The practice of washing harness in warm water and with soap is very damaging, unless a coat of oil is applied immediately after wash- apply to ing. No harness is ever so soiled that a damp sponge will remove the dirt; yet, even when the sponge is applied, it is important to apply a slight coat of oil by the use of a second sponge. All varnishes and blacking that contain the properties of varnish should be avoided.
