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MAY BE APPOINTED TO SUPREME COURT

Mr. LeBlanc Said to Be Stated
For King's Bench Division
of the Court.

There is a persistent report that Hon. A. E. White, a judge of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, is about to retire because of ill-health. It will be remembered that he had a most serious attack while here attending a session of the court a few weeks ago, and previously he had been away from the province on an extended trip to Europe for the benefit of his health, but which unfortunately appears to have effected no permanent betterment.

In political circles the report persists that Arthur T. LeBlanc, C.M.L.A., of Campbellton, will be appointed to the vacancy thus created on the Supreme Court Bench. Mr. LeBlanc may not be regarded as one of New Brunswick's foremost lawyers, but he has been in practice since 1908 and he is an Academic and the Academic have been proceeding against, consistently for the appointment of a member of their race to the Supreme Court bench over since the death of the late Sir Pierre A. Landry, who was chief justice. It is expected that Mr. LeBlanc will become a member of the Appellate Division, but rather than Mr. Justice Barry will go to the Appellate Division and Mr. LeBlanc will be appointed to the King's Bench Division.—Gleaner.

CAMPBELLTON BILL BEFORE COMMITTEE

Coun. Belle-Ile and Solicitor
Car Appear in Favor
Of Same.

The three Campbellton bills, one of which gives authority for the issuing of \$235,000.00 for overdrift, water and sewerage extensions and permanent streets, were before the municipal committee of the Local Legislature last Wednesday morning.

H. A. Carr, Town Solicitor was heard in support of the bill. A plebiscite had been held on the question of debenture issue and the vote had been in favor. The civic election immediately following had been on the same issue and the entire ticket with one exception, which supported the issue, was returned. Ald. A. C. Belle-Ile also was heard in support.

It was decided to consider the bill in private session.

This week a delegation consisting of Messrs. Wm. Richards, A. A. Andrew, F. M. Anderson and C. A. Alexander are in Fredericton interviewing the government in reference to these bills. The Graphic understands that they are asking that before authority to issue bonds is given the property owners be permitted to vote on the question.

HEAVY LOSS AT UPPER CHARLO

Thos. Craig's House and Barns
Burned.

A most disastrous fire swept Upper Charlo, a thriving village twenty miles below Campbellton on the main line of the C. N. R. yesterday afternoon doing damage to the extent of \$30,000.

About four o'clock it was discovered that Mr. Thos. Craig's residence was on fire. A northwest gale was blowing and the whole roof was soon ablaze.

The embers were carried to the next neighbor, Harry McKenzie's property, a considerable distance away and that was soon blazing, the house, barns and sheds being completely destroyed.

From there the fire jumped to A. S. Arsenau's house, and this with the store adjoining was soon masses of flames.

The next building to go was the blacksmith shop at the roadside a considerable distance from the highway.

Other buildings caught fire but were saved by hard work. The hardest fight was made to save Mr. Robert Craig's residence and this was accomplished.

The losses are estimated as follows:—

Thos. Craig—House and sheds, household furniture saved, loss about \$3000, insurance \$1500.

Harry McKenzie—House, barns, outhouses destroyed. Lost all farm produce, implements, seed, nets, etc. Loss about \$7000.00. Some furniture saved. Insurance \$2000.00.

A. S. Arsenau—House and store destroyed, with nearly all contents, including automobile and a large general stock. Little household goods saved. Loss about \$20,000. Insurance about \$10,000.

Mr. LeBlanc—Blacksmith shop and tools. Loss about \$500.00. No insurance.

Mr. Arsenau was away from home so that his loss is hard to estimate. Many nearby families moved out all their household goods, and live stock were turned out into the fields.

"JOSH" COOLING'S ILLNESS WAS FATAL

Well Known Bivalvick Character
Passed Away Last Friday Night.

(Bivalvick Paper.)

A. J. Cooling, familiar and genial character in Bivalvick for the past fifteen years, died last Friday night following an illness of about a three weeks. He was first taken down with the grippe shortly after New Year and this together with complications brought on by Bright's disease hastened his death. During practically all of his illness he was under nurses' care.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon under the direction of the Order of Eagles of Evesleigh, of which he was a member. Short services were held at Gosley's undertaking room where Rev. B. D. Hanson read from the Scriptures and offered a prayer and G. H. Loxman read from the lodge ritual. Burial was made at Lakeside cemetery where Rev. B. D. Hanson conducted the committal service and Mr. Loxman took care of the lodge service. The pall bearers were William Dopp, K. S. Johnson, William McLetchy, James Scoslon, James McLetchy, William O'Hara, Dennis Hogan and Clarence Green. A number of members of the Evesleigh lodge were present at the funeral.

Anthony Joshua Cooling was born in Fiddiside, New Brunswick, Canada, in 1857 and at the time of his death had attained the age of 65 years. Not a great deal of information is available in regard to his early history until 1890 when he came to Osoyoos, Wisconsin, and for fifteen years followed the life of a woodsman in Wisconsin and the northern peninsula of Michigan. In 1906 came to the Range and for about a year was employed as farm hand and volunteer in the company of the Virginia & Rainy Lake company. The following year he entered the saloon business in Bivalvick which he continued until the territory was dry. Since that time he has maintained living quarters in the rear of his building on Main street and was a familiar character on the streets during the summer months.

"Josh" as he was familiarly known, was always genial and pleasant and had a cheerful word for all. His outstanding characteristic was his size. He was six feet six inches tall and at the time of being taken down with his last illness weighed approximately 325 pounds. During the winter months he "hibernated" in his living quarters, coming out only on rare occasions for a movie show or when the bright sun was out. Suffering from rheumatism in the back and his feet were so stiff that he was unable to walk any considerable distance.

In the winter of 1921 he was afflicted with rheumatism and almost superhuman strength. In those days he weighed about 275 pounds, a solid mass of muscle, and it is told how he used to juggle barrels of coal and port, weighing 300 pounds in the manner which the ordinary man handles 100 pounds. JUDGEMENT IN GASPE CASE

Ownership of a Lot of Land
Settled by Court
Judgement.

An interesting judgement has been handed down by the Superior Court at Percé, in the County of Gaspé, in which William Greer was plaintiff and Rami Kennedy, of Douglastown, defendant.

Some forty years ago Lawrence Kennedy acquired a piece of land by location ticket from the Crown. Fifteen years ago the letters-patent were issued for this land, reading as follows:—"Letters-patent in favor of the legal representatives of 'Lawrence Kennedy'."

Since a number of years ago Rami Kennedy who is not a relative of Lawrence Kennedy's had been in possession of this lot, and the plaintiff ordered him to give up possession, claiming that he, the plaintiff, was one of the legal representatives of the said Lawrence Kennedy, and that he was entitled to the lot.

The defendant, Rami Kennedy through his attorney set up that he was entitled to this lot, because he and his predecessors had had possession for over thirty years, and that the words "legal representatives" in the letters patent did not necessarily mean the legal descendants of the party who held the original location ticket, but meant all parties who had any right whatsoever under the civil law of the Province of Quebec to the lot in question.

The Court upheld the pretensions of Rami Kennedy, and declared that the plaintiff was not entitled to this lot, although he was one of the legal representatives of the original party who held the location ticket.

The plaintiff was represented by Mr. W. A. E. Flynn, of Percé, and Rami Kennedy represented by the Honorable John Bell Kelly.

BONAVENTURE CO. COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting Held at New Carlisle, Wednesday, March 8th.

A General Meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure was held at the Town Hall, at New Carlisle, on Wednesday the 8th day of March, 1922, at ten of the clock in the forenoon.

The following were present: Thomas Levesque, Esq., Mayor of Matapedia (St. Alexis); Adela Dufour, Esq., Mayor of Restigouche North West Part; S. Moreland Adams, Esq., Mayor of St. Laurent de Matapedia; John A. Oatman, Esq., Mayor of Restigouche South East Part; Thomas R. Busted, Esq., Mayor of Mann; Robert Glover, Esq., Mayor of Escomine; George Fremette, Esq., Mayor of St. Jean L'Evangeliste; Pierre Cyr, Warden, Esq., Mayor of St. Omere; H. J. E. Martin, Esq., Mayor of Carleton; Isidore J. Cyr, Esq., Mayor of Maria; Robert Hardy, Esq., Mayor of New Richmond; Joseph Ferlatte, Esq., Mayor of St. Charles de Caplan; Pierre LeBlanc, Esq., Mayor of Mueselyville; Alexis Poirier, Esq., Mayor of St. Simeon; Omar Henry, Esq., Mayor of St. Bonaventure de Hamilton; Weston Chisholm, Pro-Mayor New Carlisle; James LeBrasseur, Esq., Mayor of Pasphebec; John Daniel Ross, Esq., Mayor of Hopetown; Eugene Angiehart, Esq., Mayor of St. Godfrey; William Ahern, Esq., Mayor of Port Daniel West; Bienne Derache, Esq., Mayor of Port Daniel East; Simon Chapados, Esq., Mayor of Gascon.

The whole forming a full meeting of the said Council under the Provisions of the Quebec Municipal Code. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary-Treasurer and approved of by the Council, upon the motion of Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Adams.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Dufour, that his Worship the Warden of the County, Mr. Pierre Cyr, Mayor of St. Omere, be re-elected Warden for the current term.—Adopted.

The Warden was then duly administered the oath of office by the Secretary-Treasurer.

Moved by Mayor Chapados, seconded by Mayor Ferlatte, that the demand of Mr. Hector LeBlanc, Agricultural Representative of the County, for a bonus from the County Council, be left over until the next meeting of the Council for further consideration.

Moved in amendment by Mayor Henry, seconded by Mayor Isidore Cyr, that a bonus of \$300.00 be granted by the County Council, for this year, to Mr. Hector LeBlanc, the Agricultural Representative of this County. Those voting yes—Mayors Poirier, Fremette, Chisholm, Martin, Isidore Cyr, LeBrasseur, Dufour, Adams, Busted, Henry Levesque, Ferlatte, Glover, Ross, Hardy, Oatman and Derache.

There being a majority of five in favor of the amendment, the same was declared carried, and the main motion lost.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Poirier, that the instructions already given to the Secretary-Treasurer to have a valuation made for County purposes for the unorganized territories of the County, be deferred until the month of June next, and that Mr. Ambrose Legace of Matapedia be appointed valuator, vice Mr. Gauthier.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Oatman, that, of the machines guns sent by the War Trophies Department of Ottawa, one of each be distributed, if possible, to the Municipalities of St. Laurent de Matapedia, Carleton, New Richmond, Gascon, Port Daniel West, Bonaventure, St. Omere, Maria and Hope, provided the Ottawa authorities are agreeable.—Adopted.

The report of the County Delegates on the issue between the two Municipalities of St. Omere and St. Jean L'Evangeliste, and read, it was moved by Mayor Hardy, seconded by Mayor Isidore Cyr, that the whole question of the said Road be laid over for further consideration by the County Council at its next meeting in September.—Adopted.

The Secretary-Treasurer was given further instructions by the Council to levy the expenses of the said delegation upon the two said Municipalities of St. Omere and St. Jean L'Evangeliste, according to their respective Valuation Rolls.

It being the hour of 12 o'clock in the forenoon the meeting of the Council was adjourned until 1.30 p.m. upon the motion of Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor Chapados.

At 1.30 p.m. the Council resumed business.

Mayor Busted further called the attention of the County Council to the importance of having live stock of pure breed of every kind, and the urgency of encouraging this idea upon the part of every one, all Councils and Agricultural Societies, to an ultimate successful result. He also pressed upon the Council the measures that should be adopted so as to eliminate as far as possible the dangers resulting from forest fires.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Adams, that the Local Municipality in the County, and within the Jurisdiction of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure, be requested to adopt general resolutions of caution and prudential measures that should be taken by all regarding forest fires, especially as regards the clearing of land and the burning of "brules," and to publish within their limits such resolutions. Further resolved that copies of this Resolution, and of the Local Municipality resolutions be forwarded by the Secretary-Treasurer interested to the Honorable Chas. Marcell, and the Indian Department at Ottawa, and to Mr. Fabien Bujaud, M.P. at Quebec.

Local Municipalities shall be paid in within thirty days from date of their being due, upon due notice having previously been given by the Secretary-Treasurer of the County Council, and in default of the said Secretary-Treasurer is authorized and instructed to institute legal proceedings to collect all amounts due and in arrears.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Derache, that the Local Government authorities at Quebec be respectfully requested to lower the costs of the maintenance of the in-charge, in view of the fact that the high cost of living has greatly diminished, and that such costs are a heavy charge upon the County Council, and that a copy of this present resolution be transmitted by the Secretary-Treasurer to the said Local Government authorities at Quebec.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Levesque, seconded by Mayor Busted, that the County Delegates be instructed and authorized by the County Council to divide the County Road between the Townships of Hope and Cox, and dividing the two Local Municipalities of Hope and Pasphebec, by following the provisions of the Quebec Municipal Code, as in such cases required, the whole at the charge and expense of the two said interested Municipalities, according to their respective Valuation Rolls.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Henry, seconded by Mayor Poirier, that the Local Government authorities at Quebec, be respectfully requested to prevent and suppress the discontinuation of the exportation of rough lumber from going across to, and being manufactured in the Province of New Brunswick, instead of being manufactured in the County of Bonaventure in this Province, to the great detriment of the inhabitants and residents of the County of Bonaventure and further resolved that copies of this present resolution be forthwith transmitted to the Hon. L. A. Tachereau, Prime Minister of Quebec, Hon. Frank Carrel, M.L.C., Hon. John Hall Kelly, M.L.C., and J. F. Bujaud, Esq., M.P.P.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Angiehart, seconded by Mayor Chapados, that Mayors Martin, of Carleton, and Ahern of Port Daniel West respectively be appointed County Auditors for the current term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Poirier, that Mayor Angiehart of St. Godfrey, be re-elected Pro-Warden of the County of Bonaventure for the current year.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor LeBlanc, that Messrs. John LeBoutillier, of Pasphebec, and G. Beaulieu of New Carlisle, be appointed County Auditors for the current term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Hardy, that the amount of \$6,487.43, be assessed by the County Council, in the ordinary way, upon the

of the Municipal Valuation Rolls of the different Local Municipalities of the County, for County purposes, be laid over until the September meeting of the County Council.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Levesque, that Whereas the Local Government authorities at Quebec are now constructing a road through the Matapedia Valley; That Whereas, to secure the full benefit of the said Road to the inhabitants and residents of the County of Bonaventure, it is urgently necessary that the construction of said road be forthwith continued on from Matapedia to Cross Point, with the ultimate view of making the whole of said road, and continuance thereof, a Trunk Road;

Therefore be it resolved that County Council of the County of Bonaventure do respectfully request the Local Government Authorities at Quebec to continue the construction of the said road on to Cross Point, as herein arranged for and that said construction to commence not later than the coming spring;



OUR LOCAL TALENT.
 "Campbellton has promising local talent." You have often heard this remark. That its veracity is indisputable has been repeatedly proven by such events as musical concerts and amateur plays such as "The Last Call" and "The Blue-Eyed Baby". In the above mentioned events our local talent has proven its ability to be of no mean quality. Indeed, some of the players have given performances which approximated to the histrionic skill of a professional.

But what has happened to it? As far as the public is concerned Campbellton might as well not possess it. We have not heard a whisper of anything along this line since "The Blue-Eyed Baby" arrived. No doubt most of our local artists have been devoting their spare time to the various forms of winter sport which this part of the country affords but the winter is now at an end and it will be some time before motoring can offer its devotees any appreciable degree of pleasure; therefore this is the most suitable season of the year to get the old talent under training and develop the new.

There are a few facts we should remember. This town has two theatres, one of which is in disuse and can be hired, we believe, at any time. There are also several worthy causes to which the proceeds of an entertainment may be donated. For instance, the Hotel Dieu and Soldiers'

Memorial hospitals are carrying large debts and the reduction of these by subscription alone would be a slow and onerous task. Moreover the general public is responsive and ever ready to welcome a play or concert at reasonable prices staged by local talent.

All that is needed is organization—the inauguration of some sort of dramatic or theatrical club which would promote systematic training for all those who possess promising ability along this line. If some energetic spirit would assay to organize some such society we are sure that they would be backed by hearty support and have no difficulty in enrolling a large membership.

TWO VOCATIONS THAT ARE NOT ON THE PAY SHEET

There has been several complaints voiced lately about hen-roost robbing and dog poisoning. As far as we know there are no negroes in this vicinity, but, notwithstanding, several valued members of our feathered inhabitants have mysteriously disappeared. NEW LEADER FOR OPPOSITION

John D. Palmer Chosen At Convention Held Last Friday.

NEW LEADER led us through the Convention, March 24—John D. Palmer, of Fredericton, was selected as provincial leader by the convention of the Conservative party in New Brunswick, which was held here this afternoon in the G. W. V. A. hall, York street. Three names went before the convention, those of Mr. Palmer, Charles D. Richards, M. P. of Fredericton and H. A. Powell, former M. P. of St. John. The convention with a registration of 134 delegates on the first vote eliminated Mr. Powell and tied on the other candidates. On a re-vote Mr. Palmer received a majority of four. Mr. Richards was given a unanimous vote, which was given.

W. S. Sutton, former M. P. of Woodstock, was elected chairman and Raleigh Trites, of Sackville, secretary. Addresses were delivered in the course of the convention by the chairman, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Richards and Hon. J. B. Baxter, M. P. of St. John. Mr. Powell was not present.

Mr. Richards, who represents York in the house of Assembly, will continue a leader of the Conservative opposition to the government.

Melon-Growing in the Okanagan

There is a certain market-gardener at Summerland, a little settlement on the shores of the Okanagan Lake in British Columbia, who has made his ten acres famous for cantaloupes, egg plants and peppers. He has five acres of cantaloupes from which last season he shipped 1,200 crates averaging \$3.00 gross per crate.

They are grown on the usual "hill" system 5 x 6 ft. apart and well watered and fertilized.

Mr. A. McLachlan in his winter lettuce house, Summerland, B.C.

From 1/2 acre of early salad-cucumbers the grower makes at least 3 pickings in the season, taking from 110-125 boxes at each picking. These average a clear profit of 50 cents per box, the prices varying from 60 cents up to \$2.00 according to the market.

Another highly profitable line followed by the same grower is early lettuce under glass. Last Christmas I saw one of the greenhouses (18 x 40) full of lettuce for the Christmas trade around Summerland alone, about \$150.00 of it and this will command 100 cents and steady market.—H. G. W.

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Railway News in Brief

Edmonton.—Grain is still coming into Edmonton in large quantities from towns along the line of the Edmonton, Dunvegan & British Columbia Railway. From the Berwyn station and from other northern points, the movement has been of sufficient volume to tax the accommodation in the way of freight cars to the limit, and there is no indication that this large movement will not continue. Much grain is being loaded in preparation for shipment.

Winnipeg.—Stimulated by special rates from Eastern Canada and the United States tourist traffic to the Coast will be fairly good this summer. In the opinion of the C. M. MacPherson, assistant passenger traffic manager, Canadian Pacific Railway, with headquarters in Winnipeg, there will be no general reduction of passenger fares over the Canadian Pacific, Mr. MacPherson thinks. Special round trip tourist tickets should make their appearance about the middle of May.

Calgary.—P. L. Naismith, manager of the Department of Natural Resources of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Calgary recently visited Montreal in connection with the proposed bringing of members of the Royal Irish Constabulary to settle on Alberta lands. In connection with this matter a meeting will be held in Winnipeg at the end of March. Amongst those who will attend this meeting are Sir Augustus Nanton, B. C. Coleman, Colonel J. T. Dennis, and Mr. George Walker, solicitor, Calgary. It is expected that some decision will be reached at this meeting.

Invermere.—Mr. Conrad Kain, Alpine guide at present residing at Wilmer, has received a flattering offer to join the second expedition which is being formed to ascend Mount Everest, the giant peak of the Himalayas. Before coming to this section Mr. Kain was an official guide in the Austrian Tyrol. He was brought out here by the C. P. R. as one of the qualified persons to lead Alpinists in their climbs in the peaks of the Canadian Rockies. He has climbed peaks in all parts of the world. Owing to personal reasons he is unable to accept the tempting offer which has been made to him.

St. John.—With a total of 845,586 bushels of grain shipped from West St. John by the C. P. R. last week, the total for the season to date is 2,518,800 bushels. The grain handled this season will not be less than 12,000,000 bushels. The grain handled this season includes all varieties with the exception of flax and peas. A smaller quantity of buckwheat has been handled. Last season, to date, 6,277,297 bushels of grain were exported and for the whole season, which lasted until June, 9,004.160 bushels were shipped.

Victoria.—The new Canadian Pacific liner 'Empress of Australia' is practically a new ship, having been in the builder's hands at the outbreak of the war. She has lately been converted into an oil-burner, and is similar in equipment and standard to the 'Empress of Scotland.' A twin-screw steamship of 16,500 gross tons, 590 feet in length, 75.2 in breadth and 41.5 in depth, the 'Empress of Australia' will prove a notable addition to the company's Pacific fleet, which already maintains the quickest time across the Pacific with the well-known 16,850-ton liners 'Empress of Russia' and 'Empress of Asia.' She is expected to maintain a speed of 22 knots, and will be able to accommodate 410 first class, 130 second class, 330 third class and 1,000 Asiatic steerage passengers.
