly bring the box to Harbor Breton to-morrow evening, or night. It is uncertain, therefore, whether we shall receive the Fortune Bay count before Monday at noon. The ballot boxes on the East Side of St. Barbe's district are being collected by the Earl of Devon and those on the West Side by the Home. When the steamers meet, the Earl of Devon will transfer her boxes to the Home, which will convey them to Bonne Bay for the count. This will take place on Tuesday or Wednesday next. It is not likely that the result of the Plebiscite will be known before that time, though the probabilities will vary with the poll in Twillingate and

Fortune Bay. Great expectations are held out as to the large number of votes polled in the District of Twillingate, and unless these expectations are realized the chances of the Plebiscite being favourable to Prohibition are not very good, although it is apparent that the aggregate vote cannot in any case fall much below the Forty per cent limit required.

The Embargo on Fish to Greece.

After the Proclamation placing an embargo on the export of fish to Greece, the Board of Trade made a representation to the Government to send a despatch, through His Excellency the Governor, to the Colonial office on the matter. This despatch points out that a large number of cargoes are already at Gibraltar and others on the way for the Greek market. That this fish is specially cured for Greeks, and is unsuitable for other markets. It points out that the exporters will sustain heavy losses if this fish cannot enter Greece, amounting to some half million dollars, and asks if the embargo cannot be raised in respect of this season's catch, or at least as regards fish already on the way to Greece before the promulgation of the Proclamation. It appears to us desirable if in the interest of the Entente it is not feasible to raise the embargo or to permit the entry of the fish detained at Gibraltar or on the way to Greece, that the Imperial authorities should take over this fish at market rates. A reply from the Colonial Office is expected at any time.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
The British transport Mercian was attacked by an enemy submarine in the Mediterranean, but reached port. Twenty-three were killed or are missing. Fifty were wounded.
France—Two violent enemy attacks in Champagne were repulsed.
Russia—On the Styr the Russians captured over two thousand prisoners and twenty machine guns.
The Italian liner Ancona, from Naples to New York, was sunk by an enemy submarine off Sardinia. Two hundred are missing.
BONAR LAW.
THE WAR COMMITTEE.
LONDON, Nov. 11.
Britain's new War Committee of the Cabinet, during the temporary absence of Lord Kitchener, was officially announced to-day. It will consist of Asquith, Balfour, Lloyd George, Bonar Law and McKenna.

THE ANCONA OUTRAGE.
LONDON, Nov. 11.
A despatch from Tunis says that the commander of the Ancona, who reached here Thursday, declares that the submarine gave his vessel no signal to stop. At the first sight of the presence of the submarine the vessel was shelled from a distance of five miles. The shell grazed the steamer and the Ancona stopped dead. Subsequently shells hit the boats which were being made ready for launching, and many passengers were killed and injured on the deck and in boats. Some of the passengers, who had been thrown into the water, approached the submarine but were repelled and derided. Finally shells and torpedoes were fired at the Ancona from a distance of 300 yards.

BRITISH PRESS ON ANCONA OUTRAGE.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
President Wilson's phrase regarding the rights of humanity as something for which the States are contending, figures prominently in the comment of the evening papers on the Ancona tragedy. The fact that America's policy will depend on the point whether the American live have been lost, is a singular comment upon the claim of President Wilson that America is contending for nothing less high and sacred than the rights of humanity, says the Evening Standard which continues: "We would frankly ask the American people whether this last addition to the record of murder on the high seas does not convince them that there is only one means by which the pirates can be brought to book, namely, increasing vigilance by the Allied fleet. The British and Allied navies must avenge the sacred rights of humanity, and in that task, surely, we have the right to expect the sympathy of the American Government as well as of the friendship of the American people. Our cruisers which stop German imports and exports are avenging piracy, just as much as our torpedo boats which sink pirate submarines. Sea power is one and indivisible. By demanding that we relax our sea grip on the enemy, the American Government is demanding that the pirates be not punished. We trust that the American people will still realize that the interests of humanity are at stake."
The Westminster Gazette says: "Once more, as in the case of the Arabic, Orduna and Hesperian, we have a test of those promises of amendment and qualifications which Count Von Bernstorff made to President Wilson; once more we see it matters not a straw to Germany whether American citizens are on board the ships marked down as victims, or what pledges had been given by her representative at Washington."

comment: "Whether England is strictly entitled to inflict a few weeks of delay on suspected cargoes, becomes trivial alongside the wholesale barbarity by which our enemies have again proclaimed their code and illustrated their zeal for the freedom of the seas. Sinking the Ancona and shelling her lifeboats recall to the attention of neutrals the fundage realities of what the world is fighting about."

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
The British steamer Caria has been sunk. The crew were saved. She was owned by the Cunard Co.

CANNONADE IN THE BALTIC.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 11.
A cannonade of terrific intensity was heard yesterday in the neighborhood of the Fehmarn Belt in the Baltic Sea. It is believed by those who heard it to have been the result of a British submarine attack on a German squadron.

SCENES OF SADNESS.

NAPLES, Nov. 11.
The offices of the steamship company to which the Ancona belonged, remain crowded with people for the most part women and children, enquiring for passengers who are missing and giving many signs of distress and concern and anger over the sinking of the vessel. The loss to the company through the torpedoing of the Ancona, is fully covered by insurance even the risk of war being provided for in the policies taken out on the vessel, amounting to one million dollars. The public is awaiting with keen interest the developments

America's attitude regarding the Ancona. The case is regarded here as identical with that of the Lusitania.

PERSIA INVOLVED.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 11.
According to the latest advices received from Teheran, Persia, according to a despatch from that city, a Russian force is within forty-five miles of Teheran. The indications are that the Germans, Austrians and Turks in the city are preparing to leave, the removal of the archives of the German and Austrian legations to the American legation, for instance being in progress. At a secret session of parliament, the despatch says, the majority of deputies expressed the hope that an amicable arrangement of the difficulties between Russia and Persia would be reached. Cabinet ministers have been in session for twenty-four hours, trying to formulate conditions acceptable to Russia and Britain. Much excitement is reported in the city over the energetic action of the Entente Allies. It is reported that the Shah will retire to Isfahan in the event of the Persian proposals not proving acceptable.

GREECE MAY AID SERBIA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.
A News Agency despatch from London, published here to-day, says that Greece may after all go to Serbia's aid against the Bulgarians. According to delayed messages received by the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Athens to-day the arrival at Salonika of large forces of British troops have convinced the Greek government of the Allies determination to fight the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians effectively. That is given as a reason for this change of outlook. Greece would not at any time have been so unwilling to enter the war, the correspondent says, if it had not feared that the Allies' campaign would prove a failure, leaving the whole burden of the Balkan campaign to the Greeks. Serbia is satisfied that Greece will not be the case, and Greece is looking more favorably on the idea of plunging into the struggle as an ally of the Entente Powers. The situation referred to, however, still complicated and a source of anxiety to Government.

SERBIA'S STATEMENT.

PARIS, Nov. 11.
The Serbian Legation to-day gave out a note, issued with a view to setting at rest certain reports regarding Serbian affairs, said to have originated from German sources. The statement said: "First, General Radomir Putnik, Chief of the Serbian General Staff, although he has been in precarious health for a long time, continues at his post, directing the operations of the Serbian Army. Second, artillery captured by the Germans at Kraljevo was without importance from a military viewpoint. It was part of the spoils of the two previous wars. Its loss does not weaken the Serbian Army. Third, at no time has the Serbian Government thought of peace, nor considered the making of peace before victory was won by the Allies."

PATIENTS CURED OF CANCER.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
Seven patients suffering from cancer, have been completely cured by assisting Nature's efforts, according to Dr. Bell, head of the Cancer Research Department of the Battersea General Hospital. "We have," Dr. Bell said, "been able to demonstrate, beyond doubt, the healing power of Nature, if sufficiently assisted by regulating diet and regime of the patients, together with the administration of therapeutic. Agents has proved, in many instances, quite competent not only to overcome the disease but to bring about complete recovery."

GREY PRAISES HALDANE.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
Sir Edward Grey told the Commons this afternoon that he himself had expressed the desire to resign at the time Lord Haldane left the Cabinet; but for the crisis in public affairs I would have done so, said the Foreign Secretary. Sir Edward declared that he regarded Haldane's resignation as a loss to the public service and he regretted that there had been no opportunity to utilize Lord Haldane's services in the Foreign Office.

BALFOUR'S DECISION.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
During a debate in the Commons to-day Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, laid down the principle that he would not reply to criticisms on the conduct of the war, on the ground that all criticism of the conduct of the war must, until after the war is over, and indeed till long after, be a matter almost impossible to deal with because the facts are not, and cannot be known.

HALDANE AND CHURCHILL.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
Premier Asquith answering a question, paid a word of tribute to Viscount Haldane, saying that he rendered inestimable service when in the War Office. Replying to a request by papers tabled respecting the Antwerp expedition, he declined to do so while the war was in progress. He added that Churchill, the First Lord of the Admiralty, may treat with indifference a good record, and will be amply justified when the full story is told. Sir Edward Grey's expression of respect the allegations against him. He retorted in reply to a question as to whether Haldane had been assisting the administration of the foreign of-

ice. The Secretary said that Lord Haldane had at no time taken any part in the work of the foreign office, either before or after the war except with the full knowledge and consent of himself and with the authority of the Premier. They were primarily responsible.

ASQUITH STATES THE CASE.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
To make the matter clear, Mr. Asquith stated in the Commons to-night that Field Marshal Earl Kitchener, Secretary of State for War, had never tendered his resignation to either King George or to the Premier.

THE DEBATE IN THE COMMONS.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
Resuming the debate in the Commons, adjourned from last night, owing to absence of members of the Cabinet, William Joynson Hicks, member for Brentford district, Middlesex, drew attention to the condition of the Royal Flying Corps and Naval Air Service. He said there was great dissatisfaction connected with the naval air service, in regard to organization, and the appointment of a chief who knew nothing about air craft, above the heads of those who, in fact, had built up the fabric of the service. It was important, added the member, that England should have large new aeroplanes for offensive purposes next spring in order to meet the new airships and new aeroplanes which the Germans are building. He asked why work on an English biplane was stopped in January, and whether the Admiralty had dropped the policy of attacking Zeppelins by aeroplanes.
Arthur Lynch, Nationalist, made a strong attack against Lord Kitchener, who, he said, had blundered in not moving to the defence of Liege, and again on the question of munitions, and once again on Serbia. The blunder in the Dardanelles, he added, was at least the blunder of a man who meant to do something. He contended that the war was being conducted with signal incompetence, and that unless there was a change, the country was moving straight to disaster. He would sweep away seventy per cent of the higher British command beginning with Field Marshal French, who had been in command 15 months and had made no progress. In the last offensive continuing on the Allies broke through the German lines, but in the superior command decision was wanting to take full advantage of the moral victory. The Government, he declared, had no plan of campaign. The idea of a successful war of attrition was absurd. The war must be won in the field. Men were good and munitions were there. It was leadership and direction which were lacking.
Balfour, replying to the remarks of Hicks, said he did not think it ought to be assumed that the Government had taken the lead in air craft construction. It was the desire of the Admiralty and the War Office to improve the construction of air-craft strength, power and speed for the aerial defence of London. It would, of course, be an enormous advantage to have overwhelming forces of air-craft of the latest design, which could be hurled against the invader and become invaders themselves. The Government was doing its best to increase the number of aviators and machines for their use. We are building, he said, not an inconsiderable number of lighter than air craft at the moment, largely for the purpose of scouting. The question of lighter than air and heavier than air craft is still undecided. There are many persons who think Germany chose wrongly in choosing Zeppelins.

 LONDON, To-day. A strong intimation of compulsion at an early date is contained in a statement last night by Earl Derby, Director of Recruiting.  LONDON, To-day. A Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says: Jutland papers report capture by British warships of additional German trawlers in the North Sea.

STATE OF SIEGE IN HOLLAND.
 LONDON, To-day. A despatch of Reuters from the Hague says: On the 11th inst., a state of siege will be declared in some communes of North Holland and some parts of Amsterdam between Zaandam and the North Sea Canal and communes. The decree will apply to a portion of Belt where there are three important works.
TORPEDOING OF SOUTHLAND.
 LONDON, To-day. The War Office has issued the following announcement: On Sept. 2nd the transport Southland for Alexandria, was torpedoed in the Aegean Sea, and reached Mudros under her own steam the same day. As a precautionary measure the troops were transferred to other transports. There were some casualties amounting to 3 killed, 2 slightly wounded, 22 missing believed drowned. The report of the torpedoing of the Southland, which formerly was the Red Star Liner Vaderland, was given out by the Overseas News Agency at Berlin, on Sept. 9.

OVER 200 DROWNED.
 ROME, To-day. Only 225 passengers and crew of the steamer Ancona are saved out of a total of 428 on board, says a despatch from Tunis.
FIGHTING IN DARDANELLES.
 CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. The following official statement was issued to-day at the Turkish War Office: There were artillery combats on three sectors of the Dardanelles front with patrol skirmishes near Anafarta and near Ari Burnun. Our artillery silenced the enemy artillery. At the mouth of the Kora Dere, near Seddul Bahr an enemy

mine exploded on the left wing and killed a portion of English troops.
FRENCH VICTORY IN SERBIA.
 LONDON, To-day. A despatch from Athens says a Salonika telegram to the Patria states the French have inflicted a severe defeat on the Bulgarians near Velestina, and that the fall of that town is considered imminent.
AMBASSADOR PAGE CONFERS WITH BARON SONNINO.
 ROME, To-day. U. S. Ambassador Page called at the Foreign Office to-day and had a long talk with Baron Sonnino. The nature of the conference is unknown, but it is assumed to be the sinking of the Ancona was discussed informally.

RHINELAND SUNK.
 LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Rhineland has been sunk. Up to the present only one survivor has been landed; 1501 tons.
GENERAL MONROE IN SERBIA.
 LONDON, To-day. There has been no material change the last 24 hours in the situation either in Serbia or the other fronts. The Austro-Germans claim to be advancing along the line west of Nish, but beyond reports of the capture of another four thousand prisoners. The Serbian report says like those reported captured by the Austro-Germans, the Serbian army, for the right wing must be free from this menace before they proceed with their drive. The news from the Southern part of the country is probably true. It is now known that the French did not re-occupy but simply made a cavalry raid into the town of Krievolok, Bulgarian ammunition stores. The French advancing on the west side of the Vardar River and at same time repelling Bulgarian attacks on Krievolok, are endeavoring to form a junction with the Serbians who are fighting in Babuna Pass. A new British division having larger forces under the command of General Monroe are spreading out towards Strumitsa, where encounters with Bulgarian troops are reported with the arrival of Kitchener who should soon be on the scene further developments in the Balkan area expected. It is probable the Gallipoli army may become more active. So long as the Serbian army remains intact which it has done so far, as is evidenced by the Russian successes both north and south. The Germans admit they withdrew troops from the Crimea for the purpose of supporting the Russian army. By their recent gains the Russians have established connection between their forces on the Gulf of Riga by way of Kemmer and Lake Babit which is half way between Riga and Mitau. As a result of activity of hostile submarines freight rates between Cardiff and the Mediterranean Sea continue to jump. A fresh report was made to-day when fifty shillings were quoted for Port Said.

PERSUING SERBIANS.
 BERLIN, To-day. The pursuit of the Serbian army in a southerly direction continues, according to German official report issued to-day. The advance of the Germans in Rasina Valley, southwest of Kreuze Vae has reached the town of Kupci. Further eastward Ribare and Ribarske Banja have been reached. Yesterday more than 1,700 Serbians were taken prisoners and 11 cannons captured.

Frozen Fish for Great Britain.

The following paragraphs are from the British Fishing News:
Fish is now so scarce and dear that the Government are considering the experiment of importing chilled or frozen supplies from Newfoundland and Canadian waters.
The review of retail food prices in the United Kingdom for the twelve months ended July 31, just issued by the Board of Trade, shows that the greatest advance has been in the price of fish. It amounts on the average, to 75 per cent.
The branch of the fish trade most closely associated with the consumer which has been hit the hardest is fish-frying, or the small dealers who sell fried fish and chip potatoes in the poor neighborhoods. In the industrial centres of the north so enormous is the number of workers who make fried fish one of the principal articles of their daily food that dealing in "fish-and-chips" has become a vast industry. The business is now beset with serious difficulties. It is primarily for the purpose of relieving it that the Fisheries Division of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries are consulting with a view to the import of fish, in a chilled or frozen state, from North America.

Confident That Russia Will Win.

General Brusiloff, Facing Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, Says the Germans are Checked.
Petrograd, November 7. (Dispatch to The London Times)—It is reported that a conference has been held at Libau between the Kaiser and Field Marshal von Hindenburg, lasting three days, which suggests that the Germans appreciate the gravity of the situation on the northern front and are deliberating on a plan for grappling with it.
Representatives of the Bourse Gazette who have just returned from the front saw General Brusiloff, who authorized them to state that he is disgusted with the pusillanimity of Petrograd and the stupid rumors prevailing there. There is no doubt whatever, he says, that the enemy has been brought to a halt and does not possess sufficient strength to overthrow us. For me there is no doubt that when the previously determined moment arrives we shall advance and drive the Germans forth; but it is essential for the public to retain its calm and firmly believe, as we believe, that the war will be assuredly won by us.
The general said his troops were amply supplied with ammunition, well clad, fed and shod; that whereas Russia possessed abundant human material, Germany was sending to war cripples and old men. General Brusiloff's final words were: "Disgrace and death should be the portion of those who dream of peace. We are battling for conscience. For us it would be better to die than even allow the thought that the war will not terminate in our victory."

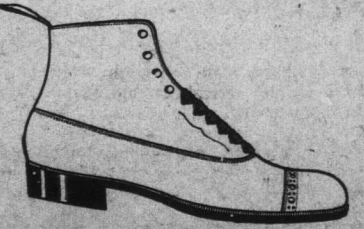

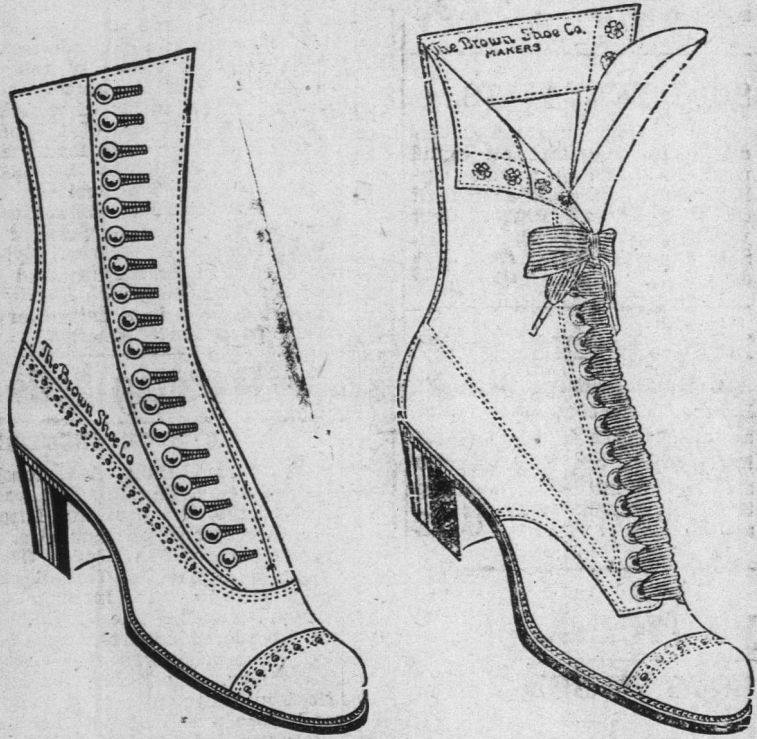
