6. Partition of the Ottoman debt among the seceeded territories except for the war debt, which is to be paid by Turkey abone.



Marl is a mixture of disintegrated limestone and clay, it contains in varying proportions lime, phosphorus and potassium. There is no better fertilizer for sandy lands than peat and marl, and it is surprising that greater use is not made of this material on many farms. Small marl beds are common over the Province of Ontario, and this material can usually be obtained for the labor of excavating. Farm labor and teams might be well employed during odd days during the summer and autumn period getting out marl for future applications. Crushed or finely divided marl can be directly applied to the land at any season of the year.—L. Stevenson.

Not many months before that, an American ten-dollar bill brought \$11.90 in Canada—a premium of 19%.

To-day, the difference between the two currencies is so small as to be negligible. A differential of 1.64 of 1% (to-day 1.8 of 1%—Editor) measures the present premium, and some contracts have been made on absolute

The disappearance of the premium of the American dollar in Canada is, in some part, the result of a contraction in American trade abroad, but in great measure it is the result of the expansion of Canadian trade and the very general and substantial improvement in the Dominion's economic posi-tion. The re-establishment of parity between Canada and America marks

A considerable decrease in the number of Eider ducks, one of the most valuable of the water fowl protected under the Migratory Birds Convention Act, is reported this season by the Chief Migratory Bird Officer for the Maritime Provinces. This scarcity is more noticeable along the sea coast of Nova Scotia, one of the principal lanes in the migrations of water fowl, this official states in a recent report to the Commissioner of the Canadian National Parks. Similarly in Massachusetts the Director of the Division of Ornithology of the State Department of Agriculture in his "Notes for Observers," of November 15 remarked that Elder as well as other ducks and geese were appearing in Massachusetts water with few if any young testifying to a disastrous nesting season.
