Paris, Jan. 10.-In spite of the special precautions taken to prevent them, there was a repetition of the scenes previously witnessed, when the trial of M. Emile Zola and M. Perreux, was continued in the assize court of the Seine. When General Boisdeffre was called he refused emphatically to tes-

tify, under the plea of professional and state secrecy. M. Delagorgue, the presiding judge, consented that Madame Dreyfus should be allowed to testify, on the condition that her evidence was restricted to the Esterhazy case. Over 200 barristers, in their robes gathered at the public entrance and indulged in horse play. When the presiding judge ordered them not to obstruct the passage, the barristers made a demonstration against the judge. Thereupon the commandant of the Republican Guards sent a detachment of troops to quell the disturbance. The intervention of the military was ill received and led to a violent affray. The barristers rushed upon the guards and struck them. One of the young lawyers was arrested, but after quiet was restored he was no longer de-

London, Feb. 10.-Lord Salisbury, in his speech in the House of Lords, said the Earl of Kimberley, in his speech, had repeatedly warned the government against the dangers of excessive acquisitions. Lord Salisbury declared he heartily concurred with the noble earl, and added: "I believe there is danger in our public opinion of a reaction to the doctrine of 30 or 40 years ago, when it was thought that it was our duty to fight everybody and take every-thing. I think that a very dangerous doctrine, not merely because we would thereby excite other nations against us and the reputation we now enjoy in Europe is not by any means pleasant or advantageous—but because there is a much more serious danger of overtaxing our strength. It is courage and wisdom to exert that strength to its attainable limit, but madness and ruin to pass it. It is of extreme importance that we do not allow party feelings to prevent the discovering and following of the narrow lines that separate

latter the British treaties fell. Lord Salisbury repudiated responsibility for this condition of affairs, declaring that if there was any responsibility it belonged to the Gladstone government for allowing the French to invade Madagascar. Lord Salisbury added: "The real truth is we have ground for discontent with the treatment we have received at the hands of the French government. We have protested against it very strongly. We conceive that the adverse tariff now being inflicted upon us is one which the French government, according to ordinary rules of international comity, is not entitled to enforce. Paris the Chinese government has agreed to pay an indemnity of £4,000 to M. Lyaudet, the Frenchman kidnapped in 1895. Pekin, Feb. 10.—The idea of a loan on either British or Russian guarantee has been definitely abandoned. The failure of the British negotiations with such favorable terms seems due to diplomatic bungling, and it is the opinion here that diplomacy is urgently needed. ## Inaugurating The Headquarters.

Important Liberal Gathering in London Last Night.

Col. Leys' Committees Attend to the Number of Many Hundreds.

Ex-Mayor Little Makes an Important Declaration.

The Colonel Meets With an Ovation, and Makes a Speech.

He and Neil McMillan Shake Hands, and Say They Have Always Been Good Friends.

Addresses by Mr. F. E. Leonard, Geo. C. Gibbons, Q.C., T. H. Purdom, Mr. Hume Blake Cronyn and Dr. Cl. T. Campbell.

Last night, the commodious committee rooms of the Liberals of London, corner of Dundas and Richmond streets, were a scene of great animation. Though no special effort was made to bring supporters of Col. Leys together, and only a meeting of committees was announced, many hundreds of electors visited and inspected the premises during the evening, and the structure was crowded with inter- the committee of my division-(cheers) ested and enthusiastic citizens from an early hour until after 10 o'clock. Fully 2,000 persons must have visited and inspected the rooms in that time. The old Priddis establishment is exceedingly well fitted for the purpose of election headquarters. There is on the ground floor commodious space for a general rendezvous, and upstairs ample accommodation for committees. ## A Small Meeting Opens the Conservative Campaign. Merchants as Boodlers.

Mr. Hodgens

Mr. H. B. Ell ot Denounces London

Electors Object to the Cry That "It Is Time for a Change"-Speeches

by the Candidate and

Others.

Mr. T. D. Hodgens, the Conservative candidate for East Middlesex, opened his campaign last night in Collins' Hall, West London. It was a small meeting-so much so that Mr. Hodgens felt called upon to refer to the fact and attribute it to the weather. A considerable portion of the audience was Liberal, another fact which the chairman, Mr. Marshall, casually remarked. However, the order was admirable, and the meeting went along smoothly after it once started. It did not begin until 8:15, the managers delaying it in the hope that the crowd would turn up. Mr. Hodgens made a mild and good-natured address. Whether other speakers followed his example, readers may judge for them-

Mr. Joseph Marshall, ex-M.P., was moved to the chair by Messrs. W. L. moved to the chair by Messrs. W. L. Brown and William Hea.

Mr. Marshall said he had always found the boys in London West intelligent fellows. He hoped the speakers would give reasons why the Ontario would give reasons why the Ontario government should be turned out.

MR. HODGENS. Mr. T. D. Hodgens, the candidate, was first called upon. He excused the small attendance on the ground of the bad weather and walking, but for which three times the number of people would have been present, he said. He noticed that the older men were not represented as well as the young, but many of the young men desired to be enlightened on the questions of the day. Mr. Hodgens said he had always taken an interest in politics, but did not pose as an orator. His nomination was a surprise to him; he had not sought public honors. The Conservative party had for years been in the nority, though represented in the house by some of the ablest men in the province. The speakers of the previous evening had depreciated the leaders of the opposition, and had alleged that outside the members of the government there was no one fit to hold the reins of power. This he denied. Hon. George W. Ross, speaking at Barrie, had been reported in The Advertiser as saying that the Conservatives had no fault to find with the government, and had no definite policy of their own, their only cry being that it was time for a change. Mr. Ross was honest enough to admit that Sandfield Macdonald left a surplus—the only time he had ever heard a cabinet minister make that heard a cabinet minister make that admission. Mr. Ross claimed that \$2,000,000 of it had been spent by the succeeding government to redeem Sandfield's Macdonald's pledges. Was it possible that John Sandfield Macdonald could be responsible for \$2,000,000 spent by his successor, Hon. Edward Blake? According to Mr. Ross, the government had been run for the last 26 years and the finances were just the same now as at the beginning. This the speaker contended was impossible. the speaker contended was impossible.
The government claimed to have a surplus in the hands of the Dominion government, but no one could say what it was, for not a dollar of it was placed there by any of the provincial governments. Mr. Hodgens criticised Mr. Ross' figures, and claimed that he misrepresented the facts concerning the surplus, and that the government had squandered it. The electors were robhed by the London asylum management. He would not mind if supplies were purchased by tenders from Liberals alone, because they would bring down the prices by competition; but he condemned the practice of special contracts, by which the government could lay its hand on a man and exact a toll from him for the privilege of supplying goods for the asylum. No one could find out what was done by this method. Mr. Love had tried to introduce issues into the campaign which were out of place, but he (the speaker) would bring in no issue not in the public interests. Mr. Hodgens took up the public accounts, and announced that the cost of the London asylum was now three times as much as under Sandfield Macdonald's administration. And what was the increase made up of? Of paid servants-of offices created for people who were wanted to sup-

### BARRIOS DEAD.

The President of Guatemala Murdered

-Biographical Sketch. San Francisco, Feb. 10.-Late advices from San Jose confirm the report that Barrios, president of Guatemala, has been assassinated. First Vice-President Manuel Estrada Cabrera has succeeded to the presidency. Gen. D. Jose Ma Reyna Barrios was born in San Marios in 1859. He was a nephew of the former president, Justo Rufino Barrios, who was killed in 1885. In the war of federation the general was in command of a division of the Liberal troops. During the war of 1885, when his uncle, the president, was killed, the general succeeded him as commander of the forces. Later, when President Barrillos was in control, he banished the young general from Guatemala, and he resided in San Francisco for about a year. In 1895 Gen. Barrios succeeded Barrillos as president, his term of office being six years, expiring in March of this year. Last June he publicly declared himself dictator of Guatemala, and from all reports he enjoyed the fullest confidence of his party.

Recall of Spanish Minister De Lome Asked For.

His Letter Abusing President McKinley Made Public.

New York, Feb. 10.-Diplomatic relations between the United States and Spain through Minister De Lome are ter Woodford, in Madrid, until Spain sends a new minister to Washington, or designates a charge d'affaires, says the Washington correspondent. Minister De Lome has cabled his resignation to his government. Assist-

ant Secretary of State Day admitted that this was true by saying that Minister De Lome did not deny the authenticity of the letter to Canalejas, and by stating that a cablegram had been sent to Minister Woodford in Madrid, the contents of which would not be made public until it has reached its destination. DEMAND FOR THE MINISTER'S

RECALL. Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.-The state department this morning gave out for publication the substance of the cablegram sent yesterday to Gen. Woodford, United States minister to Madrid, in reference to the De Lome letter. The statement is as follows: There has appeared in the public prints a letter addressed by the Spanish minister to Mr. Canalejas. This letter, the minister admits, was written by him. It contains expressions concerning the president of the United States of such character as to end the minister's usefulness as a representative of his government in this country. Woodford, therefore, was instructed at once to say to the minister of state that the immediate recall of Mr. Depuy De Lome is expected by the president.

It is stated that up to this time no response has been received from the Spanish government. THE LETTER

The letter containing the criticism of President McKinley was written by Senor De Lome evidently but recently, It bears no date. It was addressed to Don Jose Canalejas, editor of El Heraldo de Madrid at Madrid. The letter was made public by the agents of the Cuban junta in New York, who claim that one of their agents in Havana, at the risk of his life, succeeded in stealing it from Canalejas' private apartments. The objectionable paragraphs in the letter are as follows: "The situation here continues un-

changed. Everything depends on the

political and military success in Cuba. The prologue of this second method of warfare will end the day that the colonial cabinet shall be appointed, and it relieves us in the eyes of this country of a part of the responsibility of what may happen there, and they must cast the responsibility upon the Cubans, whom they believe to be so immaculate. The message (the president's message to congress) has undeceived the insurgents, who expected something else, and has paralyzed the action of congress, but I consider it bad. Besides the natural and inevitable coarseness with which he repeats all that the press and public opinion has said of Weyler. it shows once more what McKinley isweak and catering to the rabble, and besides, a low politician, who desires to leave a door open to me and 40 stand well with the jingoes of his party. he will prove bad and adverse to us. I agree entirely with you; without a military success nothing will be accomplished there, and without military and political success there is here always danger that the insurgents will opinion. # Chapter of

Fire in Pittsburg Resulting in a Number of Deaths.

Four Men Drowned-Fatal Outcome of a Runaway-Supposed Suicide May Prove To Be a Murder.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 10. - A fire of mysterious origin was discovered last night in the six-story cold storage plant of the Chautauqua Lake Ice Company. The entire building will probably be destroyed, together with about \$1,000,000 worth of merchandise of all kinds stored within its walls. An explosion of whisky occurred at 11:15 p.m., which blew out the alley wall on one side with terrible results. At the time the alley was filled with firemen, policemen, newspaper men and others. Many were caught by the falling walls. There are rumors that at least 25 or 30 men are still under the debris. Many people were injured by flying bricks and beams, and all the ambulances and patrol wagons of the city are in con-

stant service. At 2 a.m. six bodies have been taken from the ruins, among them Police Captain Berry.

FIFTEEN PERSONS KILLED. Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 10.-The loss of life and destruction of property by the fire at Thirteenth and Pike streets last night was the greatest in the history of Pittsburg. At least fifteen persons were killed, over a score injured, and property valued at a million and a half dollars was destroyed. Some of the heaviest individual losers are: The Economy Distilling Company, 8,000 barrels of whisky, worth \$750,000; Monongahela Textile Company, wool dealers, 125,000 pounds of woor, Collins' Cigar Company, 25 carloads of tobacco; W.M. Williams, commission merchant, 20 carloads of sugar.

Pittsburg, Feb. 10.—It was just 7:55 o'clock last evening when smoke was seen issuing from the fourth floor of the Union Storage Company's building on Pine street, near Thirteenth. The building was six stories in height, and occupied almost the antipe black had occupied almost the entire block between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets and Pike street and Mulberry alley. Immediately upon its discovery the alarm was sent in and was responded to promptly, but owing to the con-struction of the building it was practically impossible to fight it from within. The only openings in the fire walls

were locked.
For three hours the firemen worked, scarcely knowing what they were doing. The iron shutters were impregnable to their attacks. Finally at 11 o'clock the flames burst out through the roof and shot upward 100 feet, making that part of the city as light as day. Suddenly, above the roar of the flames and the puffing of the fire engines came the first explosion.

Those within the fire lines were seen to fall in all directions. Those outside the lines were not beyond the reach of danger. Those not prostrated by the first blast were knocked down by the reactionary waves of air as the falling walls created a vacuum that seemed to draw in everything.

It was on the Mulberry alley side, where the least danger was anticipated, that the force of the explosion was the most severe, and there the greatest number of fatalities took place. Exposion followed explosion for about half an hour, between 12 and 1 o'clock. Walls kept toppling down and firemen, policemen and spectators were rendered almost powerless to act by the sense of awe and terror which the scene inspired.

THREE MORE BODIES TAKEN OUT. Three more bodies were taken from the ruins at 11 o'clock, making seventeen so far recovered. The dead, it is now thought, will reach 25.





The Importance of Its Speedy Completion.

Hughes had an opportunity of learning the views of the people of British Columbia, the Northwest and Manitoba, on his way to Ottawa, regarding the Canadian Yukon railway. The people of the west, from what Col. Hughes saw, were in favor of the road, "I have always been opposed," said the member for North Victoria, "to building up American cities by the running of the letter. of our railways across American territory merely to save a few miles' distance by constructing on Canadian soil. I am, therefore, now, as I was then, in favor of an all-Canadian route. I also believe in the road bting built at once. As to the terms, no one can tell whether the contractors have got a good bar-gain or a bad once. It they have got a good thing, then Canada will share in it, because each alternate section has been reserved by the crown. Of course, I have not had an opportunity of looking into the contract closely, but

these are the impressions I have formed from what I have read." Washington, D.C., Feb. 10.—Assistant Secretary of War Meiklejohn, on being questioned concerning an Ottawa dispatch to the effect that the Canadian government would not permit an armed force to accompany the Yukon relief expedition, said it was true that there had been some confusion of terms as to the "convoy" which the United States should select to accompany the Yukon relief expedition, and that the matter was still open, but the Cana-dian government had been assured that the enlisted men whom it was proposed to send across Canadian soil were in no sense an armed force, but rather a Red Cross expedition, to distribute relief to all sufferers without regard to nationality, and he had no doubt that the matter would be easily adjusted without great delay.

TURBULENT SCENES IN PARIS. The New York Heraid's Paris correspondent, describing the turbulent scenes attending the trial of Emile Zola, says: "The uneasiness as to the future, while reflected in the press, is much deeper than the newspapers care to admit, and one of the leaders of the anti-Semitic movement has gone so far as to declare that France might have another Saint Bartholomew, in which the Jews might be the sufferers. Certain it is that the cries, "Abas Zola" have been succeeded by those of "A Mort," to the gibbet with him. As the Echo de Paris says, "The hoarse voice of riot is muttering." Wednesday afternoon probably fifteen thousand people gathered in the neighborhood of the Palais De Justice. The immense majority were apparently there with the object of seeing rather than of making trouble. Here and there hot-head-C. A. > THE ASSASSIN OF BARRIOS. New York, Feb. 10.-The news of the assassination of President Barrios, of Guatemala, is confirmed. The dispatch says the assassination took place at 7 o'clock Tuesday night within 150 yards of the president's palace. The assassin is a German, named Oscar Solinger. The circumstances which may have resulted in the assassination of President Barrios were: His first financial blunder, the Central American Exposition, which cost Guatemala a gread deal of money and brought no corresponding benefits. Another enterprise, which exhausted the available funds, was the railroad project to connect the capital with the eastern coast. The shooting of Aparicio, leader of the revolutionary party, was a grave political biunder on the part of Barrios, and arrayed against him the best element of the country. 



MICROBES WE EAT.

[London Chronicle.] At the London Institution last night Prof. W. B. Bottomley, M.A., delivered a lecture entitled "Microbes-Friendly and Otherwise." He commenced by observing that previous to 1830 very little was known about bacteria, whereas at the present time 560 species had been searched out, and this was solely due to the influence of Pasteur. Dealing with fungi, the lecturer observed that ringworm was caused by a fungus very like that which grows on jam. Mice were very subject to ringworm, and it was quite possible for a cat which had been "playing" with an infected mouse to communicate the disease to the first child who fondled it. Taken altogether, however, microbes were more friendly to the human sys-

tem than otherwise, and we were de-pendent on them for the flavor of butter, cheese, game, tobacco, etc. They were so minute that 250,000,000 could be comfortably accommodated on a penny postage stamp, and they multiplied with almost incredible rapidity. They were to be found everywherein the air, in food, in books and on coins. A halfpenny was found by one professor to be giving shelter to a strange collection, including several dangerous varieties, while the specimens on a £1 Scottish banknote were so numerous that he gave up counting. It was estimated that in health a human being took in by respiration 30,-000 germs per day, or 100,000,000 a year. Becteria were the scavengers of nature, and were absolutely necessary for "the round of life." In conclusion the lecturer described the "vicious" varieties, which, he said, only numbered
