## WILL PUSH TARIFF REFORM.

TARIFF CHANGES TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HOUSE ON MARCH 20.

It Will Be a Business Session From the Start and No Filibustering Will Be Allowed—Government House in Mourning for Six Weeks—No Fast Atlantic Contract Made.

OTTAWA, March 5.—The two Controllers and Messrs. Foster and Bowell are working daily on the revision of the tariff. They will keep right on at it until sometime next week, when they will be ready at the opening of the session and the tariff changes presented to the House on Tuesday, March 20.

The plan of the Premier is a strictly business one, and the Opposition will have to be ready with their proposals, speeches and motions. Otherwise they will be left in the lurch. Any attempt at filibustering or the like will be met with long adjournments and a determination of the Government to push their measures through in the speech from the throne.

The Toronto P.O. Inspectorship.

The Postmaster-General has in hand the appointment of a postmaster for the Toronto division. Mr. Barwick's plan, several applications have been sent in, both by outsiders and men in the service. The initial selection, it is understood, will be reported, is to promote one of the present inspectors of Ontario to the post and to make the same an honorary appointment. The postmaster will take Mr. Barwick's place, and Mr. McFarlane, senior inspector of Toronto, go to London. This was likely the reason the Toronto members will present to Mr. Burnham his appointment to Toronto. Nothing has been decided.

The death of Lady Aberdeen's father will be reported by a series of six weeks' mourning at Government House. All engagements in this time have been cancelled. The state dinner fixed for Thursday, the 15th, and the drawing room for 100 of the ladies of the city have been postponed until April 26 and 27. Their Excellencies had intended to make quite a gathering of them, but this announcement of mourning at Government House will upset this. The opening will therefore be made for the accession of the Queen outside of Government House take up? A big ball was given on the 15th, and a smaller one on the 16th. There has been a great deal of the winter here in outdoor sports and the like. This has also been cancelled.

No fast Atlantic service continues Yet.

With reference to a cable despatch sent from Halifax to some English papers, to the effect that the Government had accepted a proposal from James Hindart of the Canadian-Australian Steamship Line, for a fast Atlantic service, it is learned that no contract has yet been signed, and that none entered into. The Government is, as it has been for some time, engaged in negotiations with several parties, but no definite conclusion has yet been arrived at.

## INCREASED REPRESENTATION.

The Plans of the Government with regard to Toronto will be made known to-day.

Measures March 5, John Tyndall, R. S. Simpson, George Harris and D. J. O'Donnough of the Trades and Labor Council and Alfred Jury, Robert Glicking, John Francis and W. L. Taylor of the Knights of Labor Assembly waited upon the members of the Government last evening and referred to the present inadequate representation of this city in the Legislative Assembly.

Mr. O'Donnough said they were instructed to urge upon the Government the advisability, as well as justice, of granting this city representation in proportion to its population. The members of the Legislative Assembly believed that 20,000 persons per member was the unit. They had at least 100,000, and would be raised accordingly to eight members.

Mr. Hardy: Twenty-three thousand is the unit now.

Mr. O'Donnough: We do not see why we should only have three members.

Mr. Hardy: Other constitutions are simple and have taken away their representation from them. But then Toronto has a very great influence, and I think it is only right that it should have a corresponding increase in its rural constituency.

Mr. J. J. Murray: The same principle of the Reform party, representation by population. What was true before Confederation was still true.

YORK TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

Business Transacted at the Regular Monthly Meeting Yesterday.

With cloth-like regularity Janitor Edwards arranges the stuffy leeks for the reception of the township councillors in the Eglington Town Hall on the first Monday in each month, having performed this duty for the past 12 years without intermission.

Reveille and all the members of the council were in their places yesterday morning at the regular meeting.

A complaint was received from Mr. S. James notifying the council that he had assessed three more acres than he owned. The clerk was instructed to treat the as-

The City Solicitor wrote stating that when making out his former account for protection of level crossings he had included a steep hill which he had not discovered that this is not on a boundary of the city. He enclosed a new account for \$32.37.

An account for \$155.22 of Mr. Castro, in full contract for building sidewalk on north side of Yonge street from Bathurst to Dufferin, was passed.

A letter was received from the Toronto General Burying Ground Trust, the trustees being very favorably upon the matter of placing an electric light in "Cemetery Hollow" in Yonge street.

The treasurer had purchased a set of account books for the treasurer at a cost of about \$2.

Mr. Horace J. Verrett's account for \$70 legal work in connection with local improvement on Grace-terrace, York, and \$25 in connection with a McKenzie-avenue local improvement.

A position was presented by Messrs. A. Harvey, John Lucas and George Hardy asking that the town be allowed to remain on Main street between Little York and Yorkville, and Lucas and Sylvester were appointed to look into the matter.

Mr. Joshua Ingham addressed the council on behalf of his claim for \$10—half the amount paid him for work he did in Cleopatra's Needle Avenue. Lucas and Sylvester were appointed to inspect this road, and ascertain whether it is a township road and to report at next meeting.

Mr. Robert Elliott had a complaint in affidavit setting that he had a steep hill to cut and dug out \$3 for same. Mr. Francis H. Elliott was the valuator. The council authorized the treasurer to pay Mr. Davies \$3 for the same.

A petition signed by James T. Locke, L. O. P. Gardner, Fred. W. Ward, H. Wallis, G. C. Jones, James Branson, Alex, Jackson, G. Smith and others, praying for the alteration of boundaries of S. No. 21, so as to make this over to the present position of the school building within a few feet of southern boundary of the section, was presented to the Board of Education, and the Board of Education agreed to pay expenses of bonds for which they are taxed. Messrs. Hyslop and Gouding were appointed a committee to look into the matter.

A large number of persons wrote, some through solicitors, stating that they had paid their taxes and were entitled to have the lands were advertised for sale. The treasurer was authorized to redeem the following lands: Lots 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34, ranges or blocks N. 95, sub-division lot 9, con. 11, west of Yonge street, 27th Concession, Dufferin, to be 2 or 3 cent from the tax, and that the taxes returned against these lots be remitted.

A statement was presented to the council assuring them that no one's claim against the Township of York in respect of annexed territory. The claim against the townships of Weston and Etobicoke will meet on March 29, when the township's interests will be looked after by the rest of the Municipality. Clerks, Jackson, Aspinwall, Bell and Burdett and engineer Gibson, with power to call in others. TOKYO JUNCTION COUNCIL

An Attempt to Reduce Salaries of Clerk and Treasurer.

At the meeting of the Junction council last night the Finance Committee brought in its report on the special audit, to the effect that the auditors found errors of a clerical nature only and the town suffers no loss; that the auditors have not properly performed their duties.

After a long discussion all of which was surrounded by a good deal of mystery to what the auditors reported, the report of the Finance Committee's report was referred back.

The Finance Committee's recommendation that the present treasurer and clerk be retained at a salary of \$850 and \$800 respectively was carried and back. They each received \$800 last year.

A motion was passed that the Police Magistrate be paid his salary monthly hereafter.

Councillor Laughton reported that the special committee appointed to make a recommendation to the City Council to increase the town's amount for administration of Justice by \$200 per year. But the committee found that the Junction was not paying its proper share for maintenance of

the registry office by \$100. Thus a saving had been effected of \$100 per year.

A bylaw was introduced to widen Weston street from 15 to 20 feet.

A deputation from the High School Board, composed of Dr. Williams, Rev. C. E. Thompson and Mr. Holden, the school council. Dr. Williams spoke first, saying the board required \$7000 more to complete the building. Mr. Holden also said that he was concerned the amount now asked for would complete the building. Rev. Mr. Thompson said he had only been present at the meeting, and had not had time to look into the books. He said there seemed to be undue haste on the part of the school board in asking for money, he would advise the council to take a special deliberation on the matter.

Councillor Armstrong was of the opinion it was proposed to grant any more money to the school until a detailed statement of the school's financial condition was made. Councillor Armstrong also concurred in this opinion.

Already \$85,000 has been spent on this building.

The matter was referred to the Finance Committee.

Councillor Blundell's motion for the repeal of the bylaw giving the master \$800 a year salary was ruled out of order, as it had not been properly introduced. The master will come up next at next meeting.

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
