A Talk About Perfumes. low many flowers are used in the ufacture of perfumes? 'The principal ones are roses, orange wers, tuberoses, the jasmine, cassia, of the bat d violet. Aside from the roses Kabbabish. the flowery perfumes are produced in France, where farmers and gardeners vote themselves to the cultivation of flowers for the purpose. The pomades, which are a sort of vehicle for carrying the essences, are shipped to perfumers in all parts of the world. These pomades are all made in the same way. Several new processes have been devised, but none have proved as good as the old method. I may also say that perfumes are everywhere made from the raw material by the same process.'


