GAME IN ONTARIO.

Its Value to the Farmer Set Forth by a Former Londoner—How Can It Be Preserved?

[From the Toronto Week.]

An important contribution to the inquiries now being made both officially and unofficially into the question of game and fish preservation comes to us in the shape of a small paraphlet by Mr. Edward Harris, of Toronto, formerly of London. The title of this pamphlet, "Is Game of Any Value to the Farmer?" suggests the course of its argument. Mr. Harris sets forth in a striking manner how greatly an abundance of fish and game adds both to the attractiveness and to the economic wealth of a country, and the irreparable loss which is being inflicted upon this Province by the rapid extermination of both. He shows that the legislation hitherto enacted with a view to their preservation, consisting mainly of attempts to establish close seasons, and to limit or prohibit the export and even the sale of game, while it may do something to check the exterminating process, is quite inadequate to stay it. Much more does it fail to restock the forests, marshes and streams. The remedy which Mr. Harris would suggest is, in a word, legislation to encourage game preservation as a business. The results which he claims would follow are indicated in the following extract:


