



## That Is to Have Its Terminal at Toronto meno

Plan of the Improvements Proposed by the Canada National Railway-Docks and Harbor Improvements in Ashbridge's Bay-A Portage Rail-

## way from Toronto to Collingwood.

People who live in the Bast End, and, especially, about the mouth of the Don, are taking a lively interest in the proposal of the Canada National Railway to make its terminals in Ashbridge's Bay. We publish a reproduction of the original plan, filed with the Mayor and the letter accompanying it, which reads as follows:

Gentlemen,-Herewith, I beg to present to you a plan of this Company's proposed railway and steamship terminals within the Harbor of Toronto. Earlier communication with you upon this subject has been deferred, awaiting the completion of the railway's survey between this city and Collingwood. But, in view of a recent ment by His Worship the Mayor, regarding the improvement of certain property in the vicinity of Ashbridge's Bay, the Company now desire that you shall have before you a plan of the area proposed to be improved and occupied by them ation and conduct of their business operations; and to, if possible, avoid the occurrence of undesirable and vexatious complications in reaching the for the accomm proposed location with their railway line from the Don improvement.

Negotiations at an early date will be sought with the city for these terminal facilities.

The accompanying plan also indicates the relative positions of the Don and Keat ing-channels, which are regarded by the Company as unfortunate and adverse conditions for the best development of the marsh property. The locality, in the near future, will undoubtedly become, thru tais Company's operations, a centre of great commercial activity. Thus, it is of the utmost importance that its accessibility be established in a manner that will avoid, as far as possible, the necessity of expensive bridging and maintenance of public roadways by the city and this Company, where no compensating commercial or other advantage is obtainable.

The Company, without in the least desiring to formulate or even suggest a policy for the city, may, however, be permitted to point out that, if a substitute for the present Keating artificial channel was opened to the south of the area proposed to be occupied by them, a two-fold advantage would be obtained, and im-

portant value accrue therefrom to the city's lands upon either side thereof. The significance of the Company's project for the future of Toronto and development of our Province cannot be overestimated; Nature's mightiest commercial force, our peerless waterway, now lies dormant; its equipment by an active inland transportation will open the door to wider markets, give to marine and econ our Province an impetus of greater agricultural and industrial development, and will assure to Toronto that commercial importance which her geographical position warrants and the greatness of Ontarto's commerce, if unfettered, will sustain.

With the consummation of this independent facility of water transportation, your proposed Radial Railway System will become a commercial and financial possibility. It is, therefore, with confidence, the Company anticipate for their enter-
