A SEA CHANGE.

A TALE OF A MATE AND A COOK.

At the age of twenty-five, John Dorsey possessed few attributes of mind or body that would distinguish him from other sea-faring men, unless it was the deep resonance of his voice and a strong memory for faces, facts, and places—which latter made him a wonderful pilot, his mind retaining a vivid picture of every harbor, island, rock or shoal that he had once seen. His strong lungs, with his pilotage and a general intelligence, raised him early to the quarter deck.

Born at Nassau, in the Bahamas, where his mother still lived, he had obtained such education as the island schools afforded, had followed 'wrecking' until his brain was a comprehensive chart of the whole West India group, and had then made four long voyages—one in the engine-room. At intervals a gleam, as of heat lightning, would light up the blackness. Then could be heard the humming and 'cheep cheep' of a ricocheting solid shot, followed by the bark of a gun. They were firing low.

The chase, commencing with the wind ahead, ended with the wind astern; for the quarry, with large engine and small sail power, had edged around in a wide curve until the sails of the pursuer no longer drew. Before it came down, and coincident with the roar of escaping steam from the punctured boiler, the mate had noted the damage done in his department, and, to apprise the captain on the bridge, roared out: 'Rudder post—'

But the descending belaying pin, striking him a glancing blow on the head, cut short the sentence and he fell to the deck.

The escaping steam brought the cruiser back to the chase, and the 'Petrel' was captured, towed to a Northern port, and condemned. Here John Dorsey, still unconscious though breathing, was placed in the hospital of a military prison. In a week he opened his eyes and smiled—as a baby smiles. Reasons Why the Thrifty Farmer Will Not Delay About this Really Economical Work.—The best Paint to use for Iron and Steel Parts.

Now that the greater part of the season's work is finished, it will be a good plan to gather up all of the implements, plows, harrows, cultivators, mowers, rakes, binders and all such tools and store them away under shelter. It is not only necessary to get them under shelter, but to store them in a good condition. If left exposed to the weather considerable damage will be done by rain, snow, wind and frost. If proper care is not taken in storing away, considerable injury will be done to the iron and steel from rust, and to the woodwork by decay. The dirt should all be cleaned off. If allowed to remain on, as is of en done, it will increase the conditions of decay. Clean off the dirt of every kind, washing if necessary, and then paint well. Lined oil and Spanish brown, red vermilion or red ochre mixed to a proper consistency makes not only a cheap paint, but a durable one, and it will pay to let the woodwork of all the implements and the wagons covered with it.

Black asphaltum paint is best for the iron and steel except the working parts—the shafts and mull-boards of the plows, the spokes of the mowers and parts of this kind that need to be kept bright. These should be well oiled all over or covered with unsalted grease and then covered with a thick whitewash into which a small quantity of glue has been stirred. This will prevent rust and save much time in getting the implements in condition for work in the spring.

The work of cleaning and painting can be done better now than at any other time, and the tools will be all the better for it. Some time in the spring can be saved if a little care is taken in storing them away. Put the implements like the mowers, binders and hay rake in first, and the plow, cultivator and harrow that will be needed first in the spring, last. This will save overhauling in the spring. If the tool-shed has no floor, put boards under the wheels, and under every part of the machinery that comes directly upon the ground.

Shelter for the machinery and putting away in good condition will pay as well as good sheltering of the stock. Summer sun and rain are almost, if not quite, as injurious as winter wind and storms.—S. Louis Republic.
