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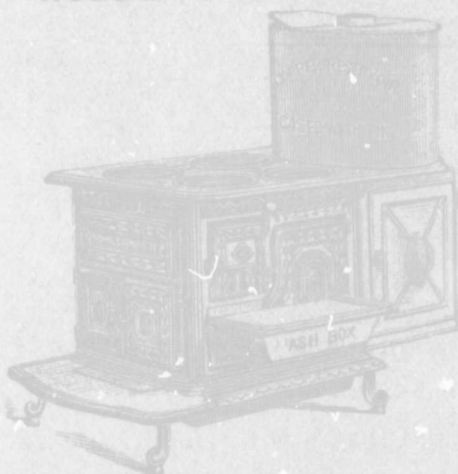
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MISCELLANEOUS DIRECTORY.

THE QUEEN AND ROYAL FAMILY.

Her Majesty ALEXANDRINA VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c., Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India (in India, Shri Shri Rani Victoria, Kaisar-i-Hind) born at Kensington Palace, 24th May, 1819; succeeded to the throne 20th June, 1837, on the death of her uncle, King William IV.; crowned 28th June, 1838; and married 10th February, 1840, to his late Royal Highness Francis Albert Augustus Charles Emmanuel, PRINCE CONSORT, DUKE OF SAXONY, PRINCE OF COBOURG AND GOTHA, who was born 26th August, 1819; died 14th December, 1861. Her Majesty is the only child of his late Royal Highness, Edward Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III., and has issue—

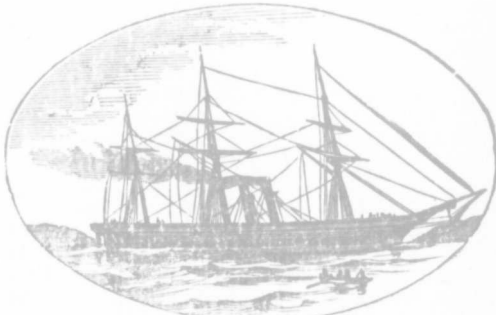

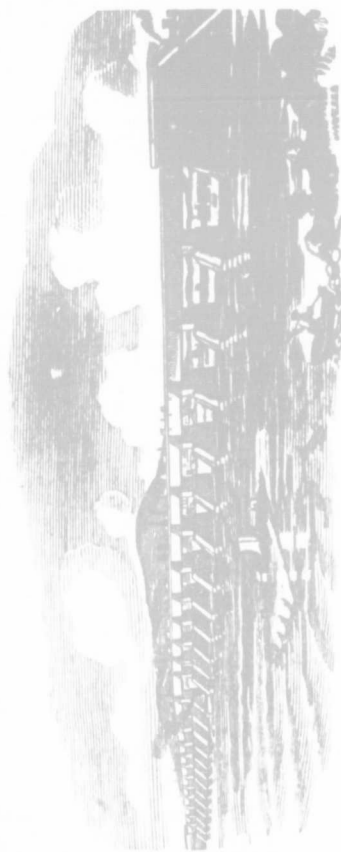
NOTE.—Schedule D.—The following goods, when the growth and produce of any of the British North American Provinces, may be imported free of duty, subject to alteration or regulation by proclamation of the Governor-General in Council, viz :—

Animals of all kinds; Fresh, Smoked and Salted Meats; Green and Dried Fruits, Fish of all kinds, product of fish, and of all other creatures living in the water; Poultry, Butter, Cheese, Lard, Tallow; Timber and Lumber of all kinds, round, hewed, but not otherwise manufactured in whole or in part; Fish Oil, Gypsum, ground or unground; Hay, Hops, Straw, Bran. Seeds of all kinds, Vegetables, including Potatoes, and other roots; Plants, Trees and Shrubs; Coal and Coke; Salt; Wheat, Peas, Beans, Barley, Rye, Oats, Indian Corn, Buckwheat, and all other grain; Flour of Wheat, Rye, Indian Corn and Oatmeal, and Flour Meal of any other grain.

All goods not enumerated as charged with any other duty, or declared to be free of duty; and non-enumerated packages, $17\frac{1}{2}$ p. c. *ad val.*

These Registration Fees are, of course, in addition to the Postage, and must be pre-paid.

DISPOSAL OF UNPAID OR INSUFFICIENTLY PAID LETTERS MAILED IN CANADA.

If for Places within the Dominion.—A letter wholly unpaid is not forwarded, but is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa. If pre-paid at least one rate, that is, 3 cents, the letter is forwarded to destination, but is rated with double the deficient postage. This rule applies also to city or "drop" letters, the postage on which is 1 cent per half ounce.

If for the United States.—A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or insufficiently paid, is not forwarded from Canada, but is sent to the Dead

Letter Office, in Ottawa, in order to be there opened and returned to its writer.

If for the United Kingdom.—A letter wholly unpaid is forwarded, but is rated with double postage, that is, 5 pence sterling per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. If it is insufficiently pre-paid, it is charged at the same rate, deducting what may have been pre-paid.

If for other British Colonies or Foreign Countries (except France).—A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or only insufficiently paid, is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

LOCAL OR "DROP" LETTERS.

One cent per half ounce, to be pre-paid by Postage Stamp.

POSTAL CARDS.

Canadian Postal Cards of one cent each circulate within the Dominion,—and are transmissible without further charge, to the United States and Newfoundland.

Newspapers.—Between places in the Dominion, to the United States, to Newfoundland, publishers pre-pay their edition in bulk, at the rate of one cent for each pound weight; no further charge on delivery. Transient newspapers within the Dominion, to the United States and Newfoundland, one cent per four ounces, to be pre-paid by stamp. Transient papers for the United Kingdom, two cents per four ounces.

Periodicals.—Published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, sent from office of publication, or from news agencies, for places in the Dominion, to the United States or to Newfoundland, the postage rate is the same as for Newspapers, *i.e.*, one cent per pound, when paid by the bulk weight; Transient periodicals, one cent per four ounces. Newspapers and periodicals for the Dominion, the United States and Newfoundland, weighing less than one ounce each, may be posted singly, if pre-paid by stamp, one half cent each.

Newspapers to France and samples are sent at the above "French Book Post" rates.

A "book packet" may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature and art, maps or prints, photographs, daguerreotypes, when not in glass or in frame containing glass; any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters), and the books, maps, papers, &c., may be either written, printed or plain, or any mixtures of the

three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign. Book packages must be *open at both ends or both sides.*

Patterns.—Rates between Canada and United Kingdom and France, same as for Book Post.

Patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

Patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck, or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts. Patterns and samples of merchandize, not exceeding the weight of eight ounces, addressed to the United States, may be sent at the rate of ten cents for each package.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal must not exceed 18 inches in length, and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

Parcels can only be sent by Post to places in Canada. Postages and registration fee must be pre-paid. The limit of weight to Parcels is 4 lbs.

TRANSMISSION OF PATTERNS AND SAMPLES WITHIN THE PROVINCE OF CANADA.

Patterns or samples of merchandise, and goods for sale, not exceeding twenty-four ounces in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per four ounces, under the following regulations:

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed; *inside* there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on

the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules, is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of one cent per four ounces is to be pre-paid by postage stamp,—and if such rate be not fully pre-paid by the stamps affixed, the package is to be rated with the deficient postage, and a fine of five cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples or patterns may be registered on pre-payment by postage stamp of a registration fee of five cents in addition to the postage rate,—and provided such packets be duly handed into the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be obtained for such packages when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed twenty-four ounces in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause: To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

Miscellaneous Postal Matter—On books, pam-

phlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscripts; printers' proof sheets, whether corrected or not; maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs; photographs, when not on glass or in cases containing glass; sheet music, whether printed or written; documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature; packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions or grafts; patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, when posted in Canada for any place in Canada, the rate of postage is *one cent per four ounces in weight*, to be pre-paid by postage stamp, or by the use of stamped post bands when suitable for the purpose. No letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or enclosed in any article of miscellaneous mail matter; and all transmissions authorized by this regulation must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides, or in such manner as to admit of inspection to ensure compliance with this condition. If enclosed in sealed envelopes, notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged.

Miscellaneous mail matter as above specified, when addressed to the United States or to Newfoundland, may be forwarded when pre-paid the one cent per 4 oz. rate, as if addressed to a place in Canada, with the exception of packets of samples and patterns of merchandise addressed to the United States, on which the special rate of ten cents must be pre-paid.

Money Orders in Canada.—All the Money Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia, are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:—

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Money Order Offices in the Dominion also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland and Scotland, the Channel Islands, and British India, save those in British India for which there are special rates, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

The Orders upon Newfoundland, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money.

All the Money Order Offices in the Dominion are also authorized to grant Money Orders on the United States, the maximum amount of which, however, upon a single order, is limited to \$40 Canadian currency. The rates are:—

In all the classes of Orders, as many of the maximum amount may be obtained as will be needed to make up the sum the applicant desires to remit.

By the amended Post Office Act, which came

in force on the 1st October, any Postmaster issuing Money Orders on credit, and any person aiding and abetting, or procuring the issue of such Orders, will be guilty of misdemeanor.

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward island, Manitoba, British Columbia, and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to the issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

1. The Post Office Savings Bank commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed upon the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank Offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in is sent to the depositor

from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster General will issue a cheque payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

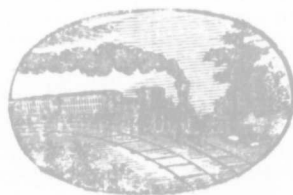
7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices, which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity whenever paying in or drawing out deposits.

8. Interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits.

Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, or for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will always be ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

CHAMBLY BASIN.

Chambly, with a population of about three thousand, ranks as first among the many country places remarkable for their picturesque scenery, and the numerous advantages derived from the possession of a beautiful river, which, for Chambly, is none other than the far-famed and historical "Richelieu." Chambly comprises two large villages formerly divided by Crown Lands, but which of late, having been sold, display actually a row of pretty houses, which unite them, and to-day all are unanimous in desiring that the two villages would form one municipality and be incorporated as a town.

Chambly Basin, composed for the most part of French-speaking people, is a beautiful village situated at the mouth of the Chambly and St. John's Canal, and overlooking that delightful bay in the Richelieu river commonly called the

“Basin,” the popularity of which increases every year owing to the great quantity of fish caught in its waters, and to the facility its calm surface offers of conducting boats thereon.

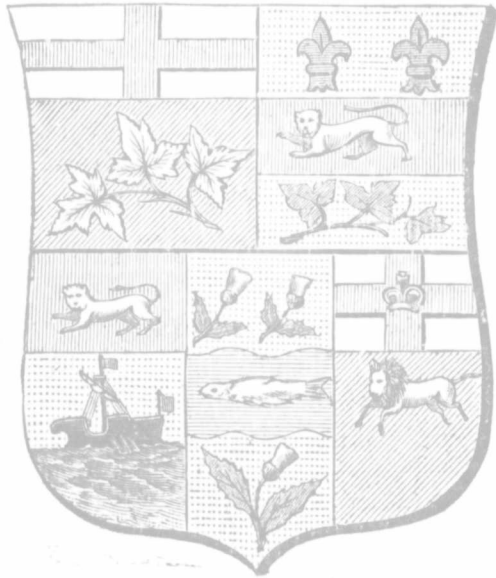
Yules Island, situated at about three-quarters of a mile from this village, at the foot of the Rapids, consequently surrounded partly by current and partly by calm water, charms by its agreeable aspect, enhanced to a great degree by lofty trees, the stranger who treads its grassy soil.

A Catholic church, a convent, a large hospital and a college are the buildings rendered the most conspicuous by their elegance and their advantageous situation. The convent, under the direction of the Nuns of the Congregation of Notre Dame, possesses rare advantages for the instruction of young ladies who desire to leave their respective homes and seek elsewhere a new home two-fold in its benefit of motherly care and careful instruction. The hospital, belonging to the ladies of the Grey Nunnery of Montreal, is adapted in every way for the reception of the poor, the orphans and the invalids. The college, under the charge of the Brothers of the Christian Doctrine, imparts a thorough commercial

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education to young men, at the same time rendering them submissive to a rule which is evidently conducive to their formation. Bartlett's Hotel holds also a beautiful position, elevated above the Basin and commanding a lovely view of the surrounding scenery.

The means of communication with Montreal are easy and varied. A daily train runs to the city, stopping at St. Lamberts station. A stage travels over the country road leading to Montreal every day for the accommodation of those who desire going to St. Hubert or Longueuil. Finally the Chambly steamer, plying between Montreal and Chambly, affords its passengers a rare sight in viewing the beauties of nature. There are several stores here, an office belonging to Montreal Telegraph Co., and a depot. Distant from St. Hubert, a station of the Grand Trunk Railway, 9 miles, from St. Johns 12 miles, from Montreal 16 miles.

CHAMBLY CANTON.

This village, containing a mixed population, is delightfully situated between the Richelieu Rapids and east side of the Chambly and St. Johns Canal. The Richelieu river is here seen in all its splendour, flowing with more than an ordinary impetuosity, breaking now and then against jutting rocks, and striking the ear of the traveller in the distance with the roaring of its billows. It is an object of admiration to the visitor, and a source of profit to the invalids, who inhale with delight the cool and healthy breezes wafted over the rippled face of its waters. Extensive saw, grist, carding and woollen mills, along with a leather factory, form a principal feature of industry for this village. Two bridges extend across the rapids to Richelieu village, both of which give subject to admiration owing to their symmetrical and vigorous structure. The one called Yule's Bridge is over five acres long and

twenty-five feet broad, tubular form, is built for the passage of horses, carriages and pedestrians ; the other is adapted mainly for the use of the Chamby, Montreal and Portland Railway Co. There are in this municipality a Protestant church, a Methodist chapel and two schools, one Catholic and one Protestant. On the rapid edge, opposite the English church, stands Mr. Joyce's Grand Hotel, which is suitably fitted out for the accommodation of Montreal visitors. Adjoining Mr. Joyce's grounds still remains the famous ruins of the old French fort, built in 1711 to protect the colony from the inroads of the Iroquois. This fort is the only remaining monument of French valour existing in Canada at the present time. A canal twelve miles long runs through Chamby, permitting navigation between the St. Lawrence and Lake Champlain. The village possesses some large stores, two telegraph offices : one pertaining to the Dominion Telegraph Co., kept in the post office department, along with a branch of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Co. ; the other belongs to the Montreal Telegraph Co., and is kept in the depot facing which is the splendid grove of General F. Walker, so popular of late from the several picnics held there by the different societies of Montreal.

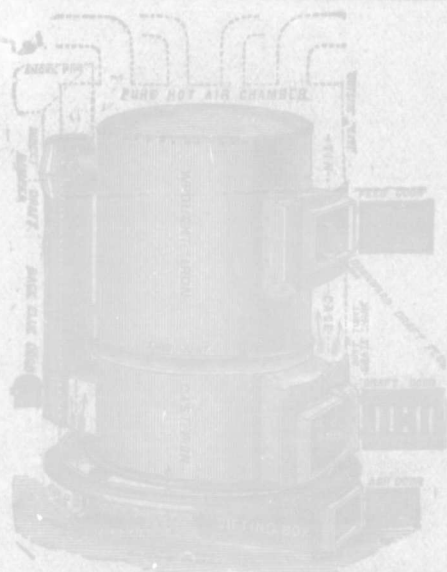

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ST. JEAN BAPTISTE
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ST. JEAN-BAPTISTE.

La paroisse de St. Jean-Baptiste de Rouville est sise et située dans les comté et seigneurie de ce nom, sur la Rivière des Hurons.

La seigneurie de Rouville, qui comprend deux paroisses, fut concédée le 18 janvier 1694, à J.-Bte. Hertel, écr., sieur de Rouville, "chevalier de l'ordre royal et militaire de St. Louis, capitaine d'une compagnie du détachement de la marine en ce pays." Elle lui fut ainsi octroyée sur sa demande par "Louis de Buade de Frontenac, chevalier, comte de Pelluan," 12e gouverneur du Canada, et par "Jean Bochart, chevalier, seigneur de Champigny, etc., conseiller, intendant de la Nouvelle France."

Edm. Alexandre Chs. Campbell, seigneur actuel, fils aîné de feu l'hon. T. Edm. Campbell, est le 7e propriétaire de ce domaine.

Les premières démarches pour former une paroisse, ou plutôt *Mission*, en cette seigneurie, furent faites en 1792. En 1797, on y construisit, en pierre, un presbytère de 50 x 36 pieds, dont le haut devait servir de chapelle provisoire, et le bas, de logement pour le curé. Le marché

d'entreprise, passé le 12 juin, est de 1,000 francs seulement, les habitants fournissant partie des matériaux. Cet édifice fut érigé sur une terre sise au sud-est de la Rivière des Hurons, donnée à la fabrique le 27 septembre 1797, par le sieur J.-B. Melchior Hertel de Rouville, seigneur, pour l'usage des curés successifs des paroisses de St. Jean-Baptiste et de St. Hilaire. M. J.-B. Bédard, ptre., fut le 1er curé de la nouvelle paroisse : il bénit la chapelle et y célébra la première messe le 1er novembre 1797. En 1798, on y comptait une population naissante de 107 familles; 600 âmes, 309 communiants et 291 non-communiants.

En février 1802, les habitants commencèrent les procédés légaux pour la construction d'une église en pierre. La répartition prélevée à cette fin, est de \$27,000.

Cependant, les travaux ne furent commencés qu'en juin 1807. Le temple ne fut logeable qu'à l'automne 1810, et complètement terminé à l'intérieur qu'en 1819. On y a fait, depuis, plusieurs améliorations et additions.

La belle église de St. Jean-Baptiste mesure 114 x 50 dans la nef et 40 pieds dans le chœur; elle contient 232 bancs. L'extérieur n'offre rien de

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remarquable. L'intérieur peut le disputer en beauté et en ornementation à beaucoup d'autres temples du pays.

Le maître-autel est surmonté d'un magnifique tableau, *St. Jean-Baptiste*, don de l'hon. J.-Bte. M. Hertel de Rouville, et œuvre de M. Wm. Berczy, gentilhomme saxon, émigré en Amérique en 1792. Le chœur est orné de six autres tableaux qui ne sont pas à dédaigner,

L'église possède aussi un orgue du prix de £475, sorti des ateliers de Samuel Warren, facteur, de Montréal : il fut inauguré solennellement, le jeudi, 28 août 1862.

Le presbytère, bâti en 1797, subsiste encore aujourd'hui, 1877. On y a fait des réparations considérables en 1828 et en 1866.

La paroisse de St. Jean-Baptiste de Rouville est restée à l'état de *Mission*, proprement dite jusqu'à l'année 1846 ; elle ne fut érigée canoniquement que le 13 août de cette année par décret de Sa Grandeur Mgr. Ig. Bourget, évêque de Montréal, auquel elle appartenait alors. Elle est sous la juridiction de l'évêque de St. Hyacinthe, depuis le 8 juin 1852. Elle a été reconnue civilement, le 19 août 1859, par proclamation de Son Ex. Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet,

Gouverneur-Général de l'Amérique Britannique. Elle comprend une étendue de territoire de deux lieues de largeur sur quatre concessions de profondeur, c'est-à-dire depuis le Mont St. Hilaire, à l'ouest, jusqu'à la Montagne de Rougemont, à l'est.

En 1846, elle a reçu trois accessions partielles, comprises dans le décret du 13 août, respectivement détachées des paroisses de St. Charles, St. Césaire et St. Damase, et en 1859, une autre annexion prise sur cette dernière. Mais en 1876, elle a été diminuée du côté nord-est, par la formation de la nouvelle paroisse de Ste. Magdeleine.

En 1823, la paroisse comptait 388 familles et 2,154 âmes. En 1869, on n'y trouvait plus que 306 familles et 1,713 âmes. L'émigration aux Etats-Unis a été cause en partie de cette dépression. Le recensement civil de 1871 accuse une population de 1,953 âmes, dont 1,028 hommes et 925 femmes, réparties dans 363 familles.

Depuis son origine, 1er novembre 1797 jusqu'au 21 décembre 1876, il y a eu dans cette paroisse, 7,957 baptêmes, 1,372 mariages, 3,451 sépultures. De 1800, 18 et 19 juin, à 1876, 6 et 8 juin, les évêques successifs des diocèses de

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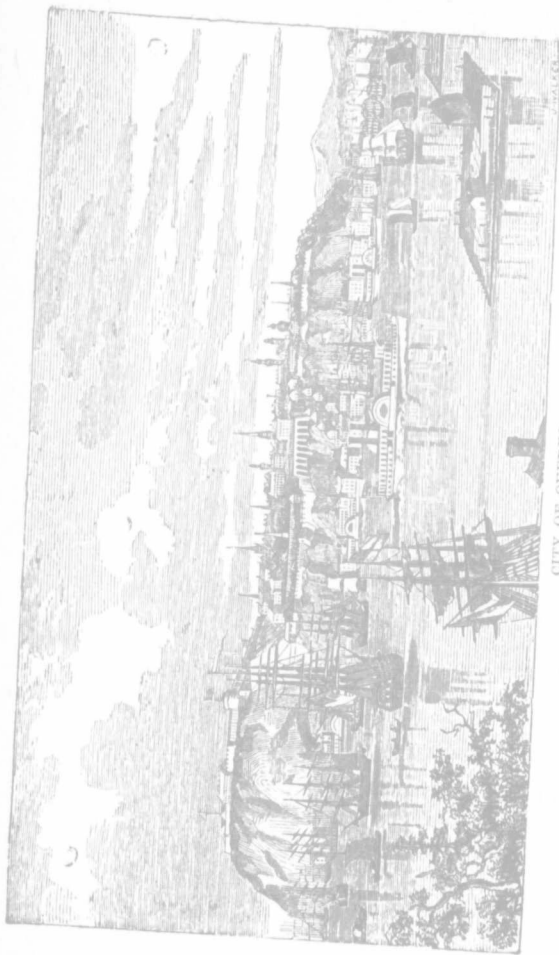
Québec, Montréal et St. Hyacinthe, ou leurs délégués ont visité quatorze fois la paroisse et y ont administré le sacrement de Confirmation à 3,672 personnes.

Jusqu'ici la paroisse a donné à l'Eglise quatorze prêtres et deux sous-diacres, lesquels n'attendent plus que le temps requis pour être promus au Sacerdoce.

En 1873, on comptait six écoles, dirigées par un instituteur et cinq institutrices, et fréquentées par 280 élèves.

Depuis quelques années, le village de St. Jean-Baptiste a l'avantage de posséder un *Aqueduc* qui prend sa source sur le versant sud du Mont St. Hilaire.

Du 1er novembre 1797 au 8 décembre 1876, 86 habitants francs-tenanciers ont été élus à la charge de marguilliers de la fabrique; 82 seulement ont été en exercice actif (en charge), les quatre autres ont, ou laissé la paroisse, ou résigné, ou sont morts avant d'être en office actif.

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ST. CESAIRE DIRECTORY.

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AGENTS GENERAUX,

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ST. CESAIRE.

Le premier édifice érigé dans le lieu, appelé plus tard *St. Césaire*, a été construit en 1775, lors de la guerre de l'indépendance américaine. C'était une espèce de petit *Fort* en bois, ou *Blockhouse*, d'environ 30 pieds quarrés ou de 36 x 24 pds., destiné à loger un piquet de soldats, entretenus, en cet endroit, par le gouvernement impérial pour surveiller les mouvements suspects des révoltés. Après la guerre, ce fort fut abandonné. En 1812, il n'en restait plus que quelques ruines.

Les premiers colons arrivèrent en cette localité vers la fin du dernier siècle, mais en très petit nombre d'abord; et le défrichement des

terres ne se développa que lentement dans les commencements, tant étaient grands les obstacles et les difficultés que les pionniers avaient à surmonter pour arracher une misérable subsistance.

En 1817, on y comptait à peine soixante habitants, échelonnés sur les deux rives de l'Yamaska, dans le Rang-Double, côté ouest, et sur le flanc sud de la montagne de Rougemont. Aujourd'hui, on y compte plus de 600 familles, vivant à l'aise pour la plupart.

La circonscription de la future paroisse de St. Césaire fut délimitée, en partie, par Mgr. J. O. Plessis, évêque de Québec, dans une ordonnance du 9 novembre 1817. Cependant, ce ne fut qu'en 1821 qu'on put parvenir à bâtir, en bois, un presbytère de 30 x 26 pds., et une chapelle provisoire. Celle-ci fut bénite, le 4 juin 1822, par Messire L. Robitaille, curé de St. Charles, sur la rivière Chambly. Ce même jour fut aussi célébrée la première messe dans cette *mission*.

M. F. X. Ed. Leduc fut le premier curé de la nouvelle *paroisse*, où il résida jusqu'à la St. Michel, 1822. Nous soulignons *paroisse*, car le mot est impropre, St. Césaire n'ayant été érigé en paroisse canonique que le 24 septembre 1833

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par Mgr. Jos. Signai, évêque de Québec. Cette paroisse n'a jamais été reconnue civilement. Le terrain de la fabrique contient neuf arpents en superficie et a été donné par le Sieur François Papineau, bourgeois, de la paroisse de St. Mathias.

De 1838 à 1842, sous Messire F. Lamarre, 8e curé, la vieille chapelle fut remplacée par une église en pierre, de 138 x 60 pds. Ce temple n'a été complètement terminé, à l'intérieur, qu'en 1859 ; il contient 350 bancs. En 1861, il fut enrichi d'un magnifique orgue du coût de £600, venu de la célèbre factorerie de Stuttgart, Allemagne. Trois cloches d'Angleterre, du coût de \$1,108.75 et d'un poids respectif de 1400, 900 et 700 lbs., ont été bénites et inaugurées solennellement le 20 juin 1869. Deux grands tableaux, *St. Césaire* et *Ste. Philomène*, sortis de l'atelier de M. Eug. Hamel, de Québec, et coûtant tous deux \$480, sont exposés à la vénération des fidèles depuis le 28 novembre 1872.

Depuis son existence de fait, la paroisse de St. Césaire a subi trois démembrements partiels. De plus, en 1856, celle de l'Ange-Gardien, à l'est de l'Yamaska, en a été détachée en entier,

ainsi qu'une partie de la paroisse de St. Paul d'Abbottsford.

La paroisse de St. Césaire possède deux maisons d'éducation supérieure : un *couvent* et un *collège commercial*.

La première est un édifice en briques, à deux étages et mansardes, de 72 x 44 pds., avec deux ailes de 30 pieds chacune. Elle fut bâtie en 1857 et bénite solennellement le 8 septembre, par Mgr. F. C. Baillargeon, évêque de Tloa : assistaient à cette imposante cérémonie : Mgrs. J. C. Prince, évêque de St. Hyacinthe ; A. Taché, évêque de St. Boniface, qui fit, à l'église, le sermon de circonstance ; un clergé nombreux et un grand concours de fidèles. Les classes s'ouvrirent le 15 du même mois.

Cette maison est sous l'habile direction des révérendes Sœurs de la Présentation de Marie, et a actuellement pour directrice Sœur Marie des Sept-Douleurs : elles sont au nombre de dix.

Le nombre moyen des élèves qui ont fréquenté cet établissement depuis son origine est d'environ 160, tant pensionnaires que quart de pension et externes.

Une des ailes est affectée à l'usage de la chapelle ; celle-ci a pour principale décoration un

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beau tableau de *St. Joseph*, peint à l'huile, sur toile, par la révérende Sœur M. Louise, de St. Augustin, de la Maison-mère, établie à Bourg, St. Andréol, France.

Le collège commercial de St. Césaire est aussi en briques, à deux étages et mansardes. Le premier corps de logis, bâti en 1869, mesure 80 x 44 pds., plus une aile adjacente de 40 x 24 pds., le haut de laquelle sert de chapelle.

Il fut béni, le 1er novembre, par le R. P. Resther, jésuite.

Les classes y étaient ouvertes depuis le 14 octobre.

Cette institution est dirigée par les Frères Joséphites, de Ste. Croix, dont la maison-mère est établie à St. Laurent, Ile de Montréal; ils ont actuellement à leur tête le R. P. A. Lemay, du même ordre. Le nombre moyen des étudiants est d'environ 170 annuellement. Outre les matières ordinaires, le *Français*, l'*Anglais*, etc., on y enseigne la *Télégraphie*, la *Tenue des Livres* et les affaires de banque.

Ces deux établissements sont dus à l'initiative, à l'énergie et à la générosité du Rév. Messire J. A. Provençal, curé de la paroisse, qui en a fait tous les frais et dépenses. Le premier a coûté

la somme de \$7,200, le second, celle de \$5,472, non-compris les terrains respectifs où ils sont assis, et qu'il a aussi donnés.

En 1874, une aile additionnelle en briques de 80 x 40 pieds, à deux étages, rez-de-chaussée et mansardes, fut jointe à la bâtisse primitive du collège. Elle coûte \$5,000, plus \$1,000 d'améliorations générales à l'établissement ; aux frais de la communauté, mais pour le moment le curé en supporta toutes les dépenses, capital et intérêts.

Avant la fondation du couvent et du collège, il y a eu jusqu'à quinze écoles dans la paroisse, la première établie au village, en 1831. Celle-ci, exclusivement affectée à l'instruction des garçons, depuis 1857, fut incorporée sous le nom d'*Académie*, par acte de la Législature, sanctionné le 16 août 1858 ; elle a fait place au Collège Commercial en 1869.

Il y a deux municipalités scolaires, depuis 1857 : deux arrondissements sous contrôle, dans le village, et treize dans le reste de la paroisse. Aujourd'hui, outre le couvent et le collège, on compte treize écoles élémentaires fréquentées par environ 400 enfants et une école dissidente pour une trentaine de familles protestantes, établies à la Montagne de Rougemont.

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VOIERIES.

Depuis 54 ans, un *pont* relie les deux rives de l'Yamaska au village. Le premier fut construit en 1823 par Louis Ruel; mais il ne dura que deux ans. Un second fut jeté sur la rivière, un peu plus haut, en 1825, lequel fut remplacé par un troisième en 1828. Celui-ci, bâti par André Bourgaud-Lacroix, et appuyé comme les deux autres sur de simples *chevalets*, devint *pont de péage privilégié* en février 1832. Ce pont a été renouvelé trois fois depuis; a été renversé par la grande inondation du 17 avril 1862; il a changé de propriétaires; appartient à la paroisse, depuis le 28 décembre 1875 et est destiné à être livré plus tard, *gratis* au public.

Pendant assez longtemps, surtout de 1840 à 1850, la paroisse de St. Césaire a servi de débouché aux townships de l'Est. Par sa position, elle était la voix naturelle de communication entre ces cantons et les grands centres des seigneuries. Pour faciliter le transport, le gouvernement fit construire en 1845, un *chemin planchéié*, se reliant avec celui de Longueuil (amélioré en 1843.) Cette amélioration donna une grande impulsion au progrès matériel de la paroisse; mais elle fut d'assez courte durée,

En 1852, le gouvernement transporta la propriété du chemin à une société formée de cinq citoyens notables du village. Cette société fit de grands déboursés pour améliorer et entretenir cette route qu'elle fut forcée d'abandonner en 1856. Alors, la paroisse et surtout le village subirent une certaine dépression, d'autant plus sensible que l'ouverture de la voie ferrée du Grand-Tronc par St. Hyacinthe, en 1848, et celle de *Stanstead, Shefford* et *Chambly* par Farnham, en 1861, fournirent alors des débouchés plus faciles et plus expéditifs aux colons des townships.

Jusqu'ici, les habitants de St. Césaire n'ont pu encore racheter cette perte, nonobstant la somme respectable de \$40,000, souscrite par eux le 20 novembre 1871, pour bénéficier de la voie ferrée de *Jonction des Cantons de l'Est*.

INDUSTRIES.—MOULINS.

Le premier essai en ce genre, dans la paroisse, remonte au commencement de ce siècle.

Vers 1810, il existait au *Ruisseau Soulanges*, à quelques arpents du village actuel, un petit moulin à scie, mû par l'eau, bâti par le seigneur H. M. Delorme, fils. Il ne subsista pas longtemps.

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La Montagne de Rougemont, la partie supérieure de l'Yamaska et la petite rivière *Barbue*, dans St. Césaire, possèdent plusieurs pouvoirs d'eau, dont quelques-uns assez puissants. On n'a pas manqué de les exploiter.

Depuis l'année 1810, à diverses époques, des hommes intelligents et industriels y ont construit plusieurs moulins, qui ont existé soit successivement, soit simultanément; les uns destinés à scier, les autres à moudre, à carder; quelques-uns cumulant jusqu'à deux ou trois fonctions.

On en a compté jusqu'à trois successifs à Rougemont, dont un mû par la vapeur, a subsisté de 1817 à 1850; trois aussi dans la *Barbue* et six dans le haut de la rivière. Quelques-uns de ces moulins ont cédé le pas à la *grande manufacture* en 1876 et 77.

En mai 1875, plusieurs citoyens actifs et entreprenants de la paroisse, le curé en tête, formèrent entre eux une société d'actionnaires dans le but d'exploiter plusieurs branches d'industrie à la fois. Cette société fut dûment incorporée par lettres patentes du 6 décembre 1875, sous le nom de "La Compagnie Manufacturière de St. Césaire." Elle a droit de posséder

jusqu'à son montant de \$30,000 ; et a pour but de "manufacturer le bois, le fer et tous autres objets de ferronnerie, et d'exploiter les moulins à farine, à scies et à cardes."

L'établissement est considérable et divisé en deux départements distincts, bâtis en 1876 et 77 : le premier est destiné à travailler le bois ; le second est affecté aux meules, aux cardes et aux ouvrages de ferronneries. On y remarque deux magnifiques foyers et deux engins de la force respective de 65 et 70 chevaux.

Les affaires sont bonnes, mais les dépenses d'entretien et de main-d'œuvre, ont jusqu'ici absorbé les bénéfices.

Le premier moulin à scie, dans la paroisse, fut bâti vers 1800 par un nommé Frambes, allemand, 50 arpents plus haut que l'église actuelle, à l'est de la rivière Yamaska.

COMMERCE.

En 1850, le *commerce* avec les Cantons de l'Est diminuait assez sensiblement. Dans le but de l'activer, L. H. Plamondon, écr., notaire et marchand du lieu, homme d'action et d'initiative conçut la première idée de la construction d'un *marché* au village. Il fut bâti en 1851 sur deux emplacements de chacun 80 x 60 pieds, donnés

gratuitement par M. et Mme. de Rottermund, seigneurs de Rougemont. Cet édifice en bois fut allongé vers l'année 1857.

Ce premier essai fut très-encouragé et réussit à merveille, si bien, qu'en 1865, on songea à agrandir le marché ou plutôt à le refaire tout à neuf sur une plus large échelle. Pour cela, l'emplacement fut augmenté de plus de moitié en front et en profondeur. Cependant, ce ne fut qu'en 1871 que la nouvelle bâtisse fut érigée pour le prix de \$2,660. Le marché actuel est un bel édifice en charpente briquée à l'extérieur et à deux étages ; l'un de 100 x 30 pieds est exclusivement affecté au commerce matériel ; l'étage supérieur, de 50 x 30 pieds, sert de salle publique pour les séances des conseillers municipaux de la paroisse, à la tenue de la petite Cour des Commissaires et aux autres assemblées publiques.

Outre plusieurs maisons de spécialités, commerciales, tels que chaussures, attelages, meubles, modes, etc., on compte dans le village de St. Césaire, neuf magasins principaux tenus par les sieurs J. B. Plamondon, J. B. Desautels, A. Maynard, Roy et Arcan, Oliv. Marcot, Jacq. Beauregard, A. Massé, T. Massé et J. B. A. Riendeau.

On y remarque aussi six hommes exerçant des professions libérales, savoir : L. H. Beaudry, Alp. Guertin et Antoine Dorval, écers., médecins ; C. Lepin, J. E. Gaboury et G. A. Giggault, écers., notaires. Point d'avocats.

Enfin, une *banque*, succursale de celle de St. Hyacinthe, a été ouverte au village le 28 novembre 1876, avec le modeste capital de \$50,000. Césaire Lepin, écer., en est le caissier.

Pour la somme d'environ \$5000, la corporation municipale du village vient de faire construire un *aqueduc* dont les eaux prennent leur source sur le versant sud de la montagne de Rougemont, distant de 4 milles. Encore actuellement (septembre 1877), on est à poser les *pipes* chez les propriétaires qui veulent se prévaloir de cet avantage.

Cet ouvrage se fait sans taxer les contribuables : on a fait un emprunt ; l'aqueduc le paiera par ses revenus annuels.
