## Germans Fail To RUSSIAN NEWS Check British

## Haig's Men Move On In Face Of **Great Opposition**

Sapping of Hindenburg Line Goes on, Though Slowly — Italy's Smashing Offensive Timely—Bulgars Wearying of Conflict—The Russian Situation

The Germans have piled high their dead before the British lines, but failed to stop the British advance.

The most furious and sustained counter-attacks have withered before the blast Delegates with merely verbal alterations,

The tremendous efforts made by Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to stem the tide of victory which was steadily setting against him have given the battle of Arras an appearance of ebb and flow, but the net result is that the most violent efforts of the Germans to regain the initiative have failed.

Possibly more ominous for Berlin, in view of the wobbly condition of her Austrian ally, is the news of the great blow struck by Italy in the direction of Trieste. The Italians have opened their spring offensive in brilliant fashion, attacking on a wider front and with apparently greater forces than at any other previous operation. The Isonzo, a turbulent mountain stream bordered by mountains and cliffs, is in their hands for a distance of fifteen to twenty miles. mountains and cliffs, is in their hands for a distance of fifteen to twenty miles appointment has not been made yet. London, May 16—British troops in Macedonia have made an important advance on the Doiran front and captured the village of Kjapri on the Struma front, it is announced officially. Advanced trenches on a front of 3,000 yards, southwest of Ernekeui, have been captured. Enemy trenches on a front of 5,000 yards, to an average depth of 500 yards, near Krastali, southwest of Lake Doiran, also were captured by the British and consolidated.

Rome, via London, May 16, 3.15—The war office announced today that as a result of the offensive begun yesterday the Italians thus far have captured 3,375 prisoners, a mountain battery and thirty machine guns. The Italians have captured the wooded heights on the east bank of the Isonzo, north of Gorizia. They have forced a passage of the river between Loga and Bombrez, capturing the latter village. In the centre of the field of attack the villages of Zagora and Zagomila were taken by the Italians.




