

Withdraw From Forward Positions East of Ypres To New Line Without Interference and Destroy Advancing Troops.

FOE REPULSED NORTH OF BALLIEUL

Attempted Attack by German's East of Robecq, After Bombardment, Broken Up by B ritish Artillery Fire and Positions Elsewhere Restored.

With the British Army in France, April 17, 10 a.m.-(By the Associated Press).—It was reported this morning that the British, fighting magnificently, had regained the much-contested town of Wytschaete, although this was not confirmed at the time of filing the present dispatch.

London, April 17.—The battle in Flanders is raging today with incredible intensity, telegraphs the correspondent of Reuter's, Limited, at the British army head quarters in France. As far as the latest reports enable the correspondent to judge, the battle is going in favor of the British. Notwithstanding the desperate attacks of the Germans they have gained no further ground since Tues day morning, and apparently they have lost some.

During his three years' experience in the war zone the correspondent says, he never has heard such terrific and uninterrupted gunfire as has gone on since Tuesday afternoon, and which continued as he filed his dispatch this morning.

ADVANCING AGAIN

The British at dusk on Tuesday, says a Reuter dis patch from the British headquarters in France, were advancing in the neighborhood of Wytschaete, south of Ypres, and were reported again to be holding the ground which they had lost there.

Among the numerous enemy attacks Tuesday after noon and evening in the northern front in Flanders, one in great force in the Zillebeke sector was disastrous for the Germans, whose massed waves were shot down at close range. They apparently were ordered to retire, and then the British gunners got on their flank, the correspondent says, and the slaughter was appalling.

METEREN RECAPTURED

London, April 17.—The British have recaptured Meteren, on the northern battlefront, by a counter-attack it is announced officially,

SUCCESSFUL COUNTERS. The statement follows:

"Yesterday evening we delivered a successful counterattack in the neighborhood of Wytschaete. At Meteren, also, our counter-attack restored the situation, and the village remains in our hands. Throughout the afternoon and evening yesterday repeated hostile attacks north of Bailleul were repulsed with loss to the enemy. Bodies of German infantry advancing in close formation were caught under the fire of our troops at short range and suffered heavy casualties. We secured a few prisoners."

WITHDRAWAL DELIBERATE.

"In consequence of the progress made by the enemy on the Lys front, our troops holding our forward positions east of Ypres have been withdrawn to a new line. The withdrawal was carried out deliberately, without in terference by the enemy. Yesterday afternoon parties of his troops advancing over our old positions were caught by the fire of our outposts and destroyed.







FOCH NOW PLANNING **COUNTER STROKE TO** SMASH THE ENEMY

No Position Yielded Until the Enemy Has Paid Price.

IS AIMING AT DECISION

Bad Appearance of News Does Not Reveal True Significance.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, April 16 .- Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.-The enemy is continuing his forcing tactics and is employing large masses of fresh troops. Since the opening of the western offensive the enemy has thrown in one hundred and twenty divisions, of which many have been thrown in two and even three times. Since the fall of Bailleul the Germans have been fighting up to Ravelsberg. Up to the present, however, he has only advanced a fed hundred yards.

We are confronted by enormous concentrations of men and guns. The purpose of the enemy has been revealed as an operation attempting to separate the Anglo-French armies by rushing on the former. Gen. Foch, in closest agreement with Gen. Haig, is aiming not only at arresting the enemy, but at a counterattack which shall defeat the Germans. Therefore, within certain limits, the sound policy is to allow the Germans to spend their surplus power as lavishly

evacuated.

It must be remembered that Gen. von Ludendorff has laid down all his cards, while Gen. Foch has not yet shown his hand. I know that Gen. Foch's disposition inspires a degree of confidence which the situation in Flanders seemingly does not justify. We may rest assured that our own supreme command is watching both the enemy and the map

Enemy Checkmated So Far.

While the enemy hopes to frustrate our plans by forcing changes by weight of numbers, so far the incomparable steadfastness of our soldiers has deprived the enemy of the fruits of his schemes. The latest report is that the enemy has carried Wytschaete and established himself in Spanbroekmolen. Therefore, although we are upon the slopes of Messines Ridge, the greater part of the ridge is in the enemy's hands.





Government May Ask Sanction to Raise More Than 100,000.

[By Canadian Press.]
OTTAWA, April 16.—Owing to the critical situation which has with some suddenness developed on the western front, and which is likely to continue until the Allied nations have materially increased the strength of their forces, the Government of Canada after the most careful consideration of all the circumstances and possible consequences has reached the decision that It is not only desirable but absolutely essential that substantial reinforcements be secured for the Canadian expeditionary forces without delay. In view of the emergency that has arisen it is now recognized that the additional men so urgently needed cannot be secured within the time required through ordinary operation of the military service act or of any system of individual selection. OTTAWA, April 16.—Owing

Abolish All Exemptions.

The Government has therefore decided that the only way in which reinforcements can be secured in time and in sufficient numbers is by taking authority to order out for service all men of certain defined ages who are physically fit and to abolish all exemp-tions in the case of all men so ordered

out.

It is the intention to call out in the first instance unmarried men and widowers without children between the ages of 20 and 23, both inclusive. It is ages of 20 and 23, both inclusive. It is believed that these young men can be spared with the least disturbance to agriculture and other essential industries. The calling out of men of other ages under the proposed order-in-council, which will be introduced in both Houses Thursday, must necessarily depend upon the exigencies of the war and the need for reinforcements. In the meantime, the military service act will continue in operation as to all will continue in operation as to all other men in Class I, and as regards other classes under the act. Men of 19 Must Register.

Men of 19 must Register.

Men of 19 will be required to register without delay. Every effort shall be made to speed up the work of the tribunals and appeal courts in dealing with the balance of the exemption claims outside, of course, of the men called out unger the new order. claims outside, of course, of the men called out under the new order.

In order that the Government may have full power to deal with the situation as it may develop from time to time, Parilament is asked to approve of the governor-in-council being given the necessary authority to call out the men of any age in any class under the military service act and to abolish all exemptions in the case of any class so called.

The order-in-council not only makes all young men now 19 years of age sub-

all young men now 19 years of age subject to the provisions of the military service act, but also all other young men as well, and when they attain 19

C. E. F. Officers Included. The order removes the exemption now enoyed by officers and men who have served in the expeditionary force, but who did not proceed farther than Great Britain, and have since returned to Canada and been discharged. They will be required to serve if physically fit when their class is called.

Certain treaties are now under negotiation with foreign Governments, under which citizens of such Governments resident in Canada may be made table to military service. Where any liable to military service. Where any such treaty is concluded the order-in-council gives the Government the power to call out the citizens of such country for service as members of the canadian expeditionary force in the same manner as British subjects.

The number of men the Government is authorized to raise under the military service act remains at 100,000. Whether or not Parliament will be called to increase this number before asked to increase this number before the House prorogues depends entirely upon developments at the front, and the prospective need for reinforce-

The minister of militia is given auth-The minister of militia is given authority to grant exemption in the class called to young men who have relatives at the front. This is absolutely the only recognized ground for exemption, it being considered that in view of the exigencies of the military situation there are no men in Canada between the ages of 20 and 23 who are indistronsulated.

"And, whereas, having regard to the number of men immediately required, and to the urgency of the demand, time does not permit of examination by exemption tribunals of the value in civil life, or the position, of the individuals called up for duty."

CABINET TO STAND OR FALL BY HOME **RULE, SAYS BARNES**

Will Resign If Lords Reject Measure.

PASS MAN POWER BILL

Dillon Reiterates His Warning Against Compulsory Service for Ireland.

LONDON, April 16 .- The third reading of the Government's man-power bill was carried tonight by a vote of 301 to

George N. Barnes, Labor member of the British war cabinet (without portfolio), announced in the House of Commons today that the Government intended to introduce a home rule bil immediately, and would use every pressure to pass it.

Mr. Barnes also announced that the Lloyd George Government would resign if the House of Lords refused to pass the new home rule bill.

To Please America. Premier Lloyd George, in the Com-

nons. said: "It is desirable. in the erests of the war, that we should set, e the Irish question, and produce something like contentment in Ireland and goodwill in America."

The premier believed that American opinion supported the man-power bill, provided self-government was given to ireland, and it was of the greatest imortance, at the moment America was endering to the Allies great aid on the attlefield, that Great Britain should satisfy American opinion. Nothing would tend more to secure the greatest measure of American assistance.
Lloyd George announced that the man-power bill is imperative, because Germany has just called up a further bell-million men

Dillon's Solemn Warning. Dillon's Solemn Warning.

In the report stage of the man-power bill, John Dillon, chairman of the Irish Nationalists, moved the omission of the Irish clause, and pressed the Government to give its real plans. He recommended that the Government go to the counties of Antrim and Down, and try to hold conscription meetings. That, he said, would open the Government's eyes.

That, he said, would open the Government's eyes.

Doubtless the giving of home rule would produce a great effect, but at the present time the Government appeared neither able to carry on the war successfully nor accept peace; neither able to govern Ireland nor allow Ireland to govern itself.

Mr. Dillon said he had been 40 years in public life, during some of the stormiest periods of Irish history, but he solemnly warned the Government that he had never known anything to ne solemniy warned the Government that he had never known anything to approach the feeling in Ireland today. If conscription was applied the chaos and confusion ensuing would be appalling, and, he declared, Ireland would be turned into another Belgium.

KEEP THE FOOD LINE UNBROKEN, IS APPEAL



B. Thompson, head of the food control board, Ottawa, in a short address at a luncheon in the Windsor Hotel here yesterday, held under the auspices of the Montreal Publicity Association and the Kiwanis Club, whose guests included a number of public-spirited women. The chief guest was Hon. Everett Colby of the United States food administration, Washington, who urged sacrifices in food consumption and who declared that he would not sit at a table with a man who would eat white bread.

UNIONISTS FEARFUL OF HOME RULE QUESTION

London, April 17.—A lengthy meeting of the Unionist war committee, which was attended by 127 members, was held in the House of Commons last night to consider the question of home rule in Ireland and the war. An official announcement issued after the meeting merely said: "The discussion was a very grave one."

According to the Daily Telegraph, Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, spoke in the interest of Ulster, while the other members urged that every effort should be made to secure a settlement should be made to secure a settlement of the home rule question, even at the sacrifice of long-cherished principles. No resolution, the paper says, was adopted, but the balance of feeling was that the Government must proceed cautiously with the home rule bill.
