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Trinity College School.

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened May 1st, 1865. In consequence of the liberal offers of assistance made by the inhabitants of Port Hope, during the summer of 1868, the School was removed to that town, where it was established in buildings provided by the townspeople, free of rent for three years. Early in 1871, this property; consisting of ten acres of land, together with the buildings upon it, and situated on one of the most picturesque sites in Canada, was purchased by The erection of large permanent buildthe School. ings, designed by H. Macdougall, Esq., Architect, Toronto, was then proceeded with. They are intended to furnish accommodation for about seventy-five boarders, with apartments for Masters, Matron, and Servants, and will be ready for occupation at the commencement of Michaelmas Term. The School is under the control of the Corporation of Trinity College, which exercises its powers through a committee appointed in the year 1866, under the title of the Governing Body.

The following Rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th., 1870:—

"The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for Books, or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a week after a Boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the Parent, or Guardian for the amount (with Bank charges), at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the Boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

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BOARDING.

Boarders will be received into the New School-House, a building furnished with bath rooms and all other appliances which can promote the comfort and health of the Boys. It is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by three resident Masters. The household arrangements are directed by a Lady Matron of ability and experience.

TERMS.

The School year is divided into three terms of about thirteen weeks each:—

Michaelmas Term, 1871, from September 20, to December 20.

Lent Term, 1872, from January 13, to April 11. Trinity Term, 1872, from April 24, to July 20.

VACATIONS.

Two weeks at Easter; eight weeks at Midsummer; three weeks at Christmas.

By the kindness of the Railway authorities, returntickets for one fare are issued for the holidays, on the Grand Trunk Railway; and for one fare and a quarter on the Great Western Railway.

EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations are held at the end of the Christmas and Summer half-years; the Midsummer Examination being conducted by the Professors of Trinity College. Removes are made only after these Examinations.

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General Proficiency prizes are given at Christmas and Midsummer to the Head Boy of each Form; in the 2nd and 3rd Divisions of the First Form these prizes are given at Midsummer by Mr. C. Logan, of Trinity College.

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To the friends of Church Education in the Diocese of Toronto and elsewhere.

7. Forms.

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The Governing Body of Trinity College School, in appealing to the liberality of Churchmen for aid in the erection of the new School Building at Port Hope, desire to bring under their notice the following facts:

This School, since its establishment, has been a thoroughly Church School. Each class receives religious instructions on every school day; a selection from the daily service of the Church is used morning and evening; and on Sundays and Saints' days there is a service for the boys in the School Chapel. the six years which have elapsed since the opening of the School, 135 boys have entered and left; and of these 22 have matriculated in Trinity College. it is mentioned that the whole number of matriculants during that period has been 66, the great advantage the School has already been to the College will be apparent. It may also be noticed that at this time the highest Scholarship of £50 is held in each of the three years by an ex-pupil of the School.

The erection of new buildings, and the providing of increased accommodation, have long been felt as serious wants; and since the appointment, in July last year, of the present Head Master, the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, have become imperatively necessary, as will appear from the increase of the School. The number of boarders during Michaelmas Term, 1870, was 28; it is for this term, (Easter, 1871) 38; and the applications for next term already received seem to indicate a number which

will require arrangements of a very different nature to be made for their reception to those which have been hitherto of a necessarily temporary character.

These considerations have induced the Governing Body of the School to commence the erection of a large building, which will cost, when complete, over \$14,000, in the confident expectation that the generous aid which has been extended to the establishment of the Church Schools of the neighbouring Dioceses of Huron and Ontario will not be found wanting in the large and wealthy Diocese of Toronto.

Of the ultimate success of Schools of this character, when judiciously administered, there can be no question. Even in England, where the munificence of past generations has made such noble provision for higher education, very many schools of this kind have been established during the last twenty years, and additions are made to their number every few months; while in Canada, where the status of the Grammar Schools is in so many instances lowered by their union with the Common Schools, some institutions of a higher class are required, looking at the question merely from an educational, and not from a moral or religious, point of view.

Since the foundation and endowment of Trinity College, another generation has grown up, who, in their turn, ought to do something for the cause of Church Education. And surely Churchmen in general, and Trinity men in particular, will not grudge somewhat of their means and time to forward the erection of a

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School which is of such vital importance to the Church and the College; for supposing its numbers only reach 100, a yearly average of 8 or 10 matriculants might fairly be expected; and with that as a nucleus, others would be attracted, and the numbers of the College largely increased.

The new building is in the Elizabethan style, of red and white brick, 100 feet long, with an average width of 47 feet, and forms part of a uniform plan, which can hereafter be extended if found necessary. The accommodation thus provided will be sufficient for four masters, the matron and servants, and about eighty boarders. The buildings used at present will then supply a good house for the Head Master and his family, detached Class-rooms, and a temporary Chapel.

The contract price of this building is \$13,000; and the following additional expenses must be provided for: Payment for the Site, \$500; Architect's commission, heating apparatus, wood shed, &c., \$1,000; in all \$14,500. From the annexed statement of sub. scriptions, it will appear that \$8,512, or more than half the sum required, has been secured.

To obtain the remainder, this appeal is now made, and the Governing Body trust that it may meet with that response from the liberality of the members of our Communion which the success the School has already met with deserves, and that they may be supported in their endeavours to place on a firm and permanent basis an institution which will be of inestimable value

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to the Church, sending out year by year a body of young men trained up in the honourable system of the English Public Schools, instructed in the doctrines of our Church, and thus prepared to prove themselves her faithful and attached sons.
