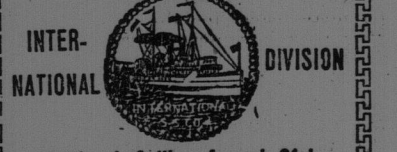

LOT OF TALK OVER CASTING

Director Murdoch Said It Was Defective

Mr. Waring, the Maker, Disputed This and Grew Excited—Director Had His Way.

The attention of the water and sewerage board last night for nearly two hours was taken up by a dispute between Engineer Murdoch and Messrs. Waring of the Union Foundry Co., in regard to a casting ordered by Engineer Hunter which Director Murdoch refused to accept.

At the request of Mr. Wilson, Woodville road, it was decided to make the proposed water extension only as far as his house, thus reducing the amount which must guarantee to give the six per cent. on the investment. The estimate is \$500.

Dispute Over Casting. The chairman said that a dispute over a casting ordered at the Union Foundry had caused a lot of friction and delay, resulting in the high levels not yet getting a full supply of water and also the expense of maintaining two men unnecessarily at the Marsh bridge.

Mr. Waring spoke very loudly and seemed excited. The chairman asked him to be moderate in his tone.

Mr. Waring asked Mr. Murdoch to deny what he said. The director said that the casting should have been put in on the day that it arrived. The cost of the casting was only \$50, while the work has been kept back three weeks and \$310 expended in wages.

Mr. Waring moved that Messrs. Fleming should be asked to make the casting, but he was refused.

RUNYAN ONLY A LITTLE THIEF WHEN HE MET MRS. CARTER—SHE ENCOURAGED HIM TO MAKE HAUL

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Chester B. Runyan, the former paying teller who stole nearly \$100,000 in cash from the Windsor Trust Company last June, today told the story of his downfall in the court of general sessions, at the trial of Laura A. Carter, charged with the receiving several thousand dollars of the money she knew to be stolen. The stolen money, with the exception of about \$25,000 which has never been found, has been restored to the com-pany.

A little later he filled the suit case from the bank vault and started for the apartment which Mrs. Carter had rented in Harlem. Mrs. Carter met him at the door, and her first words to him were: "Have you got the money?" He replied that he had. They spent some time drinking and discussing the possibility of his being followed. The next morning they emptied the suit case and counted the bank notes. There was \$75,000. He gave her \$5,000 and she went out and deposited it in a safety deposit vault. Runyan said Mrs. Carter asked him for money con-stantly, and that on several occasions he gave her sums amounting to sev-eral hundred dollars.

15 YEAR OLD HILLSBORO BOY MET SHOCKING DEATH YESTERDAY—VICTIM OF ANOTHER ACCIDENT WILL LIKELY DIE

HILLSBORO, Aug. 28.—John Taylor, the fifteen year old son of James Taylor of Lower Hillsboro, met with a terrible death this morning. While engaged in the machinery of a car he got entangled in the chain and was so crushed that he only lived a few minutes after he was extricated.

LOCATING GRAVES OF CANADIAN DEAD ARRIVED AT LAST

Colonel Hamar Greenwood, Now in Ottawa, is Interesting Himself in the Matter.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—Lieut. Col. H. S. Greenwood, a Canadian and graduate of the Royal Military College, has just returned for a short visit. He is now a citizen of Johannesburg, where he is resident engineer of the Central South African railways and commander of the railway corps of that district. Col. Greenwood is the representative of the Canadian South African Memorial Association and as testified by Col. D. E. Irvine, secretary treasurer of the association, has given valuable service to the association and to Canada generally, by looking after the lo- cation, transportation and erection of 155 memorial headstones sent from the Dominion to be placed over the graves of Canadian soldiers who fell in the Boer war. He has had sixty-five of these headstones photographed and sent to the relatives of the soldiers lying beneath. Col. Greenwood has brought with him a number of additional photographs which have been taken by him in the past.

AUSTRALIANS HAVE MARKSMEN FROM ANTIPODES GOT LOST ON GREAT WHITE WAY IN NEW YORK—GOOD SHOOTING YESTERDAY.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—Fine shooting was again done on Rockcliffe range today. The weather was good, as it has been from the first of the month, and the scoring was remarkably high. 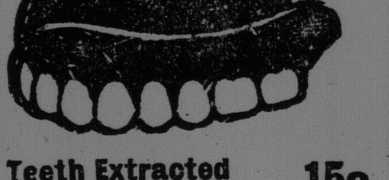
