

Three Brothers Killed in India by a Tiger.

Another and tiger story is reported from India. In the vicinity of Akote, the patrol of a village, well known as a tiger shikarree, was aroused late at night by a tumult in his cattle shed, and peeping through the crevices of a door discovered a tiger coolly walking off with a calf. The patrol fired, wounding the tiger, which dropped his prey and fled. The next morning the patrol, accompanied by his two brothers, and a parahi (the first armed with a gun and sword, and the remaining three with swords only), went in search of the animal, which was easily followed owing to the blood stains on his track. The tiger was first seen by the patrol lying apparently helpless under a bush, when he incautiously rested his gun against the trunk of a tree, and approaching the tiger, he was suddenly sprung up with a roar, and struck the patrol's sword. The two brothers attacked the tiger with their swords, but were disposed of in the same manner. By this time the parahi came up and swinging his arm in his dagger thrust it into the tiger's mouth and proceeded to hack him with his sword, but the tiger was quite spent, and quietly fell back dead by evening all three brothers died from the injuries.

Extraordinary Separation Case.

Lady Pollak, of Pollak, R. N. W. S. W. has raised before the Scotch Court of Session, an action of separation and aliment against Sir Hew Crawford Pollak, her husband. She asks aliment to the amount of £1,000 per annum, and she lays her action on the ground of an extraordinary series of acts of cruelty towards her, including setting the bulldogs at her, and repeatedly beating her since the date of her marriage in June, 1871. Sir Hew denies the charges of cruelty and explains that during his absence in America, some years ago, he contracted a habit of drinking to excess and of frequenting drinking bars. He made the pursuit's acquaintance in December, 1870, in Scotland, where she was a barmaid, and where she was perfectly aware before her marriage of his failings. He admits having drunk to excess since his marriage, but denies ever having intentionally hurt the pursuer. He has all along intended and still intends to treat her kindly, and regrets any acts of roughness of which he may have been guilty. Any such acts, he says, must have been due to his unfortunate failing of drinking to excess, and to her irritating conduct. As regards some of the grosser acts of cruelty alleged against him, he admits that under the influence of drink he may have sworn at and spoken rudely to Lady Pollak; but he adds that she is not a person of refinement, and that she has all her life been accustomed to associate with persons of rough manners.

A BAG-BAG CONTAINING \$4,000 SOLD TO A PEDLAR.—A lady in Lynn, Mass., last week, sold a bag of rags to a pedlar. She was perfectly well satisfied with her bargain until she remembered that in order to guard against thieves and robbers she had secreted in the bag two bank books, notes, and so forth, to the value of about \$4,000. But, considering how careless she had been, she was luckier than she deserved to be, for, with all the energy and astuteness of despair, she sought for that pedlar, found him in Salem, and recovered her treasure. We might offer a moral—but it would be of no use. Women who hide bank books in rag bags are beyond the reach of all morals in the world.

AN AWKWARD PRECIPITANT.—An unpleasant event lately befel a young man at Kingston who wanted to be photographed in military uniform. While crossing Wilminton Common he met another young man in military uniform, and after some conversation the latter suggested to him that he would look well photographed as an artilleryman, and proposed to lend him his uniform. The innocent youth at once gratefully accepted the offer, and went to be photographed. While the artist was engaged in posing him in an attitude sufficiently military to suit his warlike aspirations, his accommodating acquaintance disappeared with his civilian's dress. The sinner, however, paid little attention to this, and the operation being completed, walked to Kingston, proud and happy in the possession of a military photograph. On arriving at Kingston he was suddenly apprehended as a deserter, and taken before the magistrates. He succeeded in proving his innocence, on relating the trick which had been played upon him, but the clothes were taken on behalf of Her Majesty, and the young man was accordingly detained until he could procure other clothing from his friends.

THE LATEST FRENCH SENSATION.—A case likely to call forth all the emotional resources of a French jury is told as follows: "A young man, having accepted a challenge from a noted duellist, goes home and tells his mother all about it. The good lady rushes off distracted to the house of the duellist, whom she finds practicing with a pistol in his garden, and, what is worse, hitting the mark every time. She implores his mercy, but is coldly repulsed by the marksman, who declares his intention to kill her son. Thereupon in her wrath and terror, the poor woman snatches up a pistol and shoots the duellist dead. The chances are that she will be acquitted, and indeed, it is difficult to imagine any case which offers more genuine, extenuation. A jury of mothers, at least, would not very long deliberate upon her verdict.

"Lord Gordon, who 'played it' on Jay Gould and Frie to the tune of \$200,000, as reported at the time, has been the cause of some excitement in Manitoba, where one of his New York sureties had followed him with

the intention of getting him within U. S. jurisdiction. He denied the authority of the American officers to remove him, and refused to go, but was overpowered, ironed, placed in an ambulance, and driven rapidly towards the line. The party was intercepted however by the Manitoba police; and the detectives placed in confinement. We may expect some heavy discharges from Uncle Samuel's news paper gomers on account of it.

THE FUEL QUESTION IN IRELAND.—There is now being brought into Dublin from Rotterdam and sold at 18s. per ton, for fuel, while the Bog of Allen, 30 miles long and 60 feet deep in places, is perfectly unproductive, although it extends to within a few miles of the city, with one canal, at all events, running through it into the town, and the poor houses are full of able bodied idlers.

The Standard.

SAINT ANDREWS, JULY 23, 1873.

The Summer Term of the Court of Oyer and Terminer was opened yesterday, His Honor Justice Weldon presiding. There was a large attendance of persons from the country, notwithstanding the busy season of haymaking. Eight civil causes and two criminal cases were entered for trial. The first for intent to do bodily injury, for which the Grand Jury found no bill; the second for receiving stolen goods. The Judge's charge to the Grand Jury was brief, and principally referred to their duties.

LORD AND LADY DUFFERIN, and suite, have visited Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Newcastle, Miramichi, within the past week, at both which places they received a hearty welcome and an enthusiastic reception. His Excellency has the happy faculty of making felicitous replies to Addresses.

The Pacific Railway

Negotiations, are the all engrossing topic of the day. The startling revelations made by Mr. McMullen, Sir Hugh Allan's ally, Mr. McPherson's letter, and Senator Foster's statement, have put things in a new light, and created a feeling of uneasiness among the friends of the Cabinet, not without some show of reason, for the charges are very grave, and compromise the honor of our public men: so much so, as to require explanations from Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir F. Hinks, and Hon. Mr. Langevin, who are said to have received money from Sir Hugh Allan, to carry on the elections; the late Sir George Carter is also said to have received a large amount to assist in securing the return of members who would support the Government. The only mention made of the other members of the Cabinet is at a meeting on the 6th October, 1871, for entering into preliminary arrangements with Sir Hugh Allan and the Americans for the building of the Railway,—there were present Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir F. Hinks, Sir G. Carter, Hon. Messrs. Tilley, Tupper, Mitchell, Morris, Aikens and Chappais, but we are delighted to notice that not one of the Maritime Ministers is accused of receiving money for the elections, nor any insinuation made against them; indeed they are placed in an unpleasant position, for while they had nothing whatever to do with Sir Hugh Allan's bribing operations, still they are members of the Cabinet and the reputed sins of their colleagues are visited upon them. After all, the seeming disclosures of facts, as published, require confirmation, for there is no question that the Government could not, would not, and dare not, set the country's interest, for the purpose of obtaining money to carry on their own elections.

We are zealous for the honor of our public men, as it is absolutely essential to the safety of our government that we should have faith in the honor and disinterestedness of the Ministry, and we hold that it is manifestly unfair to brand men, holding the highest positions in the government—statesmen and patriots, as conspirators, betrayers of their country, &c., upon ex parte statements of disappointed persons, who failed in obtaining control of the public lands and funds, and who would stick at nothing to blast the reputation and hurl from power men who are entrusted with the government of the Dominion. Let judgment be suspended until irrefragable proof is given of their guilt. In two instances the statements of Mr. McMullen have been flatly denied,—first in the case of the "Montreal Gazette," and secondly by Sir Francis Hinks. Let the public wait until the Government rises to explain, when it is probable they will establish their innocence.

Since the above was written, official information has been received, which exculpates those members of the Cabinet named by Mr. McMullen, from any blame whatever. The premier, Sir John A. Macdonald, positively denies the charges of complicity in the Pacific Contract, and that the transactions connected with the case, will be laid before the proper tribunal under oath, in a short time. The Attorney General Olmest, also denies having received \$6,000 or any other amount. The allegations against the "Minerve," and "Montreal Gazette" of having received amounts of money from Allan have been denied in positive terms. Sir F. Hinks also states the Government never agreed nor were not paid for granting charter or contract. How professed friends of the Cabinet, enjoying a large share of patronage, can predicate articles on sensational telegrams, and for a moment cast a shade of doubt upon the Government's conduct in the Pacific affair, is to say the least unfair as well as indiscreet. The Cabinet will respect an open opponent while they will despise a tame supporter.

From the very latest telegrams it is pleasing to

be assured that Hon. Messrs. Tilley, Tupper, and Mitchell have had no connection with our knowledge of Sir Hugh Allan's arrangements with reference to money advanced for election purposes.

THE GRAMMAR SCHOOL will be re-opened on Tuesday next, 29th inst.

EARLY POTATOES.—Mr. Edward DeWolfe, of Katy's Cove Farm, in this Parish, has raised some excellent potatoes. Mr. DeWolfe is generally among the first to bring early peas and potatoes to market, and like a sensible man, he remembers the Press. He has our thanks for the liberal supply of new potatoes. We trust he has sufficient grown to supply the demand.

The weather still continues warm. The refreshing rain of Saturday afternoon and evening was of great service to the growing crops. Haymaking is now the order of the day, with splendid weather for operations.

PACIFIC RAILWAY SPECULATORS.—So much has been said and written with reference to the Pacific Railway matter, that anything connected with the Americans who were partners with Sir Hugh Allan, will be read with interest. Mr. McMullen appears to have kept a journal of transactions and conversations, and copies of all orders and checks. The people in the States, do not credit all that their countrymen assert, in fact they treat the affair with ridicule; a few weeks will determine the matter, and in the mean time, it will be wise to withhold any expression of opinion upon the sensational telegrams which are published. One thing is plain, there is a gross perversion of truth somewhere. The whole business is so mixed up, that the Investigating Committee will have a difficult task to separate truth from misstatement, and the sooner it is done the better for the country.

The Chicago Tribune says Smith and McMullen, who figure so largely in the imbroglio about the Canada Pacific railroad, are not known at home. Their importance in Canadian speculations is purely relative, but the Tribune thinks "any candid observer will admit that to seize a transcontinental railway controlled by two Governments, make a fool of Sir Hugh Allan, and overturn a Ministry, is a very fair job for a brace of Chicago speculators, and one which will add largely to our consequence abroad."

BUSINESS.—The recent advance in the price of printing material including paper and wages, has led the proprietors of printing establishments to raise their prices from the old rates, when material, wages, and living, were nearly fifty per cent. than they are at present. The rates of advertising, job work, and subscriptions are much lower in the Dominion than elsewhere, and will bear to be raised a trifle. Were the publishers and printers to form themselves into an Association, and adjust the prices to something like a fair remuneration, (which they are not at present) it would be advantageous to all concerned. Establish the prices, and let the rule be in all cases—no variation.

THE NEW DOMINION MONTHLY for July is a very fair number. The literary selections, poetry, and sketches of travel are good; The Young Folk's Department as interesting as usual, and "The Home" Miscellaneous repeats with sketches, receipts for housekeeping adornment, flower work, cookery, &c.

We have received the Annual Announcement of the Faculty of Medicine, of Dalhousie College and University, Halifax, N. S.

The Cholera is abating in some parts of the United States, but has broken out at Columbus, Ohio, and fears are entertained of its reaching Ontario.

From the Trade Circular of Messrs. Henry Glawson & Co. New York, we learn that "The prospect of the Cotton crop is at present surrounded with some doubt. There is no room for question that about 10 per cent. more land has been planted than last year. The Agricultural Bureau estimates the increase of acreage at near twelve per cent; the New Orleans Cotton Exchange report shows an increase of 14 1/2 per cent; and two commercial journals published in this city, which have made extended inquiries at the South, report respectively 14 and 11 per cent. additional acreage. The weather has been unfavorable; the crop is two or three weeks later than last year; and its general condition averages 10 to 12 per cent. below that of the same period of 1872. There is a heavy growth of weeds; and fears of the caterpillar are entertained. On the whole, the progress of the crop, thus far, has not been flattering."

BASE BALL.—The match played between the "Resolute" of St. Stephen, and the "Mutuals" of St. John, on the Barrack Square in that city on Monday last, resulted in favor of the "Mutuals." The score stood "Mutuals" 34; "Resolute" 16. The St. Stephen men were entertained at a Supper given by their St. John visitors.

GRAND MANAN PACKET.

The Grand Manan Packet has been fitted up by Capt. Pettes, with modern improvements for the comfort and accommodation of passengers; the arrangements are such as will give satisfaction.

The Customs Department has purchased a swift sloop for Customs service. We are informed that no appointment of master or boatman has yet been made.

Telegraphic News.

London, July 18.

The "Gazette" announces that the Queen has given her consent to the marriage of Prince Alfred and Grand Duchess Marie Alexandria. The friends of Edward Miall, the founder and editor of the "Non-Conformist," gave him a reception at the Crystal Palace, this evening, and a testimonial purse of \$50,000. The Shah will visit Constantinople on his way home.

London, July 18.

The Khan of Khiva is to pay Russia two million roubles indemnity, in consideration of which he will be confirmed on his throne.

London, July 19.

Sixty-two cases of cholera are reported at Vienna, forty-two being fatal.

New York, July 19.

A crowded church floor in Hudson City, N. J., fell last evening. Many severely injured; two fatally.

London, July 21.

It is now positively announced that Parliament will be prorogued the first week in August.

St. John, July 15.

Samuel Willesford, D. D., Bishop of Winchester, fell from his horse yesterday and was killed. He was riding with Earl Granville on a visit to Mr. Gladstone. The horse was going at full speed. The Bishop's neck was broken and death was instantaneous.

The master builders have accepted terms of compromise with the journeymen. The maus have not yet come to an agreement.

London, July 15.

A fire on Saturday destroyed twenty-one buildings. Its extent was bounded by St. Ambrose, Esplanade, Margaret and Ince streets. Eighty-five families were made homeless.

Washington, July 14, 1873.

The Postmaster General feels assured that the abolition of the franking privilege will result in such an increase of postal revenues as will make the postal service entirely self-sustaining. The receipts from the sale of stamps since the abolition of the franking privilege very considerably exceed the receipts from that source for any similar period in the history of the Government. The sales of stamps last week exceeded \$1,000,000.

The Finance Bureau of the Post Office Department has made a computation which shows that the paper alone of the postal card now furnished by the Springfield office—the cards being now of standard quality—costs more than the contract price for the cards. The firm is thus working at a great loss, and it is supposed will seek relief from Congress.

Eastport, Me., July 14.

Revenue cutter McCulloch has just arrived here with the officers appointed by the Government to establish life saving stations on this coast.

The trial of the Medusa was, as might have been expected, little else than a farce. The guilt of the criminals was known, and the court was organized to convict. Gen. Davis's original plan of hanging them at short notice was much the simplest and cheapest, and many will believe also the best method of disposing of the murderers.

The following general rule has been published over the signatures of the Chief Justice and Judges Allen, Weldon, and Wetmore: "No venue shall be changed (unless by consent of parties) without the special order of the Court, or a Judge, founded upon a rule nisi or summons."

Vice President Tom Scott, of the Pennsylvania Central, has gone to Europe on the double errand of negotiating the bonds of the Texas Pacific and freeing the Memphis and El Paso Railroad from the claims of the French stockholders, who were victimized by Gen. Fremont and his agents.

It is said that many Englishmen of rank and fortune will visit the Western plains next autumn during the coming season of sport. The Earl of Dunraven has already arrived, and has secured the services of the well-known "Buffalo Bill" who accompanied him on previous occasions as guide and travelling companion.

A veteran observer in England declares that reform in domestic economy, as in everything else, requires an amount of time, thought and energy to which very few people are equal.

A worthy old farmer, who was being worried in his cross examination by a lawyer in Maine, exclaimed "Look here, square, don't you ask a good many foolish questions?" When I hear a man say, "that he has got no

Ottawa, 27th June, 1873.

SIR—I have in command to call your attention to the following sections of the Act, re-
pecting the admission of the Colony of Prince
Edward Island, as a Province of the Dominion:

Section 3.—If after the admission of Prince
Edward Island into the Dominion, there be
brought from it into any other Province of Can-
ada, any article of commerce not being the pro-
duce of the Island or of Canada, and liable to
any duty of Customs when imported into Canada
from any foreign country, or any such article pro-
duced in the Island and liable to a duty of Excise
if produced in Canada for consumption therein,
then if such Canadian duty of Customs or Excise
be greater than the duty of Customs or Excise
paid on such article in the Island, the difference
between the Canadian duty and the duty paid in
the Island, shall be payable on such article when
brought from the Island into any other Province
of Canada, and such difference shall be collected
under such regulations as the Governor in Council
may from time to time make in that behalf; and
any such difference of duty payable under this Section,
shall be a duty of Customs within the meaning of
the Act respecting the Customs hereby extended to
the said Island all the provisions thereof
(including those respecting warehousing) and the
penalties for contravention of such provisions, shall
apply to such difference of duty.

Section 4 limits the operation of the above
Section, to "the end of the now next Session of
the Parliament of Canada, and no longer."

As an Order in Council has yet passed fix-
ing the procedure of the Customs in col-
lecting the difference of duty in the cases men-
tioned, I have to request you carefully to examine
such dutiable goods as may be brought to your
port from the Island, and to inform yourself of the
actual rate of duty paid thereon, and collect the
difference between the rate so paid, and the rate
per Dominion Tariff, and upon the fact of such
entry, to show the full original value of the goods,
the rate and amount of duty paid, the rate and
amount of duty under the Dominion Tariff, and
the difference, to be collected, and all such transac-
tions are to be accounted for in your statistical
books and returns, separately from the general
specifications of imports.

If the goods brought to your port are the produce of
the manufacture of the Island, and subject to duties of ex-
cise, the difference to be collected will be between the
excise duty paid, and the excise duty of the Dominion;
but in all cases the amount collected is to be treated by
you as an import duty of Customs.

The Act, and these instructions are enforced from
and after the date when they may be assigned for the sit-
uation of the Island in the Dominion by proclama-
tion of Her Majesty the Queen.

lons of oil for lamps, 5,000 tons of paraffin,
and 600 tons of sulphate of ammonia. Formerly
the coal used to yield 120 gallons of crude oil to the ton, but the supply of that
quality is exhausted, and shales are now work-
ed which yield not more than from fifteen to
35 gallons per ton.
