Agricultural and Arts' Association.

A meeting of the Council of the Agricultural and Arts' Association of Ontario was held, on Thursday, in Toronto.

A communication was read from the Hon. A. McKellar, Commissioner of Agriculture, requesting the Council of the Association to make an examination of the site purchased for the Agricultural College and Experimental Farm, and report thereon as follows: -

1st. As to the nature and adaptability of the soils for the required experimental and illustrative purposes.

2nd. The sources of water supply.

3rd. The advantages or otherwise of the site chosen.

The President, and Messrs. Christie, Diamond, Skead and Murton were appointed a committee to examine the farm and report on the communication of the Commissioner of Agriculture.

A communication was read from Professor Buckland reporting the following gentlemen to have been elected the Council for the current year, as made up from the returns sent to the Department of Agriculture and Arts by the electoral division societies of the respective districts: - District No. 1, Archibald McNab, Lochiel; No. 2, Hon. J. Skead, Ottawa; No. 3, Andrew Wilson, Montclair; No. 4, Irwin Diamond, Mountain View, Prince Edward; No. 5, Nathan Choate, Port Hope; No. 6, George Graham, Brantford; No. 7, George Murton, Guelph; No. 8, J. C. Bykert, M. P. P., St. Catharines; No. 9, Hon. D. Christie, Paris; No. 10, Robert Gibbons, M. P. P., Goderich; No. 11, L. E. Shipley, Falkirk; No. 12, Stephen White, Charley Cross.

A communication was read from Messrs. John Watson and John H. Grant, of Ayr, Ont., stating that at a meeting of manufacturers of agricultural implements in the Province of Ontario, it was unanimously agreed that it was desirable that prizes should be offered for agricultural machinery and implements at Provincial Exhibitions, but that they should still be at liberty to enter their articles for exhibition only.

Brutal Murder in Maidstone.

A MAN SLAUGHTERED WITH AN AXE.

The Windsor Record gives the particulars of a dreadful tragedy in Maidstone, County of Essex - On Friday night last a party or ball was held at the house of White Stewart, River Puce, Township of Maidstone, about fifteen or twenty men and women, all colored, being present.

Nothing appears to have occurred to mar the harmony or interrupt the festivities until upon such occasions, until midnight, when a man named Washington in an intoxicated condition, went upon the floor to dance. Seeing that Washington was drunk, Samuel Henry Hamilton intervened, took to dissuade him from trying to dance, and he was joined in his endeavors by White Stewart. Somehow Hamilton and Stewart got into an altercation over Washington, and Stewart first threw a frying pan at Hamilton and then struck him a tremendous blow on the back of the head with a common black bottle, breaking and burying parts of the bottle in the poor fellow's head.

Hamilton, finding the place hot for him, and none venturing protection or assistance, left the house, but subsequently sought admission there to again. He was not permitted to enter, whereupon he forced the door open. While he was yet outside the house, Stewart, with an ordinary chopping axe in his hand, went forward to the steps, and on Hamilton coming within reach, swung the ferocious weapon and buried it up to the eye in his body, the axe entering about midway between the point of the shoulder and the neck, and inclining inwards.

Hamilton staggered a few steps backwards and fell dead. While prostrate and lifeless, Stewart made another savage attack with the axe, fairly burying it in Hamilton's body at a point in the left side between the tenth and eleventh ribs. This seems to have satisfied his brutal passion, and the bloodily mutilated body was allowed to remain without further molestation. It is proper to say that neither the victim or his assailant were in any degree under the influence of liquor.

On Saturday Stewart was arrested and brought before Justice McPharlin by whom he was committed to Sandwich goal. Green Stewart, a brother of the murderer, was on Tuesday arrested and committed, circumstances brought to light having indicated that a conspiracy had previously been entered into by the pair to take Hamilton's life.

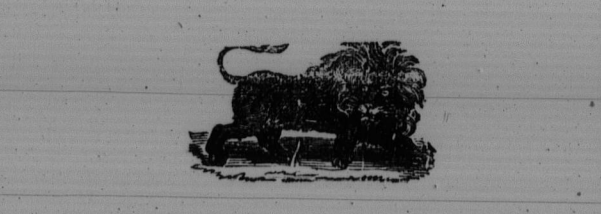

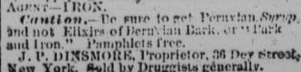

Affairs in Cuba.

London, Feb. 23.—Notice is given here that all memorials of English claimants under the Treaty of Washington must be filed by March 26th.

Mr. Monckton, a Conservative, has been elected to Parliament from North Nottingham, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Speaker Denison.

In the House of Commons to-night Mr. Bence-Jones gave notice that he should at an early day move that the divisions of the House be conducted by ballot.

Hughes, under Colonial Secretary, in replying to Mr. Dalrymple's enquiry, said that a collision between the American and Canadian fishermen was, in the opinion of the Government, impossible, but that precautions would be taken.

Havana, Feb. 24.—Insurgent General Agramonte, who surrendered to the Spanish authorities, has issued a document to his late companions in arms, which denounces the continuance of war, and asks them to surrender to the Spanish, and to allow his manifesto to circulate among the Cubans in the revolutionary districts.

Agramonte offers to receive any Cubans who are desirous of surrendering, and for that purpose he will accompany the Spanish column of troops. But should they refuse to surrender he threatens to organize the Cubans who surrendered with him, and march against the persisting revolutionists.

New York, Feb. 24.—The Herald's London special says that the Germans are arming, two corps having been ordered to be in readiness. The cause for these preparations is the great activity of political parties at Versailles, and a possibility of a change of Government in France.

Germany reserves the right to decide as to any new government there, and should she deem any such government unlikely, either by inclination or incapacity, to execute the treaty of peace, there will be another invasion.

Antwerp, Feb. 23.—Monsieur Dupanloup, Bishop of Orleans, and the Dukes of Rohan and Tromerme have arrived here. The number of strangers is constantly increasing, and their presence causes much agitation in the city. To-night the streets were occupied by a tumultuous crowd, and the police are out in force.
