The sufface of the ice condenses ammonial and other vapors and odors from the air, and the water set free by the destruction of the ice takes up the ammonia, scents, etc., and holds them securely. since. At the time we made the note no very special practical applications of this idea were purposed, except the detection of impurities in the air of school rooms and halls. The advance in scientific investigation is rapid, and we are glad to notice the utilization of this idea in quite an unexpected way. A block of ice standing in a warm room where there standing in a warm room where there are a number of people assembled wastes rapidly, and gives a quantity of cold limpid water. This water contains the ammonia distilled from the air, and will, if allowed to become warm, give a most disagreeable taste when drank. If there are Lowers or fruit in the room, it will be flavored by them, and any odors thrown off from the perspiration and breath of the people present will also be fixed in the water. It is possible to measure this ammonia-charged water, and to estimate the impurity of the air in the room. This has been done by the distillation tube we have already described, and in time this process may be of great value. The have already described, and in time this process may be of great value. The other and more simple use of this bit of stray science is in the construction of the refrigerators. Refrigerators of the common patterns, where the butter, meats, etc., are placed in the same chamber as the ice, are often contaminated by the waste ice water containing the distilled odors from the meats or fruits. By a new device, recently patented in this country, the refrigerator is made with a cone shaped metallic box hung upside down in the inside. The ice is placed in this through an opening in the top, and the meats, etc., are placed in the refrig-erator from the doors on the side. By this means the ice is kept separate from the meats, and its waste water may be drawn off through the bottom of the me-tallic cone pure and tasteless. On the other hand the moisture that collects on the outside of the inverted cone runs down to the point and drips off into

waste pipe that removes it out of harm's way. This cone shaped box is a perfect adaption of the pointed glass tube used in the new experiments in distillation by cold, and operates precisely in the same G. W.
