

EIGHT IN PORT AS SEASON NEARS END

Steamships Loading Grain for Overseas—Last Sailing Likely Friday.

This week will practically see the close of activities at the port for the season. The season was reported a successful one and surpassed all expectations. The Canadian Pacific steamship Montclare, which arrived on last Saturday from Liverpool, is the last passenger liner of the season. Her departure next Friday will practically bring the season to a close.

At present time there are eight ocean going steamers in port, the majority of which are to be shipped on the S. S. Manchester Corporation, which sailed from here yesterday for that port to complete loading.

OLD FRENCH FOLK SONGS. Rev. P. P. Armstrong of Mount Carmel, P. E. Island, has gathered orally 106 of the old French folk songs. They have been set to music by Rev. Theodore Gallant, following as nearly as possible the original tune as sung round the fire-side of the Acadian people from generation to generation. They are being sent to be printed and preserved, to the Department of Archives at Ottawa. Father Armstrong is now collecting, under similar conditions, the old Acadian folk lore, which will also be sent to Ottawa.

(Continued from page 1.) water out after the ship had been hoisted in. On returning to the city they were driven to Reed's Point and shown the C. N. R. elevators and the Pythian Castle for lunch with the Rotary Club.

An official welcome was extended by His Worship Mayor Fisher, on behalf of the city council. He assured the visitors that St. John always had the latch string out for visitors from other parts of the Dominion and it gave him especial pleasure to welcome the men from the West, many of whom were seeing the winter port of Canada for the first time. He expressed the hope that on their return they would have a better idea of what the representatives of this constituency were talking about when they asked parliament for money for needed public works here.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., M.P., outlined the claims of the port for consideration at the hands of the Dominion Parliament, and G. E. Barbour, president of the Board of Trade, also spoke for St. John. The speakers for the Progressives were R. A. Hoey, of Springfield, Man.; C. W. Wallace, of Norfolk, Ontario.

The party were accompanied on the tour of inspection by Mayor Fisher and Commissioners Bullock and Wigmore, representing the city council, and R. E. Armstrong, representing the Board of Trade.

Are Impressed. C. W. Stewart, who represents Humboldt, Sask., in Parliament, said this was his first trip to the Maritime Provinces. What seemed to strike him was the fact that despite the rise and fall of tide it was possible to load ships at any time of the day or night with equal facility.

D. W. Warner, who represents Strathcona, took a keen interest in the shipping facilities for potatoes, grain and cattle. He said they had heard a great deal about our potato shipments and were glad to see for themselves the picture painted by T. W. Caldwell, member for Carleton-Victoria, when he started out to mill their support for the new potato shed.

Several of the party paid tribute to the efforts of Mr. Caldwell to secure better shipping facilities here and their belief that in him the city had a good friend.

THE RIVAL FLIERS. The race between the British and United States fliers around the world is developing in interest. So far both parties have maintained about the same average of about 70 miles an hour for actual flying time, and although the U. S. fliers had eight days start on the Brits, they have been in the air less than four hours longer. The following summary will show the progress that has been made:

British—Left Calcutta, England, March 23; due to leave Baghdad today; distance covered, 3,109 miles; actual flying time, 44 hours, 38 minutes; next stop, Bushair, Persia; total route planned, 23,944 miles.

American—Left Santa Monica, Calif., March 17; today, 3 planes at Dutch Harbor, Alaska; one at Khatanga; distance covered, 3,375 miles; actual flying time, 48 hours, 10 minutes; next stop, Nazan, Alaska; total route planned, 25,711 miles.

FOR TRINITY CHIMES. A special collection was taken yesterday in Trinity Church for a fund to revive the ringing of the chimes which have been silent since previous to the outbreak of war in 1914. There has been a small amount on hand for this purpose. Yesterday's collection was announced as a substantial one.

FREDERICTON MAN FOUND DEAD ON PENOBSCOT BANK

The body of Edward David Clark, who lived with his family just beyond the Webster laundry at the right as one enters upon the easterly span of the Old Town-Milford bridges, at Old Town, Me., was found lying on two feet of water at the edge of the river, but two minutes' walk from his home, early Friday morning. The body of the man was found floating in the Penobscot. It is also said that he had been troubled of late by heart attacks and it is believed that, walking on the log to look for fish, he was struck with one of his attacks and fell into the water.

BELIEVE THEY HAVE THE WOMAN BANDIT

Detectives Arrest Cecilia Cooney and Man in Jacksonville, Florida. Jacksonville, Fla., April 21—A woman believed to be Brooklyn's bobbed-hair bandit, and a man, who she was her husband, were arrested here yesterday by New York detectives. The woman gave her name as Cecilia Cooney, aged 20, and the man was booked as Edward Cooney, 25.

The officers said they were confronted by an automatic pistol in the hands of the woman and two revolvers held by the man when they broke down the door in a rooming house in which they were staying. According to the police they were wanted in New York on 17 charges of holding up establishments and with assault with intent to murder in connection with the abducting of Nathan Mezria at the Brooklyn plant of the National Biscuit Company on April 12.

They were traced, said the detectives, through the birth of a baby here on April 11 to Mrs. Cooney. The baby died.

Here's Her History. New York, April 21—The gun girl first made her appearance in Brooklyn early in January when she held up a shop with the aid of a male companion. Within three months, the list of holdups in which a bobbed-haired young woman participated, had amounted to seventeen.

Mrs. Cooney, who is of German extraction, is five feet one inch tall and weighs 120 pounds. She was married to Cooney in May, 1923. Her husband, who served in the navy during the war, and who is an automobile mechanic, is a half-inch short of six feet tall.

The girl bandit specialized in drug stores and in grocery stores, the latter belonging for the most part to chain store systems. Picking out a place in a residential section, she would enter nonchalantly, ask for some merchandise and when the shop keeper faced her would point a pistol at him and order him to give her the contents of the cash register.

Then, always pointing the revolver at her victim, she would back slowly out toward the door, meanwhile giving terse admonitions not to call for aid until she was well out of sight. During the first few weeks of her activities the bandit on several occasions left taunting notes for the police, showing one place twice within about a week.

ENGLISH BOXER IS HERE FROM OLD LAND

Among the arrivals here last Saturday on the Canadian Pacific steamship Montclare, was "Kid" Moose, a middleweight boxer, who returned to Canada after an extended visit to England. While there he competed in 47 bouts, winning 41, losing four and securing a draw in two. He has been here for a few days. He is only 33 years old, has never been knocked out in his life, and is open to meet Jack Reddick on May 16 at Moose Jaw, for the Heavyweight championship of Canada. Moose expects to return to England next fall for a match with Jack Bloomfield for the light-heavyweight championship of Europe.

MacAulay Praised by Man Here Who Saw Saturday's Race. W. Locke, of Amherst, who was present at the finish of the Boston Marathon race on Saturday and who passed through the city today, said that victor MacAulay, the Windsor runner, made a fine effort in the long grid of 26 miles, 385 yards and did exceedingly well to finish in sixth place. "There were 147 entrants," said the Amherst man, "and the majority of them knew the course pretty well. MacAulay showed great powers of endurance." Mr. Locke says the Windsor boy remained over in Boston a few days to recover from the effects of his long race in passing the mile mark. He speaks highly of the work of Howard Kunkel and young Dudley Lee at shortstop.

FORD TO BUILD LONDON PLANT?

Plans on Giving British a One Hundred Per Cent Home "Jitney." London, April 18.—(United Press). Henry Ford is planning the establishment of a great plant here for the production of "100 per cent British" jitneys.

Negotiations are under way by representatives of an "unnamed principal," believed almost certainly to be Ford, for the purchase of a large tract on the Thames for use as the factory site.

Ford now has a plant at Manchester, where about 3,500 workmen are employed. The proposed London plant, to cover 225 acres, would employ about 14,000 persons, and be the largest Ford manufacturing plant outside the United States.

The Ford cars now produced at Manchester are made largely of British materials. It is said that the London plant will use British materials entirely. It has been suggested that the product carry the slogan, "A 100-per cent British Ford."

Ford's big-scale production plan in England, if carried out, will save an import duty of 33-1/3 per cent, required on all foreign cars brought here for sale. There is some anxiety among British manufacturers of light cars at the prospect of large-scale Ford production and competition here, but generally speaking the attitude of the people and the authorities seems favorable because they believe it will relieve the unemployment situation to some extent at least and bring the silver nearer the range of the average purse.

The steamer Parthenia is expected to sail this week for Glasgow. She now is loading general cargo at No. 3 and will take on cattle.

GRAVE BUT NOT LIKELY TO BE WAR

Tokio, April 21—A declaration that war with the United States over the immigration question is impossible, but assertion that it would take years for Japan to forget the "mutil" imposed by the U. S. senate are among the statements made in an interview given by Count Yamamoto, former Premier of Japan.


"There is no possibility of war resulting from the action of congress," Yamamoto asserted. "Our sword leaps from the scabbard only when the motherland is menaced or our obligations to our Allies call it forth. But the immigration issue does not involve the national safety. With such an affront hurled toward Japan our attitude must be calm, dignified and restrained."

"It is best to interpret the Senate's action not as an expression of the will of the people of the U. S. but as the result of skillful manipulation of crowd psychology, with politicians taking advantage of Hamura's phrasology."

"It will take years for the Japanese to forget this result and rally again to the support of co-operative peace efforts. No amount of Christian preaching or missionary work can convince us now that Christianity is an effective preventive of wars and racial struggles."

REVOLUTION IN SPRING BLOUSES

Advent of Tailored Suit is Reported Responsible for Change.

Blouses this spring are revolutionized, says the Boston Post. The advent of the tailored suit has wrought the change. New blouses are just as tailored as the suits and as a rule they have a decidedly masculine touch. Mannish collars, soft shirt bosoms and vest effects are among the details, also tiny pockets, and ascot ties.

Made of Wash Silks. The over-blouse type prevails even when it is cut like a waistcoat. Some hang straight from the shoulders which doesn't matter when the cost is worn. But more are adjusted at either side of the hips by buttons and buttonholes, which is neater and more finished in effect.

Wash silks are the materials and thus far it is a white season. Silk broadcloth, crepe de chine, rayon and wash satin lead in cotton fabrics there are broadcloths and piques in shirt models which lend themselves readily to the tailored mode.

A new note getting away from the severely tailored idea is the jabot blouse. This has a softening influence which many women demand and must have if becomingness is considered. Another style effects the scarf and both are good and fill perfectly the softening requirement.

As a rule, blouses have collars this spring. The Peter Pan is one used commonly on tailored styles and a newer one still is the Dana. The latter is set on a stiff collar band and fits the tailored coat collar a little closer and more neatly.

Sleeveless Blouse Styles. Dresser blouses show the soft, turn-away collar with ties which run through little monogrammed tabs or and in a jabot or ruffle. Double ruffles and jabots are being worn, and this mode is one that is to be increasingly popular, it is said.

Blouses, like gowns, are sleeveless or else fitted with long sleeves. The regulation shirt sleeve with soft cuffs is used extensively, but some severely tailored blouses are sleeveless. This is because coat sleeves to be very smart must be very tight. Therefore, many blouses to be worn beneath them dispense with sleeves.

Letters To The Editor. BUILD UP THE MARITIMES. To The Editor of The Times-Star—Your Saturday issue, addressed to Mr. E. Other lines have a very poor market locally, with the result that our manufacturers have to search all over for a market, and find it practically impossible to expand on any large scale. It should always be remembered that prosperity depends upon pay-rolls, and pay-rolls cannot be with us unless there is a market for the work of the producers. Mr. McKenna's address at Fredericton must have caused many thoughtful citizens to sit up and take notice. He is of the firm opinion that we can save ourselves by having faith in ourselves and our products. One million people can keep many factories and farmers busy and thousands of people employed. A very apt example of what people can do was given by Mr. McKenna to the writer a few days ago. He stated that at one time Kings County was a county of mortgages, but today it is practically treeless. "How did they do it?" asked Mr. McKenna. In answer to his own question he added, "Pulled it out of the cow's teats." Here is an example of a people who used what they had for their own prosperity, instead of looking for gifts from the gods. What the people of King's County have done can be done by the three

decision to use our own resources rests with the people themselves. The producers are ready to supply. Are the consumers ready to consume their own products? Here is a question every Maritime citizen should ask himself or herself: "How much money have I spent in Maritime goods during the past year?" Several citizens have been asked this question, and here are some of the answers. "Our broom is the only Maritime made article in the house." "We buy Nova Scotia coal." "We have not a single Maritime made article in the house." "Chocolates are the only Maritime made goods we have used." Don't let us look over the fence at the other man's cow when our own cow is waiting to be milked. Let us all become milkers, and foster ourselves on our own resources. No effort needed. No sacrifices to be made. Everything to be gained. These words will do it when buying goods. They are, "Maritime Made, Please." A pledge from 100,000 Maritime citizens to spend at least one hundred dollars per annum in "Maritime Made" goods will keep twenty-five millions of dollars at home for home prosperity. 
