# MINUTES

OF THE

## TORONTO CONFERENCE,

HELD IN THE TOWN OF BRAMPTON, ONT.,

JUNE 10th to 17th, 1886.

THE THIRD SESSION of the TORONTO CONFERENCE was opened in St. Paul's Church, Brampton, on Thursday, June 10th, 1886, beginning with the Conference prayer-meeting, lasting one hour.

The President, Rev. WM. BRIGGS, D.D., occupied the chair.

Rev. J. F. German, M.A., called the roll, when 136 ministers and 87 laymen responded to their names.

The President presented the report of the Transfer Committee, as follows:—

*To the Conference*—D. C. Clappison (Superannuated), Samuel Tucker (Superannuated), James C. Slater (Superannuated), Benjamin Longley, George Leach.

*From the Conference*—Samuel P. Rose, J. F. Ockley, Wm. P. McHaffie.

The ballot was then cast for President, whereupon the Rev. J. F. GERMAN, M.A., was elected.

The ballot was next cast for Secretary, and resulted in the election of Rev. WM. PIRRITE.

The hours of meeting and adjournment were fixed as follows:—Meet at 9 a.m., adjourn at 12 noon; meet at 2 p.m., adjourn at 5 p.m.

The Secretary nominated Mr. JOHN T. MOORE and Rev. J. J. REDDITT Assistant Secretaries, and Rev. E. BARRASS, M.A., Journal Secretary.

On motion of Rev. H. S. MATTHEWS, seconded by Rev. N. R. WILLOUGHBY, it was resolved that the Superintendents of Districts should meet and nominate one minister and one layman from each District, who shall constitute a Nominating Committee.

Rev. W. S. BLACKSTOCK and Mr. JOHN N. LAKE were appointed Conference Letter-writers.

## OBITUARIES.

## REV. JAMES EDGAR, M.D.

The Rev. James Edgar was born in Ancaster, near Dundas, Ont., December 9th, 1822, and entered into his eternal rest on Wednesday morning, April 28th, 1886, in the 64th year of his age.

He did not enjoy in early life all the advantages which fall to the lot of the youth of to-day, but even under the unfavorable circumstances in which he was placed he developed a taste for study and the love of books which clearly indicated that his course in life was to be literary rather than manual.

He prepared himself while young for the work of a public school-teacher, and was diligently pursuing the duties of that laborious class of public benefactors when God met him in the way and called him to the knowledge of His Son.

His conversion to God, in a special service conducted by the late Rev. Thomas Adams, was the great event of his life, for to him the chief end of being born was to be born again. All worldly distinctions were cold and devoid of charm unless they were lighted with the beams that shine from the Saviour's face. His conviction of sin was so deep, his abhorrence of sin was so genuine, his appeal for pardon at the mercy-seat so sincere, that he immediately experienced the joy arising from peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

The wonderful transformation which had now taken place in his life was so unmistakably clear and well-defined that never after was there a doubt in his mind of the all-sufficiency of the atonement of Christ to cleanse the soul from all sin.

In looking into his "dear old Bible," as he was wont to call it, may be seen this passage, 1 John 1:7, "And the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin," deeply underlined and followed by the word *all*; and at the top of the page is written, "*Cleanseth me—James Edgar—from all sin—God says all—shall I say part? No. No. Glory to God forever.*"

He had chosen the practice of medicine as his profession before his conversion, and made very considerable progress in the study of that science. Yet when the call came, "Go work in My vineyard," he was obedient to the heavenly calling and entered into the ministry. But his strong conviction and broad views of the Christian's duty to relieve the sufferings and sorrows of humanity, in whatever form found, led him not to abandon wholly the practice of medicine. Having chosen the work of the ministry he sought to catch the spirit of his Master, and with a commendable self-forgetfulness and zeal he devoted himself to the duties of his calling. He entered the ministry of the Primitive Methodist Church in the year 1846, and from the first gave proof of eminent talents and devout piety. Two brief extracts will reveal to us his inner life and the sacred communings and covenants of his soul with God:—

"December 9th, 1873. Under a solemn sense of my deep indebtedness to God I here place on record my sincere gratitude to my Heavenly Father for all His mercy and kindness to me and mine. I thank Thee, O God, for Thy boundless mercy and kindness, Thy wonderful grace, and Thy pardoning favor. I look to the atonement of Jesus Christ my Lord for pardon, purity and eternal life. Here in Thy sight I surrender back to Thee Thy own—my time, my talents, my soul—all that is mine—to be used for Thy glory in Thy service. Lord, help me—Christ, help me—Holy Spirit, help me—Amen. I complete my forty-ninth year to-day. Praise God. Amen.

JAMES EDGAR."

Eleven years later we find the record—

" 'Safely through another year,  
God has led me on my way.'

"I stand and survey the past—hazy and dreamy, full of dangers and difficulties, but through all God has led me safely. Ten thousand blessings I have enjoyed, temporal and spiritual, and still they come regularly and bountifully. I take thy light yoke and easy burden, O Christ. I trust in the merits of Jesus only. No prayers, no tears, no vows or promises—Jesus only. I leave all with Thee, O blessed Saviour.

"December 9th, 1884.

J. E."

As a preacher he was powerful and persuasive. He rarely preached without being moved to tears by the solemn truths he uttered, and seldom without moving others to tears also. Being carried away with the sacred theme himself, others caught the same spirit, and often the cry of the penitent for pardon, or the believer's shout for joy was heard during the preaching of the Word. Often when he preached at field and camp-meetings thousands were moved by his appeals, as the leaves of the forest are moved by the wind.

He occupied the best pulpits it was in the power of his Conference to bestow: Brampton, Etobicoke, Kingston, Portland, and Toronto shared the benefit of his labors, and the fact that he filled the third term in some of these places is a sufficient proof of the love in which he was held by his people. So acceptable were his services that he was in frequent demand for special church enterprises, and his name everywhere was "as ointment poured forth."

He was quiet and retiring in his disposition and had no ambition for prominence. He never sought office, yet when elected to the presidential chair he performed its duties with a courtesy and grace that won the admiration of his brethren. As a man he was manly, pure, and noble. He loved nature; especially did he love man. No wail of human woe broke upon his ear without awakening sympathy. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, clothed the naked.

He hoped for the ultimate triumph of the good in man, and labored to that end. His motto, as found on a fly-leaf in his Bible, was: "Do all the good you can, in all ways you can, to all the persons you can, and as long as you can," with the word "long" doubly underlined; and this was the law of his life.

With unwearied feet and loving heart he exhausted himself in the service of others, and only "ceased at once to work and live." His place and the mode of his being have changed, but the heir of immortality lives on forever. It was this blessed thought that led him to write after that beautiful scripture in 1 John 2:17, "The world passeth away, and the lusts thereof, but he that doeth the will of God abideth forever," the words "Hallelujah—forever." It was the prophetic voice of triumph, the shout of the victor as he dropped the sword to seize the crown.

"Servant of God, well done,  
Rest from thy loved employ;  
The battle fought, the victory won,  
Enter thy Master's joy."

#### REV. THOMAS CROMPTON.

Thomas Crompton was born in Bury, Lancashire, England, in the year 1817. He was reared amid the influences of a Christian home, and at the age of thirteen was savingly converted. He immediately began to work for God, and manifested such grace and ability that while yet but a youth of sixteen he was licensed as a local preacher. Soon from the churches there came such a good report of his labors that he was called out into the work of the ministry. This was received as the voice of God, and when but eighteen years of age he was admitted on trial by the English Primitive Methodist Conference and sent to Leeds, at that time a very important station. He was of very youthful appearance, and the first impression of a congregation was one of surprise at seeing in the pulpit

so young a person. That surprise, however, soon gave place to admiration as they listened to his matured thought and eloquent appeals. In 1839 he married Martha Blackburn, a saintly soul, whose presence cheered him in his pilgrimage through life. Thirteen years of laborious toil were spent in England, during which time he occupied several of the foremost stations in the Church and gathered blessed and abundant harvests for the Master. In 1854, when completing his second term in the city of York, he was asked to go to Canada. Obedient to the voice of the Church he came to this western world and was stationed in the city of Kingston. His term there was marvellously successful, a single revival adding more than two hundred to the Church. For some years he edited, with great satisfaction to the Church, *The Christian Journal*. In 1871, after thirty-six years of consecrated toil, he retired from the active work and spent the remainder of his life in Barrie. For many years he had been opposed to Methodist union, but believing the last movement to be of the Lord he ardently supported it and became an active member of the Union Committee. He was a man of many sterling excellencies. With a robust physical frame he combined great decision of purpose and an intellect strong, active, and clear, to a remarkable degree. He was an original thinker, always vigorous, often profound. A pithy and trenchant writer, he contributed many valuable articles to the English *Christian Ambassador*, and wrote a meritorious volume on the Agency of the Church. The end of life came to him unexpectedly. He was on a visit to his daughter in the city of Hamilton. He was somewhat ill on Saturday, though still expecting to preach on the following Sunday; but a mansion of glory was ready, and a crown was awaiting, and the Master called him to the coronation. The end was but the peaceful sunset of a busy and blessed day. When spoken to of heaven, his eye kindled and his countenance became radiant with holy joy at the thought of being welcomed by scores of redeemed souls whom he had won for Christ. On the 24th of April he died peacefully, leaving behind him a bright testimony and a useful life. As we contemplate the repose of this aged saint we are reminded of the prophet's words, "Thy sun shall no more go down, neither shall thy moon withdraw itself, for the Lord shall be thine everlasting light, and the days of thy mourning shall be ended."

#### REV. WILLIAM McFADDEN.

This esteemed minister was a native of Ireland. When twelve years of age he immigrated with his father's family to Canada, which was henceforth his adopted country, and to which he was always ardently attached. The Ottawa Valley became his home, where he received such an education as was to be obtained at the public schools. The Methodist itinerants found their way to the neighborhood, and under their earnest labors Mr. McFadden was led to the Saviour, and soon cast in his lot with the "people called Methodists." No sooner had he become a new creature in Christ Jesus than he became solicitous about the salvation of others. A better evidence he could not give that he had passed from death unto life. Some who had known him from his youth were, through his instrumentality, brought into the way of salvation. Believing that he possessed gifts, graces and fruit, the late Rev. Thomas Madden recommended that he should be received as a candidate for the ministry. Accordingly, at the Conference of 1832 he was received on trial and appointed to the Augusta Circuit. Here for twelve years he had been a resident; here, also, he was converted, and here he began his labors as an itinerant minister. The years of his probation were spent on the Augusta, Hull, and Mississippi Circuits, all of which were hard fields of labor, but he never hesitated throughout the whole of his ministerial career to go where he was sent.

In 1837 he was received into full connexion with the Conference and ordained. The Ordination Class of that year consisted of seven members, of whom the Revs. Dr. Rose and J. K. Williston are now the only survivors.

After ordination Mr. McFadden was placed in charge of the Rideau Circuit, where he labored for three years. He was then appointed successively to Peterboro', Port Hope, Consecon, Napanee, and Picton, all of which were extensive Circuits and required a great amount of labor. In all those places our beloved brother gave good proof of his ministry. Not by any attempts at sensationalism, but by diligence in the discharge of his duties, and plain, practical expositions of the Word, he sought to care well for the flock of which the Holy Ghost had made him overseer.

In 1853 Mr. McFadden was appointed Chairman of a District, which important office he occupied eleven years. He ruled well, but he always ruled in love. His brethren and the people generally regarded him as deserving of respect, esteemed him very highly in love for his work's sake.

During the latter part of Mr. McFadden's ministry he was stationed on several other important Circuits, in all of which his memory is precious. Having been an itinerant minister uninterruptedly for forty years, he was constrained to ask for a superannuated relation. After the District Meeting at which he preferred his request, a brother minister accompanied him home. He wept during most of the journey, and felt sad at leaving the work he so much loved. Shortly after his superannuation he buried the wife of his youth, which was a severe trial for him.

During his retirement from the active work he was employed to fill vacancies, and until within a few years of his death he preached frequently on his own old Circuits or in the neighbourhood of Brampton, where for fifteen years he resided.

For some time previous to his death his health was very precarious, and occasionally his sufferings were most excruciating. In all his affliction he never complained nor murmured at the intensity of his sufferings. In patience he possessed his soul, and while he did not profess to feel great rapture, he always expressed himself as having constant peace. Our beloved brother died December 7, 1885, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry.

#### REV. ISAAC B. HOWARD.

Among the many ministers of the Methodist Church who have recently departed this life, none held a higher place in the confidence and esteem of his brethren, and few, if any, have been more honored of God as the instruments in the conversion of sinners and the edification of believers, than the Rev. Isaac Brock Howard. He was born in the neighborhood of Grimsby, in this province, April 26th, 1818. Converted in Walsingham, Talbot District, in the autumn of 1837; entered the itinerant work at the special Conference of 1840; was received into full connexion and ordained in 1844; and finished his course with joy, and the ministry he had received from the Lord Jesus, at the residence of his son-in-law, Judge McDougal, in the city of Toronto, on the 31st of January last.

Being the son of a pious mother, by whom he was early instructed in the elementary principles of religion, and being naturally of a studious and thoughtful turn of mind, he appears to have been from his childhood the subject of profound religious impressions. He could not recollect the time when the Spirit of God began to strive with him and to make him feel, as he tells us, that the course which he was pursuing, if persisted in, would lead him to ruin. It was not, however, until he had reached his twentieth year that he became the subject of that Divine change which gave coloring to the whole of his after life. His conversion, which was preceded by deep conviction of sin and thorough repentance, was clearly marked. When, after many weeks of earnest seeking, accompanied by strong crying and tears, the Sun of Righteousness arose upon his soul with healing in His wings, old things instantly passed away, and all things became new. "Every cloud, every doubt, every fear," as

he tells, "was in that moment removed." He was indeed a new creature, and had entered upon a new life.

His call to the ministry was as distinct and strongly marked as his conversion. His devotion of himself to this office and work was not matter of choice but of necessity. He had from the beginning of his religious life by far too profound a conviction of the arduous character of the sacred calling, and of the tremendous responsibilities connected with it, to allow him to entertain the idea of entering into it uncalled of God. Mr. Spurgeon is reported to have said that no man ought to enter the ministry if by any possibility consistent with a good conscience he could keep out of it. And it is now evident that if by any means short of his disobedience to what he believed to be the will of God, Mr. Howard could have escaped from the work, he would have done so. But the hand of God was heavy upon him. His worldly prospects were blighted. He was sorely chastened by affliction. The result of this sharp discipline was that he submitted himself absolutely, irrevocably, and eternally to God; and in humble dependence upon the promised presence of the Master he addressed himself cheerfully and earnestly to what he now perceived to be his Divinely appointed life work.

Having put his hand to the Gospel plough he never looked back. Henceforth he was pre-eminently a man of one work. All his energies were concentrated upon the attainment of that one grand end for which the Church exists and the ministry has been instituted, the glory of God in the salvation of souls. His sermons gave evidence of careful preparation, and, as instruments for awakening of sinners and stimulating the spiritual life of believers, they were eminently effective. Both the matter of his discourses and the manner of their delivery conveyed the impression to every one who heard him that he was thoroughly in earnest. His aim was not to furnish his hearers with an intellectual treat, or an artistic entertainment, but to pluck such of them as were unsaved as brands from the burning, and to lead the saved to a more intimate fellowship and communion with God, and to a more consistent and useful life. In his case, however, it was the unction that made the preacher. His Gospel came to those who heard him not in word only, "but in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance."

Mr. Howard excelled especially as a pastor. He preached the Gospel in public, and from house to house. Like his Divine Master, he went about doing good. Like Him, too, he felt that his mission was to seek and to save that which was lost. And it is difficult to determine which was the more efficient, his public or his private ministrations. There were many things about him which contributed to his eminent success in pastoral duty. He was pre-eminently a Christian gentleman. His manners, the style of his conversation, and his entire deportment were in strict harmony with his profession. Above all there was a naturalness and ease about his conversation on the subject of personal religion which never failed to impress those who heard him with the idea that this was a matter with which he was habitually and thoroughly familiar.

Physically, Mr. Howard was never a strong man, and nothing but his joyous spirit—the result of a heart fully consecrated and sanctified by Divine grace—and the system and method which he carried into the detail of every department of his work, enabled him to accomplish what he did, and to continue his labors successfully for so many years. As it was he was forced into retirement by failing health while he was yet comparatively young. But though he was compelled to accept a superannuated relation nine years ago, he lost none of his interest in the cause to which he had, in his early manhood, consecrated his life. His closing years were among the most fruitful of his ministry. Even when as an invalid he was led to seek a temporary home in Southern California, in that distant part of the continent he found work to do for the Master; and the fruit of his ministry in that region showed that he had lost none of the power which attended his labors in former times and in other fields. He was the chief instrument in more than one revival of religion during his residence

on the Pacific Coast; and there is good reason to believe that not a few will thank God through eternity that the consecrated invalid had ever come among them.

He returned to Canada a few months ago with apparently restored health, and rejoicing in the prospect of aiding the cause which he loved so ardently, for some years to come. But as the event proved, he had only come home to die. In the closing months of last year symptoms began to develop which proved to be prophetic of the end. The entries in his diary during the month of December, though hopeful, are indicative of constantly failing strength. They are full, however, of gratitude to God for past and present mercies, and of joyful acquiescence in the dispensations of Divine Providence. When the summons came and he felt that he must die, he contemplated the end with composure, and even with joyfulness. One of the last entries in his journal was in these words: "I know that I am a great sinner; but I am pardoned, adopted, saved. I know that God loves me and delights to bless me; I know that for me to live is Christ, to die would be gain. I thank God that He has taken from me both the fear of dying and of death." And in this delightful state of mind, on the last day of the first month of this year, he passed peacefully away to be forever with the Lord. He rests from his labors, but his works do follow him.

#### REV. JOHN DOUSE.

In the death of the Rev. John Douse, which occurred in the city of Toronto on the 8th of May last, another prominent figure has disappeared from the Methodism of this country. Few of his brethren were better known or more highly respected than he was; and though he belonged to a past generation, and had been for some years laid aside from the active work of the ministry, his removal has left a blank which will not be soon filled.

Mr. Douse was a native of Yorkshire, England. He was born in Hull on the 8th of October, 1801. Little is known of his early history beyond the fact that he appears to have received the best literary training that the schools of his native town could afford, and that while he was yet a youth he became the subject of that great spiritual change in which was laid the foundation of that strongly-marked and eminently consistent religious character which he maintained up to the time of his decease. From the time of his conversion, if not earlier in life, he seems to have had the impression that he was Divinely called to the office and work of the ministry; and though he did not enter upon this work until later in life than most of his brethren, he never lost sight of it. In the meantime he devoted himself to teaching, and exercised his gifts in the various spheres of usefulness which opened to him, as a leader, exhorter, and a local preacher. In all these positions he labored with a conscientious fidelity which won for him the admiration of the ministers of the several Circuits on which he resided, and made him the instrument of good to many. At Paterington, at Leeds, and Sheffield, as well as in his own native town, he won for himself the reputation of a thoroughly devoted and consistent Christian, and a conscientious and useful officer in the Church.

It was not, however, until 1834 that the way seemed to be fully open for his entering upon what he had long believed to be his Divinely predestinated life-work. In that year, having been previously accepted by the English Conference for the missionary work, he had Canada assigned to him as the field of his future labors. He was received on trial for the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada of that year, and appointed to the Indian Mission on the Grand River. And as a mark of the estimation in which he was held, and in order to meet the exigencies of the peculiar department of the work to which he was appointed, he was ordained at the end of one year. In 1838 he was received into full connexion and appointed to the Indian Mission on the River St.



Clair. But though five years of Mr. Douse's early ministry were devoted to this kind of work, his ability as a preacher, his fidelity as a pastor, and his eminent business capacity soon created a demand for him in the most important stations in the country. Accordingly we find him during the greater part of his ministry at such places as Cobourg, Belleville, Hamilton, Kingston, Toronto, Barrie, London, Guelph, Ottawa. For fifteen years he filled the office of Chairman of a District; and in 1858 he was elected to the office of Co-Delegate, at that time the highest office in the gift of the Conference. Not the least important of the services rendered to the Church during the fifty-two years of his ministry was the careful attention which he bestowed upon the Superannuated Ministers' Fund during the twenty-three years that he acted as its Treasurer.

Mr. Douse was wont to say that he made no pretensions to being a great man, but he did aim at being a faithful man; and in this saying we have set forth one of the most essential elements of his character. There was a conscientious painstaking thoroughness about everything he did which could scarcely be surpassed. His habits of diligent and careful study formed early in life continued with him to the end. It may be well doubted whether he ever gave much time to the lighter sort of literature which requires little or no attention and thought. He preferred works the mastery of which required vigorous and robust exercise of the mind. One of the very last books that he read, and read too with evident appreciation and enjoyment, when he was eighty-five years of age, was "Whedon on the Will."

Mr. Douse never brought unbeaten oil to the sanctuary. His sermons were carefully prepared. Even the selection of the themes which he discussed in the pulpit cost him more solicitude and thought than many preachers bestow upon the entire process of pulpit preparation. Only a short time before his death he declared, in the Toronto Ministerial Association, that, though he had suffered severe domestic bereavement, in which his heart had been severely lacerated, he had not suffered as much from this, and from all other causes put together, anything at all comparable with the agony he had felt in preparing for his public ministrations.

He was no less painstaking in the discharge of pastoral duty. The quarterly visitation of the classes and renewal of the tickets, as conducted by him, involved a searching inquiry into the spiritual state of every member of the society. In this he was a model of fidelity. And, being a man of fine business ability, everything connected with the temporalities of his stations and districts, when he filled the office of Chairman, was attended to with the utmost exactitude. The admirable manner in which he looked after the interests of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund during the twenty-three years that he acted as its Treasurer is too well known to require particular mention.

Mr. Douse was a typical Englishman. He never affected the characteristics of a fine gentleman. He preferred the brusque manners which are said to be a peculiarity of his countrymen. On this account he was liable to be misunderstood by those who had not the advantage of an extended acquaintance with him. But underneath a comparatively rough exterior, he had all the elements of a true gentleman. He was above all a thoroughly honest man. "To err is human," and Mr. Douse was not exempt from the common infirmity of the race; but he was morally incapable of intentionally wronging any man. The refinement and delicacy of his feelings, and the tenderness and strength of his affections found full expression only amid the sanctities of his own home, and in the sick room, the house of mourning, and other scenes of suffering into which he was brought in the discharge of his pastoral duties.

He died at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Henry Hough, under whose roof he found a home during the later months of his life. His last illness was very brief. In his last hours he was Divinely sustained by the presence of the Master, and his end was peace.

*Resolved*,—That special papers be prepared for Port Simpson District; that the Secretary inform the examiners of the papers required, and that they be sent out in manuscript in October.

*Resolved*,—That in view of the demands of the age, the great educational advantages for those desiring them, we recommend this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to enact (1) that the standard of

the preliminary course of study be raised to that of matriculation in a university, this law to take effect in the examinations of April, 1888; (2) that when a probationer has taken the degree of B.A., and also the degree of B.D., he shall be received into full connexion and ordained when he has spent two years in Circuit work, provided he has been on probation for four years, one year being allowed for the degree of B.A., and one for the degree of B.D.; (3) that when a probationer has taken his degree of B.A. before his reception on trial, he shall be received into full connexion and ordained after having travelled three years.

*Resolved*,—That grading of certificates by classes be abolished, and that forty per cent. be required to pass in any subject of any year, the grade being shown by the average per cent.

*Resolved*,—That at next examination a separate room for the examiners be arranged for, and that no persons be permitted to remain in the room where the examinations are held except those who are supervising the examination.

*Resolved*,—That if a candidate or probationer fail in any examination he shall be allowed a supplemental examination at any time and under such supervision as the Board shall direct, special papers to be prepared and the candidates to pay the expenses of the examination.

*Resolved*,—That when a candidate presents a certificate of matriculation in any Canadian university, or a first or a second-class certificate as teacher of a public school from any Board in any Province of the Dominion entitled to grant the same, he shall be entitled to be exempted from examination in any subject in the preliminary course that is so certified to have been taken.

*Resolved*,—That Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D., be appointed Examiner for the Theological College at Cobourg;

That Rev. G. M. Meacham, D.D., be appointed Examiner for the Theological College at Montreal;

That Rev. J. E. Sanderson, M.A., be appointed a member of the Board for Alma College;

That Rev. T. W. Jolliffe and Rev. J. Van Wyck, B.A., be appointed representatives to the Board of Albert College;

That Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D., be appointed Chairman, and Rev. G. Washington be appointed Secretary, of the Board of Examiners for the current year.

Your Committee would strongly recommend that subscriptions as well as collections be taken up at all our appointments on behalf of this fund.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT AND EQUALIZATION OF MINISTERS' SALARIES.

Said Committee was appointed last Conference, as per printed Minutes, pp. 75.

Your Committee beg to make the following recommendations for the General Conference:—

1. That each Annual Conference shall be authorized to establish a Sustentation Fund for the purpose of aiding ministers on weak Circuits.

2. The Fund shall be supported by annual collections and subscriptions, taken on a given Sabbath, say, the first or second Sabbath in October, in all our congregations, and each minister and probationer shall be requested to preach a sermon on the said Sabbath, on the subject of Ministerial Support.

3. The Fund shall be disbursed during the Sessions of Conference by a committee consisting of an equal number of ministers and laymen.

4. The Committee shall consider every case of deficiency where the minister has received less than \$750, including all his receipts, except house rent.

5. No minister shall be entitled to receive assistance from this Fund if he has not taken the collection and made an earnest appeal for liberal contributions from his congregation or congregations.

6. That with a view to stimulate Circuits to a more liberal and generous support of their ministers, the Superintendent of each District, and if possible, a layman accompanying him, shall visit every delinquent Circuit, and meet the official members at the first or second Official Quarterly Meeting, and try to induce them to be more liberal in their contributions. The Superintendent should also preach on the Sabbath, and appeal to the congregations to perform their duty in a more creditable manner.

7. The President of the Conference and Secretary of the Committee shall prepare a circular as soon after each Conference as possible, embodying such facts as they may deem proper, taken from the Circuit Returns, and send one to each minister, to be used by him when he takes up the collection on behalf of the Fund.

8. Each Circuit and Mission shall be requested to print on a small sheet the names and amounts of all contributors to all Circuit and Connexional funds, and also how the total amount thus contributed has been appropriated, and present each contributor with a copy.

9. The various May District Meetings, shall consider each case of deficiency, and make such recommendations as they may deem proper. All of which is respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The following is the report of the Memorial Committee, as amended and adopted by the Conference:—

1. In reply to a memorial from the Yonge Street Church, Toronto requesting a change in the order of divine service: *Resolved*,—That the General Conference be memorialized to so amend the Discipline as to allow prayer at the close of the sermon.

2. In answer to a resolution from the Richmond Street Church, Toronto, that a Superintendent, on the request of five members of the Quarterly Meeting, have power to call a special meeting: *Resolved*,—That the request be not granted.

3. A memorial having been presented from the Newcastle Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society, requesting that the amount raised by said Society be published in the Annual Conference Minutes: *Resolved*,—That the request be granted.

4. In the matter of the invasion of the St. Vincent Circuit by the Superintendent of the Woodford Circuit: *Resolved*,—That whereas Rev. A. Thibadeau, Superintendent of Woodford Circuit, has invaded the St. Vincent Circuit and is making arrangements to build a church within the bounds of the said St. Vincent Circuit, this Conference send a letter to

the members of the St. Vincent Circuit who may have become enlisted in the building of said church, advising them of the illegality of the course being pursued by them; and also that a letter be sent to the President of the Guelph Conference, informing him of the illegal act of Rev. A. Thibadeau, in so invading the St. Vincent Circuit, and that his immediate attention be invited thereto.

5. In answer to the memorial from the Parry Sound District Meeting, requesting that tickets, class-books, etc., be issued at cost: *Resolved*,—That the matter be referred to the Book Committee.

6. The Barrie District having memorialized this Conference, recommending that only one General Superintendent be appointed: *Resolved*,—That the memorial be forwarded to the General Conference, without this Conference taking any action upon it.

7. In answer to another memorial from the above District, requesting that the *Christian Guardian* be indexed: *Resolved*,—That the Editors be requested to comply with this memorial, and have the *Guardian* indexed in future.

8. In reply to a memorial from the Collingwood District, requesting that the lay delegates to the Annual Conference be elected at the May Quarterly Meetings, instead of at the District Meetings: *Resolved*,—That the change be not recommended.

9. A resolution having been sent in from this Conference in favor of the election of ministerial delegates taking place in the District Meetings instead of in the Annual Conferences: *Resolved*,—That the change be not recommended.

10. In answer to a memorial from the Collingwood District for permission to elect alternate lay delegates to District Meetings and Annual Conferences: *Resolved*,—That such permission be not recommended, as no corresponding alternate clerical delegates could be elected.

The following resolutions were received from the Orangeville District Meeting:—

Whereas the salary of brethren on Missions and of many on Circuits is altogether too low, in some cases so low as to cause actual distress, and as an increase of Missions and missionaries means greater pressure—therefore,

*Resolved*,—That this District Meeting request the Stationing Committee and the Conference,—

1. That Conference make no new or additional Missions, and send no additional men to them until the increase in the Mission Fund shall warrant this.

2. That no consent be granted to divide a Circuit where there are two married ministers, unless each new Circuit thus formed provides for a married minister.

3. That candidates not now absolutely required to fill vacancies in the work be put on a List of Reserve, and be called only to fill vacancies that may occur.

4. That Toronto Conference be requested to memorialize the General Conference to enact that any year or part of a year spent by any candidate in the work before being received as a probationer by Conference be not allowed to count on his probation. *Resolved*,—That these resolutions be referred to the Committee on Finance and Sustentation.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT A CONVENTION OF THE UNITED DISTRICTS OF  
BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Moved by Rev. Joseph Hall, seconded by Rev. C. Bryant,

That whereas there are in this Province twenty ministers of our Church who are debarred the privilege of meeting with the Conference to which they belong, on account of remoteness, and also an equal number of laymen entitled to a vote in the Annual Conference; and whereas the Constitution of the Methodist Church does not contemplate, except under very exceptional circumstances, and then only so long as is imperatively necessary, the absence of so large a number of the members of the Conference from its sessions; and whereas there are many interests of importance demanding Conference action, which cannot be dealt with intelligently by the Conference to which we belong; and

Whereas our organization as a Conference would lend importance to our position, thereby increasing our influence in this Province, and for numerous other reasons which it is not easy succinctly to specify,

Therefore, *Resolved*,—That we hereby request the General Conference at its approaching session to constitute the three Districts of Port Simpson, Victoria, and New Westminster an Annual Conference, to be called The British Columbia Conference.

*Resolved*,—That this memorial be referred to the General Conference, with a request that the prayer of the memorialists be granted.

13. In answer to a memorial from the Collingwood District in regard to reduction in the expense of management of the Superannuation Fund:

*Resolved*,—That the memorial be forwarded to the General Conference.

## MILLTOWN PROPERTY DIFFICULTY—1880.

On examination of the resolutions that passed the St. Stephen District Meeting concerning the appropriations of certain moneys left to the then New Brunswick District by Abner Hill, Esq., the interest of which was to be paid yearly toward the support of the Methodist minister on the Milltown Circuit, the Committee recommend that the Conference take steps toward securing the restoration of those moneys for the object for which they were given, as the Committee are of the opinion that the said appropriation was illegal.

The Special Committee appointed to consider certain Minutes of the St. Stephen District respecting the Milltown Circuit, report that the said Minutes of the District were read, the statements of Messrs. Percival, Ackman, Dutcher, and F. W. Harrison in reference thereto were heard, the records of Trustee Meetings, Quarterly Meetings and Circuit accounts were examined, and find as follows:—

1. That Bro. Percival received, as appears by the records of the Trustee Book of the Milltown Circuit, and according to his own admission, \$200 in the spring of 1877, and \$440 in June, 1878, making in all \$650, which moneys were part of the proceeds of the sale of certain properties left the Milltown Circuit by the late Abner Hill.

2. Reference to moneys appropriated by S. R. Ackman.

3. That by the will of the late Abner Hill, the Chairman of the District, the Superintendent of the Circuit, and the Recording Steward of the Circuit were the only persons authorized to appropriate the proceeds of the properties left by the said Abner Hill to the Milltown Circuit, and that therefore the Trustees who voted the aforesaid amounts had no right so to do.

4. That the recipients of the aforesaid amounts, being custodians of the will, had no right to be parties to the appropriations of the proceeds of the properties above named.

5. That therefore the said amounts were irregularly and improperly received by the brethren named; that they were entitled only to the interest accruing therefrom year by year, and that they are responsible for the sums paid to them respectively, and for interest from the date of such payment, except in so far as they themselves would have been entitled to interest, as above set forth.

The above recommendation was adopted.

1882.

It was moved that a special Committee of six be appointed to look into the same and report. The following brethren were appointed the Committee: D. Chapman, Daniel, Smallwood, Teed, Dr. Pickard, Dr. Stewart.

The Committee met and reported as follows:—

An extract of Conference Journal of 1880 was read, relating to this case, together with the Minute of Conference Special Committee, and correspondence between the Chairman of the St. Stephen District and Bro. Percival.

From the correspondence it plainly appears that Bro. Percival repudiates his financial obligation in the Milltown bequest case—which obligation was defined and declared by the Conference action of 1880, and acknowledged by Brother Percival himself by the payment of *one* year's interest on the amount in his hand.

After very full consideration of the matter, your Committee recommend that the documents relating to his case, including all correspondence between Bro. Percival and the Chairman of St. Stephen District, be forthwith placed in the hands of the Chairman of St. John District, Newfoundland Conference, with a view to the final settlement of the matter by obtaining a restoration of the amount in question, or some legal security for it.

JULY 2ND, 1882.

The order of the day being called, the following resolution was passed:

In the case of the Milltown Quarterly Board and the Rev. W. W. Percival: *Resolved*,—That the Secretary of the Conference communicate forthwith with the President of the Newfoundland Conference to ascertain what steps, if any, have been taken by his Conference to enforce payment of the money due by Mr. Percival to the Milltown Quarterly Board.

JUNE 26TH, 1884.

The report of the Conference Special Committee was read. It was moved that the correspondence relating to the Milltown case be referred to a special committee.

Moved in amendment: That it be taken up by the Conference. Amendment carried.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Moved and seconded: That in view of the information received to-day through the statements of W. W. Percival, and our inability to take satisfactory action on the matter, we do now indefinitely defer further consideration of the matter.



Moved in amendment: That having considered the difficulty between this Conference and Rev. W. W. Percival, as embodied in certain documents submitted to the Conference, we are of the opinion that we cannot do otherwise than earnestly insist that the Conference officers take proper steps to have Bro. Percival meet his obligation to the Trustees of the estate of the late Abner Hill, as decided by the Conference of 1880. Amendment carried.

#### REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Sabbath-schools in the Toronto Conference, your Committee are pleased to note the increasing interest that is being taken in Sabbath-school work.

The result of this has been a more extensive circulation of Sabbath-school literature, especially among rural districts, and a gratifying increase in the givings of the people for school and mission purposes; while the great Head of the Church, who has said, "Feed my lambs," has rewarded His servants by the conversion of 1883 scholars during the year, which, when added to the adult membership, makes a total of 4,218 as the increase in membership during the year.

To further this aspect of the work your Committee would suggest that at least once in three months a Sabbath-school service and sermon to children take the place of the regular Church service.

It is a cause of deep regret that so many of our schools ignore the Catechism entirely, and your Committee would strongly recommend its universal adoption, believing that in no other way can the children of our families be taught more efficiently the cardinal doctrines of our Church.

We would also recommend the more frequent holding of Sabbath-School Conventions in connection with our District meetings, and would urge upon the brethren, clerical and lay, the great importance of attending the County School Conventions in the interests of our own Church.

Your Committee would heartily endorse the resolution of the Sabbath-school Superintendents and Teachers of Toronto regarding military church parades and other processions on the Lord's Day, believing the same to be destructive of the quiet of the Sabbath and highly detrimental to the spiritual interests of the scholars, many of whom absent themselves on such occasions.

As the laymen of our Church are deeply interested in Sabbath-school work, your Committee are of the opinion that their presence would greatly aid the Church in this important part of its operations; and your Committee humbly suggest that the General Conference be respectfully requested to amend paragraph 348, respecting the Annual Conference Sabbath-School Committee, so as to read, "composed of one ministerial and one lay member from each District."

The Treasurer, Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., presented his Annual Statement, which was duly audited; and your Committee would recommend his re-appointment as Treasurer.

## COPY OF RESOLUTION

passed unanimously at a meeting of Sabbath-school Superintendents and Teachers, held in the school-room of the Metropolitan Methodist Church, Toronto, on the evening of Friday, 28th May, 1886, called under the auspices of the Sabbath-School Association of Canada, to consider the subject of military church parades, processions, etc., on the Sunday afternoon.

"Observing with deep regret the increasing frequency of the church parades of military organizations and anniversary services of national and other societies on the afternoon of the Sabbath day, and being fully convinced that this custom is not favorable to its quiet observance, while at the same time it interferes very largely with the regular work of the Sunday-schools, preventing many scholars from attending and diverting the attention of those who are in their classes, and leading all to associate with the holy day the usual diversions of public holidays. We do therefore hereby respectfully memorialize the Ministerial Association of the city of Toronto, in the earnest hope that the pastors of the various Churches will be able to unite on some plan by which these gatherings and parades may be arranged to take place at some other time."

The Secretaries of Conferences will greatly aid in getting the Fund into a system by which it will be more easily managed in future, as well as greatly assist the Treasurer in his work, by inserting in the Minutes of Conference the following

RECOMMENDATIONS:—

1st. The Annual Conferences should exercise great care in superannuating ministers, and only those who are actually worn out in the work should be placed on the list.

2nd. In the appointment of Financial Secretaries (or District Treasurers) only those of known financial ability should be selected.

3rd. All parties sending money to the office should send with each remittance the names of Circuits, or Ministers, or others to whom the money is to be credited. Sending money in lump sums leads to great inconvenience, and makes it impossible to tell what Circuits or Ministers have paid their claims in full. In order to keep the books so that the amount paid by each Circuit or Minister can be traced, this request must be rigidly observed.

4th. The schedules sent out by the Board should be carefully filled up, taking the names of claimants as found in last year's Minutes, and accounting for them—showing who are still claimants, and who have ceased to be claimants, and why they have so ceased—and then adding new claimants, with their proper addresses, as per schedule.

5th. These schedules should be published in full in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences, as an official document for the guidance of the Treasurer in the payment of claimants.

6th. A statement of the amount paid each Circuit for ministerial support, and ordinary connexional collections for the past year, together with the names of claimants, new and old, for the coming year, should be prepared by the Secretary of the Conference (or the Statistical Committee), and a certified copy immediately sent to the Treasurer at the close of the Conference, in order to enable him to prepare his estimates in time for the Financial District Meeting.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE AID.

REPORT No. I.

The Committee appointed to consider certain Resolutions and Proposals laid before this Conference, touching a Church and Parsonage Aid Fund, embracing a Loan Branch and an Insurance Branch, beg to report:—

That they have carefully considered the documents referred to them and are of the opinion that the scheme, such as is proposed, would be of vast benefit to the Church. They therefore recommend that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to authorize the formation of a Church and Parsonage Aid Fund in substantial accord with the plan outlined in the Proposals hereto appended, and which reads as follows:—

DRAFT PROPOSALS IN REGARD TO A SCHEME FOR CHURCH AND PARSONAGE  
AID AND INSURANCE—PRELIMINARY STATEMENT.

It is an open secret that a large number of churches and parsonages are more or less in debt, and that upon many of these debts a high rate of interest is paid. It is believed that this can be remedied, and that a plan can be devised whereby interest will be lowered, debts reduced, and finally extinguished, and aid given in the erection of new churches and parsonages as the rapidly growing needs of the work demand. The need of some such plan has long been felt, and efforts of a local character have been put forth to meet it. But such efforts, because of their local character, have been only partially successful; and we think the time has come when a connexional movement should be set on foot, and a fund organized for the purposes mentioned. In such a scheme the following points are considered essential:

(1) That it be connexional in its character, and embrace all local or Conference Funds that have been organized for a similar purpose.

(2) That the fund be sufficiently large to meet all reasonable demands for loans on church property.

(3) That it be formed without imposing any additional burdens upon our congregations beyond a simple annual collection.

(4) That it be used as a Loan and Insurance Fund only.

(5) That it be administered on strictly business principles, and with the closest economy consistent with safe and efficient management.

With these general principles in view it is proposed: That the General Conference be asked, to authorize the formation of a fund in the manner hereinafter stated, for the purposes above mentioned; and that the said fund be formed and administered in harmony with the following

CONSTITUTION.

1. *Name.*—The Fund shall be known as "The Church and Parsonage Aid Fund of the Methodist Church," and it shall consist of two branches, to be known respectively as "The Loan Branch," and "The Insurance Branch."

2. *Objects.*—The object of the Loan Branch shall be to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages held in trust by our Model Deed on the Stations, Circuits or Missions of the Methodist Church, and the reduction of debts upon the same by means of loans at low rates of interest, on such conditions as will secure the earliest possible extinction of all liabilities upon the property aided. The object of the Insurance Branch shall be to provide insurance for connexional property at the lowest rates consistent with safety.

3. *Management.*—The management of the Fund, including both branches, shall be vested in a Board of nine Directors (a majority of whom shall be laymen), to be elected quadrennially by the General Conference. The Board shall have authority—

(1) To make loans to Trustee Boards of churches or parsonages in harmony with the objects set forth in the Constitution and the general regulations hereinafter mentioned.

(2) To grant certificates of insurance on connexional property.

(3) To issue bonds (as hereinafter provided) in order to procure the necessary capital for loan purposes.

(4) To institute proceedings, when necessary, to foreclose mortgages and recover loans or interest when past due.

(5) To employ such assistance as they may deem necessary for the correct keeping of the accounts, and the prompt and accurate transaction of the business connected with the Fund.

(6) To fill any vacancy that may occur in the Board or its officers during the quadrennium.

(7) And generally to take such steps as may be necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Constitution and the general objects of the Fund.

4. *Capital.*—The capital of the Fund shall consist of—

(1) Moneys or securities now belonging to the Church and Parsonage Aid Fund for the North-West.

(2) Moneys or securities now belonging to any Church or Parsonage Aid Fund in any of the Annual Conferences.

(3) Legacies or donations that have been or shall be hereafter made for the objects contemplated by the Fund.

(4) The proceeds of any bonds issued as hereinafter provided.

(5) Such portion of repaid loans as may not be required to redeem maturing bonds.

5. *Revenue.*—The revenue of the Fund shall consist of interest received on account of loans, premiums on insurance certificates issued by order of the Directors, and the proceeds of an annual collection, to be taken up in all the churches of the Connexion, in the month of January.

6. *Application of Revenue.*—Revenue arising from interest on loans and from annual collections, shall be applied—

(1) To the payment of interest on negotiated bonds.

(2) To the payment of necessary expenses of management, or otherwise connected with the Loan Branch of the Fund.

(3) The balance, if any, shall be carried to the Sinking Fund, for the redemption of maturing bonds.

Revenue from insurance premiums shall be chargeable with the necessary expenses of the Insurance Branch of the Fund, including its proportion of cost of general management and the payment of fire losses. The balance shall constitute a reserve for insurance purposes.

7. *Treasurer and Secretary.*—The General Conference shall make such provision for the duties of Treasurer and Secretary as they may deem expedient, and the Board shall determine what remuneration the officers who may be appointed shall receive.

8. *Reports.*—The Directors shall publish an annual statement for the information of the Conferences and the Connexion generally, and they shall present a quadrennial report to the General Conference, covering the business of the four preceding years, and showing the condition of both branches of the Fund at the close of the last financial year.

9. *Audit.*—The Board shall provide for a careful audit, by competent persons, of the accounts of both branches of the Fund, and shall publish the certificate of said auditors in connection with the annual statements.



It is further proposed that in case the capital arising from existing Church and Parsonage Aid Funds, together with such legacies and donations as may be received, shall be found insufficient for the legitimate purposes of the Fund, the Directors be empowered to issue bonds of the Methodist Church of the denomination of \$— and \$— respectively, with semi-annual interest coupons attached, at a rate not exceeding five per cent. per annum. The bonds to have — years to run, and to be issued under the following regulations :

(1) No bond to be sold at less than par.

(2) The first issue not to exceed \$— and subsequent issues to be made only of such amounts as may be necessary to provide loans asked for on connexional property, which the Directors are willing to grant.

It is further proposed that the following regulations be adopted in regard to loans :

(1) No Officer or Director connected with the Fund shall be a borrower from the Fund under any circumstances.

(2) The Fund shall be used for loan purposes only, and no free grants shall be made under any circumstances.

(3) No loan shall exceed one-third of the estimated actual cash value of the property, and in no case more than \$—.

(4) Loans shall be made on security of first mortgage on connexional property held under our Model Deed, with assignment of insurance policy for amount equal to the loan, as collateral. Where circumstances render it desirable the Directors may require the personal obligation of the Trustees in lieu of a mortgage, or in addition thereto. In the former case the Directors shall give a bond for a mortgage as soon as deed is secured.

(5) It shall be the distinct condition of each loan that the property is not otherwise encumbered, and that no other encumbrance will be put upon it without the consent of the Directors, in writing, first obtained.

(6) Loans may be made repayable, if judged expedient, by annual or semi-annual instalments, covering both principal and interest.

(7) Interest on loans shall not exceed — per cent. per annum, and shall be payable half-yearly.

(8) The Directors shall not be at liberty to relinquish or modify the claims of the Fund for either principal or interest of loans. This on the principle that it is far better that a church should be sold under the sheriff's hammer than that any encouragement should be given to the evasion or repudiation of just liabilities.

(9) — days' grace shall be allowed for payment of principal or instalments thereof, after which the rate of interest on overdue balance shall be advanced to eight per cent.

(10) — days' grace may be allowed for payment of interest, after which the unpaid balance shall be subject to interest, from the time it was due at the rate of two-thirds of one per cent. per month.

It is also proposed that in the Insurance Branch the business be conducted on the basis of the ordinary principles of fire insurance ; that the maximum risk on any one building shall not exceed \$—, and that any excess be arranged by re-insurance.

Persons making donations or bequests in aid of the Fund shall be at liberty to fix the rate of interest at which their benefactions shall be

loaned, provided the rate be not higher than that fixed by the regulations concerning loans.

In regard to the intimation already made to the Conference, that it is the intention of a certain person to make a liberal donation for the purposes contemplated in the foregoing scheme, it was

*Resolved*,—That we have heard with great satisfaction of the generous design of a member of our Church to donate the sum of \$10,000 to a Church Extension Fund, should such be established on certain reasonable conditions, and are of opinion that arrangements should be made by the General Conference whereby the design of the donor may have due effect; and we recommend that the Secretary convey to the friend in question the hope of the Committee that the sum named will be conveyed at once by a trust deed in the name of three or more persons, pending action by the General Conference, said trust deed to embody such conditions as the donor may wish to attach to his gift; or, should he consider it more desirable, convey his wishes in a separate communication.

#### REPORT No. II.

##### COMMITTEE ON SCHEME FOR CHURCH AND PARSONAGE AID AND INSURANCE.

The Conference having referred to this Committee a resolution, of which notice had been given by Mr. Gurney, touching the consolidation of treasurerships of connexional funds, we beg to report,—

That having considered the resolution, we are of opinion that the principle involved is a wise one, and we recommend its adoption by the Conference. The resolution is as follows:—

Whereas the various connexional funds of the Methodist Church are assuming large proportions, involving not only the handling of vast sums in the form of ordinary income and expenditure, but also the management of large investments, it is very desirable that the business connected therewith should be transacted in the most careful and methodical manner, and whereas the multifarious duties devolving upon the Secretaries of some of these funds render close attention to the financial side impossible, this Conference is of opinion that it would conduce to efficiency and economy if the various connexional funds were placed in charge of one treasurer under suitable supervision, and a division of work and responsibility made as between the secretaries and treasurer; therefore,

*Resolved*,—That this Conference memorialize the General Conference to give the question careful consideration, and, if possible, devise a scheme that will give effect to the recommendation embraced in the preamble of this resolution.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee being called to the consideration of this important question, recognize that a due observance of the Sabbath is among the strictest commands of God, and is an important factor in man's physical, civil and religious well-being.

We are devoutly thankful to Almighty God that the command to "remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy" is so well observed by the people of this Dominion; yet we deeply deplore that there is much Sabbath desecration in our land, and that some corporate bodies not only disturb the quiet of the Sabbath, but also deprive their employe'es of the day divinely set apart for rest and worship, thereby injuriously affecting their physical and religious welfare.

We would earnestly appeal to our people to refrain from patronizing Sabbath excursions, believing that it would tend towards the abolition of the evil, and hope that such domestic arrangements will be made in our homes as will enable all to enjoy the blessings of the Lord's day, viz., the worship of God's house and the activities of Christian service.

Your Committee further deplore the practice of many nominal Christians in making the Sabbath a day of social visiting and worldly pleasure-seeking, instead of worshipping God in the public assembly.

We appreciate the action of the Toronto Ministerial Association in discountenancing Sabbath funerals, and would recommend our ministers and people generally to endorse the same.

Furthermore, in order to give special prominence to the subject of Sabbath observance, we would reaffirm the recommendation of last year, that sermons be preached on all our Circuits on the first Sabbath in September.

#### REPORT OF CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:—

Memorials were received and considered from six Circuits and two Districts, recommending in effect the abolition of the Children's Fund.

After thoroughly considering everything connected with the administration of the fund, and having all the information before us afforded by the report of the Commission appointed by the Conference of 1885, your Committee recommend—

1. That this Conference recommend some other method—*i.e.*, one of those proposals for a Sustentation Fund—to the General Conference, in order to meet the necessitous cases which so frequently come before us.

2. That as some final legislation will probably take place before another Annual Conference, but which cannot go into operation before the Conference of 1887, your Committee, believing it would be a hardship in not a few cases, deem it unwise to interfere with it for the present year, and therefore recommend that the rate for the ensuing year be the same as that for last year, *viz.*, thirty cents per member. (Amended by the rate of one cent per member being ordered.)

3. That Rev. John Hunt be appointed Secretary-Treasurer.

Rev. J. Hunt presented his resignation, which, on motion, was accepted.

On motion, Rev. W. P. Brown was appointed Secretary-Treasurer.

REPORT OF CHILDREN'S FUND COMMISSION.

Your Commission appointed at the last Conference to investigate the circumstances and operations of the Children's Fund on the various classes of Ministers and Circuits in our work, beg to report as follows:—

The first constitution of this fund was adopted and brought into operation in the year 1857, the object being to equalize the salaries of ministers and enable the Stationing Committee and Conference to send any minister, irrespective of the number of his family, to any Circuit for which he might be deemed eligible. The plan thus adopted was found to be a great relief in stationing, as well as a help to many ministers having large families, and we think, on the whole, has admirably answered the purposes for which it was called into existence, though a few instances may have occurred where the application of this law may seem to have been oppressive.

Taking the year ending June, 1885, as a basis of calculation, we present the following tabulated statement. We have omitted fractions of a dollar in every case, and therefore do not present this as absolutely perfect, but we believe it to be sufficiently accurate for all practical purposes:

Two Districts, chiefly missionary, viz., Algoma and Parry Sound, are not included in the above statement. On these two Districts there were but 10 claimants, who received \$170 from the fund and paid in \$307, a surplus of \$137. We are, however, to bear in mind that this was an exceptional year—that one District (Algoma) has received on different occasions from \$500 to \$650 per annum to meet the deficiencies of claimants on the District.

From these investigations your Commission is of opinion that the Fund may and ought to still be continued, and, with certain restrictions which we recommend for adoption, will prove oppressive to none and still be a great boon to many others.

In view of these facts and considerations, your Commission recommend that hereafter (should the Children's Fund be continued) ministers who receive a salary of \$850 and upwards shall have no claim on this fund; and also that those Circuits whose ministers do not receive more than \$450 salary shall be free from any per capita charge.

We also strongly recommend that superannuated ministers and widows who may have claimants, who may be transferred to this Conference, shall be subject to the rule and shall hereafter receive their allowance from the Conference from which they were transferred, or where the widowhood occurred.

We also further commend to the careful consideration of the Children's Fund Committee from year to year the importance of reducing the per capita tax as much as possible below the maximum of 30 cents.

The Conference request the Children's Fund Commission to prepare and submit such measures as will make provision for cases of need that will arise by the practical abolition of the Children's Fund.

That for the ensuing year the sum of five cents per member shall be paid for this purpose by all Circuits paying a salary of over \$450, as reported at the present Conference.

That the Conference authorize the raising of a fund for the relief of necessitous cases, to be afterwards decided upon and distributed upon the recommendation of the Children's Fund Committee at the meeting of the next Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they recommend as follows :

*Toronto District.*—That the Trustees of the Richmond Street Church, Toronto, have permission to sell the said church, the proceeds, after payment of the debt, to be expended in the purchase of a lot, and in the erection of a church in a more eligible locality.

That the Trustees of the Agnes Street Church, Toronto, be permitted to sell the parsonage property, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt.

That the Trustees of a lot at West Toronto Junction be permitted to sell the said lot, the proceeds to be applied toward the payment of the debt on a new church, built near the said lot, and the Lambton Church debt.

That the Trustees of the St. Paul's Methodist Church, Toronto, have permission to sell their church property on Yonge Street, and apply the proceeds (save a sum hereinafter specified) to the purchase of a lot and erection of a church on Avenue Road. But inasmuch as it has been represented to your Committee that there is a large part of the congregation at present worshipping in said church unwilling that said church should be sold, or if sold, unwilling to go from that neighborhood to worship, and inasmuch as it is said to be the present purpose of the dissenting part of the congregation to purchase or erect a building in that locality in which to worship, therefore your Committee would recommend that the sum of \$3,000 of the proceeds of the sale of the said church property be held in reserve until such time as this Conference shall become convinced that the members in such dissenting part of the congregation, and their conduct and attitude in respect to our Methodist Church and its institutions, are such as entitle them to such consideration, when the said sum of \$3,000 shall become due and payable from the said Board of Trustees or their successors in office, to a properly constituted Board from such congregation, provided always that all property so purchased shall be secured to the Methodist Church according to the provisions of the Model Deed.

*Brampton District.*—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Queen Street Church, Brampton, to sell the same, proceeds to be applied to the new church.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church, Churchville, to sell the same, proceeds to be applied in the repairing of the Brick Church in the same place.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of Page's Church, Brampton West Circuit, to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new church in the village of Huttonville.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of Springbrook Church, Brampton West Circuit, to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied in the erection of a new church in the village of Huttonville.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of Claireville Church to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied to the Parsonage Fund.

That the Trustees of the Beattie Church, on the Bolton Circuit, be allowed to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied on the debt of the Bolton Church.

That the Trustees of the church formerly occupied by the late Methodist Episcopal Church, situated in the village of Weston, have permission to sell the same, proceeds to be applied toward the erection of a new church in the village of Weston.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church, Edmonton, Campbell's Cross Circuit, to sell the same and apply the proceeds to the repairing of Zion Church, where the united congregation worships.

*Whitby District.*—That the Trustees of the Five Point Church, Brooklin and Columbus Circuit, be permitted to sell said church, proceeds to be applied to the building of a school-room for the Kedron Church, on the Brooklin and Columbus Circuit.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the West Mount Carmel Church, Myrtle Circuit, to sell the same, proceeds to be applied towards improving the East Church.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the church at Pickering village to sell the stable on the church property, proceeds to be applied in the purchase of additional ground for a church shed.

That permission be granted to the Pickering Circuit to sell a lot belonging to the late Primitive Methodist Church, proceeds to be applied to the repairing of Mount Zion Church,  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles distant, the said lot not being necessary for any church purpose.

That on condition that the proposed new Greenbank Circuit be formed, permission be granted to the Trustees of Salem Church, on the present Manchester Circuit, and to the Trustees of the parsonage at the village of Manchester, belonging to the present Manchester Circuit, to sell these respective church properties, and to apply the proceeds towards the erection of a parsonage for the use of the proposed Greenbank Circuit.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church, in Claremont, to sell the same, proceeds to be applied to repairing the church in use.

*Bowmanville District.*—That permission be given to the Trustees to sell the old church of the late Methodist Church of Canada, at Hampton, and the late Bible Christian Church, at Taunton, proceeds to be applied to liquidate the church debts on the Circuit.

*Uxbridge District.*—That permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the property formerly occupied by the Methodist Church of Canada, at Unionville, proceeds to be applied to meet the debt on the church at present occupied.

*Bradford District.*—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the North Methodist Church, Queensville, to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a new Methodist church in the village of Queensville.

That in reference to the matter in dispute between the Queensville Circuit and Sutton Mission, in regard to Mount Pleasant Church, we recommend that the legal Trustees have permission to convey the property on condition that the Queensville Circuit pay fifty dollars to the Sutton Mission.



That the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church in Bradford have permission to sell the said church, proceeds first to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on the church, and the balance to be held in reserve until next District Meeting.

That the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church, on the Penetanguishene Road, Bradford Circuit, have permission to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied to the benefit of Ebenezer Church.

That permission be granted to the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church, in Thompsonville, West Essa Circuit, to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied towards the debt on the Methodist Church, Thompsonville.

That the Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church, Newmarket, be permitted to sell the same, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on the church now in use.

*Orangeville District.*—That in regard to the request of the Trustees of the parsonage of the Orangeville Circuit, situated on Mill Street, Orangeville, to be permitted to sell the property, we report that in view of the fact that the application has not been before the District Meeting, the Committee does not see its way clear to recommend it for the present.

That the Trustees of the Palgrave Church have permission to sell the plot of ground being part of lot No. 26, 6th Concession of Albion, proceeds to be applied on the church debt in Palgrave.

*Barrie District.*—That in regard to the parsonage property, Oro Station, we recommend the Conference to confirm the sale of the half-acre already sold, and that permission be granted to sell two acres additional, subject to the claim of the Missionary Society, one acre and one-eighth being reserved for the parsonage; the proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the parsonage debt.

*Bracebridge District.*—That the Trustees of the Matthiasville Church, on the Uffington Mission, have permission to sell the said church, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the parsonage debt.

*Collingwood District.*—That the amended request of the Trustees of the Methodist Church in Meaford to sell their church property in Meaford, be granted.

*Victoria District.*—That the Trustees of the church property at Maple Bay be allowed to sell a portion of the land held by them, if deemed desirable to do so, proceeds to be applied to the enlargement of the parsonage, and other improvements.

*New Westminster.*—That the Trustees of the Granville property, on the Burrard Inlet Circuit, be permitted to sell the said property, proceeds to be applied to paying off the mortgage on the property and towards procuring suitable church property in Vancouver.

In compliance with a request from the Pastor of the Agnes Street Church, Toronto, we recommend the re-appointment of the following Committee for the Agnes Street Church:—Revs. Dr. Briggs, Dr. Sutherland, Dr. Stone, Dr. Potts, E. A. Stafford, S. J. Shorey, H. Johnston, M. Benson, and Messrs. D. McLean, W. Gooderham, J. M. Trebbles, R. I. Walker, J. B. Boustead, and R. H. McBride.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee rejoice in the marvellous progress of the temperance movement in the Dominion, and especially in this Province, resulting in the adoption of the Canada Temperance Act in two-thirds of our counties, and rescuing more than one million of the population of Ontario from the responsibility for the curse of the liquor traffic. From the beginning the Methodist Church has been an earnest and ardent advocate of temperance. Nor do we stand alone in declaring eternal war against the traffic of strong drink. We gratefully recognize the noble stand taken and the valuable work accomplished by the various Christian Churches, and pray God's blessing to rest upon their heroic efforts to remove this blighting curse from our land. Thus do we see the blessed and sublime spectacle of the Churches, with the presence of God in their midst, marching in solid phalanx against a common foe. This union of action is a presage and prophecy of complete and ultimate triumph in the near future.

While your Committee rejoice in the passage of the Scott Act in twenty-five counties and two cities of Ontario, they regret the non-appointment of police magistrates essential to the successful enforcement of the Act, the apathy or hostility of many municipal authorities, and in some cases the appointment of inspectors who are not in sympathy with the laws they are called to enforce.

Your Committee are deeply convinced of the great need there exists for the further education of the public conscience on the temperance question, and would recommend:—

1. That the temperance question continue to occupy great prominence in all our Church periodicals, especially in those designed for our young people.
2. That all our ministers be instructed to preach at least once a year a special sermon on this theme.
3. That the regular weekly prayer-meeting be made a temperance prayer-meeting at least once a quarter.
4. That temperance societies be formed in connection with all our churches, and that the children of our Sunday-schools be encouraged to take the pledge of total abstinence.
5. That unfermented wine only be used in all our churches at the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
6. Believing the liquor traffic to be an unmixed evil, and that the entire prohibition of the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes is the only efficient remedy, and believing that prohibition can be properly enforced only by a prohibitory party, your Committee further recommend that all our people be urged to vote only for such candidates for parliamentary and municipal honors as are known and professed prohibitionists, and are otherwise morally acceptable.

We hail with delight the wonderful progress and development of the W. C. T. U. We rejoice in their unflinching faith, their dauntless courage, their ceaseless toil, and their great accomplishments. We cordially commend their organization to the women of our Church, and pray God's blessing to rest upon the efforts of holy women and sanctified men, that

soon a brighter day may dawn, when forever shall be banished this greatest enemy of the Church, the country and the home.

Moved by Rev. G. Webber, seconded by Mr. J. T. Moore,

Whereas the House of Commons of Canada in the session of 1884, by a vote of 122 to 40, adopted the following resolution:—

“That the object of good government is to promote the general welfare of the people by a careful encouragement and protection of whatever makes for the public good, and by an equally careful discouragement and suppression of whatever tends to the public disadvantage.

“That the traffic in alcoholic liquors as beverages is productive of serious injury to the moral, social and industrial welfare of the people of Canada.

“That despite all preceding legislation, the evils of intemperance remain so vast in magnitude, so wide in extent, and so destructive in effect as to constitute a social peril and a national menace.

“That this House is of the opinion, for reasons hereinafter set forth, that the right and most effectual legislative remedy for those evils is to be found in the enactment and enforcement of a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes.

“And this House is prepared, so soon as public opinion will sufficiently sustain stringent measures, to promote such legislation so far as the same is within the competency of the Parliament of Canada.”

And whereas, in the judgment of this Conference, the expression of public opinion, as declared by the vote on the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, by petition, by deliverance of Church courts and otherwise, is such as to justify the enactment and enforcement of a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes;

And whereas the House of Commons has not responded to public opinion, and proposed the enactment of such a law of total prohibition, but has resisted the adoption of the amendments to the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, proposed in the Jamieson Bill, which experience has proved necessary to its more effective operation;

And whereas the successful operation of the said Act has been greatly hindered by the lack of such legislation as the Dominion Government should have secured, and such prompt assistance in enforcement as the Provincial Government should have accorded; therefore,

*Resolved*,—That it is the judgment of this Conference that a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes should be forthwith secured to the Dominion of Canada; that any measure of temperance legislation, whether of local option or total prohibition, will be effectually enforced only by an administration in sympathy with such law; that to secure such an administration it is imperative that the temperance electors place their principles before their allegiance to party and organize forthwith on the basis of the Prohibitory Electoral Union, recommended by the Dominion Alliance, and by

pledging themselves to support for municipal and parliamentary honors only known and professed prohibitionists, compel the nomination by the respective political parties of men who will work and vote for the enacting, sustaining and enforcing of prohibitory legislation; and that the members of this Conference, lay and clerical, hereby pledge themselves to promote in all practical ways the speedy formation of Prohibitory Electoral Unions in their respective localities.—Carried.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

1. Your Committee, with feelings of intense gratitude to the Giver of all grace, "Who maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place," beg leave to report that "Methodism" still means "Conversion."

After the numerous revivals and unusually large increase in membership of last year, fear was entertained concerning the results of this, but we are thankful the spirit of revival has been with us, to which a net increase of nearly 2,400 testifies. The ordinary public services of the Church have had an increased attendance, and the special and social services, so far as we are able to judge, have also been well sustained.

2. It gives us great pleasure to know that many of the scholars in our Sabbath-schools have been converted during the year, and are found in larger numbers attending the public services and class-meetings of the Church. And now with the growing zeal of our people in Sabbath-school work and the attractive, helpful and loyal Sabbath-school literature furnished by our enterprising Publishing House, we hope for even greater results in the near future.

3. Your Committee would record with profound thankfulness the success that has attended the formation and operation of the "Woman's Missionary Society," and most earnestly recommend it to the favorable consideration of the Church.

4. That the meetings held at our Conferences for the promotion of holiness be taken more completely and prominently under the official control of the Conference authorities, and that steps be taken upon such occasions to impart and promote clear and correct views upon the gracious doctrines of our Church concerning Scriptural holiness.

5. Your Committee, knowing that it coincides with the genius of Methodism to adopt new appliances when they promise usefulness, have recommended the setting apart of two of our ministerial brethren to the Evangelistic work, viz.: J. M. Kerr and James Matheson.

6. We would also recommend our ministers to urge upon the people the importance of the home instruction of their children in the Holy Scriptures and doctrines of our Church.

7. Your Committee regret the absence of reliable data from which to give a fuller and more direct report.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

Your Committee on Statistics desire respectfully to submit the following report:—

In regard to the membership of the Church, notwithstanding the large increase of last year, we take pleasure in reporting this year a further increase of 2,335, making a total membership of 33,383 in the societies of the Toronto Conference.

In regard to the Connexional Funds we find considerable increase.

Your Committee exceedingly regret the large deficiencies in so many of the ministers' salaries, more than thirty of them, ordained men, having received less than \$500; the total deficiencies in ministerial support this year amounting to the very large sum of \$13,772.18 $\frac{1}{2}$ .

A noticeable feature in the Church Property Schedule, as prepared this year for the General Conference, is that the Methodist Church of this Toronto Conference holds property to the value of \$2,185,850.66.

The amount of money, including Ministers' Salaries, Circuit Purposes, Missionary Society, the Connexional Funds, and all other purposes, raised during the year reaches the handsome sum of \$352,846.54.

Your Committee would urge the appointment at the District Meetings of only those brethren as Secretaries who are willing to perform their duties in full connected with said office, as the labors of your Committee have been excessive owing to the incomplete returns of the District Secretaries, only five out of fifteen having their work in good shape.

Evidently our honest endeavors to establish an institution of high order for the education of young ladies are being appreciated by interested parents and are filling our halls with as fine a class of students as ever entered any college. Having thus secured the confidence of the country, as evidenced by our present liberal patronage, we feel in duty bound to spare no pains to make the College increasingly worthy of your support and confidence.

We have successfully established five advanced courses of study under the direction of the best professional talent, affording the highest culture to specialists in literature, science, music, fine art, elocution and commercial branches. The high standing taken by our junior pupils in the recent University and Art Examinations has established the thoroughness of our foundation work, whilst the hearty reception and favorable notice from musical critics recently given to our pupils at the college concert in Toronto afford abundant proof of the high efficiency of our Musical Department.

Our Art Department, hitherto so efficient, has been still further strengthened by placing it under the direction of Mr. L. R. O'Brien, President of the Royal Canadian Academy of Artists, and universally acknowledged to be the ablest in the Dominion.

We have made provision for the thorough teaching of a complete course in elocution and oratory by the engagement of a graduate and gold medalist from the National School of Oratory in Philadelphia, who will be assisted in the course by teachers of the literary department. Our commercial course, including phonography, telegraphy and book-keeping, has been placed under the direction of practical teachers who will spare no pains in making the instruction thoroughly efficient.

We cordially invite any members of the Conference to visit the College during commencement week, or whenever convenient, and ascertain for themselves the correctness of these statements.

- (2) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (3) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath-School Committee?
- (4) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Contingent Fund Committee?
- (5) What Probationers for the Ministry are recommended by the several Districts to be received into full connexion and ordained.
- (6) Who are the Probationers of three years?
- (7) Who are the Probationers of two years?
- (8) Who are the Probationers of one year?
- (9) Who are recommended to be received as Probationers for the Ministry?
- (10) Who are the Superannuated Ministers?
- (11) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?
- (12) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the past year?
- (13) What Probationers are on the list of reserve?

2nd. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several Districts in such manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate Committee, or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

3rd. Having selected a suitable secretary, shall, through him, be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair. The report to be read from the platform and in such manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on each item presented.

4th. That to facilitate the work each District Secretary prepare, previous to coming to Conference, separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by his District to the Conference.

5th. That for convenience, the Secretary of the Tabulating Committee shall be ex-officio an Assistant Secretary of Conference.



## SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS.

## RESOLUTION ON FEDERATION.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Dewart, seconded by Dr. W. W. Ogden,—

*Whereas* the scheme of University Consolidation, which has been for some time before the people of this Province, makes provision, through the proposed University Professoriate, for giving large and important educational advantages in the physical sciences and other branches of learning to the Students of Victoria and other Confederating Colleges, while it leaves Victoria and all such Colleges the free and complete control of their own Collegiate work and religious life, this Conference agrees with the sentiment of the Board of Regents that it would not be wise or patriotic to reject the scheme because it is not in every particular all that we might desire.

We therefore respectfully recommend the General Conference—provided satisfactory arrangements are made with regard to the site for Victoria in the Park, the permanent efficiency of the University Professoriate in its relation to the Confederating Colleges—to give its approval to the entrance of Victoria College into the proposed Federation, and to authorize and instruct the Board of Regents to take whatever steps may be necessary to complete the details and adjustments of the scheme and place Victoria in the relation to the scheme which the plan of Confederation contemplates for Confederating Colleges.

## DR. SUTHERLAND'S NOTICE OF AMENDMENT.

That this Conference has heard with great satisfaction the statements of Dr. Burwash concerning Victoria University. We rejoice in the growing prosperity of the institution, as evidenced by the large graduating classes of the past year and the unusually large matriculating class of the coming year, and are of opinion that the duty of the General Conference, alike to the Church and country, is to stand loyally by our own University, and to unite our people in cordial and enthusiastic effort to place said University in a safe financial position, and to furnish it with all necessary appliances for doing efficient work.

That the foregoing motion, and amendment thereto, be passed on to the General Conference without discussion or deliverance.

## SYMPATHY WITH REV. T. W. LEGGOTT.

Moved by Rev. W. S. Blackstock, seconded by Rev. Dr. Harper, and  
*Resolved*,—That we the members of the Toronto Conference deeply regret the absence of the venerable Enoch Wood, D.D., from another of our annual assemblies, on account of continued physical infirmity. Though absent, however, he is not forgotten, and we earnestly pray that the consolations of Divine grace which have hitherto supported him in his afflictions may abound to him more and more.

Austin, M.A., B.D., principal of Alma Ladies' College, and rejoice in the number of ladies and the thoroughness of the work being done. We commend to the Church this great department of Christian work, the higher education of the young ladies of our land, and will do our utmost to promote their success, according as the locality where students may reside may favor their attendance upon one or the other.

That the regulation made by this Conference regarding the Children's Fund is not intended to interfere with the right of each Circuit and Mission to provide for the disciplinary claim of its own minister for whatever children he may have of proper age.—Carried.

That this Conference request the General Conference so to alter the Discipline that the examination of ministerial character shall be considered final at the District Meeting, except in such cases as may be under arrest.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Geo. Washington, and seconded by Rev. J. E. Sanderson,—

That the Secretary of the Educational Committee be instructed to secure the information requisite to keep trace of the claims of the Fund upon those who have been aided by it ; and to see that any amounts due the Fund from this source be secured.—Carried.

Moved by N. R. Willoughby, and seconded by W. Galbraith,—

Whereas we learn that the Bay of Quinte Conference has memorialized the General Conference to have two Districts of this Conference transferred to the Bay of Quinte Conference, this Conference hereby records its earnest protest against such transfer, and urgently requests that those Districts shall remain in the Toronto Conference.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—

We send you greeting in the name of the Lord. We are devoutly thankful that the Lord God of our fathers has been with us during the year, and that he has abundantly vouchsafed His blessing upon the labors of His servants, the ministers and office-bearers and members of the Methodist Church within the bounds of this Conference. It is a ground of gratitude to God that the year just past, like the year which preceded it, has been one of great spiritual grace and benediction. The increase of membership in this Conference, after making up for losses through deaths, removals and otherwise, reaches 2,318. When to this is added the increase in membership in the other Conferences, we have an increase in the membership of the entire Church of over 12,000. To God alone be all the praise.

The consolidation of the interests and operations of Methodism through the union of the different Methodist Churches of this land has been successful beyond our most sanguine anticipations. The marked increase of membership, the numerous and extensive revivals of religion, the growing influence of the ministrations of the Church, and the urgent need for the enlargement of places of worship or erection of new ones, we cannot but regard as the seal of the Divine approval upon the recent union, and upon the hearty co-operation in every good word and work of the ministry and laity of the different branches of Methodism thus providentially brought together. \*Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!"

The Conference has been favored, in larger numbers than ever before, with the presence of the lay delegates of the churches. The religious zeal and energy and business ability of these brethren has very greatly contributed to the successful transaction of the business of the Conference. It is upon the hearty sympathy and intelligent co-operation of the laity in all our plans of Church work that the

prosperity of the Church greatly depends. We rejoice therefore that this important factor in Church life and Church work is so largely present in our Conference.

We ask the prayers of the congregations on behalf of the brethren upon whom the burden and responsibility of representing the Church in that important assembly devolves, that they may have a double measure of the Spirit of God, and that they may be endowed with that wisdom which cometh down from above, which is profitable to direct and to guide into all truth.

The Conference has also been favored with the presence, the godly counsels and the words of cheer and encouragement of both the General Superintendents of our Church. We rejoice in the providence of God which has raised up from a bed of serious illness and restored to the discharge of his important duties the senior of these honored brethren; and which has maintained in health and vigor, amid labors exceedingly abundant and travels very extensive, throughout the entire quadrennium, the other respected General Superintendent. We desire to record our appreciation of the great value and unifying influence of their services throughout the length and breadth of our common Methodism.

We thank God that the missionary operations of our Church never presented such manifold opportunities of usefulness, nor were rewarded with more signal success. From the Bermudas and Newfoundland and Labrador to the borders of Alaska, and in the far distant Empire of Japan, great grace has attended the preaching of the Word, and the hearts of the missionaries have been gladdened by the triumphs of the Gospel over spiritual ignorance and apathy, over superstition and sin. For years the Church has been praying that God would open doors of opportunity to preach His Word. So abundantly has that prayer been answered that wide doors stand open on every side which no man can shut, and earnest voices plead from every land, "Come over and help us." Fields white unto the harvest wave wide on every side. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest. Or rather,—for the laborers are ready and waiting for this blessed service,—rather let us rise to the height of our privilege and opportunity, let us bring the tithes into God's storehouse and prove Him now therewith if He will not open the windows of heaven, and pour out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

While earnest appeal is made for the support of our Foreign and Indian mission work, the urgent claims of our domestic or home missions must not be overlooked. No department of our work so well repays the labor and money expended upon it. None



brings in so immediate and so rich a return. In none is the harvest of souls so great. In no field do the missions so soon become self-sustaining circuits and sources of large missionary income, and in none is more heroic labor performed; in none are greater privation and hardship endured; in none is the reward for this labor and hardship so meagre and inadequate. The needs of our brethren on the domestic missions especially appeal to the sympathies and Christian liberality of our people.

A most important auxiliary to our mission work has been the Woman's Missionary Society, which held its anniversary concurrently with the meeting of Conference. Upon these handmaidens of the Lord the benediction of those who were ready to perish abundantly rests.

Few interests of our Church are more important than its educational interests. Upon them its efficiency and prosperity very greatly depend. The Church which most largely influences the higher education of the land is the Church which shall most largely mould the future destiny of the land. Methodism has not been unmindful of its duty in this respect. Its pioneer preachers, at a time when the fountain of learning was a sealed spring to all except the adherents of a dominant Church, though they were poor in this world's goods, yet rich in faith, out of their narrow means they established the infant University of Victoria College, and subsequently Albert University, to be schools of the prophets forever, to be a centre and source of moral and intellectual light and truth for all time. Never were the needs of higher training for both ministry and laity more urgent than to-day. If we would hold our own in a holy rivalry with Churches which devote their best energies, their consecrated culture and their large resources to the cause of higher education, we must not be a whit behind them in this important regard. The university of the future,—the university of the twentieth century, on whose threshold we stand—must be a vastly better equipped and endowed institution than that which our fathers founded well nigh half a century ago. Whether, therefore, the approaching General Conference shall decide upon the federation of Victoria University with the National University of this province, or upon its instauration on a broader base and with a more comprehensive scope, we appeal to the liberality of our congregations to make it an institution worthy of the largest Protestant Church in this Dominion, an institution adequate to the work which in the providence of God it is called to perform.

It is cause for congratulation that the publishing interests of our Church were never so flourishing and never so fully subserved the purposes for which they were established. The importance of circulating sound and wholesome literature, in an age of much frivolous or pernicious reading, cannot be overestimated. Our Book and

Publishing House at Toronto is a most important factor among the religious influences which uplift and ennoble the heart and mind of our people. Especially is this true of its periodical literature, which comes week by week to ten thousand homes surcharged with the vitalizing influences of an earnest Christianity. We commend to your hearty sympathy and support the noble old *Guardian*, the oldest and ablest religious paper in the Dominion, and one of the oldest and ablest religious papers on the continent, or in the world. Our young and vigorous *Methodist Magazine*—never so vigorous, so attractive, so widely read and so well sustained as to-day—should be in every Methodist household. Our varied and multitudinous Sunday-school literature, suited to every grade and every want of every school, circulates to the extent of a quarter of a million copies, and carries Methodist and missionary intelligence, temperance and patriotic sentiment and soul-saving religious truth to tens of thousands of homes. These saving truths are diligently impressed upon the minds of the children in our Sunday-schools by over 20,000 faithful and loving teachers, and year by year many thousands of scholars are gathered into the fold of Christ. Although the publishing house was not primarily established to make money, but to do good—to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land—yet it does make money and is able this year, as it was able last year, to devote \$4,000 of its profits to the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

No beneficent institution of our Church lies nearer the heart of our people than this fund, established for the support in part of the worn out preachers who have devoted the best energies of their lives to the service of God and of His Church, and who in age and feebleness extreme are dependent upon this fund for their maintenance during life's latest years. Through the liberality of the Church the claims of these veterans of the cross have been more fully met than heretofore, and the continuance of the same generous liberality is confidently anticipated.

Dearly beloved brethren, we would urge upon you the duty of self-denial, especially in reference to the use of tobacco, which we believe to be hurtful to the physical, mental and moral nature of man, besides being a waste of the Lord's money, many of our people spending more for the gratification of this appetite than for the cause of Christ.

In the great moral conflict of the day against the appalling evils of intemperance we confidently bespeak your heartiest efforts both by precept and example, by your votes and by your prayers.

We affectionately urge upon you, beloved brethren, the duty of cultivating personal piety and family religion. Watch over your own souls and over those whom God has committed to your charge, that at the great day you may say, "Lo, here are we and the chil-

dren whom Thou hast given us." In a pleasure-seeking and luxurious age seek to maintain the primitive simplicity and purity of the faith. Be not carried away by the vain desires, the idle pomps, the lying vanities of this world, the fashion whereof passeth away. Remember that your citizenship is in heaven, whence also ye look for the coming of the Lord Jesus. Seek to keep the garments of your soul unspotted from the world. Seek to walk with Christ in white on earth that ye may be found worthy to walk with Him in white hereafter. Perfect holiness in the fear of the Lord. Let your speech be always with grace seasoned with salt, that ye may know how ye ought to answer every man. Rest not satisfied with securing your own personal salvation. Seek to bring others also to a knowledge of the like precious faith. Let the Word of God be as a fire in your bones, as a burden upon your soul, till you cannot be at rest while others are unsaved around you. Let our beloved Methodism continue to be in even larger degree a grand aggressive agency for bringing the world to the feet of Jesus.

We beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind that ye may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God.

Finally, brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might, and the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and we pray God your whole spirit and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
