For more than two hours he was in an unconscious condition, but shortly before noon he rallied.

Just how the accident occurred is not known, but Mr. Cook was passing in front of the big plate, which number of men were trying to turn over. Just as he was right in front of it, the plate fell, and before he could get away Mr. Cook was knocked down and pinned under it. He fell on his face, and when removed in a few minuates, after the plate had been lifted off, he was unconscious. He was taken to Victoria Hospital

#### **DUKE KARL DEAD**

A Member of Bavarian Royal Family Passes Away.

Bayreut, Bavaria, Nov. 30. - Duke Karl Theodore of Bavaria died today from kidney trouble. Duke Karl never figured prominently in military political affairs, but studied medicine and became a famous eye specialist. One of his sisters, the Empress of Austria, was murdered in Geneva. Another sister married the Duke of Alencon and was burned to death in the Paris charity bazar fire. #### HARD KNOCKING **CREATES WORLDS**

Prof. See Says the Battering by Satellites Made Craters

on the Moon.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 30.-Extending and completing his researches on the origin of the planets and satellites of the solar system, earlier accounts of which were made public in January and June of the present year, Professor T. J. J. See, United States navy, astronomer in charge of the naval observatory on Mare Island, gave tonight to the Astronomical Society of the Pacific an explanation of the origin of the craters of the moon. Professor See announced that the lunar craters were undoubtedly due to the impact of smaller satellites against the surface of the moon, and not to volcanic action, as has been gen-erally believed since the time of Galileo. The view that the lunar craters might be due to impact, he said, had occurred to Proctor as long ago as 1873, and had been mentioned as a curiosity by Newcomb in 1878; while it had been more fully developed by Dr. G. K. Gilbert, of the United States geological survey, in 1892. But the impact theory had never been accepted by geologists or astronomers, and was not mentioned in any recent works on astronomy, so great has been the force of traditional opinion inclining to the old volcanic theory.

Professor See, however, pointed out

that he had recently proved that the moon is not a part of the earth thrown off by rapid rotation, but a planet captured from space. Dr. See said the typical crater on

he moon was a large circular depression with steep walls inside and sloping walls outside, and a small peak in the centre, with the top of it below the average level of the lunar surface. If anyone supposed the craters to be releanic, it was impossible to account for the depressions where the craters trough about the peak in the centre. nothing but satellite indentations.

Professor See said that the moon had never had any seas or smaller bodies of water, and that the lunar sions had occurred before the moon was captured by the earth, and, therefore, while the moon was still revolv-

"The roughness of the surface the moon shows how many hard knocks it has received in the past. Every planet has gone through a similar experience, but those having atmosphere and oceans, like the earth, have suffered such great geological hanges that they have long since lost all trace of ancient battering, while these indentations have survived on the airless and waterless moon, show us the terrific process by which worlds are formed," declared Profes-






