British Columbian Timber.

Though the agricultural capabilities of British Columbia are not great, its mines are, doubtless, very rich, and, from a recent report of Professor G. Dawson, of the Geological Survey, its forests appear to be of vast importance. Already the American lumber trade of Puget Sound is very considerable. Many first-class mills have been established in the numerous inlets, several of them being the exclusive support of villages containing 500 or 600 inhabitants. The daily capacity of nine large establishments mentioned by the North Western Lumberman. is 940,000 ft. B. M., and the total product of the Puget Sound mills is put at 1,-100,000 ft. In June last the cut was 200,000,000 ft., and the output of the region is stated to be 25,000,000 feet a year exported to foreign countries 25,000,000 feet used at home, and 150, 000,000 feet sent to California.
