MICHAEL LARKINS KILLS HIMSEL. WHILST ON THE BEAT.

Police Officer Michael Larkins (No. 123), hed to Headquarters, committed suicide elf through the head with his own revolver. pulled the trigger of his pistol. The builet entered the right side of the skull and went clean through the brain. Larking fell like a log and was just breathing when McCracken rushed to his assistance. He died within three minutes of the firing of the shet. Word was at once within three minutes of the firing of the shet. Word was at once telephoned to headquarters, and the patrol wagon was ordered to the scene to take the body of the dead man to the station. There it was keps for an hour, when in accordance with Coroner Johnson's order it was conveyed to the City Morgus preparatory to the holding of an inquest in the afternoon.

Larkins joined the force in 1883 and was a native of Ireland. He was 28 years old and reckoued one of the best officers in the force. Before coming to Toronto he worked as a farm laborer in the township of Adjala, Ont., in the county of Cardwell.

Cheerful to the Last.

The peculiar feature of the case is the The peculiar feature of the case is the fact that up to within ten minutes of the shooting Larkins was spoken to by quite a number of people and appeared in the best of spirits. In the guardroom, on the previous night he was one of the merriest of the crowd, cracking jokes and playing dominoes with as much zest as the rest. Patrol Sergeant Bowers saw him at 6.32. At that time he appeared to be all right, and answered the customary questions in his usual manner. Policeman William J. Paterson saw him at 6.45 at King and George-streets, but did not speak to him. The death of Larkins has created a profound sensation in police circles.


