

It now sells for ten cents a pound, and 10,000,000 pounds of it are pro-duced annually in Niagara Falls. But this is an ante-climax.

The first gem merchant he went to laughed a laugh that had grown rusty through constant use, and said he would try it just to show it wouldn't work. But it did work, and Acheson went back to Monongahela City with an order for ten carats at forty cents

### THE RISE OF AN INDUSTRY.

On the strength of this order he or-ganized the Carborundum Company and built a furnace that would produce four ounces a day. These improved methods fairly swamped the market, and the prices soon fell to \$440 a pound. And the supply outstripped the demand, until it was found that the operation of valve-grinding could be performed in a mere fraction of the accustomed time if Carborundum was used. Then the price fell to \$10 a pound, and purchasers would keep one or two pound cans in their safes and weigh out the contents to the foreman as they needed it. And all of a sudden the demand passed the supply, and the company started an electric light plant and a one-car electric railway to se-cure a steady flow of the needed cur-rent. Carborundum seemed to have made good. On the strength of this order he or-
