THURSDAY, June 4. The Council met at 3 p.m.; present 29 members, the Warden in the chair.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have examined the County Engineer's report showing the various. Contracts let by them for the repair of the County Roads for the current year, and would recommend that no further expenditure be incurred except the sum of \$2000, to be laid out as recommended in the report of the North District Engineer; also that Mr. Carter, contractor, be paid the balance due I'm for the construction of the Ospringe and Bristol road, in accordance with the report of Mr. Cooper, County Engineer.

Valuable Discovery.—At the last Paris Exhibition, a patent machine for sharpening mill stones, attracted a good deal of attention. The invention, like most other valuable discoveries, is as simple as it is effective. It consists of a spindle or small wheel about an inch in diameter, connected with a frame, to which is fixed a black diamond. A man attends the machine, and directs by the hand the longitudinal and lateral movement of the diamond in its operations. The first lines it cuts are more expeditiously and better executed than could be accomplished by the old and somewhat rough way of sharpening by picks. Owing to the exactness of the lines the flour is more equally ground, and a greater quantity of way of sharpening by picks. Owing to the exactness of the lines the flour is more equally ground, and a greater quantity of flour is produced from a given quantity of wheat. This machine has been introduced into England, and has been found to be practically all that was represented The saving effected by the application of the patent, combining the saving of labor the increased quantity and superior quality of the flours manufactured, is variously estimated at from 25 to 50 cents per bag. Of this however, there is no positive certainty, but the following facts have been proved by actual experiment: That the manual labor is reduction-fourth, and that the total saving effected is upwards of \$17 per week on every pair of stones, or nearly \$900 per annum. In this country where the price of skilled labor is much higher, the saving would be greater. Surely it is worthy the attention of our entelligent and interprising millers. rising millers.
