Some raised bank notes, principally those of the Imperial and Bank of Commerce have appeared recently; it is supposed that the work has been done in Toronto. The alterations on the face are so well executed as to easily deceive indifferent and careless persons but the designs on the genuine and counterfeit bills are entirely different, and examination of the borders is the quickest way of discovering the fraud.

THE BY-LAW submitted to the ratepayers of Campbellford last week for the granting of a bonus of \$10,000 to Messrs. Gault Bros., of this city, for the establishment of a factory in that village, was carried by an overwhelming majority. The firm have not fully decided upon the character of the goods to be manufactured.

THE FINANCE Committee of Belleville City Council having resolved to take advantage of the favorable money market to float a portion of the \$90,000 recently borrowed from the Bank of Commerce for current expenses, are advertising for tenders for the purchase of \$50,000 of city debentures. The city expects to be able to float the new debentures at the rate of at least 6 per ct. prem.

Honest traders have frequently complained not without cause, of the unfair advantage which unscrupulous and financially irresponsible men in business derived, under the working of the old Insolvent Act, over those paying 100 cents in the dollar; but conscientious and law-abiding merchants on St. Bonaventure st. in this city have for the past few months, according to common report, suffered from a grievance somewhat similar in its effects, but arising from another cause. It appears that a certain confectionery dealer is in the habit of keeping his store open to the public on Sundays, and selling goods up to a late hour in the evening. The neighboring storekeepers have the matter in their own hands, and would perform a duty they owe to themselves and society by informing the police authorities, with a view to compelling this unscrupulous dealer to respect the civil, if he does not the moral law.

THE POULTRY business in Toronto seems to be already overdone, for the best dressed turkeys are reported as cheap, pound for pound, as good beef, while geese are considerably cheaper, in that city. The export trade in poultry has commenced; on Monday last a carload of over 3,000 turkeys, dressed, was shipped to England by Wm. Gray, jr., from Newcastle, Ont.

The fruit sale for account of Messrs. Gillespie. Moffatt & Co., this city, on Monday last, was well attended, and the bidding was good. ()f damaged fruit, Valencias sold at 51c to 7c; London layers at \$2.371; loose Muscatels at \$2.05; 100 bags almonds at 10 c to 102c; shelled do at 274c in boxes, and 22c for bales. The terms were cash and auction duty. 500 boxes sound Valencias sold at 72c, at four months; and Japan tea brought from 20c to 21c.

WINGHAM, Ont., recently voted a bonus of \$12,500 in aid of widening the gauge of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway. Out of 132 votes only 8 were recorded against it. Culross Township, in the County of Bruce, rejected their by-law for the same purpose by a majority of 44, while Howick Township, County of Huron, carried it by a majority of 56. Teeswater also carried a by-law for \$30,000 to aid the same reilway. East Wawanosh will submit a bylaw for \$5,000.

MR. DAVID SEATH, of this city, assignee, has issued in handsome book form a list of insolvents in the Province of Quebec under the provisions of the late and amending Acts, giving the dates of insolvency, dividends declared, applications for discharge, and names and residents of assignees. The book will doubtless have considerable interest for those concerned as creditors in estates not yet wound up, and as a sourenir of the salt river up which sailed so many credit ventures during the recent depression. Some of the later as well

as the earlier assignees are not represented too often under the head of "Date of Dividends." By the way what has become of the estate of F. L. Hart. Esq.?

The amount of excise revenue collected at the Inland Revenue Division of Ottawa for the month ending 30th November, 1880, was \$11,-763.25, an increase over the corresponding month of last year of \$1,295.36.

The objections formerly existing to the want of good hotel accommodation at Ottawa are to be removed. Mr. Graham, the proprietor of the Union, has just about completed an extensive wing thereto, and the hotel is to be shortly opened under the name of the "Grand Union."

not the proper qualifications Carrying a small stock, he continued to do a moderate business for a time, and succeeded in obtaining credit up till within a couple of months ago, but bad management, losses on bad debts, together with heavy expenses, having a large family to support, compelled him at length to assign to his heaviest creditors, a Montreal dry goods firm. His liabilities amount to \$2,858, distributed among Montreal houses, and his assets, including stock and book-debts, of which latter over one half are considered bad or doubtful, are estimated at \$1,813. The book accounts considered good amount to \$362. 84, while a total of \$427.43 is believed to be bad or doubtful. Mr. Archamb mlt owns a farm which cost him \$545, and is now mortgaged for all it is worth; also a house and lot which, cost \$1,200, now valued at \$600, and mortgaged to three different parties for a total of \$1,200. TRADE OF MONTREAL.

In a leading article in a recent number of the Montreal Herald, entitled "The Times we live in, and what we pay," a comparison is instituted between the imports at the port of Montreal during the first ten months of the years 1878, 1879 and 1880, and likewise between the duties levied in the same years. The figures given are: 1878, imports 21,034,197, duties 3,183,790 1879 " 19,396,520 " 3,893,535 1880 " 26,057,726 " 5,401,056

We presume, of course, that the figures are correct according to the customs returns at this port, but we think it may

be interesting to give the figures from the Government Trade returns for the fiscal years commencing with that ending 30th June, 1876.

It is, of course, impossible to institute a comparison with the Herald's figures, as they apply to different periods, but it would be interesting, that a detailed statement of the leading articles of import should be given, so that the cause of the great increase in 1880 might be ascertained.

It might be inferred from the Herald's remarks that the city of Montreal has been burdened to the extent of \$5,401,-056, but this is obviously a mistake. The consumers of the goods, and not the importers, have to pay the duties, and if the trade of Montreal has increased as it would appear to have done, the inhabitants generally have derived a benefit thereby. There is one article regarding which there can be no doubt that a considerable increase has taken place, and it so happens that it is precisely the article on which very heavy taxation is imposed. We refer to sugar. Prior to the reopening of the refineries in Montreal, and during the admission of foreign sugars on which bounty was paid on exportation. those sugars were largely imported at Toronto, Hamilton and other western ports, whereas, since the new tariff came into force, sugars have been imported direct in considerable quantities. It seems probable that some change may likewise have taken place in other branches of trade. Adverting to the alteration in the character of the imports, the comparison instituted by the Herald between the two tariffs is calculated to mislead. The Herald admits that he cannot question the wisdom of the Government in attempting by some means to bring about a closer balance between revenue and expenditure. It is rather singular that one of the chief complaints against the tariff has been that it has not accomplished that important object, and yet we are now assured that at a single port there has been an increase this year of nearly a million and a half of dollars.

Concurring as we do with the Herald. that the reaction in trade is not to be attributed to the tariff, we are equally convinced that, in view of the increased obligations of the Government, it was absolutely necessary to raise more revenue, and with that object to increase the customs duties. Of course the details of the tariff are fairly subject to criticism, and in the whole list there is no item which presents more difficulty than sugar, and especially since the attempts that are being made to encourage the manufacture of beet sugar. We should like very much to see a statement of the Herald's calculations, shewing that under the old tariff sufficient revenue would have been raised to have met the deficits which have existed in past years, and the increased expenditure. We shall be better able to discuss the details of the tariff when we receive the trade returns for 1880, but in the meantime, we must point out that the aggregate returns from a single port for a portion of the year form no satisfactory basis on which to form a judgment as to the merits or defects of the tariff.

COTTÓN TRADE AND MANUFAC-TURE.

In a series of articles under this caption, published nearly a year ago, we pointed out, among other things, the extraordinary progress made within the decade in the cotton industries of the country. The year 1874 witnessed the highest importation of manufactured cottons to Canada, and meantime there has been a gradual decrease in the receipts of these goods, with a more than corresponding increase of raw cottons, as shown by the following table:

The returns for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1880, shortly to be laid before Parliament, will undoubtedly show a still greater advance. Notwithstanding the statements as to the great exodus to the United States it would appear that the consumption of cotton is increasing in the country, for the falling off in the importation of manufactured goods is not at all proportionate to the importation of raw cotton. The total imports of raw cottons from the United States to Canada during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, were 9,709,864 lbs., valued at \$983,013. The following is a close approximation of the average value per lb. of raw cotton imported to this country from the United States during the last six years:

1874, 1875, 1876, 1877, 1878, 1879, 14 1-5c. 143c. 12c. 103c. 103c. 104c. Such a reduction ought to account in

some degree for the improved position of many of the mills, and a glance at the

highest and lowest prices of raw cotton in the New York market for the years quoted shows that our people know when and how to buy to advantage. Canadian manufacturers have hitherto devoted themselves chiefly to the making of brown or grey goods, but the success which has attended the Montreal Cotton Company's bleached goods factory at Valleyfield, and the large quantity of British goods still being imported, have stirred up some of our wholesale merchants, and there is some probability that another factory will be established ere long not far from Montreal, wherever the greatest inducement as to locality and bonus can be had.

The Victor Hudon Cotton Company mill at Hochelaga is adding to its already enormous capacities. An engine of 800 horse power has just been put in, thus doubling the driving force of the factory. The number of looms now in operation is about \$50, and the old machinery is being rapidly replaced by new improvements. The present consumption of the factory, as stated by the manager, is 170 bales of about 500 lbs. each per week, and the turn out is about 75,000 lbs. of piece goods or 250,000 yards, making an annual product of about 13 million yards. The company, instead of adding to their small capital of \$300,000 have devoted their surplus profits to the making of improvements, and the result is that the property is now worth about \$750,000, realizing handsome profits, and paying what appear to be heavy dividends to the shareholders. This factory affords one of the best illustrations of a wise application of the best principles of Political Economy to be found on the continent.

Whatever may be said of the N. P., for or against, there can be no two opinions as to the benefits bestowed thereby upon the cotton industries, the thousands of operatives and their families, -who in turn become additional consumers of other goods,-as well as the shareholders in these enterprises. The Canada Cotton Co. of Cornwall, whose stock, quoted at more than 30 per cent. above par recently, was offered at ten cents in the dollar a year ago, divided a four per cent. dividend for the last six months; the Stormont of the same place paid five per cent; Valleyfield, five per cent; Merriton, 4 per cent; Hochelaga, five per cent,-and Dundas eight per cent for the 12 months of 1879. There is a feeling among the trade that prices are maintained too high, that the directors are too much disposed to bleeding the goose that lays the golden eggs, and they point to the developed condition of the woollen manufactures as a warning. On the other hand, some of the directors say that they have already had a surfeit of the cotton tariff as recently inaugurated, and that the wholesale dealers or jobbers would be obliged to pay from five to ten per cent. over present figures under such a tariff as that anterior to the National Policy.

We shall endeavor in a future article to give some idea of the cost of preparing the raw material for the wholesale and retail dealers.

HARBOR DUES AND TRANSIT CHARGES.

The joint reply of the Board of Trade and of the Corn Exchange Association of Montreal in answer to inquiries made by the Minister of Public Works relating to canal tolls, harbor dues, wharfage and other charges affecting the navigation of the St. Lawrence has been published. It does not contain any point that has not already been discussed by the press, and there is a lack of preciseness in the remedies proposed by both institutions that is not conducive to a firm and a determined decision on the part of the Government. The first section of the pamphlet is but little more than a synopsis of the progress of the carrying trade of North America during the past quarter of a century. The extensive tables of statistics brought forward to illustrate the increase of the carrying trade are not all to the point. For instance, the table comparing the quantities of vegetable food of all kinds carried eastward by the New York Central and Eric railroads to the quantities of wheat and flour moved in the same direction via the New York canals cannot be taken as a fair exhibit of the traffic of the canals. Vegetable food comprising all kinds of cereals compared with only one kind of grain cannot be admitted as leading to exact conclusions. The comments on the inferiority of canals vs. railways do not show a serious consideration of the question. Railways, of course, competing with the canals of the State of New York must increase in traffic every year, while the canals cannot do more than maintain their averaged transportation. The capacity of canals is limited. The Erie canal cannot move more than 5,000,000 tons, the capacity of the boats is limited to \$,000 bushels. while railroads have no limits. The reason why, in 1861 and 1862, the canals did a larger business than in any other year is a very simple one. The railways were at that time taken possession of by the Government for the transportation of war material and troops.

The report inclines to the belief that

canals are not able to keep their traffic, though their rate of freight per ton be 33 to 50 per cent. less than by rail. The report does not take into consideration that the small canals of the State of New York have been virtually abandoned by the State, and that many affluents that fed the main canal have ceased to serve this purpose. Another reason for the decline of traffic is the through freight business from Chicago or Milwaukee to European ports. The freight is engaged on board designated steamers, and the goods must be at the port of shipment on the Atlantic at a fixed date; the slow canal barge with the risk of detention on the way can no longer be used for quick transportation; railroads alone can serve the purpose. It has been already pointed out in this JOURNAL that the railroads having been extended in the South-West, bring to New York breadstuffs that Montreal could not attract, and that the proportion of Montreal in the shipments from the lakes has not decreased though its percentage in the total receipts at the seaboard has been lowered.

The annual average movement of grain for ten years on Lake Ontario is stated to be 31,601,853 bushels, and the proportion of Montreal in the movement appears to be during the last five years a yearly percentage of 64.38. The compiler does not know how to account for the decline of Oswego as a receiving port, its share having diminished from 43.42 per cent. in 1869 to 23 per cent. in 1879. The cause of this decline is the decrease in the milling business. The superior grade of wheat produced in the Genessee Valley gave to the milling business a large interest in the towns of Watertown, Rome and Syracuse. The Genessee wheat ceased to be grown, owing to the impoverishment of the soil, and the millers imported wheat from the west to maintain their brands,now, the State of Minnesota, owing to Smith's process, has the monopoly of grinding the "family flour," and the receipts in the port of Oswego are becoming less, year after year.

It were useless to follow the report of the Board of Trade and the Corn Exchange Association in its statement of rates of freight and canal tolls, so much having been said already in the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE On this important question. If the toll on wheat on the Erie canal is 33 cents per ton of 2,000 lbs., the toll is said to be 20 cents per ton on the Canadian canals; but the 25 cents charged in Montreal per 100 bushels, that is to say, on wheat \S^1_4 c, per ton, ought to be added to the toll, if the right charge on wheat is to be given. The difference in tolls on

wheat between the two countries is about 5 cents; it is less on corn and on barley, owing to the weight per bushel.

We have already referred to the long list of charges on vessels in the five Atlantic ports, and pointed out the position occupied by Montreal. Harbor dues, pilotage, towage are higher in Montreal than in any other port, but the distance from the sea ought to be considered in regard to pilotage and towage. The comparison between the rates of freight in the five ports cannot be of any interest.

Averaging daily quotations of rates between a port where vessels call for a freight and another port where the entering vessels have been chartered to arrive is of no avail. If the Norwegian, Italian or Austrian fleet of Merchant vessels flock to New York in search of a freight, Montreal is not a port of call, and no vessel comes here on ballast.

The comparison between the rates of insurance is also useless. Montreal insurers do not take any risk on vessels leaded with grain that are not A 1; New York and the other ports will insure vessels quoted A 1½, and sometimes under. There are besides the higher rates, heavy even in the middle of September, that the American insurers do not demand. The small number of vessels dispatched here for "A port of U.K. and a market" has no other cause than the heavy charges on navigation that compel them to pay for improvements they did not require.

The conclusions arrived at in the report are too well known to require notice, but we would have preferred to hear the representatives of the commerce of our city express themselves more decidedly and with stronger arguments upon such an all-important subject.

THE BOOM IN STOCKS.

The abundance and cheapness of money has naturally caused a considerable ad vance in stocks in the United Kingdom, the United States and Canada. Consols have been quoted above par, and it seems far from improbable that there may be a new creation at the rate of 21 per cent. Our own Government will probably reduce the 5 per cent. Dominion stock to 4. It is, of course, difficult to form any correct opinion as to the extent of the transactions on the Stock Exchange for speculation, which is always rife under the circumstances which exist at present. The alteration in the law which prevents banks from making loans on the collateral security of bank stocks does not seem to have prevented extensive dealings in those securities, and the prices are high in view of the current

dividends It may fairly be assumed that after the complete weeding out of insolvent firms, that has taken place, the banks will suffer less by had debts than they have done in the last few years, and that they will share in the general prosperity. Among the miscellaneous securities the principal rise has been in the shares and bonds of cotton manufacturing companies, which have materially advanced. If we may judge by the price of Dominion stock and Montreal Corporation securities, both of which may be considered Al investors are disposed to be satisfied with rather less than 5 per cent. interest, which is considerably more than can be obtained from the leading banks. The prices of securities generally are based very much on an earning of 5 per cent., the more speculative ones, of course, being expected to produce higher rates. In New York the bulls and bears have been waging a fierce war, the advantage having been with the former until within the last few days. The two gigantic public works about to be undertaken, the Canadian Pacific and Northern Pacific, will absorb a considerable amount of capital, and it is fortunate that a great portion of it will be obtained in Europe.

THE PACIFIC RAILWAY.

In view of the near approach of the meeting of Parliament, when the precise agreement entered into between the Gov ernment and the Pacific Syndicate will be made public, we shave some hesitation in noticing the article in the Toronto Globe of the 30th, which professes to give the substance of that agreement in greater detail than it has been furnished by the Ministerial journals. We do not find any. thing in the Globe's article that leads us to doubt its correctness, nor anything that might not as well have been given by those journals which are more in the confidence of the Government. Concealment is calculated to damage those who resort to it, and the Globe has certainly availed itself of the opportunity to excite opposition to the Government scheme. After all, the information furnished by the Globe is confirmatory of the reports which have been generally circulated, viz., that the subsidy to the new Syndicate was to be a land grant of 25,000,000 acres of land, and \$25,000,000 in money. It never could have been imagined by any one that, in arriving at an agreement for a subsidy, a mileage rate for the entire line was likely to have been adopted. It has always been known that the line between Nipissing and Thunder Bay, on the North of Lake Superior, would be much more costly than

that over the prairies West of Winnipeg. On the assumption that the figures given by the Globe are correct, we think that they are not open to criticism, indeed we do not infer from the Globe's article that he is of a different opinion. He objects, and there are doubtless many who are inclined to concur in his opinion, to the prosecution of the line between Nipissing and I hunder Bay, believing that that branch might well be postponed. especially if the connection with the North West, by a branch to the Sault St. Marie, were secured. On this point there is room for wide difference of opinion; but, in view of the fact that a considerable portion of the line in British Columbia, is already under contract, and that it is most important that a terminus on the Pacific should be secured, with as little delay as possible, we are unable to discover any tenable ground for postponing the construction of any portion of the road West of Thunder Bay. The line north of Lake Superior is, it cannot be denied, open to more doubt, in view of the great cost which it will entail. We think it only right to give the Globe's figures which seem likely to be correct.

TOO MUCH CASH.

One of the most singular features of the general improvement in business is seen in the readiness with which retail purchasers make cash offers for goods. After employing his usual eloquence, and, owing to the greater confidence brought about by the better times, having submitted to a considerable "beating down" in agreeing as to the price of a bill of goods which leaves his firm the closest possible margin on the ordinary four months credit, the traveller is surprised to hear his customer say,-"Come now; what will you take off for cash?" or, "Come, take off five per cent. for cash, and you can have it." This means to the wholesaler fitteen or twenty per cent. per annum on four months' notes, which his banker discounts for him at six, seven or eight per cent. The new departure is not confined to any particular districts or Provinces; it is said to be quite general east and west, and the purchaser usually succeeds in getting a considerable discount off the price of the goods. The wholesalers do not favor such an abundance of cash. If the retailers who, as a rule, do not employ farmers' notes to dis-

count were to be met by their customers with similar proposals they would have less hesitation in knowing what to do. And it is not alone the man who has usually been recognized as a good mark that takes the commercial traveller by surprise with eash offers for heavy discounts; the man whose custom to the wholesaler bordered on speculation has also begun to discount his own paper. The position of the traveller is rendered exceedingly difficult by this change, a condition of things brought about largely by the increased amounts of country produce, grain, cattle, &c., sent to outside markets-by the larger number of persons employed in the various new or enlarged industries, but also, to a great extent, by the thorough weeding out of superfluous dealers during the depression, which thus happily wrought its own cure. We trust that the many thousand readers of the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE have each and all become partakers of the long deferred improvement, and shall be glad to have substantial proof thereof from those whose date on their address label still shows '79, '78 and even remoter years.

THE RIVER DISASTERS.

The comparatively open weather of the early part of the week effected little towards materially improving the positions of the grounded or ice-bound vessels down the river. The Peruvian and Dominion after an ineffectual attempt to get away have been obliged to put back into the mouth of the Richelien river, while the positions of the Boyne and the Dominion steamship Ottawa have become more threatening. It is feared that the latter may become a wreek.

Various causes are assigned for these disasters apart from the main consideration that they imprudently delayed their departure, and perhaps in one or two instances were greedily overloaded. Blame is attached to the pilots by people who fancy that these so-called experienced navigators should be able in case of necessity to run the channel without buoys or other water marks to guide their course. It is said that the Ottawa's pilot, uncertain as to the new channel, which is only 300 feet wide, attempted to enter the old passage and instead of striking it, ran on the boulders in the ridge between. The vessel is said to have been drawing 23 feet 6 inches at the time, and in view of the fact that the heavy westerly storm had blown much water out of the channels, quite a common occurrence when rivers at intervals widen into lakes, it is doubtful whether, being so deeply freighted, she could have steamed through the older channel which is three feet shallowed than the new one, even had the pilot succeeded in entering it. It is suggested that Can-Buoys surmounted by flag staffs would be more serviceable than the light poles now in use, as less liable to be over run by new ice. The former are liable in frosty weather, leaning at a sharp angle with the current, to accumulate ice on the upper surface, the weight of which

very soon sinks them; but there is nothing to prevent their being made cross-shaped or with such an attachment to the pole, so that as one sinks through the weight of ice another arm would be raised in its stead. Complaint is also made as to the narrowness of the channel, many of the vessels passing through being over 300 feet in length, but as there is little possibility of anchorage in such a bed there can be little or no probability of swinging across stream. It is not likely, however, in view of the expectations that the Ottawa Government may assume the channel debt that further widening willshe undertaken very soon.

The whole circumstances are most unfortunate, for apart from the direct losses to owners, shippers and insurance companies, the reputation of our magnificent water course will suffer in other parts of the world and, of course, with the usual exaggerations. The lesson, however, will not be lost: masters of vessels are not likely to be caught again so late in port, and champagne suppers will be postponed to a more auspicious season. The increased business at this port has been more than enough for the carrying service, and some of the owners may have came to remember the "Last straw that broke the camel's back." Perhaps the most practical suggestion for a prevention of future accidents of the kind is that a strong vessel such as the Progress (unfortunately in the lower waters recently when wanted) should be ready and close at hand during the few weeks about the close of navigation. There need be no lack of employment for such a vessel during the early part of the season. It is: also suggested that had there been more unanimity among the underwriters the recent unfortunate delays in port would not have been made; but companies who felt that in ceasing to write on the 1st November in previous years, they had been losing customers, tended rather to the other extreme to make amends the present season, and with most unfortunate results.

THE COMMUNITY has been exercised the last few days over the flight of Frank J. Keller, advocate, of this city, under peculiar circumstances. Complaint laid before the Police Magistrate by Mr. Wm. Kerr Hepburn on the 29th ult., set forth that on the 10th Oct., 1879, Dame Eliza Maria Mitchell, of Stonebaven, Scotland, by her attorney, Henry A. Budden, gave to the complainant, to Arthur Wm. Hepburn, of Picton, Ontario, and Francis John Keller, as trustees, the sum of £2,000 in trust for Miss Matilda Hepburn, her grand-daughter; £2,000 in trust for Miss Emily Hepburn, her second grand-daughter, and £1,000 for Miss Florence Hepburn, her third grand-daughter : which sums were to be invested in bank stocks or mortgages on real estate. The interest on these sums was to be paid in part to the com. plainant for the education and the maintenance of the said three young ladies until they came of age or married. It was provided also that in case of the decease of any of them, the money should go to their issue if any; and in case of the decease of any of them without issue, that the money should go to the next of kin. It was provided also that none of the said trustees should be reponsible for any

of the defaults of the others. The complaint then set forth that the said Keller, on or about the 2nd of January 1879, did, with intent to defraud, appropriate \$7,140.75 of the trust funds to his own purpose. Mr. Keller was accordingly taken into custody, but was released on bail of \$4,000 furnished by Mr. Millen, contractor, and another distant connection resident in Montreal. His arrest on a capias was avoided by his sudden departure on the western train on Wednesday night. He has been heard of from Ogdensburg, N.Y., and it is not probable he will make his appearance in court to-day. Although said to be in possession of a good practice, Mr. Keller somewhat surprised his friends by the manner in which he dressed and lived, and he is said to have been lately addicted to gambling at cards. The misappropriation was discovered some time ago, when Mr. Keller's pretext that he had invested the money in life insurance policies would no longer wear, and exposure was avoided by his wife's relinquishing to the Hepburn family her sole right under marriage contract to the furniture and household effects. She is reported as having returned to her family in Quebec. Mr. Keller is reported to have attempted blowing out his brains in a restaurant on Wednesday evening, but was prevented by a brother barrister. He stated to some friends at the Bonaventure depot, when stepping on the train, that the matter was not likely to be presecuted for the sake of some elderly persons, whose connection with the business would not well bear light. His papers will probably furnish some interesting information.

THE CANADA Atlantic Railway Company, the Amalgurated Coteau and Province Line, and the Montreal and City of Ottawa Junction railways, have cancelled the contract between the Company and Messrs. Baich and Stanton, for the construction of the Railway, in consequence of their failing to proceed with the work at the time stipulated in the contract. It is said the Company have several offers for the contract under consideration, and that work is likely to be commenced upon the road at an early date.

MR. W. GOODERHAM, jun., of Toronto, in a letter to the Globe, says that upon Toronto granting \$300,000, and some of the other numicipalities who have already voted over \$800,000 modifying some of the conditions contained in their by-laws, he and his partners, Mr. Worts and Mr. George Gooderham, will be prepared at once to go on and build the Toronto and Ottawa Railway, to finish it with all speed, and run it as an independent road, free from the control of any other company. The Globe had charged Mr. Gooderham with being merely the agent and figurehead of the Grand Trunk in the purchase of the charter of the Road.

Messrs. Lake Bros., Napanee, have sold their grocery store to J. F. Smith; Mr. A. Toby, harnessmaker, has sold his business in Napanee to R. J. Smith, and removed to Picton, where he is about opening a shop. Abel Yates has sold out the Briscoe House Napanee, to S. J. Potter, who has refitted and refurnished the hotel in first-class style. C. Tait Scott, proprietor of Scott's Banking House Wingham, Ont., has opened a branch at Oakville, Ont.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY, Dec. 2nd, 1880.

Business is more brisk than usual at this season, notwithstanding the early advent of cold weather and the premature close of inland navigation, the principal effect of which has been to retard exports. The consequence is that our leading railroad companies have more freight just now than they can carry; for want of sufficient rolling stock the Occidental Railway Company ceased to receive freight last Saturday, but they have been relieved this week. A few complaints are heard against the Grand Trunk's winter rates being too high to facilitate trade between Montreal and the west. The snow-storm of Wednesday came none too early to benefit the roads throughout the country, and consequently trade as well. The month has opened with an easy money market. In New York a temporary stringency in money has been developed, but this has had no material effect here. Call loans on stocks can be negotiated at 4 per cent. on call and 5 per cent. on time, and commercial paper is readily discounted at 6 to 7 per cent., as to name and date. Sterling exchange is nominal, in consequence of the demoralization of the New York market; rates quoted at 81 to 81 prem. for round amounts and Sa cash over counter. Drafts on New York drawn at 1 to 1 prem. The stock market was characterized during the closing days of last week by strength and activity, but, since Monday last, values have fluctuated considerably, and on the whole were easier; with another "break" in the market yesterday, prices are considerably lower for both bank and miscellaneous securities than at the date of our last issue. It was estimated that on Wednesday about \$900,000 was paid out in dividends in this city.

Seconds have chiefly sold at \$4.40 to \$4.50, a few barrels brought a few cents more. No Thirds coming in. Pearls are higher. Since our last 25 barrels sold at \$5.75 and 25 barrels at \$6.00 for first Sort. Receipts since 1st January, \$283 barrels Pots, 1463 barrels Pearls. Deliveries, \$666 barrels Pots, 1516 barrels Pearls. Stock in store at six o'clock on 1st December, 79 barrels Pots, 51 barrels Pearls.

Boots and Snoes.—There is a continued good demand for heavy winter wear, especially warm, felt overshoes, which the Rubber Companies are not able to deliver rapidly enough to satisfy all orders; manufacturers are also a little behind still with orders for heavy boots. In other lines business is quiet. The workshops are generally closed, for a few days, during stock taking. As previously reported, the books will show a satisfactory year's business; although prices have not been quite so good as they should have been, perhaps, a larger business has been done than in previous years, buyers have paid promptly and losses have been small. Collections continue first class.

CATTLE.—The arrivals for local demand during the week were small as compared with the week previous, and the quality was also inferior. Prices are unchanged, and vary from 3½ to 4½ for good butchers' cattle. Hogs are worth from \$5.62½ to \$6 per 100 lbs, and dressed do from \$6.75 to \$7. The total shipments of live stock from this port for the season just closed were: Cattle 35,416; Sheep 67,543; Hogs, 700.

Drugs and Chemicals—Business in this line has been exceedingly quiet since our last issue, and not much improvement is expected for some time to come. Some houses are taking stock. Prices are nominally unchanged. Quinine is lower in sympathy with the New York market; it might be bought now at \$3.35 for lots, but holders are not anxious to sell, as they expect another advance ere long. Indice of Polash and Tartaric Acid are each reported a shade lower, also the latter being quoted at 52c to 55c per lb. Payments reported good. In the English markets there has been a slight revival, and prices there have been shaded somewhat, but there is no marked change of importance. A good many of the manufacturers are still delivering on old contracts at prices considerably above present values.

Day Goods.—The character and extent of business in this line does not vary much from week to week, at this season of the year; still, the trade here are more than usually busy, the majority of dealers report that light sorting-up orders from country merchants for woollens and other seasonable goods continue to be received by every mail, and payments continue to be met promptly. Ottawa district merchants are still experiencing a "boom," and as many of them bought sparingly during the early part of the season, they are now forwarding fair-sized orders for goods which they must have for the winter trade. The continued cold weather has materially benefitted the dry goods trade, but especially has it proved a boon to the retail community, who have been doing a rushing business in all classes of goods, almost entirely for eash, too, which argues well for the condition of customers and future of the trade. The landing city retail stores are crowded daily, and canlers declare the aggregate of sales for November to be from 50 to 75 per cent. in advance of that for the like period of last and other preceding years. A few of our wholesale houses

have commenced stock-taking, preparatory to the anticipated early arrival of spring importations.

Groceries.—Teas.—By auction a couple small lots very low Japan sold 20c to 21½c, of which about 490 packages since sold about 21c, held 22½c to 24c, quality quite common. Market is quiet, and prices for fine made Teas up to fine qualities are not much altered. Young Hysons dull. Black Teas not much doing. Sugars.—A firm tone prevailed most of the week, but advance is now apparently arrested, and prices remain at about §th higher than were current 10 days since. Granulated, 9½c to 10½c. Yellows 7½c to 9c. Choice Porto Rico held 2c, ordinary 7½c to 8c. Molasses.—Some low qualities 27c to 33c; good fair to good, 35c to 38c; choice 42c to 47c. Syraps stendy. Rice dull. Coffices rather better abroad. Recent sale of Java in Holland a little higher. Spices, Pepper keeps up. Pimento tirm. Fruits.—a little improvement reported in Malaga Raisins. Valencias steady, 7½c to 8½c. An auction sale of damaged fruit showed fair prices, and a round lot of 500 boxes Valencias sold to settle dispute 7½c.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- The breadstuffs markets, both local and foreign, have continued inactive, and somewhat irregular, during the week. The imports to the United Kingdom during the past week show an increase of 15,000 ars. Wheat, and 5,000 barrels Flour, and a decrease of 20,000 qrs Corn, as compared with those of the week previous. To-day the English market shows an improvement, wheat having advanced 6d per qr., and in Chicago an ad-vance of about 12c on yesterday's closing, prices is reported. The buoyancy of the outside markets renders holders here, less anxious to sell, and indeed for several days there has been but little business doing in either Flour or Grain. Of course since the close of navigation the demand has been entirely local. As before reported many of our grain merchants are now buying in the West, for shipment from Portland, and prices here remain nominal at about the figures last quoted. Stocks of grain in store are much lower than at the like date last year, as may be seen by reference to the table below, with the exception of corn and rye: those of corn are more than double those of last year at this date, while a comparison of the stocks of wheat shows a decrease of some 22,500 bush. In snows a decrease or some 2,300 outst. In flour there is also a considerable decrease. Recent arrivals are quite light; and, although the demand, as usual, has been light since the closing of the port, yet the supply has been insufficient for the daily wants of the city, and values have therefore considerably advanced. Considerable quantities are supposed to be lying at Grand Trunk stations on the western line, but the demand for produce freight just now is so great that sufficient rolling stock cannot be commanded to bring it forward. No recent sales of consequence have been reported Superior Extra, in retail lots, has been reported sold at as high as \$6.75. Extra is saleable at \$5.60, but there is none in the market. Strong Bakers' are selling in small lots at \$6.35 to \$6.50, and Spring Extras are worth \$5.50 to

DARRY PRODUCE.—In Butter there has been no business doing in this market, except in jobbing lots, and of these even sales were few and small, as many of the greeces have arranged for their supplies from farmers comng to market, or for shipments direct from the

country. There is no demand from shippers for either poor or fine grades, as they have no orders from across the ocean. Wholesale prices here therefore rule nominal, at about the figures quoted last week. In New York there is a sharp local demand for choice, perfect flavored creamery, at full prices. Western there has taken full precedence, and the best lots readily command 36c, with an occasional squeeze up to 37c. Exporters are indifferent, and the prospects for shipments this week are quite doubtful. The Cheese market has continued dult, without sales to relieve the monotony. Holders, having bought at high figures from the factorymen in the early part of the senson, are still asking 13jc for the best September, and 12 to 12bc for Oct., but no buyers can be found at these prices. In Liverpool the cable still quotes 60s, while holders ask 68s to 69s for Sept., and are confident of an improved demand ere long. Stocks in Montreal include about 50,000 boxes, of which 20,000 are from Wisconsin; in Ontario, West of Toronto, it is estimated that 25,000 boxes, of which 13,000 are said to be in farmers' hands, are held.

Fish.—Orders are being steadily received, and stocks are gradually becoming reduced. A considerable quantity of green fish was expected to have arrived per the Steamer Bearer, which got ashore down the river, and the cargo had to be thrown overboard. This has tended to stiffen the market, and enhance prices; green cod is now quoted at \$4.25 to \$4.50 for No. 1, and \$3.25 to \$3.50 for No. 2. Draft fish are extremely scarce, and under a good demand are held at \$5.75 to \$6, and for extra large \$6.50 is asked. Sathmon is in very light demand, and prices rule about steady at \$18, \$17 and \$16 for Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Newfoundland, and \$15 and \$14.50 respectively for Nos. 2 and 3 California. Labra for herrings.—Desirable brands have been pretty well sold out of first hands at \$5 to \$5.50. For inferior lots, nominally inspected, of which there is not a great deal in the market; concessions on these prices would be made.

Figures.—Apples—Arrivals for the week nil; the local demand is fairly good, but with the close of navigation shipments from this port ceased, for the time being. Sales have been wholly of a retail character, at \$2 to \$2.50 per barrel for go od to choice, while poor and frozen qualities sold at lower figures, \$1 and under. Cable advices received last Saturday report sales of Canadian apples in Liverpool at an average price of 14s, Is lower than the average quotation at previous sales; as a rule, Canadian apples bring Is to 2s more than American in Liverpool. Oranges.—Supply limited, and demand only fair; quoted at \$7 to \$7.50 per case. Lemons.—A fair demand for Messina fruit, at \$4 per box; Malagas worth \$3.50. Almerin Grapes in good request, with stocks light; \$6 per keg is asked and obtained for good sound fruit. Crankerries very scarce and wanted; held firmly at \$7 per barrel. The shipments of Apples from Montreal, Boston and New York, to Great Britain during the season just closed include 544,448 barrels. The Canadian fruit has been characterized by London and Liverpool dealers as especially fine, and top prices were obtained for it from the commencement, the quality and packing being far superior to all other arrivals.

Fuss.—The "boom" in the fur trade has continued throughout the week; the demand for manufactured goods is unprecedented, and the wholesale trade are obliged to refuse numerous orders, they having already more in hand than they can execute within the time allotted to them. Manufacturers are experiencing difficulty in obtaining the assistance necessary to fill orders, now b ing pressed for immediate execution for both the city and country trade. Payments were never better. Of Raw Furs there are very few coming forward as yet, and none but good prime skins are wanted. There is a fair demand for good qualities of all des-

criptions except Muskrats, which will undoubtedly be lower in value before long. The prospects for Fox also are not bright. As the offerpects for Fox also are not bright. peets for Folk also are not origin. As the other-ings increase lower prices are expected all around. Meanwhile we quote as before: Bear, S7 to S10; Fisher, S7 to S9; Otter, S10 to S12; Beaver per lb, \$2.50 to \$3; Red Fox, \$1.25 to \$1.75; Gross, \$2 to \$5: Martin, \$1 to \$1.50; Mink, \$1 to \$2; Lynx, \$1.50 to \$2; Skunk, 50c to 90c; Rerecon, 40c to 60c; Fall Maskrat, 7c to 10c; Winter do, 9c to 11c; Kitts, 2c to 5c.

HAY, ETC .- Increased receipts in this market have caused a considerable decline in prices, and Timothy hay is now selling at \$10.50 to \$11 per 100 bundles of 15 lbs. each for good to choice; common cow hay brings \$3.50 to \$10, as to quality. As soon as farmers are enabled by the ice bridge to cross the river from the south side, prices will likely suffer a further decline. Straw rules steady at \$5.50 to \$6 per 100 bundles.

HARDWARE AND IRON .- As intimated at our last reference, business in general hardware is now confined to filling small orders, and these are not to say numerous; no large transactions, except in heavy goods, are looked for until after the close of the year. There is a con-tinued brisk demand for skates. Payments re-ported good, and prices firm but nominally unported good, and prices firm but nominary unchanged throughout the list. Tin plates are meeting with more enquiry, but holders are quite firm; they could doubtless effect many more sales were they willing to concede to lower prices. I. C. Cokes, in lots of 500 boxes and upwards, have passed between dealers at \$4.50, and charcoals at \$5.50, but the market seems to be pretty well cleared of lots to be had at these prices. Jobbing lots have been sold to consumers at \$5 for I. C. charcoal, and at \$8 for I. X. For a lot of about 1,000 boxes a bid to-day was refused. Pig Iron .- Market conto-day was refused. I g from—market continues firm, with an upward tendency; the feeling is one of great confidence, as the outlook is promising, but buyers are still unwilling to follow holders in their views of an advancing market, and sales are chiefly for small lots. of from 10 to 50 tons to consumers. When it is remembered, however, as previously reported, that two-thirds of the stock held in this market is owned by the makers in Glasgow, who are not anxious to sell, that it could not now be imported, except at an advance of about \$1.25 per ton on current prices here, which are stated by some to be below the cost of production, and that foreign markets are strong and steadily advancing, it is difficult to see what buyers can gain by holding off any longer. There is now every probability of considerably higher prices ruling after New Year's. A sale between dealers of about 100 tons Glengarnock at \$20; also of a lot of 50 tons to a Toronto consumer, delivered, at \$23, is reported. A mixed lot of 1,000 tons of Glengarnock and Carabroe was under offer yesterday at a limit, but there was a difference of 25c betweeen it and the highest bid. Latest cable advices quote warrants in Glasgow firm at 53s, Summerlee at 62s., and Eglinton at 58s,-about the same as quoted last

Hors.-This market rules quiet and firm ; brewers are buying only small lots, as necessity compels them, and those who carry large stocks are not buying at all. This year's crop commands from 17c to 20c per lb, for fair to good qualities, but few sales are reported. Lemay's London circular, issued 15th ult., says:—There s no material alteration with regard to English to report. There is a fair trade doing, and prices are exceedingly firm. Choice continental hops are from 10 per cent to 15 per cent dearer; medium qualities in better demand at late rates. The demand for Americans continues, little or nothing offering on the spot. Prices for the best qualities advancing. Advices from Nuremberg report that the Bavarian market has undergone a material change apward. Trade very active, and large quantities have been taken out of the growers' hands. In some districts all this year's yield has been sold out, and otherwise stocks have been sensibly reduced. During last week

an agent in this city for one of the largest Nuremburg firms received instructions to transmit any further orders by cable, as the market stills shows a rising tendency.

HIDES AND SKINS .- The market continues to be well supplied with green hides both from local butchers and from the West, States hides continuing to arrive in considerable quantities The demand is steady and fair, not brisk, and prices remain firm and unchanged, at the figures ruling for several weeks. A few calf skins have counged hands at the nominal price of 12c per lb. Lambs' pelts are rather firmer, and may be quoted at from \$1.15 to \$1.30 for this month, though there is no decided advance on last week's prices.

LEATHER. - Another quiet week has been experienced by the leather dealers, and, as previously reported, business is likely to continue small until after the manufacturers have finished stock-taking. A few sales of No. I B. A. sole have occurred, the prices paid being 26e to 26½c; also of best union light splits at 30c to 32c, and of common belt knife splits at 24c to 26c. Harness not much wanted, and prices easier, though not quotably lower. Values for most descriptions rule firm and un-

Ous .- The market for cod oil rules steady at 471c to 50c per wine gal., or 60c Imperial; sales of 50 brl. lots have been made at these figures. Stocks light. Steam Refined Seat steady, at one Imperial gal.; stocks becoming reduced, and no more to arrive until after the reduced, and no more to arrive until after the new catch,—about next May. Straw Seal worth about 48c, Imp. gal. No pail vat in the market. Nawal Stores.—Turpentine is weaker in New York, but the price here is unchanged. It was offered here this week at 59c, Wine gal., for a 50 barrel lot, but not sold, so far as an be ascertained.

PROVISIONS .- Receipts of hogs in Chicago for November have been unprecedentedly large, including 1,111,997 head; shipments for the month were 65,712 head. The total number packed in Chicago since the commencement of the new season is 953,000, against 707,000 for the like period last year, showing an increase of 246,000 this year. For Pork and Lard the Chicago market is at present writing weak, with a decline yesterday of 27kc to 30s per barrel for pork, and of 122c per 100 lbs. for lard. Closing prices were: pork, \$13.574 January, \$13.725 February; and lard, \$3.624 January, \$13.75 February. This market has ruled dult, with stocks pretty well reduced. Mess Pork is in light demand at \$17 to \$17.50, but sales are contrad almost suitable. confined almost entirely to humbermen's requirements, and generally small. A few car loads, however, have been reported sold at \$17.50. Land very searce, and wanted at 124c to 122c for pails; no tubs in the market. These quotations are for Untario new lard, which is coming forward slowly. There is no Fairbanks' in the market, but one dealer is offering it to arrive at 12½c. Canadian lard is expected to meet with the most demand during the winter. meet with the most demand during the water. Hams.—New Ontario hams, of which a few only have been offering here as yet, are worth 13c; demand slow. Dressed Hogs coming forward very slowly, and are sold, chiefly to arrive, in car lots at \$6.50, and in jobbing lots at \$6.75 to \$7. East.—The position remains as reported St. Eggs.—The position remains as reported last week, except that prices for strictly fresh have advanced, owing to the limited supply of this description, and are now quoted at 24c to 26c; packed are worth 21c to 2cc.

POULTRY.-There is a fair supply of poultry now in the market, receipts having been freer during the past week, but some dealers complain that a great deal of the stock arriving is poorly dressed. Sales of lots in boxes are reported at 7c to 8c per lb. for turkeys, 6c to 8c for ducks, and 4c to 6c for chickens and grese, according to quality. Venison is now in the market, and saddles have sold at 7c per lb. Partridges are worth 45c to 55c per brace.

PETROLEUM .- The demand for immediate consumption continues fairly brisk, but there is no speculation apparent, and prices are easy, though unchanged. We had of another carload having been seized and condemned at Kingston on Tuesday for being below the legal fire test.

Tallow .- Owing, it is stated, to a decline in values for olcomargarine, prices for tallow in this market have suffered a decline of \$c to 1c per th. during the week. Rough fallow is now worth \$\frac{1}{2}c\$ to 5c, and rendered, \$\frac{1}{2}c\$ to 7c per 1b.

WINES AND LIQUORS .- A small jobbing business continues to be done, but no large sales reported. Stocks have been reduced to a low point, and prices remain firm and unchanged.

Sales renorted include 50 bales of Greasy Cape at 184c to 194c, but it is doubtful if more could be bought at the inside figure. Other sales of 250 bales Cape Wool have been make on p. t. TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

TORONTO, Dec. 2nd, 1880.

The trade in general merchandise continues fairly active for the season. The grain markets show less activity on account of the closing of navigation, and the movement of produce is restricted for the want of cars. As is usual this month, the provision trade is quiet, and curers are busily engaged in cutting hogs. Groceries are inclined to be quiet, but hardware and dry goods are fairly active. The hopeful feeling in the latter branch of business is clearly visible among our wholesale dealers, and the turn over this senson has been large. Sorting-up orders for all classes of seasonable goods are coming in freely from the west and north, and also from the Ottawa valley. Fancy woollen goods are quiet, with stocks pretty well cleaned out for some articles. In tweeds there is a fair movement at unchanged prices, which are however, below those of a few

Cuttons are steady at the late reduction, and moving freely. American agents are in the market, and asking &cadvance on ducks. Lower prices are not looked for, as the decline was made chiefly to keep out American goods, which are now being pushed for sale. Remittances are coming forward liberally, and prosprets for a good spring trade are encouraging. The money market is unchanged, with a fair movement and a little firmer feeling in rates. A large amount of capital has found a market in New York, but there is still abundance here for business Call loans are quiet at 44 per cent., and time loans at 5 to 54. The ruling rate for commercial paper is 7 per cent., but large amounts of short-dated are taken at 6. There is, however, not as much offering. The stock market has not been as active as last week, and while some securities are higher others are lower. Bank of Toronto gained several points in bids, but little stock offered. Hamilton and Federal are also higher. On the other hand, Ontario, Merchants and Commerce are lower. Among sales within a few days were the following :- Merchants at 118, 118 and 1181, Ontario at 1023 and 102, Commerce at 142 and 1423, Dominion at 140, Standard at 105, Imperial at 127, and Federal at 132. Loan and miscellaneous shares were quiet and firm, with sales of Freehold at 158, Ontario Savings at 133, Canada Permanent at 196, British America at 156, Consumers Gas at 154, and Dominion Telegraph at 92.

Boots and Shoes.—Trade has not been as active the past week, owing chiefly to the milder weather, but yesterday's snow is apt to make an improvement the coming week. A number of houses are busy stock taking, and factories are working on spring samples which travellers will soon be taking out. Sorting-up orders for winter goods are coming in from country districts, and prices show no changes. Payments generally satisfactory, and dealers hopeful.

Coal.—A moderately active trade has been transacted since our last report. The advance of 50 cents for hard is maintained, which was the result of higher freight rates and difficulties of transportation. Egg, stove, grate and chestnut, as well as the best quality of soft coal, sell at \$6.50 a ton delivered; second quality of soft, \$6.

COAL Oil.—There is no new life to report in this market, and dealers do not expect to see any until prices harden. Sales of from five to ten barrel lots are made at 25c per Imperial gallon and single barrel lots at 26c.

COUNTIN PRODUCE.—Apples.—The demand has been slow the past work; but on limited receipts prices have been well maintained. The best winter fruit sell at \$1.75 a barrel, whole-

sale, and commoner kinds at \$1.25 to \$1.50. Beams are chering in fair quantities, and ordinary lots are taken at \$1 10 to \$1.15; they sell at \$1.30 to \$1.35 and small lots of handpicked at \$1.40 to \$1.50. Country Lard quiet and nominal, not enough offering to establish prices. Eggs are firm; limed are worth 17c to 18c and fresh 18c to 20c in case lots. Hogs are firm, showing but little change in prices; receipts are fair. Car lots bring from \$5.75 to \$6. Hogs are unusually quiet, and prices for the most part are nominal. Choice lots are held at 23c; middlings at 20c, and inferior at 15c to 18c, but buyers show little inclination to purchase. Onions are dull and easier this week; car lots are not worth over \$2.50 a barrel, and five to ten barrel lots \$2.75. Proatoes are a little limer on small receipts, but the demand is yet poor; car lots are quoted at 38c per bag. Poultry comes in treely and is easy; boxed lots of geese sell at 4c to 5c; chickens, 5c to 6c; and turkeys and ducks, 7c to 8c per lb. Tatlow is quiet and stendy, with sales at 61 to 63c; dealers pay 34c for rough and 6c for rendered.

Daugs and Chemicals.—The drug business has been fairly active the past week, with but few changes in prices. Alcohol is higher, at \$2.53 per barrel, while optim is easier at \$8.75 to \$9. Borax is steady at 15c, and glycerine at 30c. Quinine was lowered to \$3.55, at which price it is firm, in sympathy with better markets in the States. Cream of tartar, 35c. Tartaric Acid, 60c. Linseed oil unchanged at 79c and 83c for raw and boiled respectively. Heavy chemicals steady and unchanged. Remittances only middling.

FLOUR AND MEAL.—The Flour market has been exceedingly dult this week, without apparent demand. Considerable quantities offered from day to day at the closing prices of last week without response. Offerings are more liberal on account of easier prices outside, whereas last week, when prices were strong, there was none on the market. On Saturday there were several sales of superior extra at \$5.20 and extra at \$5.10. These grades were freely offered at the prices named on Monday and Tuesday, without takers. A sale of medium bakers is reported at \$5.25. To day the market was dull without bayers. Prices nominal.

The stock in store is 3,600 barrels against 12 050 barrels the corresponding week of 1879. Outmeal is quiet; there are a number of sellers at \$4.10 to \$4.20, but the highest price paid for car lots this week was \$4. Small lots sell at \$4.25 to \$4.50. Cornmeal is dull, with demand entirely of a local character; small lots bring \$2.90 to \$3. Bran continues in fair demand, but holders not willing to sell. A sale of a car was made on Monday at \$13.

Wheat.— There is less activity this week, due to the unsettled feeling of outside markets. Sales have been made at slightly reduced prices. The latter part of last week No 1 Fall sold at \$1.17 on track and No. 2 Fatl at \$1.15 f.o.c. Up till Tuesday no other sales were reported, when No. 2 Spring sold at \$1.20 and No. 1 Spring would bring \$1.22. To-day No. 1 Fall was nominal at \$116 and No. 2 at \$1.14. Little inquiry for Spring at \$1.19 for No 2 and \$1.21 for No. 1. Barley, prices nominally unchanged, offering \$1 liberal but no buyers. Stocks increased about 6,500 bushels during the week, and are now 93,154 bushels as compared with 227,717 bushels the corresponding week of last year.

Coarse Grains—Barley.—The closing of navigation has had a marked effect on this grain. The demand has subsided, owing to the difficulty in making shipments, from the great scarcity of cars. The bull in the demand has induced holders to offer more freely, and the result is lower prices. On Friday and Saturday sales of No. 1 were made at \$1.07 on track, No. 2 choice at \$1.05 fo.c. and \$1.04 on track, No. 2 at \$1, and No. 3 Extra at 93c. On Mon-

day and Tuesday No. 1 sold at \$1.05, No. 2 choice at \$1, and No. 3 Extra at 90c. Holders asked these figures yesterday, but no buyers could be had. Stocks increased over 25,000 bushels turing the week; on Monday 325,005 bushels were in store against 181,288 bushels the corresponding week of 1879. Outs are unchanged at 34c on track, with demand and supply about equal. Stocks same as last week. Neas are firmer; offerings have been small and the demand good. No. 1 are worth 71c, and No. 2 sold on Tucsday and Wednesday at 70c. The stock in store is 21,165 bushels, a decrease of 12,500 bushels during the week; the corresponding period of last week there were 14,826 bushels. Rye has shown little animation during the week, receipts as well as demand being apparently small; cars would bring 85c on track. Corn is dull and nominal at 57c to 58c on track.

Oatmeal, from via Portland to Liverpool, 81.18 per barrel; Fork and Becf, in barrels, 58c. per 100 lbs; Apples, per barrel, prepaid, \$1.36 for lots of 130 barrels or over; Clover Seed, 70c. per cental.

Groceries.—There has been but little change in the state of trade the past week, but yesterday's snow is likely to improve the demand from the country districts. Some houses, however, report a fair business, and the majority of dealers unanimously agree that payments were never better. Wools.-The market shows a slight improvement this week, one of our dealers having a large fleece order to fill from the States. Ordinary fleec, brings 29c, Western 30c, and Kingston and Picton 33c to 34c. The latter are fine clothing. Palled super steady at 29c to 31c, and extra at 35c to 36½c.
