Terms of Settlement Proposed by the Powers.

The Question of Evacuating Thessaly Proves Troublesome.

Constantinople, June 11.-In a memorandum submitted to the Turkish Government the powers propose that the crests of the mountains on the Greek frontier be occupied by Turkish instead of Greek troops, and also that the indemnity be in proportion to the F YOUR BICYCLE NEEDS CLEANING resources of Greece. It is further proposed to modify the capitulations or posed to modify the capitulations, or special privileges enjoyed by Greek subjects in Turkey, with the view of abolishing certain abuses which have been the subject of complaint upon the part of the Turks. It now rests with the Turkish Government as to whether peace will be concluded speedily or not, and it is believed that the sultan will resist as long as possible.

London, June 11.—The correspondent of the Daily News at Constantinople, under date of Wednesday, says: "The session of the peace conference called for today has been postponed. It is believed that Turkey is prepared to evacuate Thessaly, except the large tract north of the River Peneus, which includes Tyrnavos, Milouna Pass and other important points.






