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

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

OF THE

BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

OF THE

Montreal Amateur Athletic Association,

For presentation to the Annual Meeting to be held Monday, May 20th, 1889.

GENTLEMEN,

Another year of unremitting exertion has been added to the record of the past, and our different schemes have been pushed forward with rapidity and despatch.

Our Grounds are something to be proud of, and any one looking at them to-day, with their general completeness of appearance, will find it hard to realize that this time last year we had not begun to work at them.

Since then they have been graded and levelled, and sown with grass-seed, fences erected and painted, a grand stand built, capable of seating about 5,000 people, a cinder track laid, probably the finest in America, being one-third of a mile around, eighteen feet wide for 220 yards, and twelve the balance; and latterly a handsome Club House, with large hall upstairs, and dressing rooms, boxes, shower baths, etc., downstairs. The want of these grounds was felt very severely last season, and pretty well accounts for the debit balance of \$3,855.65.

In July last the initiation fee of \$10 proposed, and carried at the Semi-Annual Meeting came into force, making the first year's membership in the Association cost \$20, with the option of paying the subscription half-yearly. This course of action met with the unanimous approval of the members, not a dissenting voice being heard. Around the Club House proper, no great changes have taken place: The entrance has been painted and the steps renewed, and new spouts placed on the south side, which puts our central home in good repair.

In September last the long-looked forward to Bazaar, or M. A. A. Fair took place in the Victoria Rink. Probably no event connected with the Association was ever so successful. It was opened by Sir D. A. Smith, and for the space of one week the Rink was crowded with our friends. To the ladies who took part, and really made the Fair the success it was, the most hearty thanks of the Association are due, and it is more than encouraging to us to find such ready and willing support accorded by the fair ones. The receipts were very satisfactory, and we certainly broke another record, and placed the standard of emulation on a high pedestal.

The Gymnasium has kept up to its standard of excellence, and the early part of the season saw more gymnasts and aspirants to the rank than ever working in the gymnasium. The thanks of this Association are due to Dr. Cameron, who delivered a very interesting address at the opening entertainment of the season, and one which was highly appreciated by the audience. The closing exhibition was well worth seeing, some novel, and to us, new pieces of work being introduced.

The Field Sports Department felt the absence of accommodation the worst of any, as neither Spring or Fall Games were held.

We were represented at the Canadian Championship Games, held on our grounds on September 29th, when Mr.

Moffatt was successful, securing the half mile championship in 2 min. 3 2-5 sec.

We were again represented at the N. A. A. A. of America Championship Games, held in New York on the 13th October, when Mr. J. W. Moffatt won the half mile in 2 min. 2 1-5 sec.

The Lacrosse Club had a rather quiet season, principally owing to the limited ground accommodation. But the good days for this branch of our tree are coming, and the principal factor in their quietness having been removed, great things may be expected from them in the near future.

The Snow Shoe Club had one of their most successful seasons; tramping and the attendance thereat being very satisfactory. The record of the Club regarding Carnival work was kept up to the average, though the interest in the great winter fete was not as great as usual.

The Toboggan Club had a fine season, notwithstanding the lateness of the arrival of snow. Arrangements were made with the Montreal Club, by which we used their plant and slide. An artificial slide was also erected alongside of the natural. The slide was opened on the Tuesday of Carnival Week by the Governor-General, and was well patronized by our members all season.

The Bicycle Club had a fairly good season, the Tuesday night rides to the Athletic Club House being more popular than ever, but the continuity of wet weather interfered somewhat with their movements.

The Football Club were similarly situated to the Lacrosse Club, the lack of suitable grounds militating somewhat against their movements; we, however, won the Quebec Championship again, and played a draw with Ottawa College for the Championship of Canada; but the Fall of this year will see this game to the front if enthusiasm among the playing members may be taken as an indication.

Our Cinderella Club failed to materialize this year, the Committee being of opinion that one season's rest would not hurt, and the intention was to have the next one in the new Athletic Club House on the Grounds, but this will probably be left until the Fall. But the Dramatic Club have revived their old time successes, and their performances both from an artistic and financial point of view are something to be proud of. The Entertainment Committee also arranged with the Rev. G. H. Wells, D.D., to give a lecture in the Gymnasium, on "Montreal to the Yellowstone." Mr. W. Prowse illustrated the lecture with a series of views, and the hearty thanks of the Association were tendered to these gentlemen for their willing and effective co-operation.

The Hockey Club finish the season as Champions, though they lost that much coveted honor to the Crystals in the earlier part of the Winter. This only seems to have had the effect of making the team work harder, and the result is that the Cup still looks at home in our Trophy Case.

REPORT OF BILLIARD ROOM COMMITTEE.

GENTLEMEN,

Again I have much pleasure in presenting a report of the Billiard Room Committee for the past year, and it affords me much satisfaction to be able to report the affairs of this department to be in a flourishing condition.

REPORT OF THE GROUND COMMITTEE.

SEASON 1888-89.

MONTREAL, May 3rd, 1889.

To the President and Directors of the M.A.A.A.

GENTLEMEN,

It gives me much pleasure in presenting the report of the Ground Committee, particularly as this is the first report of our New Grounds.

The grading of the grounds was commenced early in May, and the Contractors did not get finished till well into July, much to the disappointment of your committee, as we hoped to have had the seed in, early in June.

Just as soon as the grading was finished we started to lay out the cinder path. The track is three laps to a mile, leaving the playing part of the field 600 feet long by 430 feet wide, allowing accommodation for three games being played at one time.

The seeding of the ground, although delayed very much, by the tardiness of the Contractor, proved a great success, the grass with the help of the continuous rains of last August, grew very rapidly. We now have an excellent turf, which, with proper care will be one of the best in the city.

The fence enclosing the grounds is all of 11/4 in. Pine, planed and grooved and covered with three coats of paint, both inside and out.

The grand stands were put up more with a view of making a comfortable seat than holding a large crowd, and your committee feel that they have filled a long looked for boon, a very comfortable stand, covered in, with iron posts supporting the roof, and no obstacles in the way to obstruct the view. The filling of the stands from the back is another new feature which will enable the committee to handle a crowd much easier than on the old grounds.

The Club House which has been put up on the strip of land between St. Catherine Street and the grounds, is 100 feet long by 38 feet wide. The first flat contains the dressing rooms, committee rooms, reception room, shower baths (4) and lavatory. Ticket offices are also on the first flat facing St. Catherine Street, enabling spectators to enter the grounds by either side of the Club House. The second flat has been fitted up as a Music Hall with a large stage, also a hard wood floor, and your committee feel sure that this will be a source of revenue to the Association.

Our Caretaker's quarters are above the Hall with windows looking out south, east and west, thus giving him an entire view of all our property.

Your committee cannot close without congratulating the Association on the purchase of the new grounds, the business way in which all the details were carried out and being the owners of the best equipped athletic grounds on this side of the Atlantic.

Your committee beg to commend Geo. Crawford, the caretaker, for his interest and painstaking work in connection with the grounds.

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SHOOTING DEPARTMENT, 1888-89.

To the President and Directors of the M.A.A.A

GENTLEMEN:

This department has not been a progressive one since the formation of the Victoria Rifles' Armory, as the majority of the shooting members of the Association are also members of that institution, and when shooting indoors, would rather use the Morris Tube improvement provided at the Armory than the apparatus provided at the Gymnasium.

On inquiry, I find that this improvement on indoor shooting has given great satisfaction, and to make this department self-sustaining and satisfactory, it would be necessary to introduce the same; but I cannot recommend it, as it is rather an expensive apparatus and also on account of our non-military members not taking any interest in the Shooting Department.

I would recommend that the Shooting Gallery be removed, as in its present state it will never prove satisfactory, and the space it occupies could be utilized for another alley by the Bowling Department, which they greatly need.

The above members rendered valuable assistance in instructing the classes, and I have no doubt will appreciate the official badge issued to them.

I desire to place on record my appreciation of the hearty interest Mr. Doig has taken in the Gymnasium, and our success

during the past season, is, in a great measure, due to the efficient and painstaking manner in which the duties of Instructor have been discharged by him.

During the season, in addition to minor repairs and alterations, the following apparatus has been added to our equipment:—The Curved Ladder Plank and Ladders for the Pyramid Team. In the early part of the year the room above the corner of the stage was placed at the disposal of your Chairman, to be fitted up as a dressing room, and this, with the three already in use, provides sufficient accommodation.

On the 4th October, the opening Complimentary Exhibition was given by the members, and although handicapped by want of practice, the performance was very creditable. An interesting part of the programme was the instructive address delivered by Dr. J. C. Cameron, to whom a hearty vote of thanks was tendered.

The regular work of the classes commenced on the 6th October, and although our Toboggan Slide was again in operation, and a Carnival held during the winter, the attendance for the season has been very satisfactory, as the following statistics prove:—

The prizes and conditions of the annual competition, held as usual at the close of the season, were as follows:—

GYMNASTIC PRIZES.

1st Prize, Championship Medal, open to all members of the M. A. A. A.

2nd Prize Medal, open to members only who have attended twenty class nights.

4th. Prize Medal, restricted to members who have attended twenty class nights, and who have never won a prize for Gymnastics.

1st Prize Green Medal) For members of the class of 1888-89 2nd " who have never attended Gymnasium previously.

If a "Green" prize winner obtains a sufficient number of points to entitle him to a prize in the higher class, he has the option of taking either medal.

RULES.

1. Unless three-fourths of a possible score is obtained the "Championship" Medal will be withdrawn and the winner awarded 2nd Prize. Former winners in Gymnastics are debarred from winning the 4th Prize. Only members who have not, prior to October 1st, 1888, taken part in Gymnastic classes, are entitled to compete for the "Green Medals" and in the event of a "Green" competitor securing a place among the other prize-winners, shall be entitled to only one medal, as he may choose.

- 2. Only those members attending at least twenty regular classes during the season, shall be entitled to compete for medals, except in the case of the "Championship," to which no restrictions are attached, beyond those arising out of Rule 3. Entries free, and will close one week before date of competition.
- 3. All Competitors will be required to perform, in rotation, such exercises as may be selected by the judges, at their discretion, from a list furnished by the Instructor of those in use on the following apparatus:—Parallel Bars, Horizontal Bar, Rings, Inclined and Bridge Ladders, Curved Ladder Plank, Flying Trapeze and German Horse, also Jumping, Vaulting, Peg-Pole, Climbing Rope, and the regular class exercises with Dumb-Bells, Indian Clubs and Bar-Bells.

In addition, competitors will be allowed five minutes each for a series of advanced exercises of their own choosing, on each of the following apparatus, viz: Parallel Bars, Rings, and Horizontal Bar.

4. Three Judges, to be named by the Chairman, will have entire control of the Competition, subject to these rules, and their decision shall be final.

The Competition took place March 30th, and April 2nd, 4th and 6th.

The Judges were Messrs. Fred. W. Barlow, A. G. Gardner and Chas. Gwilt, to whom our hearty thanks are due for the very efficient manner in which they performed their arduous duties. The prizes were awarded as follows:—

Judges, A. G. GARDNER. CHAS GWILT.

The competition was very well contested, and for the first time in its history the Association has two Gymnastic Champions, Messrs. Gross and Rodden having tied for that coveted title. Recognizing the difficulty of arranging any additional competition, or series of exercises that would be equally fair to both contestants; duplicate medals were awarded by the Board of Directors.

Thursday evening, April 18th, our Gymnasium Hall was completely filled, on the occasion of the closing entertainment. An excellent programme was presented, the audience were enthusiastic, and greatly encouraged the performers by their hearty appreciation and applause. Special features were the Tumbling, Double Trapeze and Ladder Pyramids, the latter a reorganization of the well known team from the late Mr. Barnjum's Gymnasium. The Competition medals were presented to the successful winners by Messrs. S. M. Baylis, Jas. A. Taylor, F. M. Larmonth, W. J. Cleghorn, and W. A. Doig.

The thanks of the Association are due to Mr. Wm. Liddell for assistance rendered during the season, and especially in connection with the M. A. A. A. Ladder Pyramid Team.

The Fencing Club seems to have died of neglect—a matter to be sincerely regretted: This result may in a great measure be attributed to the fact that a number of the Club members who have heretofore taken an active interest in this branch of the department, were, from various causes unable to continue the work. In the early part of the season a competent instructor was secured, but unfortunately resigned almost immediately after, owing to his departure from the city, and no further action was taken by the members. The fine exercising room at their disposal, together with the previous record of the Club should have aroused sufficient interest to ensure its continuance. I can heartily endorse the hope expressed by my predecessor, "that the club will again be revived at an early date."

The Boxing classes under the tuition of Professor J. Latter

were continued during the past season, and were fairly well attended, but suffered from somewhat similar difficulties as those affecting the Fencing Club. I would recommend that additional facilities for practice among the members of these classes be provided for the coming season.

I cannot close this report without referring to the heavy loss Gymnastics and Athletics generally have sustained in the death of Mr. Fred. S. Barnjum. He might almost be called the father of Gymnastics in this city, certainly its oldest and most consistent advocate, and the estimation in which gymnastic exercise is at present held, is mainly due to his persistent and intelligent efforts for nearly a quarter of a century. His death will be sincerely mourned by none more than the large numbers of older members of this Association who have benefited by his training and friendship, and who owe much of their health and happiness to his earnest and untiring devotion to the cause of physical education, with which his name will always be associated.

REPORT OF THE SPORTS COMMITTEE. 1888.

To the Board of Directors of the M.A.A.A.

GENTLEMEN,

Owing to having no track of our own and the difficulty of making satisfactory arrangements for other grounds, it was decided to hold no races last season, and consequently your Out door Sports Committee have very little to report.

Mr. J. W. Moffat was sent to Detroit to represent the Association at the first Annual Games of the Amateur Athletic Union, held in that city on the 19th September. Unfortunately his entry had not been made in time, and he was not allowed to compete.

A. of A., held in New York City, on the 13th October, time 2 min. 2 1-5 sec., and on the 17th October, at Yonkers, N.Y., won a half mile handicap from scratch in 2.07, and at the games of Columbia College, held on the 26th October, he again won the half mile event in 2 min. 2-5 of a second.

The exceptionally wet weather of last fall interfered very much with our usual Hare and Hounds runs, and but three meetings were held.

With the completion of our track, which has received the unqualified praise of every runner who has seen it, and the comfortable quarters provided by our new club house, your committee look for a decided increase in the number of competitors at our Spring Games, and with a view to encouraging young runners, have arranged for a series of weekly handicap events, your committee would also recommend that at least a portion of the programme at the Annual Fall Meeting be composed of handicap races.

GENTLEMEN:

We regret that the Managing Committee's Report for the past season is not more encouraging.

The past two years' record has been anything but a satisfactory or successful one, mainly owing to the fact that we were without suitable grounds for practice, &c.

This drawback, we are happy to state, is now removed, and hope that the opening of the new M. A. A. A. Grounds with Club House thereon [which will have every accommodation for players and athletes in general] will effect a boom in the interest of our National Game, which of late has fallen somewhat in the estimation of many lovers of purely amateur sport.

At the Annual Convention of the N. A. L. A., held in Cornwall on 13th April last, Mr. A. W. Stevenson (of this Club) was elected President, and deserves great credit for his services in that capacity.

At our last Annual Meeting; the members present were almost unanimous that we should retire from the Champion-ship Series for the Season; the Committee, acting upon their suggestion withdrew, and do not regret having done so, as out of the four Clubs playing in the series, three (the Brockville,

Cornwall, and Ottawa) were brought to task for not complying with the laws and rules of the N.A.L.A., leaving the Shamrocks champions for 1889, as you are already aware.

A Committee from our Club were appointed to meet a like one from the Shamrock Club and endeavour to make arrangements for the use of their grounds, but were unsuccessful in effecting a settlement, and we again made use of the Exhibition Grounds, which had been secured for two years through the kindness of Mr. S. C. Stevenson.

We played our first match on the 24th May (vs. Cornwalls) on Exhibition Grounds, and were defeated by them three goals to one, our players being Messrs. A. L. Shanks, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, E. Sheppard, H. Drysdale, A. G. Gardner, A. Hodgson, W. D. Aird, T. L. Paton, W. Hodgson, W. Geraghty, *Captain*, Geo. Aird.

As we could only muster eleven players, the opposing team dropped one of theirs to equalize. The match was fairly well contested, the last game occupying over fifty minutes.

A match was arranged to take place on the 16th June with the Shamrocks for the benefit of the "Fresh Air Fund," but owing to some misunderstanding between Messrs. Graham & Co. (the organizers) and the Shamrock Club, it was postponed indefinitely.

On the 23rd June, at Exhibition Grounds, we received the Cambridge Team from Boston, and played a friendly match with them by the American time system (two half hours) defeating their team four games to one, the following representing our Club:—P. Gorman, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, A. L. Shanks, J. Paterson, A. Urquhart, S. G. Waldron, A. A. Hodgson, W. C.Hodgson, H. Drysdale, W. Geraghty, Captain, F. C. A. McIndoe.

The day was a very disagreeable one, and there not being a large attendance, the gross gate receipts (amounting to \$51) were handed them to help defray their expenses.

There being no other matches arranged, nothing of importance took place until September, when a "Fair" under the auspices of the M. A. A. A. was held in Victoria Rink; this club having a section, at which were for sale, fancy goods and useful articles, the whole realizing a considerable sum toward the object, viz: funds for the new grounds. We would take this opportunity to thank very kindly the members and their lady friends, who contributed in many ways to make the "Fair" the success it was.

Arrangements being completed for a return match with the Cambridge Club of Boston, a team from here played vs. them on the Union Baseball Grounds, Boston, 6th October, and defeated their team six goals to none. The following composing our team: A. G. Higginson, A. L. Shanks, N. Walsh, E. H. Brown, W. G. Ross, J. G. Ross, H. Cassils, F. H. Gardner, G. S. Low, A. A. Hodgson, W. C. Hodgson, W. Geraghty. Captain, Robt. Lloyd.

There was a very small attendance to witness the match, as it rained all day; the trip notwithstanding the weather was thoroughly enjoyed by the team, who were well treated during their short stay, by the Cambridge and Harvard Clubs.

Reference has been made to the new grounds, and as in all probability larger numbers will turn out to play, we would suggest to your incoming committee that they take action at once in forming a second team, or "Young Montreal Club," abundant material for which we have among our members, and it is hoped that good results will follow.

The Annual Convention of the N. A. L. A. will be held here on the 12th inst., and our committee deem it advisable that Senior Clubs, members of the Association, should so arrange that Junior Clubs shall have nothing to say in matters affecting them, as last year important changes proposed, pertaining solely to Senior Clubs were voted down by the Junior representatives.

In July last, we had the pleasure to receive from His Excellency, Lord Stanley of Preston, Governor-General of Canada, his acceptance of Honorary membership in this club.

During the season our team received invitations to visit and play in the following places:—Ottawa, Sherbrooke, Chicago, but were unable to accept any of them.

Messrs. Summerhayes & Walford have finished the composition picture, showing pavilion and part of old grounds, copies of which may now be had from them.



Your Committee is proud of the privilege of submitting the report for the tenth anniversary year, to this the eleventh annual meeting of the Montreal Bicycle Club.

We are now the second oldest Bicycle Club in America,—the Boston—of Boston being the oldest, the Bangor, Maine, now defunct, being second, and the Montreal third, closely followed by the San Francisco Club, eleven days later.

The season opened with a ride to Lachine on Saturday, April 28th, being attended by 23 members, and closed, owing to the continued wet weather on September 11th.

A great deal of interest has been taken in racing, both on the road and track, and a large number of interesting races have taken place. The principal event, as in the last season, has been the road race series for the Club Cup, presented by Messrs. F. G. and J. T. Gnaedinger, and prizes by several of the members.

The Club has now in its possession three racing machines for the use of members, two of them purchased by private subscriptions of the members, and the third a donation from Mr.

W. G. Ross. During the past three years we have been looking forward to and expecting a really first-class racing track, but that of the Shamrock Club proving a failure, at least for bicycling, it is not until now that we can claim to have one of the finest, and that all our own.

The Club mileage for the season was 656 miles, and the total attendance 549.

67 members turned out with the Club during the season, and an average of 10½ at each of the 52 rides held.

I beg to present the Sixth Annual Report of the Tuque Bleue Toboggan Club.

The past year cannot be regarded as a very favorable one, on account of the shortness of the season, and the scarcity of snow during the early part of the year.

It was the intention of your Committee to erect a slide on the new M.A.A.A. Grounds, but learning that the Montreal Toboggan Club did not intend organizing this year, negotiations were opened with their Committee and an offer of \$100.00 for the use of their hill and plant being accepted, we at once took steps to build additional chutes and make the necessary arrangements to accommodate our large membership.

His Excellency the Governor-General kindly consented to officially open the slide and honored us by appearing in full Club uniform. He was presented by your Committee with a very handsome toboggan as a souvenir of the occasion and a wish expressed that we might be honored with his presence on some future occasion when the natural slide was in good order.

The Annual Races were held on the afternoons of Friday and Saturday, Feb. 8th and 9th. The entries were large and the competition keen, resulting in the following securing 1st prizes:

GENTLEMEN,

It is with great pleasure that I place before you the Annual Report of the work done by the Club during the year 1888.

The past year has been successfully gone through without a defeat by both the 1st and 2nd fifteens.

Owing to want of grounds to practice on, no matches were played in the spring, with the exception of one practice game. namely: the Banks versus the rest of the Club, which ended in a win for the latter.

We played Queen's College, Kingston, for the first time in the annals of the Club, and it is to be trusted that this will become an annual fixture.

By an accident we were deprived of the services of our full back, Mr. W. C. Hodgson, in the second match of the season, and his loss was severely felt in our other matches.

Our Second Team played fewer matches than usual owing to the great want of grounds. Three were played by them, all of which were won, and thus securing for the second time in succession the Intermediate Championship.

The Third Team were not so successful, only winning the first match played, against Third McGill College, but were defeated by the Third Britannias in the second round of the Junior Championship.

These matches were held early in the season before our Third Team was properly organized, and it is hoped that next year they will have more success, as they have plenty of good material.

Foot-ball in Montreal seems to be gaining in popularity, and we are very glad to see a new Club taking such a high position as the Victorias, (which is composed largely of members of this Association) have done, in the Intermediate Championship,

There is still a good deal that can be done to make the game more interesting to spectators, and there is a feeling in the Club, that this lying on the ball in a scrimmage, should be put a stop to.

The M.A.A.A. Fair was held in September, and contrary to general expectation the Foot-Ball Club's table (thanks to the ladies who presided at it) was one of the most successful at the Fair.

We have to record the loss of our Vice-President, Robert Stirling, whose sad death by drowning is sorrowfully remembered by all. Although he had retired from the Foot-Ball field, yethe still took, as an office-bearer in the Club, an active interest in the game, of which he had been such a brilliant exponent.

The matches played during the past year were as follows,

October 13th vs. Ottawa City played on our new grounds, which owing to the rain were in a very bad condition; after a very pleasant match, resulted in our favor by a score of 25-0.

We were in this as in all other provincial matches without the services of our ex-Captain, R. Campbell.

October 20th vs. McGill, 1st championship match on the McGill grounds, resulting in our favor by 27-0. The ground was in splendid condition, and the speed of our backs, gained us an easy victory.

October 30th vs. Britannias, final for the Championship resulted in a win for us by 14-5. The new Grounds were in a frightful condition owing to the rain, but in spite of the ground the match was very open and splendidly contested. We did not play our full team owing to the absence of both R. Campbell and W. Hodgson.

November 5th vs. Queen's College, played on the Exhibition grounds, a draw, Queen's 2, Montreal 1.

November 15th vs. Ottawa College, for the Championship of Canada. This match which had been looked forward to with interest by the Club, was played on the Metropolitan grounds, Ottawa, and resulted in a draw. The match was one long scrimmage, all the work being done by our forwards, our backs hardly touching the ball during the whole match. Early in the game F. Mathewson got hurt, and his place was well filled by W. Clouston.

Our 2nd fifteen matches were as follows:-

October 20th vs. Lennoxville, won by 4-1. A protest was lodged by Lennoxville, but not sustained by the Quebec Union.

November 3rd vs. Victoria, won by 4-1. The final for the Intermediate Championship, a hard and evenly contested game.

November 15th vs. Ottawa City, won by 6-o.

October 6th vs. McGill 3rd, won by 5-o.

' 13th vs. Britannia 3rd, lost by 11-1.

The Club has played five 1st fifteen matches, winning three, and the other two being draws, scoring 67 points against their opponents 7.

It is almost a certainty that the continuance of these interesting performances depends upon some such plan being adopted and supported. It is hoped that when the Committee lay their plan before the members, they will show their appreciation of the efforts the Dramatic Club are making for their entertainment, by giving it their hearty support.

. To the President and Directors of the M.A.A.A.

GENTLEMEN,

The M. A. A. Fair held in aid of our New Grounds, may be safely called one of the most interesting events in the history of the Association. During its progress from September 25th to 29th, the Victoria Rink was fairly transformed, and was an inspiriting sight, presenting a scene of busy activity that will not soon be forgotten by those who attended. It is doubtful if any enterprise of a similar nature ever achieved such a marked success, in proportion to the outlay, as that which characterized this most successful undertaking.

A résumé of the inception and organization may prove of service in affording hints for a similar event. At a meeting of the Canvassing Committee held May 3rd, it was decided to hold a Fair in aid of the new grounds, and the President and Hon.-Secretary of the Executive were elected, with full power to proceed with the organization. The first step was the enlisting of the many tried lady friends of the Association, and the choosing of a Chairman and Lady President for each club or branch of the Association, with power to select as many assistants as they deemed necessary. The Chairman of the various clubs or sections, ten in number, with nine representatives from the Canvassing Committee forming the Executive, their first meeting was held May 30th, and from that on, the scheme developed.

Before the summer holidays everything was well under way, and at most of the summer resorts groups of "Fair Workers" could be seen. As an example of the magnitude the Fair ultimately assumed, it may be stated that the members of committees actually engaged in the various sections during the afternoons and evenings numbered three hundred,—two hundred ladies and one hundred gentlemen.

The original idea of publishing a literary souvenir of the Fair, containing articles exclusively the work of our own members was carried out. The work was edited by Messrs. S. M. Baylis and Will. H. Whyte, published under their supervision, and named "Athletic Leaves." Apart from the interesting matter contained in the pages, the book itself was very creditable, being printed on heavy toned paper, illustrated in artotype, with a special and handsomely designed cover. "Leaves" were contributed by Dr. W. Geo. Beers, Messrs. Geo. Iles, Hugh W. Becket, "Luke Sharp," Carl Fuller, S. M. Baylis and Will. H. Whyte, poems by Messrs. W. D. Lighthall, Arthur Weir, O'Hara Baynes and "Luke Sharp." The work was unique in its way, and it is safe to say will be kept as an interesting souvenir.

A considerable addition to the funds resulted from the two concerts given under the auspices of the Entertainment Committee. The first an evening concert in the Gymnasium Hall, June 28th, and the second "The cruise of H. M. S. "Tuque Bleue," a nautical concert in the Victoria Armory Hall, Sept. 20th and 21st; they were both rich musical treats, ably managed and conducted by Mr. W. A. Coates, chairman Entertainment Committee.

On September 21st, in reply to a request from the Executive, a letter was received stating that their Excellencies the Governor-General and the Lady Stanley of Preston, would gladly allow the M. A. A. A. Fair to be announced as being held under their patronage. An honor that was much appreciated.

The Fair was formally opened by Sir Donald A. Smith, on the afternoon of Tuesday, September 25th, congratulatory addresses were also delivered by the Rev. Jas. Barclay and the Rev. Canon Ellegood. A large number of invitations were issued, and a great many responded, amongst whom were Messrs. Duncan McIntyre, R. B. Angus, Jonathan Hodgson, Ald. Rich. White, and Ald. D. Wilson, who evinced great interest in the objects of the Fair. Many ex-officers and old members were also present, and took an active interest.

Owing to the lateness of the season, and the various disadvantages which we had to contend with, made it impossible for us to make any further attempt to play for the Champion-ship,


