London, Jan. 14—Armenian refusees arriving at Erivan, Russia, Transcacasia, state that 1,500 Sasun Armenians, who were forced, by cold and famine, to surrender to the Turks under the government amnesty, were killed by order of the Governor of Mush. The men were massacred, and the women and children drowned in the Euphrates river. This news was telegraphed to Viscount Bryce by an Armenian refugee worker.

VAN HORN PAID \$700 BY CAPT. VON PAPEN

Interesting Evidence of Expelled Attache's Part in Conspiracy Revealed by Documents Taken from Him at Falmouth, Eng.—Van Horn's Commission as Lieutenant in German Landwehr is in Possession of United States Department

London. Jan. 14—Copies of corespondence seized from Captain Franz Von Papers, recalled German military attache at Washington, when he réached Palmguith on his way to Gemany, have been turned over to the American embassy for transmission to the State Department. They show that Von Papen made frequent payments to persons charged with the responsibility for blowing up munitions, works and bridges in the United States.

Von Papen's, cheque stubs, bank hooks and letters from his bank, the Riggs National Bank, of Washington, show about 500 items, many of which had to do with routine expenditures. Others, however, revealed payments to various persons who have figured prominently in the activities of German agents in America, and to a least one spy, who committed suicide in a cell in an English prison.
