



Mr. Jerome, district atterney of New York, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election as a quest to that effect, and that he will depend for his election on popular support, outside of any party Machine His theory sounds well. He claims that a few men control a party organization, that they select candidates to suit their own purposes, whether personal or political; and that the man elected by their favor comes unde obligations to them, and is not free to serve the public as he should.

There is no doubt a great measur of truth in the charge, especially so in the United States: and perhaps more in connection with state and municipa politics than in matters affecting the national government. A party organization is natural, if not absolutely incessary where there is a responsible parliament. Certain men are sure to become leaders of the organization, and if they are both astute and unscrupulous, they will try to control the organization for their own benefit. The organization supposed to represent the rank and file of the party may in such cases represent only the bosses. Th result does not give popular government, and seldom honest government

In Canada the situation is not as bad as in the United States, but we fre. quently see instances of the predominance of the boss, and of its ill-effects. Men are sometimes selected as candidates, not because they are good men but because they are able to supp. election funds, or because they are in "the ring," or because it is thought they can be manipulated by the bosses It is not long since we saw in Lon-

If we shut our doors to other people they will not open theirs to us. If we build up barriers against others they will erect barriers which we will find difficult to surmount. Exclusiveness is not an attribute of civilzation, and if we want to civilize as well as be civilized, we must be prepared to meet other people on terms of equality.




