THE POTATO CROP which has failed so extensively throughout England I is sat-isfactory to know has been almost wholly saved in Ireland and some parts of Scot-land, and the alarm that prevailed a month ago lest there should be a potato famine in the land, is, consequently, hap-ly subsiding. Its apprehension, mean-while, has stimulated commercial enterprise, and as the crops have been gener-ally abundant and of good quality ghout France and Germany, the high prices to which the English mark have been tendering for the past fortnight, it is to be ho tements of the newspapers may be de-nded upon, for we are informed that during the past week there have be very large importations from France Belgium, and Holland, at Hull an Belgium, and Holland, at Hull and Grimsby, and two large steamers have been chartered to carry cargoes of potatices from some of the principal ports in the Baltic, including Antwerp, Bremen, and Brussels; and that insurances to the extent of from £8,000 to £9,000 have been effected on the cargoes, which are expected to arrive in Liverpool in about three or four days. The potatoes are packed in bags, weighing eight stones, and meet with a ready sale at 7s. 6d a bag, from leal dealers. There are no symptoms of disease in them, and the importation has not been less than 200,000 peeks during the past week. Preference was given to the potatoes brought by the "City of Ghent," from Ghent, which landed 2,031 bags on her last voyage.—The French boats are bringing in full cargoes of sound potatoes, which meet with ready purchasers at 14d. per peck.
