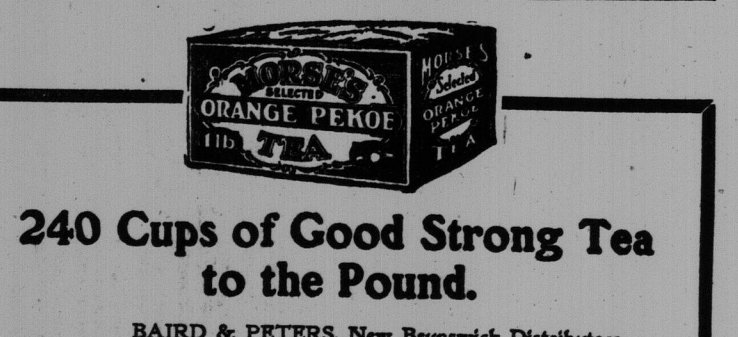

FEDERAL VOTE IN 1925 IS NOW BELIEVED SURE

Much Conjecture, However, Follows Premier King's Statement

OPPOSITION THINKS LIBERALS SEEK DELAY

Ministerial Supporters See Improvement in Maritime Strength

OTTAWA, Aug. 24—An additional stimulus to speculation regarding the dissolution of the 14th Parliament and the calling of a general federal election was contained in the statement made public today from the Prime Minister.

Conservatives inclined to the view that it is an apology for delaying the contest until next year, while Liberal supporters look upon it simply as a reminder to Mr. Meighen that he is not in office now and that some one else will fix the election date.

There is no room for doubt now that that date will be in 1925. Preparations for the contest are being accelerated by both the Liberal and the Conservative organizations.

Reports brought from the Maritime Provinces, even during the past four or five days, indicate a change of feeling where some time ago there was considerable gloom.

Disolution LIKELY SOON. Disolution of Parliament may be expected not long after the return of Ottawa of His Excellency Baron Byng and some time in September, probably in the latter part.

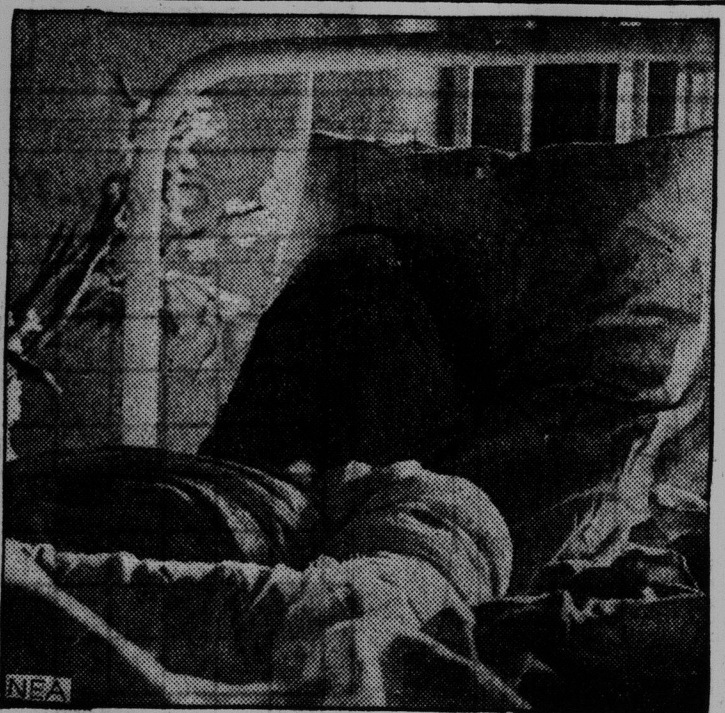
