Here is a danger to the press and a real peril to free institutions, for the press can have no mission in the world press can have no mission in the world worth filling except as the free voice of the plain, unorganized and unsubsidized people. Notwithstanding all that may be said, we have as yet no reason to conclude that the corporations have a dominating voice in the press or in the public life of Canada. It is, perhaps doubtful if they can ever win any enduring victory in a free country. The very susplicion that is bred by the lobby of the corporation in Parliament may, of the corporation in Parliament may, perhaps, lead to a condition of the public mind under which the corporation may get less than justice, and oapital become an object—of unjust susplicion and a subject for unrighteous dealing. At least this is true, that no public journal can be influential as the mere mouthplece of a corporation, and perhaps we could have no better evidence of this than the efforts of party papers upon the one side or the other to convict public men and public journals of compromising relations with corporations which do not exist in fact. In Canada the people are still supreme, and their free suffrage is the best franchise of newspapers and the best refuge for Governments.

SUICIDE AT MACLEOD.

Mounted Constable Harrison Married in the Afternoon, Was Dead Next Morning.

Macleod Advance: The flag at the bar racks flying half-mast on Saturday morning racks flying half-mast on Saturday morning intimated to Macleod people that a member of the force had listened for the last time to the stirring notes of the bugle. In the present instance the details of the affair are particularly sad, the victim being a refined and talented young man, held in high esteem by his comrades at the post. The news which came down from the barracks the morning in question was startling enough. Constable, William George Harrison, the dead man, had only been married the afternoon of the Previous date, and had been granted leave of absence for the night. At about 6 o'clock the following morning he left his bride of a few hours' standing and made his way to the post. At 6.30 the man was a corpse.

He had been employed as an assistant to Veterinary-Surgeon Wroughton, and in consequence occupied a room in one corner of the stable reserved for the care and treatthe stable reserved for the care and treatment of disabled troop horses. He had entered the stable immediately upon arrival at the barracks, had gone to his room, and, drawing his heavy military revolver from its holster, had placed the muzzle to his mouth and sent a bullet crashing into his brain. A comrade heard the muffled report of the firearm, and, hurrying to the reom, discovered the man stretched at full length on the floor. He immediately rushed out and gave the alarm, but by the time the affrighted men reached the fatal spot the man had breathed his last.

A coroner's jury, after hearing the evidence in the case, brought in the following verdict, in accordance with the facts as set forth: "That the deceased came to his death from a bullet wound in the head, and by his own hand, while temporarily insane."

The body was burled with military hon-

The body was buried with military honors in the police burial ground on Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, Rev. Canon Hilton performing the rites sanctioned by the Episcopal Church. Three volleys were then fired over the grave, the bugle call "Lights Out" being the last token of respect paid to the memory of the departed.

ANOTHER CRISIS IN SAMOA.

Natives Were Making Trouble and Preparations Were Made to Land Blue Jackets.

Washington, Nov. 24.-Official advices from Samoa just received here state that another dangerous crisis with the natives resamoa just received with the natives recently occurred, and preparations were made to land British bluejackets. Some of the thirteen native chiefs, with their Mataafan followers, assembled at Vainos, not far from Apia, and began a disorderly agitation. The place is the home of Tamasese, one of the former aspirants for the throne, who used his influence to keep down the disorder. Several hundred natives were engaged, and there was considerable fighting, but it did not go beyond noise and a number of broken heads. The natives were finally pacified, but it has served to direct the attention of the officials in Samoa to the rather delicate and dangerous status of affairs.

At the request of a friend of St. Andrew's Institute, Mr. Thompson has kindly offered to give a lecture with limelight views on some of his military experiences for the instruction of the boys who attend the night school and other classes at the Institute, and for their parents and adult relatives. The lecture will take place on Monday evening next, Nov. 27, at 8 o'clock, in the hall of the institute, at No. 80 Nelson-street. Any of the general public who desire to hear the lecture will be 'cordially welcome, although it is meant primarily for the benefit of the institute boys, and is a gift to them freely and cheerfully given by Mr. Thompson. Some particulars of General Gatacre, who is at present engaged in the war with the Boers, and of his past military engagements, will be of living interest.

Wycliffe Man in Hong Kong.

The newly-appointed Y.M.C.A. secretary for Hong Kong is Mr. W. J. Southam, a graduate of Wycliffe College, Toronto. Mr. Southam goes to a field in which there are already four Christian Associations among students, including one in the Queen's College, which has over 1000 students. He will also have charge of the work among other classes of young men in the city.

The right of voting at municipal elections shall belong to the following persons, beling men, or unimarried women, or widows, of the full age of twenty-one years, and subjects of Her Majesty by birth or naturalization, and beling rated, to the annount hereinafter provided, on the revised assessment roll of the municipality upon which the voters list used at the election is hased, for real property held in their own right (or, in case of married men, held by their wives), or for income, and having received no reward and having usexpectation or reward, for voting;

Firstly: All persons, whether resident or not, who in their own right, or whose wives are at the date of the election, freeholders of the municipality (and assessed for \$400):

Secondly: All residents of the municipality, who have resided therein for one month next before the election, and who are, or whose wives are, at the date of the election, tenants in the municipality (of a property assessed for \$400);

Thirdly: All residents of the municipality at the date of the election who are rated on the last revised assessment roll thereof, in respect of an income from some trade, office, calling or profession of not less than \$400, and have received such income during the twelve months before the date of the final revision and correction of the assessment roll and have since the said date continuously resided in the municipality.
