A PROBABLE CASUS BELLI.

ENGLAND FORMS AN ALLIANCE WITH AFGHANISTAN.

Rejection of Fortresses Agrees as a sign that may lead to War.—The Russian reply considered by the Cabinet.

LONDON, April 4.—The reports from Lord Dufferin indicate that his negotiation with the amir of Afghanistan are a victory to the English and apparently to the Afghans. The negotiations tend strongly towards a joint military alliance between England and the amir that their very success may be accepted by Russia as a message. Lord Dufferin today reported that the amir has obtained from India a special subsidy for the maintenance of an Afghan garrison at Herat of sufficient strength to insure the integrity of that entire district.

An English engineer and a number of English officers will superintend the construction of a series of fortresses along the Afghan frontier, to be garrisoned and defended by Afghans exclusively. This is the thought, it is thought, is gratified at this scientific and professional military aid openly given by England.

Lord Dufferin also reports that he has agreed that the English shall construct a railway from Bolan to Candahar and a military road from Herat to Kandahar across the line of fortresses between Balkh, Herat and Candahar by a telegraph system.

It is feared Russia may continue to juggle with the Afghan question under the assumption that the Rawal Pindi council is really arranging a compact with England as the controlling spirit of a firm of which the amir is but a dummy.

The Russian army corps at St. Petersburg declares that if England advises that Herat be fortified, and the fortification follows as a result of English counsel and with English assistance, it will constitute a casus belli.

Considered in Council. LONDON, April 4.—The cabinet council today approved of the agreement made between the amir and Lord Dufferin. The victory has been instructed to invite the amir to visit London as a guest of the crown.

The cabinet also considered Baron De Giers' answer to Earl Granville's proposals concerning the Afghan frontier, Russia agrees to accept the proposals provided the zone of survey is extended to the Pamirian mountains. This means that Russia consents to limit the discussion to a zone containing a portion of the territory which is to be debated, provided that the zone is extended to include the territory which Russia desires to make defensible.

Baron De Staal has sent a separate communication to Earl Granville, the contents of which have not been made public. It is reported on good authority that the baron's document is an official Russian utterance on the subject of irritation caused by Russia by the military and anti-Russian demonstrations in India. It is also stated that the document regards the safety of the Russian empire and all military preparations and demonstrations until the conclusion or failure of the pending negotiations. The English embassy at Tehran, near the locality of the Russian conflict, reports that large masses of Russian troops continue to pass through Tashkent southward. The English consul at Bokhara makes a similar report. These troops are supposed to be on their way to Merv or Meshed. Reliable advice estimates that 65,000 Russian soldiers are already stationed between Balkh and Sarakhs.

The nature of Baron Dufferin's reply to the English proposals has been made public. It is reported on the correspondence between the two powers on the Afghan question, as the joint commissioners cannot be delineated by their principals. It is believed Russia is merely endeavoring to gain time.

Be of Good Cheer. LONDON, April 4.—England has annexed Quetta island with the consent of China. The island contains the Korean entrance to the sea of Japan and the Russian ports on the Pacific.

A Contest Inevitable. LONDON, April 5.—Prof. Vambury, the distinguished traveller is of opinion that war between England and Russia is inevitable. He says the Rawal Pindi meeting will probably delay the outbreak, but if the amir consents to an English railway from Sudd to Herat, hostilities will commence within a few weeks. He believes Russia, at the best only awaits the completion of the railway to Puli Khai and that it will open before the end of the year. The amir is expected to be directly across the Caspian sea may begin directly. The Novos'vrensky of St. Petersburg openly demands that Russia withdraw from the Paris declaration regarding the fitting out of privateers.

Russia and Persia have agreed upon frontier lines between their respective territories near Merv.

Preserving Peace. LONDON, April 5.—A Rawal Pindi dispatch says a second army corps has been ordered to be ready for service.

Montana Cowboys Volunteer. CALGARY, April 6.—A number of Montana cowboys are here ready to join the Canadian mounted contingent. They claim that the advance of the rebels is in all directions, and the people here have no fear whatever if the government only sends arms.

The Advance on Prince Albert. WINNIPEG, April 6.—Advice from Qu'Appelle show that the most active preparations are being made for the advance on Prince Albert when reinforcements shall have arrived.

The Troops En Route. OTTAWA, April 6.—The Ottawa company of sharpshooters overtook the Toronto Grenadiers at Bardville. The Ottawa, 10th Royals, Queen's Own, and Grenadiers were all at Nepegon to-morrow. The Ninth battalion, consisting of 250 men, reached the city on Saturday, and the 400 strong condition was pushed on west immediately.
