Hon. Mr. Brodeur and W. F. Maclean Have No Contests

Two Elections by Acclamation

DISQUALIFIED AT START?

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—(Special).—Three Conservative candidates in Quebec are disqualified at the start if lawyers here express the reading of the Elections Act.

After the general election of 1904 it was found that E. N. Lewis, M.P. for West Huron, was surety for the contractor who carried the mail from Goderich station to the postoffice, a distance of about half a mile.

Mr. Lewis could not take his seat without being liable to heavy penalties. He was therefore disqualified from taking his seat, but the government passed an act of parliament indemnifying him and he was thus relieved from the penalties provided by the general act.

LAST-HOUR OPPONENT FOR LAURIER IN QUEBEC.

There was only one election by acclamation in Ontario, W. F. Maclean, the former Conservative member for South York, being unanimously commanded by the electors of that constituency "to finish his work."

In five other constituencies no Liberal appeared. Two Conservatives are opposed to each other in Frontenac—Dr. Edwards, the nominee of the convention, and Melzer Avery, the Conservative member in the last parliament. Against Major Beattie, the former Conservative member for London, there is running J. W. McCandless, a labor man, the Liberals after several attempts having failed to get anyone who would stand.

In only two of the five Toronto are Liberals contesting the election. In the south A. Claude Macdonnell's opponent is J. G. O'Donoghue, nominee of the Independent Labor Party; J. H. Duthie, a public ownership candidate, is opposed to E. B. Oeler in the west, while in the east two Conservatives are in the field—A. E. Kemp, straight, and John Russell, independent.

In Prescott, two Liberals will fight it out.

In Centre York, Capt. Thos. G. Wallace, son of the late Hon. N. C. Wallace, will oppose Dr. P. D. McLean (Lib.), who won from him in last winter's by-election by a scanty score of votes. Prospects are bright for a change. In North York, Mr. Armstrong (Con.) is spoken of as likely to give Hon. Mr. Aylesworth a real surprise.

BRUDEUR IS UNOPPOSED TO HELP LOCAL FIGHT

Otherwise Candidates Would Have Been Found—Montreal Herald Scores McAvity.

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—(Special).—The fact of one lone county being allowed to go by default to-day by the Conservative party in the Province of Quebec is a proof that the opposition organization is much better in this part of the Dominion than most people would suppose.

Then it must not be forgotten that the unopposed return of the Hon. Mr. Brodeur to the cabinet was caused by the Conservatives had no one to contest the seat with the minister of marine, but because they considered their chances of winning the local seat with a federal election in their hands much better than if the two elections were going on simultaneously. As it is, it now looks as if the opposition standard bearer in Rouville for the assembly, supported by Mr. Bourassa, was held in a pretty good chance of success on Monday next.

LAURIER HAD BUSY DAY AT ROCKLAND AND HULL

Premier Predicts Victory and Compliments Russell Liberals on Fealty to Party.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—(Special).—Nomination day was a busy day for the Premier. In the afternoon he addressed a meeting of about three thousand people at Rockland, in Russell County, in the interests of Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of state, and in the evening spoke at Hull in support of Emmanuel Devlin, the Liberal candidate in Wright County.

LAURIER APPROVES

Proceedings in connection with the nomination at Ottawa reflected the keenness of political feeling there. Thos. Birkett, the English-speaking Conservative candidate, who spoke first, reported that he had a very good hearing at the start, but stuck to his guns and later on was listened to with more attention.

FALL OF BRICK KILLS A MAN

The work was being done by the Abattoir Company, and was begun Saturday, Oct. 10.

CAR CRUSHES BOY'S FOOT

Nine-Year-Old Harold Trimble Hurt Catching on Trolley.

Just as a belt line car was leaving the Yorkville car barns at 5 o'clock last evening, little 9-year-old Harold Trimble, living at 90 Spadina-street, who, in company with some other little boys of his own age, was playing on the street, attempted, boy-like, to climb on the car, but in some way he missed his hold and when he was picked up by P. C. Jackson and taken to a nearby drug store, it was found he had a badly crushed foot. He was taken to the Hospital for Sick Children, where the injured foot was dressed, but his parents would not allow of his remaining in the hospital. It is not thought that he will lose his foot. The only witnesses of the affair were a couple of other youths, who say the lad hurt was the only one to blame. The men at the car barns say it is impossible to keep the little fellows from climbing on the cars as they go out or come in.

BLAZE IN HARDWARE STORE

Brooks-Sanford Suffer \$15,000 Loss in Early Morning Fire.

Fire at 1 o'clock this morning spread up the elevator shaft of the Brooks-Sanford Hardware Co. building on Bay-street, near Adelaide, and burst through the roof.

THREATENED ANNIE'S LIFE

General Hains called that day, Mrs. Hains asserted, and upon hearing the captain's accusations, said he would shoot Annie on sight. Later that day Capt. Hains' brother called, and at his solicitation, she took a drink of whiskey and then, at her husband's order, signed a paper which was not read to her. This she believes, was the confession which they say she made. The night the post-surgeon and some friends came and treated her for a mark over the eye, which Mrs. Hains said she received from the captain. Early the next morning Capt. Hains entered, and with a pistol drove them out.

BRITISH STEAMER STOPPED

NAMES BROTHER-IN-LAW AS HOME DESTROYER

Wife of Captain Hains, on Trial for Murder, Makes Sensational Counter Charge.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Mrs. Hains' affidavit in reply to her husband's divorce suit was made public to-day. It is declared that when Capt. Hains returned from San Francisco to Fort Hancock, on Sandhook, May 29 last, he accused her of intimacy with William E. Annis, basing his allegation on a letter which Capt. Hains said he had received from his brother, T. Jenkins Hains.

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REAL HOT TIMES WHEN RIVALS MEET

Nominations in Toronto Exceptionally Lively—Foster and Shaw in Verbal Battle for Name of Letter Writer.

Nomination meetings in Toronto were the liveliest ever. Personalities were indulged in to greater or less extent by all the candidates, and at times the gatherings became tumultuous. The nominations brought no surprise, the candidates known to be in the field, alone being nominated. They are: For North Toronto, Hon. George E. Foster, Conservative; W. H. Shaw, Liberal.

Centre Toronto: Edmund Bristol, Conservative; T. Edmondson, Liberal. West Toronto: E. B. Oeler, Conservative; J. R. Duthie, Independent. South Toronto: A. C. Macdonnell, Conservative; J. G. O'Donoghue, Liberal. East Toronto: A. E. Kemp, Conservative; Joseph Russell, Independent Conservative.

The Conservative candidates were all members of the late parliament. Mr. Foster was first elected (King's County, N. E.) in 1885. He was defeated in St. John City in 1900 and in a by-election in North Ontario, in 1903, but was re-elected for North Toronto in 1904. He was minister of finance from 1895 until 1896, and is the most dreaded critic of the Liberal administration.

E. B. Oeler has represented West Toronto since 1890. He was elected in Toronto, since 1900; Mr. Macdonnell, South Toronto, since 1904, and Mr. Bristol, since April, 1905, succeeding the late E. F. Clarke, by acclamation.

The figures in the last election were: Foster 422, Urquhart (Lib.) 430, majority (Lib.) Macdonnell 301, H. H. Dewar (Lib.) 302, majority; Oeler 484, A. T. Hunter (Lib.) 237, majority; Kemp 415, J. K. Leslie (Lib.) 192, majority.

The most bitter contest is being waged in the north, where a vicious attempt is being made to defeat Foster, while the harder fight, that of Oeler, which is the only uncertainty admitted by the Conservative organization.

In the nominations yesterday, in West Toronto, E. B. Oeler, who is a director of the C. F. R., was quizzed from the audience by a man who called himself the writer of a letter concerning C. P. R. strike. He stated that he had done all he could do to settle it, and stated that Sir James Whitney, Premier, greatly admired the strikers for the orderly conduct of the strike.

In the Centre, the Bristol supporters badgered Robinson throughout the recriminations were not so stinging.

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

London and N. Y. Society.

By Mrs. George Cornwallis West (formerly Lady Randolph Churchill).
To The New York World Mrs. George Cornwallis West has contributed a most interesting article on modern society, "and what," she says, "is vulgarly dubbed the smart set, both in New York and London." Commenting on the recent expressions of Mrs. Wm. Astor, that the women who have the greatest influence and who give New York society its tone are almost unknown outside their own circle, Mrs. West writes:

"Her views are expressed most freely as to the inequities of certain would-be fashionable women, whose empty lives and unostentatious, not to say vulgar entertainments, are naturally condemned by all sensible and right-thinking people. The glorified and detailed account of some of these senseless festivities, as given by the press, is, it is probably exaggerated, have brought blushes to the cheeks of their compatriots abroad, who have been mercilessly chaffed on the 'strange doings' of their country people. We read of pink luncheons and violet teas, pale blue dinners where the sauces match the hostess's gown (shades of Lacinius!), and where everything is blue except the conversation; red slippers and freak dinners where the guests are invited to sit on horses and imagine they are in the hunting field, or in a gondola and fancy themselves in Venice. Apart from these eccentricities, and without wishing for one moment to condone or approve of these methods of notoriety, there may be something to be said for the motive—some excuse, if a lame one. After all, what are these people striving for, if not a laudable desire to attract attention as a means, so they think, to get into the best society?"

"Money they are told, is the open sesame to those 'magic portals' which are their goal—and if this is so in their estimation, can they be blamed for trying by every means to demonstrate their wealth? They have yet to learn that a vulgar and marvellous display of it defeats its own ends. The very people they wish to impress are disgusted and refuse to know or meet them. And yet it may be only ignorance, not viciousness, from which they are suffering. In Mr. Barrie's new play, 'What Every Woman Knows,' Shand, the ambitious but uncouth Scotchman, says to Lady Sybil (who has been following his electioneering campaign) something of this kind: 'I hear you think I am vulgar, not that it matters to me what you think, but if it is injurious to my career I must cure myself. He then proceeds to ask for help and guidance. Now, who knows whether these misguided people who are being so severely criticized might not see their mistake if they were given a chance of realizing that notoriety of the kind they indulge in is not the best way of conquering society, and that refinement and culture are really bet-

ter to conjure with than startling and wild extravagance, merely to go one better than their neighbor? But who is to show them the right way and from whom would they take advice? No one likes to have their shortcomings pointed out to them, and on social matters we Americans are proverbially sensitive. If we are too proud to be led by any one, our good sense ought to help us to know that we are not infallible and that there is nothing derogatory in learning. Of all nationalities Americans are the best at adapting themselves. With them to see is to know—and to know is to conquer.

"We are told that the most refined and cultured in New York society find exclusiveness an absolute necessity. There is no doubt where there is no recognized authority—no 'fountain head'—so to speak—society tends to break up into different sets, each a law unto itself and looking down on the others as vastly inferior. This is the case in Paris, where since the revolution there is no recognized head. New York society is so small, compared to the great numbers which compose that of London, it seems incredible that those women who, by their assured position and knowledge of the world have the right to speak, should not be able to wield some authority on matters of taste.

"Perhaps if they opened their doors a little wider their influence, not to say example, might be felt. In England society is easier of access than in any other place in the world, being built on broader and more solid foundations, and a long established order of things has made people less apprehensive of having their privileges encroached upon or their position shaken, and can afford to receive whom they please—and be it said to their credit, in the most exclusive of charmed circles individual merit is more appreciated than rank or fortune. Beauty and charm in a woman and brains and good fellowship in a man will take them where dull duchesses and rich bores seek in vain to enter. You may be a princess or the richest woman in the world, but you cannot be more than a lady, and surely this ought to be a passport all over the world.

"Taking modern society of the present day as a whole, however, although undoubtedly in many ways deserving of criticism and even censure, is it really more pleasure-seeking and extravagant than that of other generations? I do not think so. One has but to study history to realize that in many respects this generation compares very favorably with the eccentricities and wild extravagances of past generations. If life is open to them. In England the most frivolous of social butterflies has her earnest and serious occupations, even if they be few and far between, and most are imbued with a certain desire to appear au fait of the questions of the day. In this she is better off than her cousin across the sea, to whom

politics are a sealed letter, and who is restricted in rationally spending her money by having fewer outlets."



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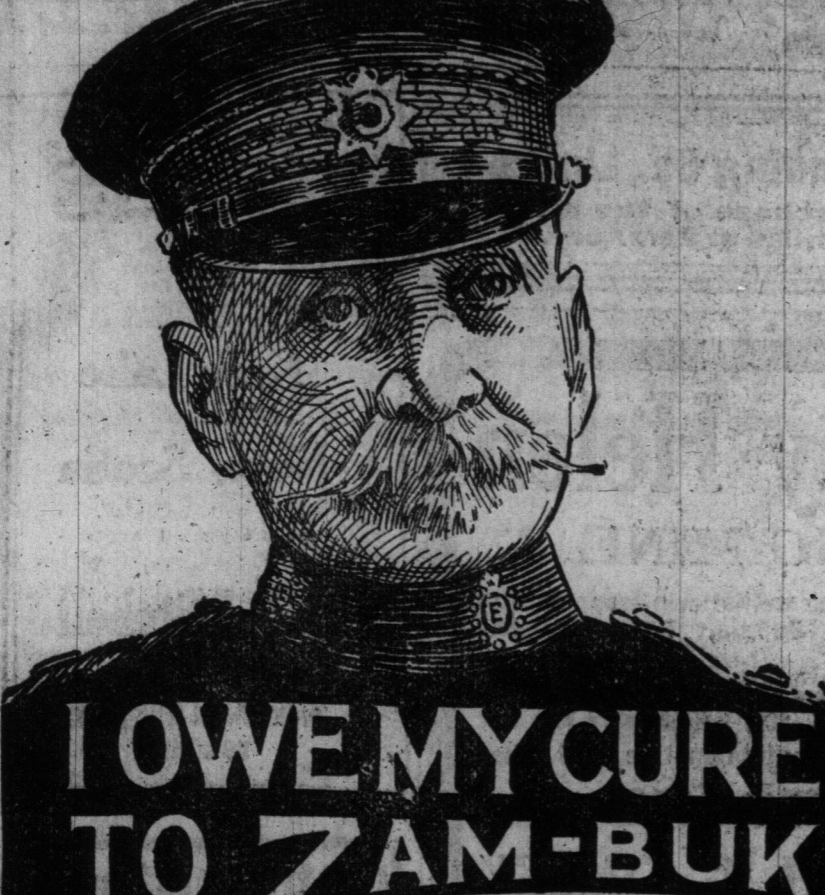

World Office Monday Evening, Oct. 19. Regardless of inactivity on other exchanges, the local markets for the Cobalt shares did a large business to-day, exceeding that of any time during the current movement. Much of this increased buying was attributed to the return of a party of Toronto Stock Exchange brokers who came back from an inspection of the camp this morning. Advances were almost general, and excellent support was accorded every one of the active securities. The decision of the directors of Silver Leaf to work the property in the piece of leasing it, evidently met with the wishes of the shareholders, as the company's stock was much stronger to-day. New high records on the movement were made in several issues, and the market at the close was decidedly buoyant. An increase in business at the Toronto Stock Exchange curb is indicative of the greater attention being paid by this exchange to the mining shares and to the gradual lifting of the Cobalt investment demand for the Cobalt stocks.

STOCK EXCHANGE BROKERS ARE IMPRESSED BY VISIT

Members of Toronto Stock Exchange Give Opinions of the Cobalt Camp.

The trip of about thirty members of the Toronto Stock Exchange to Cobalt on Saturday has been the means of putting a better footing than ever before. The party have nothing but highly favorable reports about the development, and the legitimate way in which the mines are being worked. As one broker said: "Some of us journeyed up as bears and came back as bulls." The visit was successful. 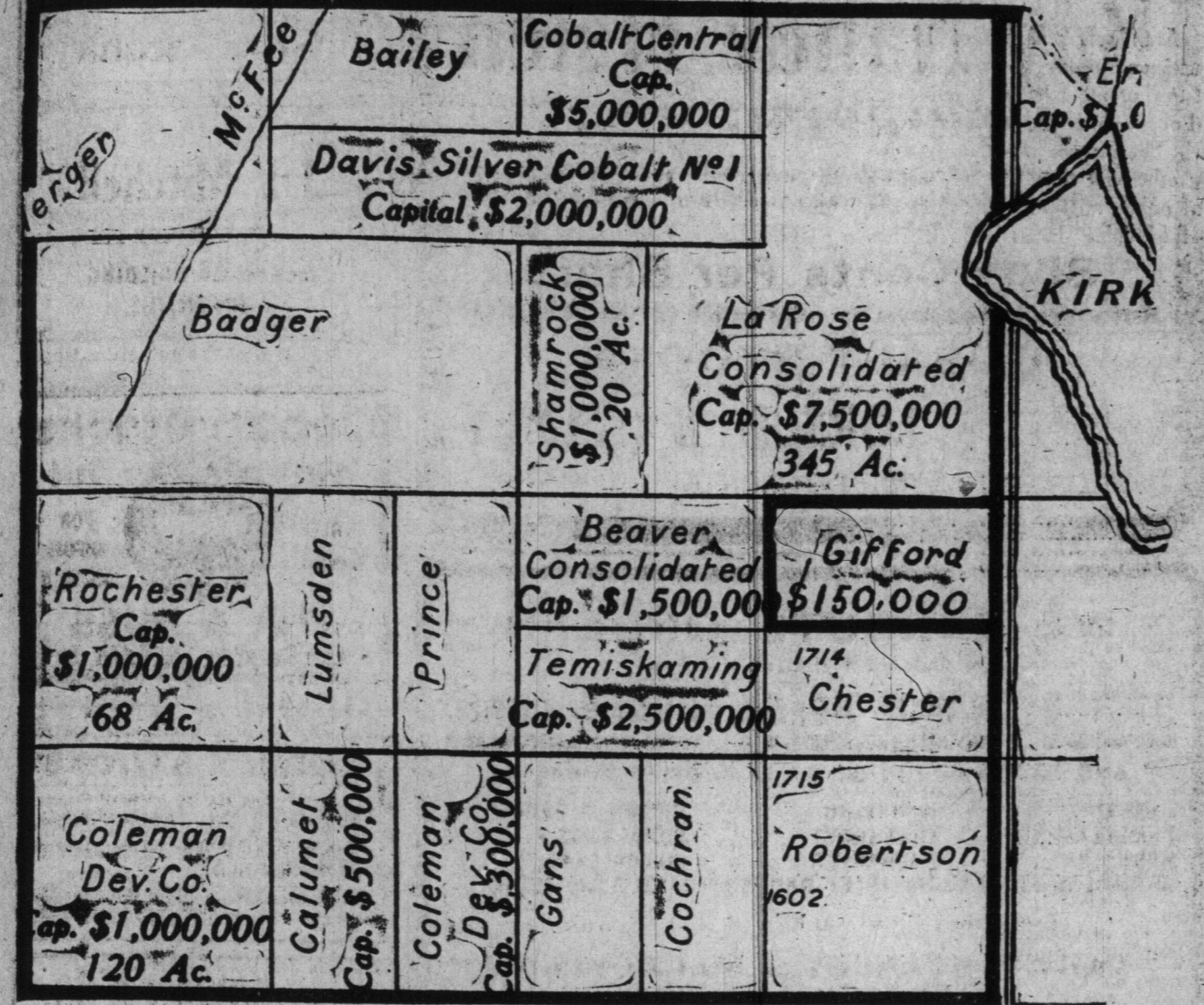

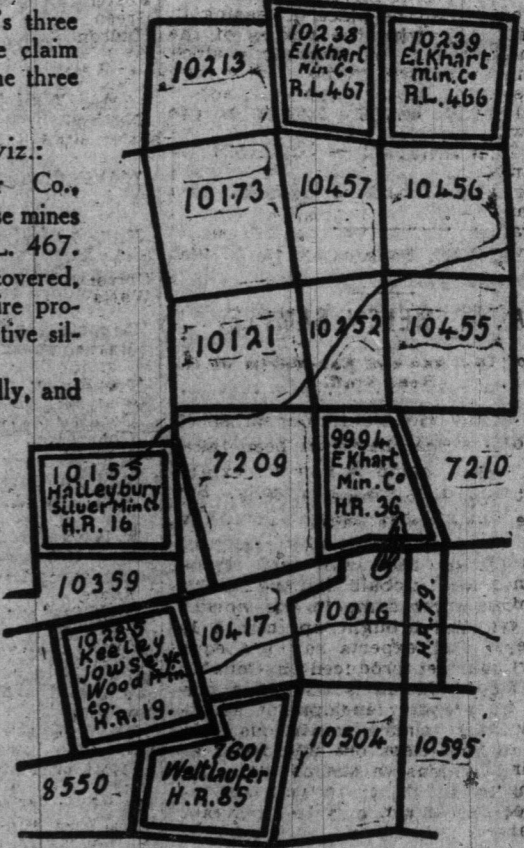

PERSONALITIES IN EAST AND \$5000 CHALLENGE

A. E. Kemp Demands Proof of Statements Reflecting on His Factory--A Lively Meeting.

A. E. KEMP, manufacturer (Con.). JOSEPH RUSSELL, manufacturer (Ind. Con.). The nomination meeting for the East Toronto city division in O'Neill's Hall yesterday afternoon went the limit in noise and vivacity. The Kemp contingent arrived early and ran the show. The Kemp paper was signed by 97 electors and the Russell by 36.

On Thursday last at a meeting of Mr. Russell's 24in charges had been made against him by S. Heakes, who he understood is Mr. Russell's organizer, and he called upon Mr. Russell to either confirm or contradict. Mr. Kemp then read aloud a challenge addressed to Mr. Russell, backed by a certified cheque for \$5000, stating that: "Press reports of the meeting showed that the time of the usual procedure, was taken up mostly in discussing his (Mr. Kemp's) business affairs.

The charges made were so disgracefully unfair and untruthful that Mr. Russell should deny or prove them. The following statement was made by Mr. Heakes, according to press reports: "Mr. Heakes declared that some of Mr. Kemp's employees had received a cut of 40 per cent in their wages; that ten days ago the staff of the Kemp factory had thirty-five Macedonians on a pay roll of \$12, and that when a single man at \$5 a week got discontinued his job was filled by a married man at \$5 a week."

These statements were untrue and he had marked cheque for \$5000 which he would place in the custody of Mr. Coady, city treasurer, if Mr. Russell would do likewise, to back up his statements; the charges to be investigated by a committee of five, two to be appointed by each candidate and by these four the additional one. The candidate who failed with respect to the challenge was to lose \$5000, to be donated to the Associated Charities. (Cries of "Give it to the Macedonians!" "Give it to the unemployed!")

Continuing Mr. Kemp said that trial was going on in the country and that a house-cleaning was needed. It would be in the interests of the country. Premier Laurier had said that his "soul was too high" to deal with the scandal charges, but as a matter of fact the scandals were too serious in nature, too disgraceful, to be thus lightly passed over.

Russell was allowed a hearing. "Give the boy a chance!" he shouted. Mr. Russell continuing said he would put up a marked cheque for \$200 and that was as far as he cared to go.

He had made a point of never saying anything against Mr. Kemp in his speeches and he would leave it to the electors to decide whether the charges against him were true. Again there was such an uproar that Mr. Russell had to stop and could not go on until Mr. Kemp said: "Give Mr. Russell a hearing, the same as I had."

Mr. Russell said that if Mr. Kemp could prove his statements in regard to the charges he would donate \$100 to any charitable institution. Mr. Russell asked that he be given a four years' trial at Ottawa. In regard to protection he believed in it. More industries was the great thing Canada needed. Mr. Kemp's course in relation to the tin-plate duties was inconsistent with his position as a follower of Mr. Borden. He believed in public ownership. It would do away with a good many evils and also help to stop the graft Mr. Kemp had referred to. The abolition of the "deadly" level crossing was another thing favored. It should have been dealt with before and railroads compelled to remove them. "I leave it in your hands to decide," he concluded, "whether I go down to Ottawa to represent you or not."

TWO IN W. TORONTO CON. AND INDEPENDENT C. P. R. Strike is Made a Live Topic at the Meeting of Candidates Osler and Duthie.

EDMUND BOYD OSLER (Conservative), a share broker. JAMES HUNTER DUTHIE (Independent), a coal sales agent.

JUDGMENT AGAINST MOTORMAN
Vice-President Doble Makes Collation Suit a Precedent.
In order to make a test case, Mr. Doble, vice-president of the Ontario Motor League, brought suit against W. F. LeBar, a motorman employed by the Toronto Street Railway Company, in Judge Morson's court, to determine whether the individual as well as the company can be held responsible in case of damage to a man's property.
In the case in question the damage was done by a trolley car to an automobile owned by plaintiff, which he himself was driving at the time. The machine was being turned at Ulster and Bathurst-streets on Good Friday, April 17, last. A Bathurst-street car, without getting the signal to go ahead, the motorman immediately turned the current on and off again, but in a fraction of a second damaged to the amount of \$40 was done, and for this judgment was given Mr. Doble, together with costs.
This established a precedent, and should have a tendency to make motormen and drivers generally more careful under certain conditions.

Neither would agree to abandon their stronghold, although Captain Wallace agreed to allow the speaker the Liberals had to occupy his platform for the last 40 minutes of the meeting.

Mr. Gamey was undoubtedly the centre of attraction, for while there were not more than 100 persons at the Liberal meeting, Victoria Hall was practically filled, and towards the end of the meeting numbers were unable to obtain seats. Alex. McCowan, M.L.A., presided. Mr. Gamey's address was a brilliant one, and his story of the extravagance of the government was tersely told and aroused much interest and laughter. The speaker's remarks were chiefly aimed at the government's immigration policy, which, he said, was flooding the country with useless aliens who were a burden to the country.
