

Already Many Requests for Information re 1925 Auto Travel.



Moscow, Sept. 23—(By mail to United Press)—That the French government will follow in the footsteps of Britain and grant de Jure recognition to the Soviet government before the end of this year—and possibly within a few weeks—is the confident belief of high official circles here.

These cases are fortunately not many in number but when they do occur they cause the bitterest possible feeling on the part of the unfortunate and those who know of the circumstances.
