THAW DECLARED SANE. PHILADELPHIA, April 22. Harry K. Thaw was declared sane to-night by a jury that had been hearing testimony to determine his mental condition. The jury declared him fully capable of looking after his estate. It deliberated seven hours and the verdict was reached when some, waiting in the court room, had about abandoned hope that an agreement would be arrived at. Counsel for Evelyn Nesbit, divorced wife of Thaw, said a motion probably would be filed for retrial of the case. Thaw was not in the court room when the verdict was pronounced. He was released on his own bond, getting complete freedom for the first time for seven years.
