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# EIGHTH SESSION.

KINGSTON, Tuesday, June 15th, 1869.

#### SERVICE IN THE CATHEDRAL.

Morning Prayer was sung by the Rev. T. B. Jones, LL.D. The Lessons were read by the Ven. the Archdeacon. The Litany was sung by the Rev. H. Wilson, B.A. The Ante-Communion service was said by the Lord Bishop, assisted by the Very Rev. the Dean reading the Epistle.

The Sermon was preached by the Rev. J. S. Lauder, M.A., Rector of Christ Church, Ottawa, from 1 Cor. xvi. 13, "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong."

The Offertory, amounting to \$33.20, was in aid of the Sustentation Fund.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Dean, the Archdeacon, and Rev. W. Bleasdell, M.A.

### THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

His Lordship read the following address to the Synod:
REV. BRETHREN AND BRETHREN:

By the good Providence of God we have been permitted to meet in this, the eighth Session of the Diocesan Synod, and our thanks are due, and, I doubt not, are heartily tendered, to Almighty God for the measure of success which has attended our efforts to promote the well-being of His Church. The Reports of Committees will show, I think, that the various Funds of the Diocese are in a healthy condition, with the exception of the Clergy Trust Fund, fifty-five thousand dollars of which are at present unproductive. It is with very great regret that I have to state that the Committee have felt themselves compelled to commence a suit in Chancery against the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, to set aside the division of the Trust Fund, made in 1863 between this Diocese and that of Toronto, so far as relates to the sum of £10,000 stipulated to be paid by the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway. I feel very deeply how unseemly a proceeding it must appear when one Diocese goes to law with another, but redress cannot be had otherwise, and the amount at stake is too serious a sum to lose while we have a good prospect of obtaining our rights by means of legal proceedings. I think it right also to mention that I expressed to the Bishop of Toronto my anxiety that the matter in dispute should be settled by arbitration, and the scandal of a suit be avoided. His Lordship agreed most fully with me, and expressed a similar wish, but no steps were taken to bring about a friendly

Since my last address to the Synod seven new Churches have been built, and six additional Clergymen have been admitted into the Diocese. Churches have been tted into the Diocese. restern portion of the e Confirmations, from ar. Two hundred and ninety-six males and four hundred and eighty-five females were admitted to the sacred rite. Of the seven hundred and eighty-one candidates, five hundred and ninety-eight received their first Communion immediately after their Confirmation, a very gratifying proof of the attention bestowed by the Clergy in preparing them for the ordinance.

The meeting of the Provincial Synod last September was saddened by the death of the Lord Bishop of Montreal, Metropolitan of our Ecclesiastical Province. His loss at such a time was felt to be a serious one, and much anxiety was evinced regarding the appointment of his successor, who was to be elected by a process hitherto untried. Although an election was not effected at the first meeting of the Synod and the House of Bishops, yet on the second occasion of meeting last month a happy termination was put to the want of concord between the two Houses, by the unanimous election of the Rev. Ashton Oxenden, honorary Canon of Canterbury, who I pray may be endowed with wisdom and zeal to preside worthily over the Canadian Church. The Session of the last Provincial Synod was rendered memorable by the passing unanimously of a resolution which has done much good in allaying alarm, caused by fear lest unlawful or obsolete practices should be introduced into the ceremonial of the Church. It has ever been a function of the Diocesan Synod to promulgate and give effect to the decrees of the Provincial Synod, and therefore it is my duty to inform this Synod that the following resolution contains the decision of the Provincial Synod on the question of Ritualism:-

"Whereas the elevation of the elements in the celebration of the Holy Communion, the use of incense during Divine Service, and the mixing of water with the Sacramental wine are illegal, it is resolved by this Synod that the above mentioned practices are hereby forbidden in the Church of this Province; and, whereas, the Rubric at the end of the Communion Office enacts 'that the bread shall be such as is usual to be eaten,' the use of the wafer bread is hereby forbidden; and this Synod would express their disapprobation of the use of lights on the Lord's table, and vestments, except the surplice, stole or scarf, and hood, in saying the public prayers, or ministering the sacraments or other rites of the Church, and their determination to prevent by every lawful means their introduction into the Church of this Province."

At the same session a very important Canon on the Temporalities of the Church was passed, which, on being approved by the Governor in Council, and after publication in the Official Gazette, was to be substituted for the present Temporalities Act. Much inconvenience has arisen in consequence of the delay in obtaining the sanction of the Governor in Council, but the cause of it seems to be that a question has been raised whether we have not applied to the wrong Government, all matters connected with the laws of property and civil rights belonging to the several Provincial Governments. I trust that a remedy may be speedily found for this great inconvenience, and I would draw attention to the fact that while the old Temporalities Act is still the law, yet that all such

provisions of the new Canon as do not conflict with the statute are the laws of the Church, because they have been sanctioned by the Provincial Synod.

I desire to bring before the Synod a subject of grave importance to the welfare of this Diocese-I mean the stipends of our Missionary Clergy. There are at present thirty-six missions, which it is agreed on all sides, cannot without external aid support a clergyman. This aid is now afforded by the Mission Board to the extent of an annual grant of \$200 each to twenty-five missions, and \$300 each to eleven missions, which are considered the poorest. Now, although I am very thankful that the means placed at the disposal of the Musion Board are increasing, as I am informed by the Secretary that the amount of this year's contributions will be probably \$1,000 in excess of that of last year, yet I feel in duty bound to address my Lay Brethren now present on the inadequacy of the present stipends. I am addressing the representative men of the Church, and if I could hope to convince them that there is much need of increased effort in behalf of our Missionaries, I should feel sanguine that a remedy would be applied. My solicitude on this subject springs not only from a desire to see the temporal wants of our Missionaries supplied, but also from the conviction that if the standard of our clergy socially and educationally is to be maintained, remuneration for their services must be improved. It was the remark of Dr. Chalmers, I believe, that a scandalous maintenance makes a scandalous ministry, and what more grievous scandal to the Church can arise than that her ministers shall not be maintained in moderate respectability, or that men of ability and high character should be deterred from ministering at her altars by a reluctance to face a position where the utmost circumspection cannot combine the required conventional respectability with freedom from I am far from intimating that our clergy as a body have deteriorated as yet, but that is owing more to God's goodness than to our liberality. Indeed, I am convinced that a process of deterioration will inevitably set in unless the evil be met in time. It is notorious that the clergy are not in receipt of as good incomes now as they were twenty years ago. It is equally well known that the cost of living has greatly increased everywhere, and tells most on the clergy labouring in the remote country districts. We have lately lost the services of a hard working and successful Missionary, Mr. Henderson, solely because he was unable to maintain himself and family suitably in the Mission of Pembroke. Much is expected from a Missionary, involving, as his work does, the labour of the head and hand and heart—our people too, are exceedingly fastidious in their requirements. I frequently receive applications from vacant parishes, and I am instructed as to the sort of clergyman the congregation want. He must be as "fine a man as I can procure," eloquent, zealous, given to pastoral visitation, and pious, and if I can find

such an one, the congregation may raise for this "labourer worthy of his hire" \$300 per annum; and in some of our Missions the energies of the people are much taxed to raise even that sum. What means, then, of remedy can be found? It will be suggested perhaps that Missionary Meetings are the proper place to stir up the liberality of the members of the Church, but however appropriately we may employ such meetings in inculcating zeal and self-denial in support of the Church, it seems to me that the Synod of the Diocese should take the matter up, and speak with authority-laymen to laymen, not as it too generally is, clergymen to laymen. It would be a great step in the right direction if the Mission Board were enabled to raise the grant made to all their Missionaries to a uniform sum of \$300; or, if unable to do this, to devise some system by which length of service in the mission field should receive some recognition. I put it to the Synod whether it does not demand much self-denial and Godly contentment to sustain a young man of education and ability, and who has spent all his available capital in obtaining that education, when at the outset of his career he is told, your income shall be \$600 the first year of your ministry, and should you labour for twenty years, your income will, in all probability never exceed that sum. Your family may increase and require to be educated, your health or your voice on which your bread depends may fail you, and yet the Church cannot promise you that many years of faithful work will be rewarded by any increase of stipend. Where is the lawyer, or merchant, or farmer, or mechanic, who would have much heart for his work were he told that he would earn as much the first year of his professional life as he should ever after, and that only, say, \$600? In the present day the cause of unbelief, and the arch-enemy have the highest intellect and education employed in their service. Greatly therefore do we need an educated ministry; we should not aid and abet in lowering the status and standard of our clergy by the withholding from them adequate support, or afford them any pretext for engaging in secular pursuits which might interfere with the duties of their sacred calling. No subject of more importance can possibly engage your attention, or that of the Mission Board, than that which I submit for your consideration, and I pray God to direct us aright.

That whereas, there is at present no properly authorized system of lay co-operation in the Church, it is desirable that some definite organization under proper authority, be formed, by which the now wasted or misused energies and affections of the young and unoccupied may be utilized and turned to the glory of God and the good of the Church.

## 15. By Rev. J. STANNAGE—

That before a Clergyman is located in a Parish or Mission, it shall be the duty of the Archdeacon, or some one appointed by the Bishop, to visit such Parish or Mission, and to see that the necessary provision is made for the support of such Clergyman; and also once a year to see that the contract has been carried out; or, if not, to know the reasons why, for the information of the Synod.

Whereas, certain lands, mortgages, stocks, and debentures, have been conveyed to the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, and pursuant to the Act incorporating the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, for the purpose of making provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Ontario: and whereas sundry sums of money have been bequeathed and given for the same purpose: and as other lands, securities, and monies may be given for the same benevolent purpose, it is expedient to provide for the due administration of the said Fund.

Be it therefore enacted-

1. That a Committee be appointed by the Lord Bishop at the annual meeting of the Synod, consisting of five Clerical and five Lay members of the Synod, five of whom shall be a quorum, to superintend and manage the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Should any vacancies happen in the said Committee, the same shall be supplied by the Lord Bishop on being notified by the Clerical Secretary .- Confirmed.

That from and after the passing of this Canon, every widow, or the guardian of any of the orphans of a Clergyman, desiring an annuity from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, shall apply by memorial to the Committee of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund for said annuity, setting forth the time of the decease of such Clergyman, the name of his widow—or of the guardians as the case may be, and the names and ages of his children: and such memorial shall be taken into consideration by the Committee at their next meeting after the receipt thereof: and if it shall appear that the deceased Clergyman has complied with the provisions and requirements of this Canon, and other Canon or Canons which may be passed relating to the management of this Fund, then and in that case only the Committee shall make a grant of not more than \$200 per annum in favour of such widow, and forty (\$40) dollars per annum for each such

orphan under the age of eighteen years, and being unmarried, if the Fund will permit: and in the event of the death of the widow herself, then the additional sum of forty dollars per annum shall be paid to each child, subject to the foregoing regulations. And in the event of a Clergyman leaving no widow, but leaving orphans, then, in such case, the annuities to the orphans hereinbefore provided for shall be doubled; and provided further, that the sum granted in no case exceed the annuity paid to a widow and orphans under the foregoing regulations; and the respective annuities shall cease when the widow shall marry again, or the orphan shall attain the age of eighteen years, or marry, whichever shall first happen, provided always the grant in favour of the orphan children of any one family does not exceed one hundred and sixty dollars per annum. And their several annuities shall be payable in four equal quarterly payments, that is to say, one on the first day of January, April, July, and October in each year: the first such quarterly payment, or such portions thereof as may have accrued from the day of the death of said Clergyman up to the sitting of the Committee, shall be duly paid to the widow, or guardian authorized to receive the same .- Confirmed.

That sections 2, 5, and 11 of Canon VIII. are hereby repealed, and the following sections substituted therefor, and said substituted sections shall be read as the said sections of the said Canon.

That in every case of any Clerk in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland within this Diocese, who may be charged with any crime or immorality, with drunkenness, profane swearing, disorderly conduct, frequenting places most liable to be abused to licentiousness, with the discontinuing the exercise of the ministerial office without lawful excuse, or exercising any lay profession or occupation, unconnected with his sacred calling, without the sanction of the Bishop; with the habitual disuse, after notice from the Lord Bishop, of public worship, or of the Holy Eucharist, according to the offices of the Church, with the habitual infringement, after notice, of the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer, or with schism or separating himself from the communion of the Church; with heresy, or teaching or maintaining heretical doctrines, or with teaching or inculcating doctrines contrary to those of

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the Church, such teaching or maintaining being by way of writing, or printing, or preaching, or public teaching, or circulating books containing such doctrines; or with any violation of the provisions of the Statutes constituting the Synod, or of the Canons, Rules and Regulations of the Synod, or concerning whom there may exist scandal or evil report, as having so offended, it shall be lawful for the Bishop on the application of the party complaining thereof, or if he shall think fit of his mere motion, to issue a commission under his hand and seal to five persons, of whom one shall be an Archdeacon or Rural Dean within the Diocese, or in case of the absence or sickness of the Archdeacon, should there be only one Archdeacon of the Diocese, then any five dergymen whom the Bishop of the Diocese may appoint, for the purpose of making inquiry as to the grounds of such charge or report: provided always that notice of the intention to issue such commission under the hand of the Bishop, containing an intimation of the nature of the offence, together with the names, addition, and residence of the party on whose application or motion such commission shall be about to issue, shall be sent by the Bishop to the party accused fourteen days at least before such commission shall issue: provided that no commission shall issue on the application of any party complaining until he shall have first given to the Bishop and his successors in office, a bond, to be approved of by the Bishop, in the penal sum of \$200, to pay all costs and expenses that the party complained of may have incurred, in case he shall be acquitted of the complaint, or the complaint dismissed for want of due prosecution.

That all sentences which shall be pronounced by the Bishop or his Commissary in pursuance of this Canon, shall be good and effectual, and binding on all parties concerned therein; and that said sentences may extend to admonition or to the deposition, deprivation, or removal, as provided for in the said Statutes of this Province, in the preceding section mentioned. Should the sentence be one of admonition, it may be public or private, as the Bishop shall determine. When the penalty of suspension shall be inflicted, such sentence shall specify the terms thereof and the period of duration. Removal of a Clerk in Holy Orders from office in the said Church shall be considered to include deposition and deprivation. Upon such sentence being pronounced the connection between him and his parish or congregation shall be ipso facto severed, and all other offices, rents, issues, profits, and emoluments which he may have held by virtue of such office or ministry, from which he has been removed, shall wholly cease and determine. A copy of the sentence shall be sent to the accused, and another to the Vestry or Vestries of the Parish or Parishes, Congregation or Congregations, with which he may be canonically connected, and such other publicity may be given to it as the Bishop or his Commissary shall deem expedient.

That it shall be within the power of the Bishop, ex-officio, and not inconsistent or contrary to the said Canon, to admonish those offending, which admonition, for any offence mentioned in the second section of the said Canon not made a subject for judicial enquiry or presentment, shall be made in private: upon a second offence, it shall be public or private at the discretion of the Bishop, and made in such manner as to the Bishop may seem proper.

That the certificate of Lay Delegates be amended by adding to the end of the certificate the following words:—"And I do hereby declare that the person above elected has proved to me by certificate from his own parish Clergyman that he has communicated once within the past year."

Also, that power be given to the Clerical Secretary to alter the wording of the certificate so as to contain the full list each year of the representatives of the parish, and the time they have to serve.—Confirmed.

Moved by the Rev. J. A. Preston, seconded by Jas. Rosamond,

That with the view of disseminating more widely throughout the Diocese, Bibles, Prayer Books, and Church literature, as well as Sunday School Library books and other useful instructions of a similar kind, this Synod requests his Lordship the Bishop to bring under the notice of the

Book and Tract Committee the propriety of taking steps towards the establishment and maintenance of Branch Depositories at different points in the Diocese, in connection with the Diocesan Depository established at Kingston; or, if it seem advisable, that this matter be referred by his Lordship to a Special Committee to collect information and to report before the close of the present Synod.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

1. By the Hon. Jas. Patton—

That whereas the Lord Bishop, at a special session of the Synod held at Ottawa in November, 1862, announced "That he joined with the Bishop of Toronto in authorizing and recommending for use in this Diocese the Church Hymn Book lately authorized in the Diocese of Toronto," and that such announcement was received as official and binding upon the Diocese, and was recorded in the Journals of Synod.

And whereas, also, the subject of Church Psalmody has engaged the attention of the Provincial Synod, and a Committee, composed of representatives from the several Dioceses, has been appointed to prepare a selection of Psalms and Hymns adapted to the wants of the Church throughout Canada. Be it therefore resolved—That this Synod would greatly deplore the introduction or use of any unauthorized versions of the Psalms and Hymns, since a departure from the recognized official action of the Synod must be attended with much unnecessary expense, and is calculated to destroy the uniformity of Divine Service in the Churches of this Diocese.

2. By the same—

That Canon VII. relating to the election of Delegates be amended, by providing that there shall be eighteen Clerical and eighteen Lay Representatives voted for by the same ballot, and that the twelve members in each order having the highest number of votes shall be declared elected Delegates to the Provincial Synod, and the next six highest substitutes.

# REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

The Board of Missions commence their annual Report by expressing their most grateful thanks to the great Head of the Church, for his continued favour in putting it into the hearts of his people to respond liberally to the various appeals which have been made to them from time to time on behalf of the Missionary cause during the past synodical year. The reports of the various Deputations appointed by his Lordship the Bishop to advocate this vitally important cause, afford gratifying evidence of still increasing interest and more enlarged liberality in the great majority of the congregations visited.

The Rev. Septimus Jones, Convener of Deputation No. 1, reports that the Deputation began its labours at Salmon River, an out-station of Napanee, on Sunday, January 17, and was enabled to visit every station assigned to it on the published list. Large and encouraging meetings were held, comparing tavourably with those of the previous years. At Croydon, however, owing to there having been no Minister in charge, no notice of meeting had been given, so that none was held. The Ministers of St. James', Kingston, and St. John's, Portsmouth, declined to receive the Deputation, and these appointments were, with the Bishop's consent, omitted from the programme. The Rev. Mr. Burke, owing to pressing parochial duty, felt obliged to leave the Deputation after the meeting at Murvale, which I deeply regretted, both on my own account and that of the cause for which we pleaded.

The Deputation received, in the course of their tour, very welcome and efficient help from the Ministers of the several stations, and also from the indefatigable Clerical Secretary, and the Rev. Messrs. Lewin, Mulkins, Mulock, and Kirkpatrick. On a few occasions the cause was ably advocated by our lay brethren, and with excellent effect. Even a few earnest words from a brother of the laity, although in some cases he may be no practised speaker, have a pertinence and a force which add immensely to the power of the appeal, and cheer greatly the hearts of the Deputation themselves. We everywhere experienced the kindest hospitality. Through-

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out our tour we beheld in general signs of life and growth on the part of the Church. One great drawback of our spiritual as well as agricultural husbandry in this country seems the practice of running over too wide an area. As it is, the work of our Missionaries oftentimes resembles that of a farmer, whose farm should consist of several patches of a few acres scattered through a number of different townships, so that half of his time and half the strength of his team would be spent upon the road in running from one spot to the other. I might refer, in this connection, to the exhausting labours of your Missionary in the rear of Kingston, who ranges with an enormous amount of effort and endurance over some six or seven townships, and is, with unabated zeal, doing a great work. This tendency to widen the area of each Mission is, in a measure, inevitable, owing to the paucity of labourers, but might perhaps be mitigated by some system which would render more available the piety and gifts of our zealous laymen either as readers or lay deacons.

The number of stations visited was 16, miles travelled 245, number of persons addressed 1596, amount collected, \$132.67, average 8 cents per poll (of those present), expenses, \$10.50.

The Rev. E. M. H. Baker, convener of Deputation No. 2, reports that the Deputation, consisting of the convener and the Rev. Messrs. F. W. Kirkpatrick and S. Tighe, commenced its labours Jany. 12th, at Christ Church, Belleville, and concluded them Jany. 29, at All Saints, Kingston, having held in all 17 meetings, addressed about 2455 persons, travelled 135 miles, and collected \$291.91. The weather being remarkably fine throughout the tour, the attendance almost everywhere was large, each meeting a success, and the total offertory larger than that of 1868 by \$106.55. The parishes of Christ Church, Belleville, Millford, Fredericksburg, and St. George's, Kingston, more than doubled their preceding years' collections; Trenton, Consecon and Marysburgh nearly doubled theirs; while, with two exceptions, the offertories of the rest, especially that of Amherst Island, show a gratifying advance—the exceptions being Wellington and Picton, where, however, the very trifling deficiency has been much more than made up by greatly increased liberality in the parochial subscriptions-an increase, amounting in the case of Picton, to nearly 100° per cent. At the Belleville, Trenton, and Kingston meettings the Deputation were cheered by the presence of the Bishop, and this powerful advocacy of the Missionary cause of the Church largely contributed to make these meetings so successful. For the Sunday School Missionary, Hillier presented \$3.60, Picton \$11.40, Amherst Island \$9.60, St. George's, Kingston, \$20.00, and All Saints', \$12.00-(sent in during advent) in all \$56 00. But the Deputation were assured in more than one of these parishes that further offerings for this object from them could not be forthcoming, unless steps were taken to secure the hearty co-operation of at least a fair proportion of the Missions of

The Ven. Archdeacon Patton, D.C.L., Chairman Mission Board.

The Rev. G. A. Anderson, Convener of No. 3, reports :- The Deputation of which I was the Convener, travelled upwards of 200 miles, addressed 1000 persons, and collected \$130.25. At some of the stations visited, particularly in my own Mission, the collections did not equal those received at other times, not I think from any want of interest in Missionary work but the bad sleighing furnished an excuse for small congregations. However, at several of the meetings the subscriptions exceeded those of last year, and though Deputations usually complain of the little interest taken in their work in towns and cities, it is with pleasure I mention that the congregation of St. Thomas' Church, Belleville, contributed \$38.25-not, perhaps, what we might reasonably expect, but sufficient to show that they have not forgotten the spiritual destitution of their fellowchurchmen. Though there is a decided improvement in the contributions in the County of Hastings, to which the labours of Deputation No. 3 were confined, much remains to be done. It claims to be one of the wealthiest counties in the Diocese, and yet while it received \$800 from the Mission Board, it only contributed last year \$770

The Rev. J. Staunage was Convener of No. 4, and he thus briefly sums up the work performed—On the 6th January I started on my journey as Convener of Deputation No. 6, and returned home on the 26th of the same month, having travelled 214 miles, and visited and held meetings in 17 different congregations. I was assisted in the work by the Rev. Messrs. K. L. Jones, Burgess, Low, Stephenson, White, Nesbitt, and Mc-Morine—Mr. Loucks being prevented by sickness from complying with the Bishop's request.

The places visited and congregations addressed by the Deputation were—Frankville, Ballicanoo, Lansdowne, Leeds, Delta, Newboro, Portland, Newboyne, South Elmsley, Smith's Falls, Montagu, Port Elmsley, Perth, Lanark, Rokeby, and White's.

A good spirit was manifested everywhere, and some increase in the collections; but what was most pleasing of all was the fact that we did not visit one single Parish or Mission where some great work of improvement in Church matters was not going on.

The sum collected was forwarded to the Secretary, and has appeared in the Canadian Churchman.

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A full and interesting report of Deputation No. 5 having been already furnished through the medium of the Canadian Churchman, the Convener, the Rev. J. J. Bogert, has made his official report very brief. He states that Deputation No. 5, consisting of the Rev. Messrs. G. A. White, M.A., K. L. Jones, B.A., and myself, held meetings at the following places:—Franktown, Prospect, Ashton, Carleton Place, Innisville, Clayton, Almonte, Pakenham, Fitzroy 9th line, Fitzroy Harbour, and Mohr's Corners. These meetings were, with scarcely an exception, well attended, and the collections good. At Carleton Place and Innisville contributions were made by the Sunday Schools. The statistics furnished by the Clerical Secretary were laid before the several meetings, and appeared to give satisfaction.

The Statistical Report of the Deputation, already sent in, renders further remarks unnecessary.

From the Mission Card, it appears that the Deputation travelled 213 miles, addressed about 1400 persons, and collected \$141.55, which is somewhat in excess of the amount collected on the same route last year.

Deputation No. 6 originally consisted of the Archdeacon and the Rev. Messrs. Bleasdell, McMorine, and Spencer, but for half the tour, the Archdeacon alone represented the Deputation. He was then joined by the Rev. Mr. Spencer, who continued with him to the end of the work, and rendered most seasonable and efficient help. The Rev. Messrs. Bleasdell and McMorine pleaded parochial duties for not joining the Deputation. Complaints of a similar character have been made by other Conveners, and therefore it is hoped that in future every effort will be made by those appointed on Deputations to attend to the important duty to which their Bishop assigns them. A failure in this respect operates injuriously in many respects. The Deputation is deprived of the benefit of their assistance, and the people become disgusted when they see for successive years the names of three or four Clergymen announced to address them, and find only one present. They begin to think the Clergy themselves take but little interest in the work, and many make it an excuse for not attending themselves. Your Chairman was informed at several stations that this was the reason why the attendance was not larger, as the Deputation of the preceding year had been in like manner reduced to one. Moreover the Clergymen in several cases complained of the unrleasant position in which they were placed, when, after having announced that three or four members of a Deputation were coming from long distances in order to plead the cause of Missions, only one made his appearance. Deputation No. 6 held its first meeting, January 19, in Sussex Street Chapel, in the City of Ottawa, and it was a glorious success. The building was crowded

to its utmost capacity. His Excellency the Governor General took the chair. His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese was also present, and made a most effective and telling speech. The Archdeacon, the Hon. Mr. Tilley, and the Rev. Mr. Johnson, of Hull, also addressed the meeting, while his Excellency the Governor General made a most appropriate and practical closing address. It was most gratifying to behold one occupying the exalted position of representative of our beloved Queen taking so prominent a part in the Missionary work of our Diocese, a cause so intimately connected with the growth and prosperity of Christ's Church, and the advancement of the pure and undefiled religion of the Gospel. The collection amounted to \$213! a vast increase on the small sum of \$12.63 collected in the same place the previous year.

January 20 .- The next day the Deputation went on his way rejoicing; but that he might not be too much elated by the success of the meeting in Ottawa, the next three stations proved, the one a complete, and the other two comparative failures. At Bell's Corners, after a cold drive, the Deputation was still further chilled by having no meeting. The day was very blustering, and a county agricultural meeting being held at the same hour, there were only four or five present, and it was determined, after consultation with the Incumbent, to hold no meeting. The Convener acknowledges that in coming to this decision he committed an error, for Christ has promised that wherever even two or three are gathered together in His name, there will He be in their midst. To mortify him still further, he was afterwards informed that two young women had each gone prepared to lay a dollar on the plate. The Rev. Mr. Pettit very kindly drove the Deputation to the Lower Church, March, where the meeting was but thinly attended, and very little interest manifested in the cause, the collection being \$4.50 less than that of the preceding year. Similar remarks will apply to the meeting next evening in the March Upper Church, where the congregation, men, women, and children, all told, numbered only 35, and the collection was less by \$3.75 than that of last year. This was the only Mission on the whole route where there was a falling off in the collection as compared with last year's, and it was the more to be regretted as the parish had just become for the first time a recipient of aid from the Mission Board. The Deputation was most hospitably entertained by Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Greene, most worthy and zealous members of the Church.

The next day, the Rev. Mr. May, the worthy Incumbent of March, drove the Deputation to Hazeldean, where we were met by the Incumbent, the Rev. Mr. Godfrey. For a mid-day meeting, the attendance at Hazeldean was very good, and the collection, \$5.50, was in excess of last year's to the amount of \$3.25. The Rev. Mr. May ably seconded the efforts of the Deputation. The meeting in the Huntly Church, in the evening, could scarcely be deemed a successful one. The Convener was alone, the night very cold, and the result not very encouraging, the collection amounting

only to \$3.00. One pleasing incident was the interest displayed by the children of the Rector in the singing, for which we were mainly indebted to them.

On Saturday evening the Deputation met the Rev. Mr. Pettit, the laborious Rector of Richmond, at another of his Churches, St. John's, Goulborne, where the Convener had preached the opening sermon some years ago. He was pleased to meet a large and attentive congregation, though the collection was a trifle less than that of the preceding year; but he felt confident, from the remarks made, that the total collections on the cards from this parish will far exceed those of the previous year. The meeting in Richmond was held on Sunday morning, and though the attendance was not so large as it might have been, still much interest was manifested, and the collection, \$13.50, was a decided improvement upon the \$4.20 of 1868. The Rev. Mr. Merritt, from North Gower, also addressed the congregation. In the afternoon the meeting was held in the Church at North Gower village. The sacred edifice was completely crowded, and the collection, amounting to \$13.50, was exceedingly creditable as the first fruits, and the earnest of what this Mission will do this year for the Missionary cause. Similar language will appropriately describe the meeting held the next evening at the village of Kars, where the Church was well filled, the congregation deeply interested, and the collection amounted to the goodly sum of \$15.50-making a total for the Mission of \$29, a larger sum than that contributed by any other Mission visited by the Deputation, excepting of course the city of Ottawa. It is greatly to be regretted that an unfortunate misunderstanding between the Mission Board and the Incumbent and guarantors of North Gower should have caused very hard feelings in the minds of the latter parties, and have compelled the Board to sue the guarantors; but although much soreness in consequence existed, the Convener is bound to acknowledge that these feelings were not permitted to interfere with the success of the cause, which was most zealously advanced by the Incumbent and by Mr. Adam Eastman, one of the guarantors, a faithful member of the Church, and a most liberal contributor to its funds. At this meeting the Convener was joined and ably seconded by the Rev. Mr. Spencer.

Tuesday, the 26th, found the Deputation once more in the City of Ottawa, and this time for the purpose of attending the Missionary meeting of St. Alban's Church. It was very gratifying to see the chair occupied by Sir John A. Macdonald, affording thereby another pleasing example of one holding a high official position relaxing for a time from the cares of office to take part in proceedings designed to extend the borders of the Redeemer's kingdom, and to advance the glory of God. The Bishop of the Diocese was also present, and spoke in his usual forcible and practical style. The Church was well filled, though not crowded, and the collection exceeded by the sum of \$12 that of the preceding year.

Chequered and varied are the scenes and events of human life, and the brightest days are often succeeded by the darkest. The Deputation left Ottawa with glowing feelings of gratitude, and inspired with hopes for the future. Unfortunately these were checked and withered in the very bud—the meeting in Gloucester chilled them to death. The congregation consisted of three males and three females, who were addressed by both members of the Deputation. No collections was made, as the person asked to collect said they were not prepared to give anything. When the Convener visited this Church on a former occasion, at the same hour of the day, the building was crowded. There is a manifest decline of Church feeling here since then.

At the evening meeting in the village of Metcalfe 85 were present, and \$8 were contributed, contrasting most favourably with the small sum of \$3, collected the preceding year. At both the stations of this Mission visited by the Archdeacon, he felt it imperative on him to speak very plainly to the congregations on the duty of contributing more liberally to the support of their Clergyman, and he informed them most distinctly that unless they did so, the Board would be compelled to withdraw its allow-

ance altogether.

The Rev. Mr. Fleming kindly drove the Deputation the next day to Duncanville, where, although the meeting was held in the middle of the day, upwards of fifty persons were present, thus manifesting most gratifying signs of life. The Church at Bearbrook was filled, as usual, with a very attentive congregation. Such was also the case the next evening in the very neat Church recently erected at Navan. Very encouraging were the signs of vitality exhibited in this Mission, where the labours of the Rev. Mr. Garrett seem to be highly appreciated. Twentytwo dollars and sixty cents collected in this Mission was a very creditable earnest of what may yet be expected for the Missionary cause; the amount was rather more than double of the sum contributed the preceding year. The weather during the week had hitherto been very pleasant and the roads very good, but now was about to commence that series of snowstorms for which the past winter was so remarkable. On coming out of the Church at Navan, it was snowing with every indication of its continuance, and the Deputation was 60 miles distant from Hawkesbury, where the meeting was to be held at 7 P.M. the following evening. Under these circumstances, and after consultation with Messrs. Shaw and Rathwell, the gentlemen who most kindly volunteered to drive the Deputation the next 35 miles, it was concluded that in order to keep our appointment at Hawkesbury, it was necessary to set off as soon as man and beast had partaken of needful refreshments. Accordingly, having severally driven back to the hospitable abodes of Mr. Wm. Shaw and Mr. Rathwell, the Deputation supped, and then about one A.M. set off in the midst of a storm of mingled snow, rain, and sleet, which was most unpleasant to face, and

which soon caused the roads to become very heavy. Once the sleigh upset and the Archdeacon was pitched into a snow drift, but the snow was soft and no harm done. After a tedious and uncomfortable drive of ten hours the Deputation reached Plantagenet Mills, where they were quite ready for their breakfast at half-past 11 A.M. The Deputation here parted from their kind hosts, who, at so much personal inconvenience, had brought them thus far on their way. The rest of the journey was accomplished in the sleigh of Mr. Godfrey Valley, who, at the request of the Rev. J. G. Armstrong, had met us at Plantagenet. We passed on our route the Church in Alfred, and at length reached the Parsonage at Hawkesbury, where we were most kindly received and hospitably entertained by the worthy Incumbent and his kind wife. After most welcome ablutions and a comfortable dinner, the Deputation found themselves much refreshed and quite equal to the labours of the evening. The storm and the heavy roads no doubt prevented some from attending, still the congregation numbered 55, quite as many as could have been expected under the circumstances. The Deputation were aided by a faithful lay brother, Mr. Dartnell, the County Attorney, who made a very interesting and effective speech on the occasion. The collection amounted to \$12.80, a large sum in proportion to the numbers present. The Convener much regretted the absence of the Hon. John Hamilton, whose liberality had on former occasions helped to swell the sums collected. On Sunday, January 31, the Archdeacon preached in the beautiful Church in the forencon, and in the afternoon the Deputation, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong, were driven by Messrs. Burwash and Albright, two members of East Hawkesbury congregation, a distance of 15 miles over very heavy roads to the Town Hall, for the last of our Missionary meetings. The hall was densely crowded, upwards of 200 being present, and among them were many whom the Convener had known in Cornwall as gallant volunteers during the Fenian raid, and whom on this occasion he exhorted to be valiant soldiers of Christ, fighting manfully under His banner, and earnestly "contending for the faith once delivered unto the saints." The congregation seemed deeply interested in the services, and it was hoped that by God's blessing a good impression was made.

Up early the next morning, having to drive about 55 miles to Cornwall. The morning was bitterly cold and the roads heavy, nevertheless we were driven by Mr. Leroy, one of the gallant volunteers, to Alexandria, a distance of 25 miles, by one o'clock. Here the Archdeacon was met by his own team, driven by the Rev. Mr. Auston, and the Deputation reached Cornwall at half-past 10 p.m., most thankful to God for His gracious preservation of them, and for the measure of success which He had vouchsafed to their humble efforts in His cause. The Archdeacon had been absent fifteen days, had travelled 379 miles, had visited 18 stations, addressed 2225 persons, and collected \$374.87, being an increase over the previous year's collections to the amount of \$261.83. Laus Deo.

The Convener of No. 7, the Rev. Chas. Forest, A.M., thus communicates the results of his Deputation:—I beg respectfully to report that the members of Deputation No. 7 have fulfilled the duty to which they were commissioned. Every station in the district allotted to them has been duly visited, with what result the authorities in the Church may judge.

The total sum realized was \$278.43—showing an increase over last year of \$56.28. As the returns of 1868 were considered a subject of just congratulation, the Church may lawfully deem that this section of the Diocese is advancing in its zeal to maintain the mission work which we have in hand.

- (1) At Oxford Mills, from an audience smaller than that of 1868, the offertory was \$4.70—an increase of more than 100 per cent. An evening meeting would be advisable here, for during the day the majority of the farmers are so employed as to preclude the possibility of their attending at 3 P.M.
- (2) At Kemptville, of which honourable mention has been made so often in years past, we were so unfortunate as to hit upon "Municipal Election Day." Had our visit fallen a day earlier or later, our returns would have been richer by \$10 or \$12. Our collection amounted, however, to \$21.50, which, with the Sunday School offering (\$32), made a total of \$53.50.

Under every disadvantage Kemptville has nobly maintained her character. The cause of Missions has there many and hard-working supporters. Next year I am confident the Church will reap a rich harvest in this parish.

The Sunday School contribution for a special Missionary was delicately conducted by our veteran Superintendent, Mr. R. Leslie. He has the credit of initiating this Sunday School movement, not by words only, but by deeds. May it remain a monument to his praise when he himself shall have passed away.

(3) Mountain—so long troubled and distracted—is once more (under the present Missionary, Mr. McKenzie) united and active. Considering the status of the people, the offertory, \$7.60, is highly creditable. If system were introduced, even this might be considerably increased. All things considered, however, the average liberality compares favourably as against other parishes.

(4) At Finch, an increase of more than 50 per cent speaks well for the interest which the Incumbent, the Rev. A. Fisher, has taken in the cause, and for the zeal in Church work which he has called forth. Collection \$13 20.

(5) Roxboro is also 50 per cent in advance of last year. Here the offertory was \$5. The fact that about 163 dissenters attended our meeting argues a growing interest in the Missionary operations of the Diocese.

(7) Cornwall, creditable as its exertion was in 1868, is nearly 25 per cent in advance of last year—which increase, if considered in connection with the large sum of \$10,000 raised in this parish for the "Memorial Church," proves that local efforts do not, in loyal minds, destroy interest in general Church work. Offertory \$52.

(8) Osnabruck has advanced by 11 1-10 per cent.

(9) Osnabruck rear has fallen off nearly 25 per cent. I would respectfully urge that this station (the rear) be given up by Deputations, and that some back stations either in Cornwall or Williamsburg Parish be taken up in its stead. It has been visited for five years, and \$2 is its general average. Collection—front \$16, rear \$2.20.

(10) Williamsburg shows its liberality and its good working, by an increase of 33 per cent, apart from its S. School donation. Offertory \$22.

(11) Morrisburgh—at which the collection was \$15—shows an increase of 34 per cent. Thanks are due to the Incumbent.

A special gift from a class of young people deserves honourable mention, inasmuch as one lady, Mrs. D'Olier, by encouraging Missionary effort, has so employed the nimble fingers of her young friends as to realize the sum of \$8.70. Total Morrisburg, \$23.70.

(12) Edwardsburg (\$2.22) has fallen off to the extent of \$1.80.

(13) Matilda has advanced 10 per cent on last year. Collection \$9, in addition to which the Sunday School, zealously conducted by Mr. J. H. Ross, devotes the handsome sum of \$12.65—which, considering the number of children under tuition, is the highest sum raised by any Sunday School in the Diocese in the space of one year.

(14) Prescott, our last station, shows a falling off of nearly 32 per cent. Why? Your Deputation cannot report. It is but just, however, to add that considering the small number present at the meeting, only 72, the average of liberality was by far the highest attained during our tour.

Your Deputation, in concluding this report, beg to acknowledge, with thanks, the kind courtesy and generous aid extended to them by their brethren, both of the Clergy and laity, in every parish and mission which it was their duty to visit.

To sum up—we travelled 191 miles, visited 14 stations, addressed 1657 persons, realized for the benefit of the Mission Fund \$278.43—which sum indicates a general average per station of \$19.28, and per poll 16 80-100, or nearly 17 cents from each person at our meetings. The increase over last year is \$56.28.

The Rev. R. Garrett, Convener of Deputation, reports as follows:—As Convener of No. 8, I beg to submit a report of this Deputation, which I regret to say only consisted of the writer—the other members for some reason or other not having made their appearance.

The Parishes and Missions visited were Gananoque, South Lake, Lansdowne front, Maitland, Brockville, Lyn, New Dublin, North Augusta, St. James', St. Andrew's, Merrickville and Burritt's Rapids—twelve stations in all.

The number of miles travelled were probably about 270, and the total sum collected at the different stations amounted to \$148.25. By comparing this sum with that collected on the preceding year, 1868, it will readily be seen that the increase over last year amounts to \$34.11. Although there is a slight falling off at some of the stations, yet at others there is a decided improvement. As for instance at Maitland, the collection last year was \$11—this year it is \$16; and also that at Brockville in 1868 was \$17—in 1869 it is more than \$31.

The collections at Merrickville and Burritt's Rapids were, as you will see from the report already transmitted to you, particularly good. But it must be remembered that the sum of \$30 of this was a free-will offering from the Sunday Schools—\$15 from that at Merrickville, and the balance from that at Burritt's Rapids. The system of the early training of children to deny themselves, and to contribute a portion of their means to the Mission work of the Church as a humble offering to their Heavenly Father, must be good and commendable. Is it not the training up of the child in the way he should go.

I must express my sincere thanks to Almighty God for the measure of success attending our meetings. Everywhere they were good—that at Burritt's Rapids decidedly the best. In the absence of the other Delegates—so much to be deplored—I found the Incumbents of the several parishes and stations visited willing to render every assistance in their power in furthering the object of the several meetings. My intercourse with them, and with the laity, was delightful, and I trust profitable. I returned home on the evening of the 1st February.

the Upper Ottawa and Nipissing Districts, remaining absent on duty from February 8th till March 6th. The unusual severity of the season did not impede his progress under cover of the woods as it would have done in a more open country, and consequently he was enabled to prosecute the journey, which in all exceeded 400 miles, without incurring the loss of more than a single day. During the time he was absent he held services morning and evening of every day, in either a private dwellinghouse or a lumber shanty, baptized the children of those residing in the neighbourhood, and in some instances administered such medical and surgical relief as the attendant circumstances admitted. He visited the depots of Messrs. Eddy & Co., Smith & Co., Brown, Watson & Co., and of the Hou. John Hamilton, the Hudson Bay Company's post at Mattawa and at Fort William, and, in addition, the newly-formed settlement at South River, which flows into Lake Nipissing. This I believe to be a more important point in a Missionary than any of those previously mentioned, and he would urge attention to the Missionary wants of that locality without delay. A Missionary who could become a resident settler there could secure now a large tract of land, by actual settlement, for the benefit of the Church, but a little delay may render it a thing impossible. The natural advantages of the locality, the water power, the fertility of the soil, the great extent of hardwood country on the east side, the proposed railway from Toronto, which would bring the lumber supplies for the Upper Ottawa district by a route so much shorter and more direct than the present, all point out the present and future importance of that natura' terminus. He hopes, therefore, that the Board will be able to make some provision for the pressing necessities of those who have had hitherto to go 160 miles for a barrel of flour, but who have now advanced so far as to see a mill in process of erection among them.

# REPORT OF THE CLERGY TRUST OR COMMUTATION FUND.

The Committee of the Clergy Trust or Commutation Fund again submit their annual Report.

The Committee regret that in consequence of the very small sum received as rent, about \$340, from the Farmer and DeBlaquiere Lands, and the total unproductiveness of the Buffalo and Lake Huron \$40,000, the pleasure of announcing a surplus is still deferred.

It was announced in last year's Report that the judgment of Mr. Vice Chancellor Spragge, in the suit against the Buffalo and Lake Huron and Grand Trunk Railway Companies, had not then been announced, though it was feared it would be adverse, in which event Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., in whose hands the business had been placed, stated that "the Synod's only recourse will be against Mr. Cameron and the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto for handing over a worthless security." Accordingly, the Executive Committee having learned that the judgment was adverse, considered that its only course was to commence a suit as above advised. Such suit in Chancery has already been brought, the bill has been prepared, and the following is the report of counsel as to prospect of success:—

"In the matter of the Synod of Outario and the Church Society of Toronto and the Hon. J. H. Cameron.

"We have had a long conference with the Lord Bishop of Ontario and the Committee, and we have considered this matter.

"We are of opinion that the division made was, in the particular complained of, unjust, and failed to carry out the avowed intention of both bodies, and by it both the Church Society, and Mr. Cameron personally, have largely profited at the expense of the Synod or Ontario.

"There are some difficulties which cannot at this stage of the proceedings be accurately estimated, but while we are thus unable to advise positively that the suit will be successful, we are of opinion that the prospects of success are such as amply justify the filing of a bill."

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but it is a matter of regret that prompt remittance should be confined to so few parishes, and more especially as the subject has been repeatedly alluded to in the Auditors' Reports, and has been brought prominently under the notice of members of the Synod.

II. CLERGY TRUST FUND -Since the last audit, there is a decrease in the capital of this Fund of \$2642.41, and full explanation in respect thereof will no doubt be made in the Report of the Committee. The Securities on 31st May, 1869, only represented \$291,032.40, as against \$293,674.81 on 31st May, 1868, and \$296,598.14 on 31st May, 1867.

In regard to the Debentures held by the City Bank of London, amounting to £8400 stg. (\$40,880), and upon which the interest is \$2452.80, the Auditors find that there is a loss of about \$15 annually for commission, exchange, &c.; and unless, therefore, some good reason exists (and none such is apparent either to the Treasurer or Clerical Secretary) for their remaining in London, it is advisable that steps should at once be taken to have them lodged with the other securities belonging to this Fund.

III. DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND .- Owing to the depreciated value of Gore Bank Stock, the 35 shares belonging this Fund which heretofore have been credited at par value of \$40 (\$1400) are now reduced to their market value of \$15 per share (\$525). The investments represent, therefore, the sum of \$1998.34, instead of \$2873.34.

The Debentures and Dominion Stock represent the same amount as before, viz., \$27,871.67. There is, therefore, a deficiency on capital account of \$1412.83.

In the list of lands furnished by the Clerical Secretary, it would appear that a village lot in Trenton belongs to this Fund, but with no data to guide them the undersigned cannot state the probable cash value of same.

The payments on account of this Fund would seem to have been in excess of the receipts. The Auditors have only to remark, therefore, that the provisions of Canon XV. should, until altered, govern the expenditure.

The Auditors have, also, to remark on a singular discrepancy in last year's Report respecting the 21 Dominion Debentures, inasmuch as on 31st May, 1868, these Debentures had not been purchased. The investment in question was, at that time, in the shape of two Bank Deposit Receipts, bearing interest, amounting to \$2108.31, and the Debentures were not purchased until 2nd June, 1838. When the accounts were audited, however, which was after the last-mentioned date, the Debentures were in the custody of the Clerical Secretary, and were submitted for inspection. This, it would appear, is the explanation of the item of \$2100 in its two-fold shape in this and last year's balance sheet. Section 7 of Canon XXIV. defines the period at which the books shall be closed in the following terms:—"The fiscal year is hereby declared to terminate with the 31st day of May, and the statements above referred to shall be made up, and all accounts closed at that period."

Unless, then, some provision is made for adding thereto, it cannot attain the magnitude which might otherwise be anticipated for it from the gradual progress and prosperity of the Diocese, and which the nature and objects of the Fund render so desirable.

The value of the remaining lands (700 acres) belonging to this Fund is at present undetermined.

VI. The Mission Fund.—There is a difference between the Bank balance of \$3307.70 and the Clerical Secretary's of \$3257.70, occasioned, however, by the non-presentation of cheques Nos. 610 and 643. But there is still unexplained the item of \$50 referred to by the Auditors of last year, and it remains an open question as between the Treasurer in his capacity of resident Manager of the Bank of Montreal, and the Clerical Secretary. The Auditors can throw no additional light whatever upon this matter, and it will therefore rest with the Synod to deal with it as in their wisdom may be deemed advisable; but they would recommend that it should be disposed of in one way or the other, and, if their view is concurred in, that the Clerical Secretary should be authorized to charge the amount to profit and loss. The confident reliance of the Manager upon the accuracy of the Bank's entries forbids the hope that further negotiations would lead to any satisfactory result.

As a precautionary measure, and that the harmony of the relations between the Synod and the Bauk may be preserved unimpaired, the Auditors would submit that the Bank Receipt Book may not at any time be signed until the Clerical Secretary has had ample opportunity of verifying the correctness of the balances as claimed by the Bank. If this rule is adhered to, there cannot be a recurrence of this difficulty.

So soon as the value of the 600 acres belonging to this Fund has been ascertained, the books will necessarily show corresponding credit entries for same.

VII. PRAYER BOOK FUND.—The books and invoices were submitted for inspection and found correct, but the examination was not so searching as the Auditors would have wished, since there were no means of testing the accuracy of the sales. This must always be the case unless a Day-Book is kept specifying in detail the receipts. It is due, however, to the Rev. Mr. Bousfield to state that he explained the difficulty of minuting sales on all occasions, and that to enable him to do so some additional assistance would be required. In view, therefore, of increasing the efficiency of this Department, and of introducing a proper system of checks, it might be worth considering how far a wider basis of usefulness could be established. The Auditors would respectfully submit, therefore, that the subject might advantageously be referred to a Special Committee to report to the Synod. A printed Receipt Book would be found to afford

additional facilities for audit purposes, and should be obtained with the least possible delay.

VIII. RECTORY LANDS FUND.—This Fund is gradually assuming large proportions, and the Auditors would submit that it might be deemed desirable to entrust its management to a Committee specially charged to watch over it. The interests involved are large, and a Committee could give the investments their careful supervision.

IX. Sustentation Fund.—The item of \$321.20 paid Note and interest to the Merwin Estate has attracted the attention of the Auditors, and they are not prepared to admit that the Synod as Trustees of the overplus of the bequest (represented by the Weatherhead Mortgage) could be called upon to make good the balance of an unproductive security. Had the face of the Mortgage been realized, as Trustees they would necessarily be required to pay over the surplus, but not otherwise. The Estate stood charged, in their opinion, with the full payment of the bequest, and the Executors were not justified in demanding payment of that which never was received by the Synod.

The item of \$251.16 for taxes must also be referred to, as it is thus made up:—Redemption of Lot 29, 2nd Con. Tp. Cambridge, taxes for Lots 2 and 29; Redemption of Lot 27, 9th Con. Tp. Verulam; and the Auditors would recommend that the taxes on all lands belonging to the Synod be paid annually, and the increase of per centage thereby avoided.

This Fund is entitled to a credit for 200 acres of land in the township of Cambridge, but the value has not yet been ascertained.

X. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—The 10 shares of Gore Bank Stock formerly estimated at \$400 are now entered at the market value, viz, \$125. The investments of this fund now amount to \$11,831.80.

There are also 283 acres of land, which, when valued, should be placed at the credit of this Fund.

#### SUGGESTIONS.

The Auditors have endeavoured faithfully to discharge the important duties entrusted to them, and have made careful investigation of the several accounts, and they desire to place on record the fact that their labours have been materially lessened by the assistance of the accountant, Mr. Jas. Watt, whose certificate will be found appended hereto. Mr. Watt's experience as a professional accountant and as one of the City Auditors has enabled him to make some valuable suggestions.

Repeated audits, however, have, in addition, been instrumental in impressing upon the undersigned the importance of sundry details tending to greater security alike to the Clerical Secretary and the Synod, and they would, therefore, recommend as follows:—

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modil that there should be columns showing the following particulars, viz.:—(a) Amount of policy; (b) in what office; (c) amount of annual premiums; (d) when due; and (e) where payable.

2. VALUATION OF LANDS.—That as there are 1783 1-5 acres belonging to the Synod, and credit cannot be given to any particular Fund until valuation be made of the lands, it is highly desirable that the probable cash value may be ascertained with all convenient despatch.

3. Taxes.—That the taxes on lands belonging to the Synod should be so closely looked after that in future there may be no entries for Redemption monies against any Fund. A series of columns should, therefore, be ruled opposite each Lot, in which taxes, when paid, could be entered. The absence of any entry in the adjoining columns would suggest the possibility of outstanding taxes.

4. Bank Account.—That the responsibility of the Clerical Secretary would be greatly lessened if the monies belonging to the several accounts were deposited more frequently in the bank—sums of \$50 and upwards daily, but all other monies weekly as required by the Constitution.

5. BANK CHEQUES.—That in all cases the system should be adhered to of issuing cheques payable, as printed, to order only. A voucher is thereby secured for every payment by the endorsement of the payee. And further, that no cheque should be issued until the signatures of the proper officials have been first attached thereto.

6. RECEIPT BOOK.—That a printed Receipt Book be procured, as recommended by Mr. Watt. At present the link is wanting by which all the entries can be properly tested.

7. HALF YEARLY BALANCE.—That it would be an improvement if the books were balanced half yearly, and submitted to the examination of a skilled accountant, as formerly recommended; and the Auditors have no doubt but that this suggestion will meet with the cordial approval of the Clerical Secretary.

ACCOUNTANT'S CERTIFICATE.

To the Hon. Jas. Patton, and Samuel Muckleston, Esq., Auditors for the Synod of Ontario.

Gentlemen,—Having carefully examined the books of the Clerical Secretary of the Synod of Ontario, kept by him for the "Mission," "Sustentation," "Widows' and Orphans'," "Divinity Students'," "Prayer Book," "Assessment," "General Purposes," "Episcopal," and "Rectory Lands" Funds respectively, I beg to certify as follows:—

That by comparing the Journals of each Fund with the "General Cash Day Book," I have found that all the entries therein of monies received

and disbursed during the year between the 1st June, 1868, and the 31st May, 1869, inclusive, have been correctly carried into the Journals of the Fund to which they relate, and thence posted to the Ledger thereof; and that, having checked the work of posting from the several Journals to the Ledgers, and of addings in both, I have seen that it is correct. Further, having compared the Bank Account as it stands in the Ledger of each Fund with the Bank Pass Books and Cheques, I have found that they coincide in respect of cash deposited and drawn out during the year ending 31st May, 1869, and that all the balances agree, making allowance, in the case of the "Mission Fund," for a former difference of \$50, and for two cheques for \$50 each issued in December and March last, Nos. 610 and 643, which are consequently at the credit of the Bank in the books, but were not charged by the Bank prior to 31st May, such cheques, it is presumed, not having been presented.

I beg to certify also that the Abstract Statements laid before you as Auditors, showing the Receipts and Disbursements of the Clerical Secretary during the year ending 31st May, 1869, on account of the several Funds above-mentioned, are all correctly extracted from the books thereof, and in accordance with the entries therein:

With respect to your desire that some system be devised for better instructing the correctness of the moneys paid in on account of those Funds, and lessening the labour of future Auditors, I would suggest that your object might be in a great measure attained were the Clerical Secretary to adopt the usage of the City Chamberlain in regard to the revenue received. He keeps a bound Receipt Book, with margins, somewhat like a bank cheque book. When a receipt is given, it is cut off from the margin, whereon is noted a counterpart in substance of the receipt, namely, the same No., date, name of party paying, the sum, and on what account, &c. From these margins the entries are made in the Cash Book, and the margin marked " Entered." And I think it would be an improvement were the page of the Cash Book put on the receipt margins, and in the cash entry the No. of the receipt given. It is likely some instances would occur where money would be received without receipts being issued, but these would be few. I am satisfied that this system, if adopted, would not only greatly facilitate the work of audic, but would be found very useful and convenient for the cashier. I think one General Receipt Book would answer better than having one for each Fund, as it would be connected more immediately with the General

With the margins of such a book and the subsidiary Ledger to refer to, in which the accounts of persons indebted to the Funds are kept, showing arrears, if any, the Auditors would be enabled to report with more satisfaction to themselves.

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# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE INCREASE OF THE EPISCOPATE.

On the appointment of the Committee by his Lordship the Bishop, the Ven. the Archdeacon was requested to act as Chairman, and to call a meeting of the Committee, which he accordingly did, naming June 23rd for the day, and Prescott for the place of meeting. Accordingly, the Committee assembled and, after prayer, proceeded to consider the very important subject before them. The Archdeacon read to the Committee a communication from his Lordship the Bishop, in which his Lordship (inter alia), stated, "that the new Diocese should consist of the counties of Pontiac, Ottawa, Prescott, Russell, Carleton, Lanark, and Renfrew," and that he "would consider it inexpedient to form a new Diocese, unless the counties of Pontiac and Ottawa are included." He moreover stated-"I shall not consent to a division till a capital sum (to be approved by me) be raised, which at 6 per cent yields £500 per annum. This is a sine qua non, without which it is useless to confer with me on the subject." (Letter, June 22, 1868.) After much discussion, the line of division proposed by his Lordship was concurred in, provided the consent of the Lord Bishop of Montreal could be obtained for the surrender of the two counties on the other side of the Ottawa. The mode of raising the sum of \$33,333, the principal sum required to yield an income of \$2000, was a more difficult question. This sum was larger than that raised by the whole Diocese for the endowment of the present See, and it was therefore felt to be impossible that less than half the Diocese should raise more than the whole undivided Diocese had contributed. The difficulty was enhanced by the consideration that the Sustentation Fund, and the further enlargement and endowment of Ontario College, were also pressing necessities. After much conversation on the subject, and the proposal and rejection of various schemes, it was agreed to forward to his Lordship the following Report :-

"The Committee appointed by his Lordship the Bishop of Ontario on the division of the Diocese, beg leave to report that they met in the Schoolroom of St. John's Church, Prescott, at 12 noon of Tuesday, the 23rd June, 1868. Present—the Ven. the Archdeacon, his Honour Judge Jarvis, the Rev. Dr. Boswell, the Rev. Messrs. Stannage and Lauder, and Messrs. Wm. Ellis and Herbert S. McDonald, Esquires. Total 7.

Having taken the chair and opened the meeting with prayer, the Archdeacon read a letter which he had just received from his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese. He then submitted a map on which he had defined, by strongly marked lines, the limits of the proposed new Diocese as suggested by his Lordship, embracing the counties of Prescott, Russell, Carleton, Lanark, and Renfrew, and (with the sanction of the Lord Bishop

of Montreal) of the counties of Pontiac and Ottawa beyond the Ottawa

Although disappointment was expressed by some of the Committee, yet they eventually all concurred in the propriety of the proposed division if Pontiac and Ottawa could be included.

The question of the proposed endowment next engaged the serious attention of the Committee, and after long discussion they arrived at the unanimous conclusion that so large a sum as \$33,333 could not be raised within the limits of the proposed new See, and although assistance might be reasonably expected from the remaining portion of the Diocese of Ontario, the Committee could not assess any of the remaining parishes, and therefore could have no assurance of raising the required amount.

They regard, therefore, the decision of the Bishop, to require that \$33,333 should be previously raised and secured, if persisted in, as an insuperable obstacle to any immediate division of the Diocese.

The Committee fully concur with his Lordship that the future Bishop should not have a less income than £500 per annum. They believe, however, that this sum might be secured without making it a necessary preliminary that they should secure so large a principal sum.

The Committee believe that immediate steps should be taken to endeavour to raise, say \$20,000, and that in the meantime the several parishes or missions composing the new Diocese should be assessed by the several Vestries so as to secure the required sum of £500, said assessment to be reduced from time to time in proportion as interest accrued from the Endowment Fund, and with the prospect of that assessment being wholly discontinued after the demise of the present Incumbent of the See of Ontario, or its voidance from any cause, when, as the Committee unanimously recommend, there should be returned to the new Diocese a capital sum equivalent to that contributed by it to the existing Episcopal Endowment Fund, and also a proportionate share of the money recently added to that Fund under the award of Sir J. B. Macaulay; these sums, together with the endowment which would be raised in the meantime, would, in the judgment of the Committee, be amply sufficient to secure more than £500 per annum.

In the meantime, this sum of £500 might be secured by some such assessment as the following.

The Rev. Mr. Lauder assured the Committee, on behalf of Christ Church, Ottawa, that his congregation, as having the greatest interest in the work, would guarantee £200 per annum.

The Committee therefore beg respectfully that his Lordship would allow them to make the experiment of securing the £500 as above. They also respectfully suggest, that as six out of the present Committee of eight reside outside of the proposed new Diocese, the Bishop should appoint six others living within the limits of the proposed new See, as it is their opinion that at least a majority of the Committee should so live within it.

All which is respectfully submitted.

His Lordship, in acknowledging the receipt of the Report, stated " that the Report was of course for the Synod to consider, as the Committee is a Committee of the Synod, and after discussion I shall be in a better position to form a right judgment," and he further advanced various reasons why "he could not concur with the opinions that prevail among some members of the Committee."

Under all the circumstances, it was evident that the Committee could take no further action until after the meeting of the Synod, and especially so, since in consequence of the lamented death of the Lord Bishop of Montreal, no further steps could be taken towards the surrender of the counties of Ottawa and Pontiac, a measure which the late venerated Bishop assured the Chairman that he was most auxious to promote.

Your Committee, in conclusion, would venture to recommend that this important object should not be lost sight of, as in their judgment the erection of a new Diocese, with Ottawa as its Cathedral City, is most urgently required; and in begging to be discharged they would recommend the appointment of another Committee, all the members of which should live within the limits of the proposed new See of Ottawa. All which is respectfully submitted.

From this, moreover, must be deducted a loss of \$200 on the O'Donnell Mortgage, which was before held at a value of \$1200, and a deficiency of the sum of \$183.99 arising from the quarter's salary of the Bishop being paid in advance. This small sum, however, will be repaid at once out of the arrears of interest now due. These arrears amount to the sum of \$786.31, very much less than the amount of arrears reported annually during the last four years.

There is also a lot in the Village of Trenton, which may be valued at \$120. This brings in no return.

Your Committee, with a view to keep the capital of this Fund intact, and to provide against losses which will arise even in the most prudent investments, have suggested a scheme which, when matured under the sanction of the Bishop, will form a fund to meet any possible reduction of capital.

Your Committee have reason to congratulate the Synod that the only losses on capital which have occurred since the establishment of the Fund is the \$200 before referred to, and \$86.82 on the Minaker Mortgage. As far as your Committee can judge the securities are ample.

## REPORT OF THE BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE

The Book and Tract Committee beg to report that the Depository, under the able and careful management of the Rev. Mr. Bousfield, continues in a satisfactory condition as regards its finances, being practically out of debt, and the amount of stock being in excess of that with which it was first started.

A feeling seems to prevail that it would be advisable to establish Branch Depositories throughout the Diocese, but, with the means at the disposal of the Committee, they feel that they would not be warranted in recommending the adoption of such unless some steps were taken to augment its resources.

They would, therefore, respectfully suggest that his Lordship the Bishop would give expression to this wish and recommend some means (say subscriptions, donations, or an annual sermon) by which this desirable object might be attained.

Were the capital so enlarged, and a greater interest taken in its work to help it onward, it might before long, in the good providence of God, be enabled to establish Branches and make grants occasionally to poor Missions.

## (I.)REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE RE-DISTRIBUTION OF EXPENSES.

The Committee on the Re-distribution of Synodical Expenses beg leave to report that the present charges to which their attention has been directed are for the Clerical Secretary's Stipend \$800, the Lay Secretary's \$100, and the rent of offices in the Synod Hall \$200-making a total of

These charges appear to your Committee to be unequally distributed in proportion to the work done for each Fund by the Secretaries. The Commutation Fund, for instance, occupies less of the Secretaries' time than some of the other Funds, and yet it bears more than half of the whole expenses. It is true it is by far the largest Fund, and therefore may be reasonably expected to bear a greater proportion of the whole than any other Fund, but as it is in the least healthy position of them all, your Committee consider that \$637.50, its present charge, is far too large a share of \$1100. Moreover, your Committee would recommend that the Episcopal Fund should be assessed, and that the Depository, which occupies so large a room, should also bear a portion of the expenses. They would therefore recommend the following scale, in lieu of the present, viz .:-

# REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed "to inquire into the state of our Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese, and to devise some plan for the more systematic training of our youth in said Schools," beg respectfully to report.

In instituting this enquiry, a printed set of questions was sent to each pastor, and also to each Lay Sunday School Superintendent whose name was known to the Committee.

The answers received seem to indicate that our Sunday Schools, intended to be nurseries for the Church, have failed in many important particulars to fulfil the high and holy purposes for which they were instituted.

The following are some of the defects which have been pointed out :-

1. There is too little systematic teaching and training of our youth in the great fundamental truths and practices of Christianity. Religious instruction can be deemed valuable only in so far as it leads to a wholesome knowledge of Christ, a genuine faith and love of Him, and a consistent endeavour as faithful members of his body, the Church, to live according to His example. Christian principles must be lodged in the mind and heart, and inwrought into the character and life. This can be effectually done only by the constant presentation and reiteration of the truth in a clear, connected, and progressive system in connection with personal oversight.

2. There seems to be too little provision for the imbuing of the minds of our youth with sound knowledge of the distinctive features, tenets,

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claims, and authority of that branch of the Church of Christ to which we belong, so that, although our Schools are professedly Church of England Schools, they do not, in any adequate degree, serve to increase the number of our intelligent, attached and consistent Church members, or even of habitual attendants upon her ministrations.

3. We observe, also, a tendency, much to be deprecated, to make Sunday Schools a substitute rather than a subsidiary to pastoral instruction and home training, and to restrict religious teaching to Sunday clone.

4. The indiscriminate use of the Holy Scriptures as a text book of instruction, by persons not duly qualified to expound it, as a field upon which to perform rival feats in committing to memory large numbers of verses, leads to obvious evils.

#### II. REMEDIES SUGGESTED.

1. Revival of the practice of public catechising, according to the law of the Church, during service on Sunday afternoon, if possible, or, if not then possible, at such other hours or on such other days as may be practicable, an endeavour to carry out the spirit of this law in our pastoral visitations—availing ourselves of the opportunities of affording week-day religious instruction afforded by the Common School Law—the organization of Church Schools.

2. The organizing of adult Bible Classes—meetings for Sunday School Teachers, and of Church Associations for the study of the Holy Scriptures as interpreted by the Book of Common Prayer, and for carrying on systematically, under pastoral direction, the work of the Church.

3. Special services, at least twice a year, at which the subject of Christian education, especially in connection with home, and the Sunday School, should be brought forward—formation of parochial libraries throughout the Diocese.

## III. AS TO THE SCHOOLS THEMSELVES.

Your Committee would suggest that, where public catechising be not practicable, they be formally organized, and a constitution and rules of order provided for them by authority of the Synod, that thus the work may be uniform and every department of teaching under proper governance and direction.

They would further recommend that a short Liturgical form of prayer, printed on card (for more easy distribution) be provided for the opening and closing of the Schools. The Sunday School prayers now extant are too long and too complicated. They would advise brevity, with a special reference to the work in hand.

They advise also the adoption of some Sunday School Hymn Book, the selection of which they leave to the Synod, or to any Special Committee appointed by them.

They would also recommend the appropriation of a given time (not less than a quarter of an hour), at every meeting of the School, to the rehearsal of some portion of our admirable Morning and Evening Prayer; and for this reason, there are few Churches in which the services are rendered in such manner as to realize the purpose or spirit of "Common Prayer." Scarcely one-tenth of our adults respond. Instruction in this behalf, given to our youth, could scarcely fail to be of signal service to the Church. The result would be manifested in improved appreciation of the objects of our Liturgy.

They would further advise that the Church Catechism be made imperatively the basis of all instruction in our Sunday Schools.

As lessons in *prayer* they recommend chiefly, if not only, the Lord's **Prayer** and the Collects.

With regard to lessons to be read or committed to memory—these they would limit to those senior or more advanced classes, which are presided over by the more competent Teachers; and, further, they would recommend that the passage to be learned should be restricted to the Gospel or Epistle for the day. The rivalry which sometimes obtains amongst Sunday Scholars as to the number of verses they can recite, alas! with little or no understanding of their grave import, is, to say the least, very demoralizing. The sanctity of Holy Scripture is lost sight of.

In this connexion they would advise the adoption of the selections from the narrative portions of Holy Scripture, printed by the S.P.G. and other Societies in England, as early books in Sunday Schools, reserving the entire volume for the most advanced classes.

As a matter of paramount importance, they would urge that no one be admitted to the office of a Teacher unless he (or she) be a regular communicant. They assume that a Teacher of the young, in our communion, should be beyond doubt a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, and that the children should learn to feel the force of this fact. The occasional, and in some cases too frequent, wanderings of Teachers to other places of worship, operate most injuriously on the young mind. Persons divided in their allegiance should be deemed incompetent to teach Church children.

That wherever it may be practicable, a special collection of books be provided, in connection with each School, on the nature of baptism; on the sponsions therein made; on the articles of the Christian faith; on practical piety; on prayer; and on the obligations and high benefits of the Sacraments—said collection to be styled "The Teacher's Library." A small outlay on the part of each Teacher would easily ensure the advantage of such a select body of reading. The result would be a reliable understanding of the Church Catechism. This Catechism, next to the Bible, stands to our youth as a summary of Christian obligation and obedience.

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#### IV. LESSON BOOKS.

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As Lesson Books, your Committee recommend the following works:—
For those whose ages are from 5 to 7—" Hymns for Little Children,"
by the author of "Lord of the Forest;" Calvary Catechism; Watts'
Divine Songs.

7 to 9-Church Catechism; the same broken into questions, &c.

9—Sinclair's Catechism; Mant's do.; Sweete on the Church; Burgess' Large Catechism; Heip to Exposition of Catechism, by J. M. Chanter; Baptism Vow, in 3 parts.

9 to 13—Sweete on Sunday Teaching; Young Churchman Armed; Sweete's Selected Scripture; Dr. Beaven on Bible History; Bishop Doane's Manual; Pinnock's Catechism of Bible History; Dr. Beaven's Catechism.

13—In addition to above, Bishop Strachan on Confirmation; Collects and Questions; Dr. Patton on Fasts and Festivals; Catechism on 1st and 2nd Lessons; Ridley on Confirmation; Ridley on Holy Communion.

Confirmation Class—Catechism on the Church; on the Ministry; on Holy Scripture; on the Sacraments, &c.; XXXIX Articles; Bible and Common Prayer, with Scripture proofs; Theophilus Anglicanus, by Wordsworth; Office of Holy Communion from Common Prayer, with explanations and Scripture proofs.

#### V. LIBRARIES.

In regard to the expediency or inexpediency of having Sunday School Libraries, your Committee find that the Clergy and Laity are both very divided in opinion. Many of the most thoughtful and earnest amongst them have, after long testing the question, come to the conclusion that, in the great majority of cases, this weekly reading dissipates rather than improves the mind. These gentlemen would prefer a system of periodical rewards—for attendance, good conduct, and general efficiency in study. They further believe that the effect of improved teaching, if this can be attained, would far outbalance the doubtful results of the Library system. This point is specially commended to the consideration of the Synod.

Your Committee, however, feel it to be their duty to state that the doing away with Sunday School Libraries is open to very grave objections. If the children be not furnished with good books they will find their way to bad ones. Moreover, Libraries have become a part of our Sunday School system. A desire for mental excitation has been created in children's minds which it will be almost impossible to appease. This craving (abnormal as it may be) has been so far indulged that, unless we very judiciously deal with it, we shall lose our hold on multitudes of the children who now frequent our Schools.

On this, as well as on another ground, your Committee advise the retention and improvement of the Library system.

Their further ground is—that good books, if not properly read by the

children, are, or may be, in a majority of cases, read to the family circle by the parents. The good seed is not lost. The fruits, although at the moment not palpable, may nevertheless be very valuable as a safeguard from error, and as an inducement to sound and loyal Christian practice.

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Serious difficulties arise when your Committee deal with the questions of suitableness, convenient accessibility, and cost of the books which should form such Libraries.

1. As to the 1st, they regret that we have no standing Committee duly empowered by the Synod to examine and determine what books are fit or unfit for admission as Sunday School books. The books used amongst us have not, thus far, received the imprimatur of the Diocese. They are of motley character—some of them very good, others very indifferent, and some, perhaps, of a very doubtful, if not of dangerous tendency. Your Committee are of opinion that great judgment should be exercised as to the quality of the religious literature which is thus forced upon our youth.

They would, therefore, recommend the appointment of a Standing Committee, whose especial duty it should be to read over all such works as, for Sunday School Library purposes, may be submitted to them; and that no book or tract, for Sunday School uses, shall be offered for sale at our Depository or Depositories, unless it have the approval of the said Standing Committee.

It is also desirable that the manager of our head Depository should have at command (for the use of the Standing Committee) catalogues of all the Sunday School books published in the interest of the Church by the leading Societies, both of England and America.

2. A difficulty, almost as serious in character, arises from the fact that there is but one depot, that at Kingston. Our Missions are widely scattered; and save at the expense of great trouble and increased cost (both burdensome to poor parishes) the books stored in Kingston cannot be obtained.

It is recommended that, so far as may be practicable, Branch Depositories should be established—the plant (to use a railway phrase) to be derived from the parent depot; that each subordinate Depository be under the control of the Clergyman in whose Parish it may be located; and that he and his Churchwardens, i.e., the Ecclesiastical Corporation of such Parish or Mission, be responsible to the Head Depository for all sales by them effected; and that the said Corporation report at least half-yearly as to the stock sold and in hand. The unsold to be, by agreement, returnable to headquarters, if uninjured, at the expense of the body or persons making the return.

3. Your Committee further regret that, from whatever cause, the books in the Church Depository at Kingston are too high-priced. The same books can be, and are, obtained in other quarters in Canada—aye,

even from dissenting booksellers—at a less price than is demanded at our (now) only Depository.

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the The -aye, If the Church deem that religious books are essential to the instruction of the youthful mind, it is not too much to expect that provision can be made whereby the indulgence, so freely granted by the secular government, might be accorded in aid of the interests of religion, *i.e.*, that the General Depository should meet Sunday School applications for books by duplicating the value of the money forwarded; and by sending books in number and value corresponding to that doubled ratio.

Or, if this cannot be, that the Sunday Schools should, at least, have the privilege of purchasing books at the New York or English discounted price.

Before concluding their report, your Committee would express their regret that the laudable duty of self-sacrifice for the support, not simply of Sunday School Libraries, but of the Church, is not more generally practised in our Sunday Schools.

In a Diocese like is, where the Church must be, for ages to come, its own provider, a more important lesson can hardly be inculcated. On the support of the rising generation depend the prospects of our Zion, and our Sunday Schools are the proper field in which that lesson can most effectually be taught.

In some of our Schools the system adopted is to enrol the children able and willing to contribute one penny per month to the Mission Fund in a book known as the Sunday School Mission Book, and to take up their offerings on the first Sunday of every month; the remaining collections in the Sunday School being reserved for Library or other uses.

This plan has been found to work well in several of our Parishes. In its early working it may, it is true, be but as a grain of mustard seed—of small consideration and of little effect; but, the principle once established, results may follow which will confer upon our land rich and imperishable blessings.

In conclusion, your Committee would suggest that the Standing Sunday School Committee, if appointed by the Synod, be authorized to act in the interest of all matters affecting Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese; and that it be empowered to require annually from each Parish a report of the (numerical) strength, working, progress, and prospects of every School in such Parish, for the information of the Synod.

All which your Committee most respectfully submit.

Your Committee would have proceeded with the revision of the remaining seventeen Canons, but as the most important of those Canons are now referred to Committees specially appointed for such purpose, your Committee beg to report progress as to those last mentioned Canons, and ask to be continued.

## THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF ONTARIO.

By resolution of Synod, passed at its first Session (see p. 74), the Rules, Constitution, Canons, and By-Laws of the Diocese of Toronto, were adopted as the Rules, Constitution, Canons, and By-Laws of the Diocese of Ontario, subject to alterations and additions to be made.

#### I.—CONSTITUTION.

1. The Synod shall consist of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, and any coadjutor or assistant Bishop thereof, of the Priests and Deacons of the same licensed by the Lord Bishop, of those Clergymen of the Diocese in good standing in the Diocese who have become superannuated or incapacitated in consequence of infirmity, and of Lay representatives to be elected as is hereafter provided.

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2. The Lay representatives shall be male communicants of the full age of 21 years, who shall have communicated at least once within the previous year. They shall be elected as hereinafter provided, at the Easter meeting, held by each minister having a separate cure of souls, or at any meeting specially called by him for that purpose, and all laymen within the cure, of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have at the time of the election declared themselves in writing, in a book provided for such purposes by the parish, to be habitual attendants of that congregation, and members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination, shall have the right of voting at the election: Provided that no member shall vote in the election of Delegates in more than one Church in the Diocese within the year.

3. The Minister himself, if present, shall preside at the election, and in his absence the Curate Assistant, or in case neither the Minister nor his Curate Assistant be present, a Chairman elected by a majority of those present.

4. Each cure shall be entitled to three Lay representatives, and who, except in the case of a first election in a cure, shall serve for three years. One of these representatives shall retire annually, but he may be re-elected. In the case of a first election in a cure, the first on the list of the representatives, returned and certified to the Clerical Secretary, shall serve for three years; the second so returned and certified shall serve for two years; and the last so returned and certified shall serve for one year: but when there are two congregations having Churches, that which has the largest number of voters shall elect two, and the other one; when there are three congregations having Churches, each shall elect one; and when more than three, those having the smallest number of votes shall unite for the election of one representative with the congregation of the Church nearest to them; and in all cases the Church to which the Minister is specially licensed or appointed shall be entitled to at least one representative.

5. Within thirty days after such election the Chairman of the meeting shall send to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod the amount assessed on his Parish or Cure as hereinafter provided, together with a certificate of such election according to the following form:—

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On the receipt of this certificate by the Clerical Secretary of the Synod, he shall enter the names of the Lay representatives on the Synod list, to be printed and sent to each of the Clergy and Lay representatives afteen days before the meeting thereof, and at the foot of the list the Secretary shall place a note indicating to the Parishes which have not paid their assessment that representatives cannot sit or vote until it has been paid. The Chairman of the meeting shall likewise furnish such representative with the following certificate:—

N.B.—No representative can sit or vote in Synod until the assessment due by his Parish is paid.

And such certificate shall be taken as sufficient proof of the election; but without it, any person presenting himself as such representative shall be required, before taking his seat, to afford sufficient proof of his election. No representative shall be permitted to act until the assessment and the arrears, if any, upon his Parish are paid; and representatives shall continue in office until their successors are appointed: Provided that when the cure shall be vacant from the inability or neglect of the congregation to support a Clergyman, the Lay representatives shall, after the expiration of one year from the vacancy caused by such inability or neglect, cease to have seats in the Synod.

6. If any Lay representative is elected for more than one parish, he shall, within one week after receiving notice thereof, select the parish which he intends to represent, and shall signify the same to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod, who shall at once notify the minister of the other parish or parishes for which such representatives shall have been elected; and thereupon such minister shall proceed to call a new election by giving due notice thereof on two consecutive Sundays, such new election to take place within fifteen days from the receipt of the notification from the Clerical Secretary of the Synod. And in the event of the erection of a new parish or cure, or of a vacancy occurring in the number of representatives of any parish or cure, either by death or otherwise, the minister of the said parish or cure shall in like manner and within the same period proceed to hold a new election to fill such vacancy, and the voters at the last election shall be entitled to vote at such new election without further registration. The person elected to fill a vacancy shall serve only for the unexpired term of the retiring representative.

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ceeding within That 7. If any Lay representative shall decline to serve, or shall at any time resign his office, signifying the same in writing to the Incumbent, or shall remove from the Diocese, the said office shall, in any such case, become vacant; moreover, should any Lay representative secode from the Church, or abstain from the Holy Communion for the space of one whole year, or should he wilfully absent himself from public worship in the Church which he had been accustomed to attend, for the space of six calendar months; or should he be convicted of any crime, he shall thereupon forfeit his said office, and the Incumbent or Minister of the Parish or Mission of which he was the Lay representative shall, within fifteen days after being made acquainted with such vacancy or forfeiture, proceed to call a new election:

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And should the Incumbent or Minister neglect or refuse to call for a new election after receiving the written application for a meeting for such purpose, signed by three persons having the right to vote at the election of Lay Delegates, and one Sunday having passed without such meeting being called by him, then it shall be in the power of any three such voters to call a meeting by notice, to be affixed on the outer main entrance door of the Church, at least ten days previous to such intended meeting.

- 8. The Synod shall meet annually, or oftener at the discretion of the Bishop; the time and place of meeting being appointed by him, who shall adjourn or prorogue the Synod, as may appear to him most for the welfare of the Diocese.
- 9. A quorum of the Synod shall consist of not less than one-fourth of the whole number of the Clergy, and one-fourth of the congregations within the Diocese, represented by at least one Delegate, and no business shall be transacted without a quorum.
- 10. There shall be a Clerical Secretary and a Lay Secretary, the former to be elected by the Clergy, the latter by the Laity, annually on the first day of Synod, and whose duty it shall be to keep regular minutes of all proceedings of the Synod, to record them in a book provided for that purpose, to preserve all papers, memorials, and other documents, to conduct correspondence, and to attest the public acts of the Synod, and who shall deliver all records and documents to their successors. The Clerical and Lay Secretaries shall be ex-officio members of all standing Committees.

him paid over to the Treasurer at least once a week. The Clerical Secretary shall acknowledge the same in such manner as the Executive Committee shall from time to time direct.

That it shall be the duty of the Secretaries of Synod to have the proceedings of each session of Synod printed and distributed to the members within two months from the close of the session.

That it shall be the duty of the Clerical Secretary to have the notices

of motions given on one day printed and ready for distribution on the following morning.

11. There shall be a Treasurer of the Synod, who shall be ex-officio a member of the Executive Committee, and two Auditors.

That the Executive Committee be empowered to make some Chartered Bank the custodian of the Securities and Funds of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, on such terms as may be agreed upon between such Bank and said Committee, provided, nevertheless, that no higher rate of commission be allowed, either for collecting interest or principal, than one quarter

That the banking account of the said Synod shall be kept in the name of the Treasurer of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, to whose credit all monies shall be deposited, and that no money shall be withdrawn from said account except by cheque, signed by the Treasurer and the Clerical Secretary of the Synod, and countersigned by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, or in the event of his not being present, by the Chairman pro tem. of the Executive Committee, and that all securities be examined, at least once a year, by a Committee appointed for that purpose.

12. A Finance Committee shall be appointed annually, to fix the assessment to be levied on each parish for the ensuing year.

13. There shall be an Executive Committee, to be nominated and presided over by the Lord Bishop, and to consist of twenty members, ten chosen from the Clergy, and ten from the Lay representatives; of whom seven shall be a quorum, and whose office shall continue till their successors are appointed: in addition to the twenty members so to be nominated as aforesaid, the chairmen of the several standing Committees of Synod shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee. In the absence of the Bishop the Committee shall elect a chairman. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to prepare in due form all such matters as the Bishop, or any other members of the Synod may desire to bring forward; to receive reports from all other Committees, to examine and confirm or refer back the same with instructions for re-consideration, and in the event of the Committee re-affirming the previous report, that the Bishop shall have power to decide the question; to print such reports or such parts of them as they may deem expedient; to countersign or endorse by their chairman all cheques, claims, and applications made by any Board or Committee; or any other lawful applications on the Treasurer of the Synod; and to issue a circular, under the Bishop's direction, stating the time and place of meeting, the business for the ensuing Synod, and the order in which it will be discussed; which circular shall be forwarded to each Clergyman and Lay representative fifteen days before the meeting of Synod.

14. The business to be submitted to the Synod so as to have precedence in order of proceeding, shall be sent to the Clerical Secretary, to be sub-

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15. No act or resolution of the Synod shall be valid without the concurrence of the Bishop, and of a majority of the Clergy, and of the Laity present. This rule not to refer to the election of a Bishop.

or the canons, if passed at one session of the Synod, shall lie over to the next meeting of the Synod; and shall not take effect unless again approved by the Bishop, and a majority, consisting of two-thirds of both Clergy and Laity.

17. That the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be authorized to fill up temporarily any vacancies occurring among the officials of the Synod until the next meeting of the said Synod.

18. That where no provision is specially made otherwise, one-third of the members of each Committee of Synod shall be considered a quorum of that Committee.

19. All Committees shall be named by the Bishop, unless otherwise ordered.

## II.—ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. The first meeting of the Synod in each session shall be preceded by public morning prayer, and a sermon, together with the Holy Communion; and the collection at the offertory shall be devoted to missionary or other purposes, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee.

2. After divine service on the first day of meeting, the Lay Secretary shall attend at the place of meeting of the Synod, to receive the certificates of the Lay representatives, which shall be examined by the Secretary and a committee of two to be appointed for that purpose,

3. The Synod shall be opened with prayer. The Clerical Secretary shall then call over the roll of the Clergy, to be furnished by the Bishop, and mark the names of those in attendance; and the Lay Secretary shall call over the names of the several parishes and their representatives, marking those who are present.

4. The election of Secretaries shall then be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively; and a Treasurer and two Auditors shall also be elected, all of which officers shall hold their respective offices until their successors shall be appointed.

5. After this, and on all other days after morning prayers, and the opening prayer, the order of business shall be as follows:

(1.) Reading, correcting, and approving the minutes of the previous meeting.

(2.) Appointing committees.

- (3.) Presenting, reading, and referring memorials, petitions and correspondence.
- (4.) Presenting reports of committees, of the Treasurer, and the Auditors.
- (5.) Giving notice of motions. On the second morning of Synod, election of Provincial Delegates:
  - (6.) Taking up unfinished business.
  - (7.) Consideration of motions.
  - 6. An address from the Bishop shall be in order at any time.
- 7. The minutes of the proceedings of the last day of each session shall be rea 1 and confirmed before the close of the session.

#### III.—RULES FOR THE PRESERVATION OF ORDER.

- 1. When the Bishop has taken the chair, no member shall continue standing.
- 2. When any member is about to speak for the information of the Synod, he shall rise and address himself to the chair.
- 3. No motion or amendment shall be considered as before the Synod (excepting such as may be proposed by the Bishop, or committees), unless seconded and reduced to writing. To prevent surprise, no motion, except motions in course, shall be considered till the succeeding day of meeting, notice thereof having been first given:
- 4. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, without asking and receiving permission from the chair.
- 5. When a question is under consideration, no other motion shall be received; unless to adjourn, to move the previous question, to lay it on the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to amend it, or to divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order here named.
- 6. Motions to adjourn or to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.
- 7. When a motion has been read to the Synod by the Secretary, it cannot be withdrawn by the mover, without the consent of the chair.
- 8. Each member shall have the power to require, at any period of the debate, that the motion in discussion be read for his information.
- 9. A member called to order while speaking shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.
  - 10. All questions of order shall be decided by the chair.
- 11. An amendment to an original motion shall, in discussion, take precedence of such motion: an amendment to an amendment shall be first

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12. No more than one amendment to a proposed amendment to a motion shall be in order: yet a substitute for the whole matter may be proposed and received, provided it deals directly with the subject in hand.

13. Whilst any question is being put from the chair, the members shall continue in their seats, and shall not hold any private discourse; and when a motion is so put, no member shall retire until such motion is disposed of.

14. When a division takes place the votes of the Clergy and Laity shall be taken separately, if required by the Bishop or four members of each of the respective orders; and the Lay representatives shall in all such cases vote by parishes, and when so voting, the majority shall be considered as the vote of the parish.

15. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative.

16. A question, being once determined, shall not again be drawn into discussion in the same session, without the special sanction of the Bishop.

17. No protest or dissent shall be entered on the minutes of the proceedings; but, when required by any one member, the number of affirmative and negative votes shall be recorded, and when required by three of either Clergy or Lay Delegates, the names of the Clergy and Parishes voting on both sides of the question shall be also recorded.

18. The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman, and shall be received in course, unless a motion be made for their re-committal.

19. The Chairman of the Committee, or some member deputed by him, shall explain to the Synod the bearing of any portion of the Report, if requested by any member of the Synod.

20. A motion to suspend the order of proceedings or rules for the preservation of order shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate, and no rule of the order of proceeding or of the preservation of order shall be suspended, except upon the unanimous consent of the members present.

### IV.—ON THE ELECTION OF A BISHOP.

1. In the event of a vacancy in the See, the Dean, or in case of his inability or unwillingness to act, the Archdeacon, and in case of the inability or unwillingness of both, then the senior clergyman of the Diocese shall within one week from the occurrence of such vacancy, or its announcement to the Diocese, or so soon thereafter as possible, memorialize the Metropolitan, or in the event of his absence, or refusal, or neglect for

twenty days to act, or of that office being vacant, then the senior Canadian Bishop who may be willing to act, praying him to summon a meeting of the Clergy sad Lay representatives of the Synod, at the Cathedral city of the Diocese, to elect a successor, such meeting to be held within thirty days of the receipt of the memorial of the Dean or other dignitary or other Clergyman, and to be presided over by the Bishop calling the meeting, or in the case of his death, illness, or inability from other causes to preside, then by some other Canadian Bishop. And the said Metropolitan or other Bishop shall give at least ten days notice of the time and place of such meeting.

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2. In the election of a Bishop to a vacant See, or to a new See, the Clergy and Laity shall vote separately by ballot, the Clergy as individuals, and the Laity by parishes. A majority of votes in each order shall determine the choice, provided that two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote be present, and two-thirds of all the parishes entitled to vote be represented; otherwise two-thirds of the votes of each order present shall be necessary to determine the choice.

3. Any Clergyman elected a Bishop, and holding at the time of such election any preferment or benefice, shall resign such preferment or benefice prior to his consecration. And in case he is elected Bishop of another Diocese and accepts, this See shall be ipso facto vacant.

#### V.—SUBDIVISION OF A DIOCESE.

In the event of the subdivision of this Diocese, the portion intended to form the new Diocese shall be bound in all their proceedings by the Constitution of the Diocese of which they formed a part, until the said new Diocese shall be fully organized by the election and consecration of the Bishop, and until altered by its Synod.

#### VI.—ON THE PATRONAGE OF THE RECTORIES.

Whereas this Synod has, by a resolution passed at the session of 1862, agreed to vest the Patronage of the Rectories in the Lord Bishop, and whereas it is necessary that a By-Law should be passed affirming such resolution, be it enacted, that during the life or incumbency of the Right Reverend J. T. Lewis, Lord Bishop of Ontario, the appointment to all Rectories within his Diocese be vested in the Right Reverend J. T. Lewis as such Lord Bishop; and that such appointments to Rectories as have been made in this Diocese since the session of this Synod, in April A.D. 1862, be hereby confirmed.
