



FOOD ROTTING IN DANZIG

Thousands of Packages of Food Sent from States a

Complete Waste.

New York, Jan. 29—The United States relief administration today no-tified the State Department that thous-ands of packages of food, sent by per-sons in America to starving relatives and griends in South, Central and East-ern Europe, have been rotting in huge plies in Danzig since last summer. There is no prospect, it added, of the goods reaching their destinations. Cable advices received from the ad-ministration's Warsaw representative said that the loss of food and money would total 'hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Among All Participants Numbered 7,354,000-Men Killed in Action or Died of Wounds.

M. L. Shaw, Upper Woodstock, asks for information as to the number of men who were killed during the war or died of wounds. On March 1st, 1918, General March, of the U. S. A., issued a statement, showing that battle deaths during the war among all par-ticipants numbered 7,354,000, so far as could be estimated from available statistics. This figure includes only men killed in action or who died of wounds.

In the list prepared by the United States General Staff, Russia led with a total of 1.700,000 Germany was see-ond with 1.600,000, and the United States last with 50,000. Approximate figures for other na-tions were: France, 1,355,000; Eng. Iand, 800,000; Huity, 460,000; Turkey, 400,000; Belgium, 102,000; Roumania, 100,000; Serbia and Montenegro, 100,-000.
