HOLLAND MUST **ASSUME FULL** RESPONSIBILITY FOR EX-KAISER

Lloyd George Informs Netherlands Government To This Effect.

WILHELM A MENACE

Former Emperor a Danger So Long As Near German Border.

The Hague, April 27 .- Responsibility for the continued residence in Holland of the former Emperor William of Germany was placed squarely and exclusively on the Netherlands Govern ment in a note sent by Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain on March 24

Mr. Lloyd George's note says: "The Allied governments have learned of the royal decree assigning the former emperor a definite place of internment in Utrecht, this decree being accom panied by an undertaking of the Netherlands Government to assume complete responsibility for the custody of the former emperor and control of his correspondence and relations with the outside world."

The note pointed out that William, in spite of precautions, is "a very serious danger, so long as left within 40 kilometres of the German frontier, and is a potential centre of reactionary propaganda and a constant menace to the peace of Berope."



GERMANY IS ON VERGE OF FINANCIAL COLLAPSE

Berlin, April 27.—Germany's financial collapse is near, according to a statement made before the National Assembly yesterday by Dr. Wirth, minister of the treasury.

He declared the army and navy budgets reached their present dimensions because Germany was maintaining a paid defence force, which former enemies should take into account in demobilizing the old army. This force has cost 2,000,000,000 marks, he asserted, while the government has already expended 3,000,000,000 marks on the maintenance of the occupational armies in the Rhineland and elsewhere. The postal deficit was given as 1,000,000,000 marks, and the shortage reported by the administration of state railways was 12,000,000,000,000. Dr. Wirth favored the early flotation of an internal loan, and demanded that Germany's obligations imposed by the treaty of Versailles be clearly fixed.

IRISH PROBLEM WILL BE SOLVED SOON, IS **BONAR LAW'S BELIEF**

British Government Leader **Declares Condition Is** Yet Deplorable.

ASKS FOR PATIENCE

Declares Lloyd George's Administration Doing Everything Possible.

London, April 27.—Canadian Associated Press.-Bonar Law in speaking before the House of Commons last night, said that there was no good in denying that Ireland's condition is deplorable and very likely worse than it has ever been before. Continuing Mr. Law said: "For the last generation this country has had only one desire, and that is to has had only one desire, and that is to get on good terms with Ireland. Instead we see the present situation."

Mr. Law said that it could not be cured in a day, and if any members thought that by merely sending scores of thousands of soldiers to Ireland, the question would be settled they were greatly mistaken. There were signs that the excesses were having effect, and they were now being directed against men who called themselves Sinn Feiners, and they were suffering. Mr. Law ers, and they were suffering. Mr. Law said he could not help thinking the effect on Ireland would bring about the restoration of reasonable government.

"I do ask the Commons to give us credit and recognize the problem that has been dealt with. If the government fails after a reasonable time then the government ought not to continue in office," urged Mr. Law.

800 KILLED DURING FIGHTING THAT LED TO GOVT.'S DOWNFALL

Many Civilians Are Victims in Revolution in Guatemala.

San Salvador, April 27 .- Men, women and children to the number of 800. resulted in the overthrow of President resulted in the overthrow of President Manuel Estrada Cabrera, according to the latest advices received here from Guatemula. Numerous adherents of Cabrera who remained faithful to their chief were killed in their own houses, the advices say.

Demands are being made that Cabrera, who is now a prisoner, be placed on trial. Large numbers of Guatemalans who fied from the country are returning and are being received with much enthusiasm.

Allies Will Stop At Nothing To Keep Germany To Treaty

DECLARATION ISSUED

Says Germany Making No Effort-Will Have Exchange of Views.

SAN REMO. April 26 .- The text the Allied declaration says:

"The Allied powers have taken cognizance of the letter of Dr. Geophert thead of the German delegation in Paris) of April 20, transmitting a request from the German minister of war, asking that the German Government be authorized to retain an army of 200,000, instead of 100,000 men, as provided for in the Versailles treaty, and affirming that this is a necessity in order to maintain order.

"The Allies must declare immediately that a proposition of this nature cannot even be examined as long as Germany is failing to meet the most important obligations imposed by the beace treaty and does not proceed with disarmament, on which depends he peace of the world. Germany has not fulfilled its engagements, neither concerning the destruction of war material nor the decrease of its effectives, nor the supplying of coal nor for reparations or the costs of the armies of occupation. It has given usither satisfaction nor made excuses for criminal attacks which several times members of the Allied missions in Germany have been the victims of.

The Allies realize the difficulties met by the German Government and do not seek to impose too narrow an interpretation of the treaty, but they are unanimous in declaring that they cannot tolerate a continuation of these infractions of the treaty of Versailles, that the treaty must be executed and remain as the basis of relations between Germany and the Allies, and that they are resolved to take all measures, even, if necessary, the occupation of an additional part of German territory, in order to insure execution of the treaty. They affirm however, that they have no intention of annexing any part of the German territory.





LORD CECIL HAS CONDEMNATIO FOR IRISH RULE

Strongly Denounces Lloyd George Administration in Commons.

INCLINED TO BE GLOOMY

Nobleman Looks Forward To Irish Republic As Humiliation.

LONDON, April 26.—In the House of Commons tonight Lord Robert Cecil strongly condemned the Irish adminis-tration. He said the situation in Ire-

tration. He said the situation in Ireland was graver that for centuries. Sixteen murders were committed in the first three weeks of April, as compared with 36 in the last three months, and during the last week there was one murder daily.

No arrests had been made, no one was punished and there was no protection for the public against violence. The Government, he declared, had shown serious vacillation and want of, resource. If convictions could not be obtained under the existing law, the law must be altered, and if necessary, to bring prisoners to England for trial. Soldiers should be used to protect the police.

police.
The viceroy, said Lord Robert, should not be a soldier unless he had very special administrative capacity. Unless the Government proved its capacity to govern, the country would drift through anarchy and humiliation to an Irish republic.

Stones were thrown, and some of the soldiers were injured, one of them seriously. It is said that some shots were fired, but no! dy was wounded. ADMITS IRISH HELD IN PRISON

LONDON, April 26.—One hundred and seventy-nine Sinn Feiners are interned in Wormwood Scrubbs Prison, according to a statement made in the House of Commons today by the home secretary, Edward Shortt, and of these all but five are on hunger strike.

The policy of giving special ameliorative treatment to such men had always been followed in England, said the secretary, but he did not understand that these prisoners or their friends had demanded any improvement in their conditions.

IRISH ARREST HOLD-UP SUSPECTS

MILLSTREET, County Cork, Ireland, April 26.—Two hundred men of the Irish Republican army arrived in motor cars Sunday morning and took up positions in various parts of the town. They cut the telegraph wires before selzing and carrying off six persons who are suspected of implication in the hold-up of several bank officials last November, when £18,000 was stolen. It is the announced intentions of the Republicans to hold the men until they disclose where the money is secreted.







The question came from C. A. Fournier (Bellechasse), who asked how much power was being exported at the present time by each of the three companies. It was shown that the three companies are the Ontario Power Company of Niagara Falls, Ont., Canadian Niagara Power Company, and the Electrical Development Company of Ontario, Limited. Sir Adam Beck is the president of the first-named concern; A. Munro Grier of the second. and Sir Henry M. Pellatt of the last-named company. The average export for the month of February, 1920, was as follows: directors of three companies stationed as follows:
Ontario Power Company (Hydro-Electric Power Commission), 42.687 kilowatts; Canadian Niagara Power Company, 15.675 kilowatts; Electrical Development Company, 11,845, kilo-

watts.

The maximum export since March 31, 1916, for the respective companies is as follows: Ontario Power Company (Hydro-Electric Power Commission), 55,680 kilowatts; Canadian Niagara Power Company, 52,910 kilowatts; Electrical Development Company, 22,240 kilowatts,






