The cholera plague is still extending in France, leaving its ghastly record wherever it appears. In Toulon on the 21st inst, 46 cholera deaths were reported, and 171 cases received into the hospital during a period of twenty-four hours. There is great danger of this event unless proper quarantine precautions are taken, owing to the large number of sailing vessels that trade, principally in lumber, between the Mediterranean ports and those of the Maritime Provinces. It is estimated that over six hundred vessels are engaged in the lumber trade, from New Brunswick to ports mentioned. Only a minute will prevent the disease making its appearance.

Despatches from St. John's Nfld., to the Secretary of the Treasury at Washington, D. C. state that seven survivors of the Greely Arctic expedition have been found—Lieut. Greely, Sergeant Brainerd, Sergeant Francis, Sergeant Long, Sergeant Ellison, Sergeant Stewart, and Private Connolly—who were rescued by the relief ships Thetis and Bear near the mouth of Smith's Sound on the 22nd of June. Sergeant Ellison was very much prostrated and badly frosted when found, and died at Godhavn on the 6th July, after undergoing surgical operation. Relief ships Thetis and Bear, with the survivors are now at St. John's Nfld.

The story of suffering and privations as told by the rescued men is as usual a harrowing one in all its details. When will this monumental quality of manly endurance and money in the endeavor to solve an impossibility be stopped?

The Number of Deaths in Shipwrecks.
RESEARCHER CONSIDERS THE NUMBER OF DEATHS IN SHIPWRECKS AS BEING THE MOST INTERESTING FACT IN THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD.
We are indebted to Mr. J. E. Wilson, of Halifax, for the following very curious statement of persons saved from shipwrecks in the Bay of Biscay in 1882—the record of which is the most interesting in the world.

It will be seen that while the failure in Canada for the last six months shows a large increase both in number and aggregate liabilities, as compared with the same period of 1883, yet the rate of increase is not so high as that of 1883 as compared with 1882.
It is interesting to note that the number of failures in 1882 was 1,100, and that in 1883 it was 1,200, an increase of 9 per cent.
