



No editor, no newspaper, will be guilty of permitting the publication of any matter which will give information or be of service to the enemy, but the determination implied in the circular under review is to muzzle honest criticism and make the press a mere automaton, moved only at the pleasure of the censor. The mesures that the press must not discuss without the approval of the censor, are: Conscription, The Local Loan, The Regiment, The Conduct of Affairs in connection with Army and Navy matters, and Shipping. We have no idea where all this is going to end. So far as the freedom of the press is concerned, it does not exist, and is but a myth in this Dominion at any rate. It is being bludgeoned into servile submission to autocracy and the velvet glove of politeness only serves to conceal the iron hand of

(b) That he has one or two brothers and one of them is serving. or has served, in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces during the present war. (c) That he has three or more bro-

thers and two of them are serving or have served in His Maesty's Naval or Military Forces during the war. (d) That he has persons mainly dependent upon him for support,

such as parents, brothers or sisters and (e) Ill health or infirmity.
