screen or riddling machine. This is an iron slide, several yards long, with holes through which the coal

with holes through which the coal drops at various stages into true as waiting beneath. It is jerked about by steam power and the coal moves downward while the girls stationed alongside pick out the rubbish. It is dusty work.

The girls start work at 6 o'clock in the morning and finish at 3 or 4 o'clock in the afternoon. As may be undered their work is acquious, and

SETTLEMENT ASSURED.

Venezuelan Trouble Will Soon be Adjusted.

Washington, Feb. 4.-There are as yet no advices from the allied Governments respecting the nature of the next proposal they will submit to Mr. Bowen, Venezuela's representative, for a settlement of their claims, but there is good authority for the statement that the note of Mr. Bowen, addressed to the British Ambassador, will result in an adjustment of the trouble. At the British Embassy the most important conference that the representatives of the ables here have yet held among themselves took place. The conference was called to consider the recommendations which the Italian and British Ambassadors and the German Minister should make to their Governments as to the next step to be taken. As a result of this conference the Foreign Offices at London, Berlin and Rome are in possession of suggestions which, if adopted, will mean the success of the negotiations and the raising of the blockade. The allied powers have been again requested by their representatives to consent to a priority of the payment of their claims for a limited period only, and equality of all claimant nations thereafter. Mr. Bowen has stated that he is willing that the allies receive preferential treatment for one month, if at the end of that time all the claimant nations be placed on an equal basis as to the proportionate payments. the most important conference that



In committee members sit beside the chairman at the table. Lord Rosebery prefers the seat on the chairman's left when he is about to speak. In the House of Commons no member would dream of encroaching in such a manner on the Speaker or the Chairman of committees. The Lords also permitmessengers to pass freely up and down the floor, which would be a breach of privilege in the Commons. The side of the House on which a peer sits is no sure indication of his views. Unionists still stopposite the Government along with the Liberals. Lord Halifax, the leader of the High Churchmen, whose views on the Education Bill are the antithes of Lord Spencer's, sits behind the Liberal leader. So does Lord Camperdown, and from that place takes the liberty of lecturing and criticising the "Red Earl."



THE FATHER ARRESTED.

PECULIAR DEATH OF A COLLING WOOD INFANT.

A. H. Clarke, the Father, Thought It Had Eaten Poisoned Cheese-The Mother Gave It Beer that Made

Collingwood, Feb. 5 .- A small child of Mr. A. H. Clarke, which was insured for a small amount, died under peculiar circumstances. The doctor who was called to the house by the father found the child cold in death and came to the conclusion that the death had been caused by a convulsion of some kind. The father of the child stated to the doctor that he had placed strychnine on cheese to kill rats and that the child had eaten the cheese and also that he had insured the child's life. The cirimstances aroused the suspicions of the sumstances aroused the sampleions of the doctor, who thereupon performed a postmortem examination and found cheese in the stomach of the child as stated by the father. The mother of the child stated that she had given the child some beer from a glass from which she had drank and which had made her deathly sick. The circumstances led to a Coroner's inquest this evening at which the above facts were brought out. Clarke was arrested during the proceedings and is held awaiting further developments. A HERO'S HARDSHIP.

Pathetic Story Told in Court by a

Soldier.
London, Feb. 4.—The Daily Graphic says :- At Lambeth County Court yesterday Frederick George Johnson sued Joseph Freedman, a Walworth draper to recover 25 shillings, a week's wages, to recover 25 shillings, a week's wages, in lieu of notice. The plaintiff stated that on returning from the front, and being unable to obtain his arrears of pay from the War Office, he was starving when the defendant engaged him as a salesman at £1 a week, afterwards increased to 25s. He had received seventeen wounds in South Africa—thirteen flesh wounds and four severe wounds—and had been awarded the Victoria Cross for rescuing two disabled officers Cross for rescuing two disabled officers from under fire. When in Mr. Freedman's service he was absent one day from the effects of enteric fever, acquired in the Transvaal. For this he was discharged.

from the effects of enteric fever, acquired in the Transvaal. For this he was discharged.

Replying to Judge Emden, the witness said he was discharged from the army after seven years and six months' service with an exemplary character. In addition to his Victoria Cross he had three other medals. Men coming home from the front were unable to get their arrears of pay for three or four months, as their papers were in South Africa. He was absolutely starving when Mr. Freedman employed him.

Judge Emden—1t is, in my opinion, a most disgraceful thing for any English Government to bring home brave men, to whom we ought all to be deeply grateful, and leave them for three or four months without means of livelihood. We were glad enough of these men's services, and to treat them in the way they have been treated was gross

The plaintiff—Beg your pardon, sir, but if I may say it, we were treated like dogs when we got home: I only wanted my rights; I did not want charity. Judge Emden—It is a shocking thing,

Although the disease has lisappeared from Manila, it is still epi-lemic in parts of the islands. The total of the reported cases since the out-break is 130,363, with 82,955 deaths. The actual number is probably 20 per cent.
