The Ottawa Journal in its news columns to-day publishes the following: Oscar Tokoi, formerly Premier of Finland and leader of a band of political exiles, has settled on a farm at North Temiskaming. He is accompanied by forty fellow exiles, who have been banished from their native country. Tokoi, who was President of the Finnish Parliament at the time of Kerensky's rule in Russia, was deposed as a result of the revolution and became a political exile.
