English Coal Strike Paralyzing Business—Pennsylvania Railroad Cuts Off Many Trains

London, Eng., April 2.—Yorkshire is in the throes of a coal war. There are now upward of 130,000 miners on strike in the county, 45,000 having laid down their tools yesterday.

Industrial sections of England today began to feel the effects of the minimum wage strike of coal miners in the north of England and many manufacturers were compelled to suspend. Strike leaders are working to extend the strike into Northumberland and other coal producing counties and to Wales.

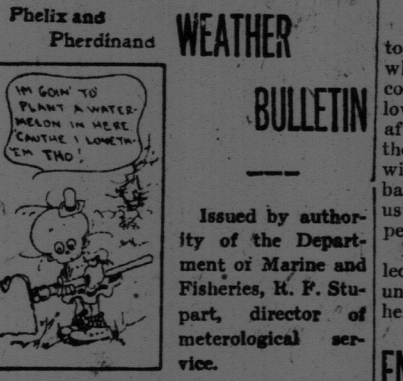

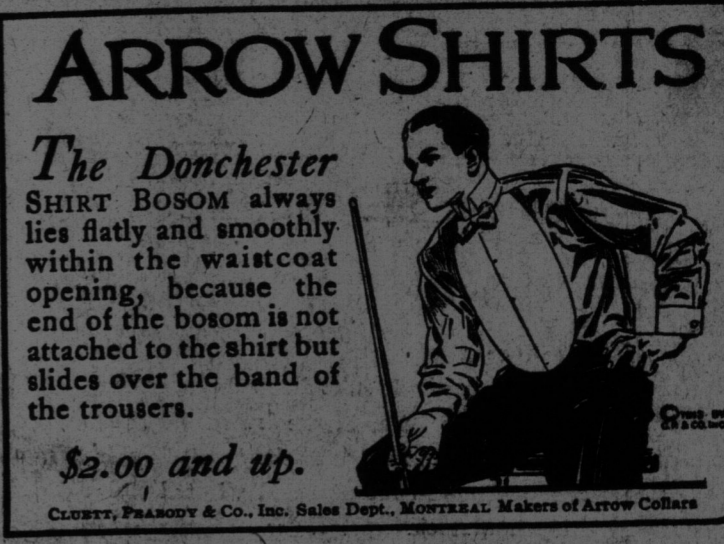
