Black and white pepper both come from the pepper plant, a climbing perennial shrub which grows in the East and West Indies, chiefly in Sumatra. black pepper the berry is picked before it is quite ripe; or white, it is allowed to mature and the black pericarp or hull is then removed. The characteristic called piperine, and to a volatile oil. In black pepper berries, the ash is about four and a half per cent, and should not be more than six and a half: either extract, including piperine and resin is about six and a half per cent; crude fibre about sixteen per cent, and there is present some starch and nitrogenous material. White pepper contains less ash and less cellulose because the woody outer covering is removed.

Ground pepper is often much adulterated; the common adulterants are cracker crumbs, roasted nut shells and fruit stones, charcoal and cornmeal, pepper or mustard hulls, and buckwheat middlings. Also an excessive amount of sand adhering to the berries as they wrinkle in drying should be classed as dulteration. Most of these adulterations are evident under the microscope. The Government standard for good pepper is seven per cent total ash, fifteen per cent fibre, twenty-five per cent Road Presbyterian, the Askin starch, and six per cent non-volatile ether extract.

As pepper is properly used only in small quantities, it has no food value, and there is no great difference be-tween black and white in digestive effect, it being largely a matter of habit and personal preference. For pickles it is probably wise to buy the pepper corns whole to use instead of the ground pep-



For Every 4,000 of Population.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—The situation with regard to the Ontario lists for the oming federal general election is in the nature of a political scandal. A a result of what would appear to have a result of what would appear to have been deliberate delay on the part of the Government to issue writs and after such delay, failure to date such writs back, practically all existing voters' lists in the province have become outlawed and new lists will have to be prepared at great trouble and expense not only to the country, but

expense, not only to the country, but to the candidates. Particularly is this true of cities, towns and villages with a population over 2,500 as in the rural districts per-sonal registration and new lists were required in any case.

In the urban centres a perfect army of enumerators will have to be appointed at the country's expense. An enumerator will be required for every 4,000 of population. Six days of ten hours each will be allowed for regis-






